

Escape plan — one class lady

PARTIALLY deafened by the tumult of up to 17,000 fans at the Palais de Omnisports in Paris, England fans were able to weigh up carefully, before their eyes, precisely what is keeping England in Division 1 of the European League, whilst the men's team have risen to the level we knew they were capable of reaching — second only in Europe to Sweden — and at this moment in time there is a sign of weariness in the Swedish

camp.

A team of brilliant young players, it could be England, it could be Russia or Yugoslavia or even France, might just topple Sweden from the top branch of the European tree before much longer, just like Alan Cooke took the England crown from Desmond Douglas, earlier than expected by some. However, Carl Prean was the star of the show in Paris. At times he looked strong enough to beat everyone in sight. Alan Cooke did not play as well as he did in Norwich and Des Douglas was delighted to contribute a supporting role, playing 1, 5, 9, giving him ample rests between his games and for England to have such experience on hand for the ninth game was a Parker mastermind coup, both France and Russia fell into the ninth game trap as Douglas powered home and the pressure was too great for the opposition.

But, it is highly unlikely that success is going to be recorded either in the Super Division or the Division 1 of the European League without a really first class woman player. Example — France took the European title from Sweden 4–3, thanks to the efforts of the Chinese girl Xiao Ming Wang, the new French No 1.

Holland stopped England in Norwich largely through the strength of Bettine Vreisekoop.

Competition is so fierce in the top divisions of the European League that it is almost impossible for the men to win all the singles and the men's doubles. Teams like England are almost two down before they

start when there is a player of the Vreisekoop class in opposition.

Since her astounding form at Brighton, Andrea Holt has failed to scale other mountains because she has such a tremendous amount to learn. She went through another stage of her apprenticeship in Paris, losing to lesser players than she rocked in Brighton. We can only hope that she, or one of the other three ladies in our squad, can rescue England next season.

A more tranquil situation is in prospect in the ETTA corridors of power. John Prean, the chairman is putting forward almost the same team of re-election of his vice-chairmen, with the stunning but welcome addition of George Yates, the former resigned deputy chairman, who is returning as a candidate for vice-chairman without portfolio.

Reading man wins at Hornchurch

30th ESSEX 3-STAR OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Magnificent Stokes halts Skylet

THE 30th Essex 3-Star Open Table Tennis Championships took place at the new venue of Harrow Lodge Sports Centre at Hornchurch. 295 entries were accepted but many were refused due to their late arrival, including Scotland's No 1 and 2 Dave Hannah and John Broe.

Saturday saw the men's and ladies groups played off with no major surprises. There were 60 groups of 4 players in the mens and 18 ladies groups of 3.

One thing about the venue became obvious at an early stage and that was the three flights of stairs and about 80 yards of corridor that separated the control tables from the playing area. Some of the older umpires booked taxis for the Sunday others wondered whether it would be safe to throw ropes over the balcony to the floor below and slide to their matches. Referee Dave Miller claimed he had no road map and refused to move!

The ladies were well represented with only Joy Dean missing from the top 11 English ranked players. The men unfortunately were minus Des Douglas, Alan Cooke and Carl Prean but the next 15 ranked were present.

The ladies' doubles went according to ranking up to the final then the No 2 seeds Fiona Elliot and Lisa Lomas toppled the favourites Alison Gordon and Mandy Sainsbury in two straight.

The men's doubles saw an upset in the quarter-finals when favourites Skylet Andrew and Nicky Mason went under to

Steve Dorking and Adrian Dixon, but this pairing was defeated in the semi-finals by John Souter and Colin Wilson the No 4 seeds. Graham Sandley and Philip Bradbury, who had ousted Bradley Billington and Sean Gibson, in the final. This hard hitting tactical match was eventually won by Souter and Wilson 22-20 in the third.

In the ladies' singles semifinals Alison Gordon beat Andrea Holt and Fiona Elliot came through against Lisa Lomas. The final was a hard fought match as Fiona Elliot No 2 seed just managed to edge out Alison Gordon 21-17 in the third.

The semi-finals of the men's saw Skylet Andrew home against Nicky singles scrape Mason in 3 games and Jimmy Stokes powering his way to victory over Kevin Satchell also in 3 games.

The final was a classic for young Jimmy, still in brilliant form following his victory in the Middlesex 3-Star Men's Open, the match see-sawed from one to the other until Stokes's passing shots saw him home.

The first finals played were the class 2 men's and ladies' singles. The ladies was won by Sue Collier beating Helen Lower in two closely fought games. Chris Oldfield took the men's from Joe Kennedy in a hard hitting three games scraping home 24-22 in the third.

The veterans' final was contested between John Hilton the No 1 seed and Ralph Gunnion No 3 who had put out No 2 seed Henry Buist in the previous round. John coasted home in two straight games.

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Jimmy Stokes from Reading, unlucky not to be at the European Championships in Paris must have made his bid too late, winning first the Middlesex Open and then the Essex. Mike Loveder captured one of the best action shots of the year with his cameras that have been very busy for Table Tennis News this campaign.

The end of the road

ENGLAND's battle for a place in the European Super Division for next season is over. At Norwich on 2 March they fought hard in front of a capacity crowd that roared them on at every opportunity, but to no avail as the Netherlands just held out getting the verdict - and

promotion 4-3.

It was indeed sad that the man who has done most for English table tennis over the past decade should have one of his very rare off-nights as Desmond Douglas lost the opening singles of the night to the Netherlands No 1 Paul Haldan and then when England fell behind for the third time at 3-2 he lost to Henk Van Spanje 19 in the third, having recovered from a 20-13 deficit. England captain, Donald Parker, kept the opposition guessing right through the evening as he gave all of his five players matches in tactical switches designed to disrupt the Dutch. His introduction of Carl Prean to partner Alan Cooke at 2-1 down was an immediate success as the two young players extracted themselves from early deficits in both games to snatch victory from under the noses of their more experienced opponents. Bringing Lisa Lomas in to partner Carl in the mixed doubles appeared to unsettle the Dutch as the English pair captured the first game but it was not to be as Haldan and the vastly experienced European No 2 Bettine Vriesekoop came back to win 18 in the third. Earlier Alison Gordon had fought gamely against Bettine but had gone down two straight.

Revelation!

Alan Cooke was a revelation. Following on his first Men's Singles national title at Crawley the previous weekend, he played with a maturity far beyond his expectations taking out Van Spanje in the second game of the night and in the final 'dead' rubber, Haldan without dropping a game. With Desmond having already announced his intentions to retire from European league play from next season it now appears as if England have a natural successor to wear Des's crown.

And now Hungary


What of the future? Well, next season it will be even harder to gain promotion. Belgium proved they are a force to be reckoned with in England's previous fixture and it is now known that Hungary have been relegated. They have been the most successful country in the 20 years of the competition, having won the Premier Division title five times and have finished second on four occasions. This is also the first time that they have been relegated in the history of the competition. There are also strong rumours that the USSR are returning to the scene and that they will start in the First Divi-

THE East Anglian 2-Star Open will be held at the Waveney Leisure Centre, Lowestoft on Saturday and Sunday, 7 & 8 May promoted by the Lowestoft League. The organiser is Russell King, 37 Grampian Way, Oulton Broad, Lowestoft, Suffolk NR32 3EP and the closing date is 17 April. Len Pilditch and Doris Moors are the referees, and the prize money is £730.

Swedish domination weakens

A POPULAR winner Mikael Applegren, a magnificent stadium, crowds up to 15,000 at peak times are just a few of the features of the 1988 European Championships at the Palais de Omnisports, Bercy, south-east Paris from 18-28 March.

Many of us have seen European and even World Championships organised in a sloppy fashion. The French were having none of that! The organisation was run on military lines. The officiousness of some the gateguards had to be seen to be believed.

To the table tennis — Appelgren, a popular Swedish winner in 1982 did it again; in the final he stifled the Russian challenge from Andrei Mazunov 15, 14, –18, 12 without a great deal of trouble.

Bounced back

The fireworks came in the preceding semi-final when Appelgren after losing the first two games, bounced back to beat Jan-Ove Waldner, the man who most people thought would win the title.

Every time Jean-Philippe Gatien, the successor to Jacques Secretin came into the arena, the noise was quite deafening—how the other players managed to retain their concentration is a mystery to me. But then in these huge stadiums some can play easily with all the noise and distractions, for others it wrecks their play completely at worst, or forces them into all sorts of errors at best.

Jorgen Persson was of course, the other young Swede who was well-fancied to win the European crown, but he was beaten in Round 3 by Gatien, a happening that was greeted with the greatest acclaim I have ever heard in Europe.

Eastern Europe continues to expand its monopoly over Western and Northern European players in the women's competitions. Looking through the quarter finals of the women's singles it is difficult to see an eastern name, let alone British.

The really classic chopper Fliura Bulatova is the new women's champion of Europe. She moves so fast to apply the backspin and usually succeeds in making her opponents overhit.

But watch out for the losing finalist — Ottilia Badescu (Romania) is only 17, the same age as our Andrea Holt. Badescu was only subdued at 12 in the fifth game of the final.

Fighting on

When England men stormed through the event and severely testing Sweden in the final, there were hopes that another fairytale was soon to emerge in the individual events. Carl Prean obliged as Alan Cooke never really got to grips with the best parts of his game in Paris. The Saarbrucken man, hitting harder than ever with the Lentec rubber long pimples, suddenly ran into trouble just before playing David Hannah.

Surprised

A Czech umpire, a member of the ETTU technical committee spotted that the rubber had disappeared from the official long list of approvals. Everybody looked surprised during the 35-minute delay as Carl changed his rubbers to something less lethal. He played on and beat Hannah with some discomfort and then hammered out Erik Lindh quite easily.

A great run

But the next day, Prean failed to handle Paul Haldan and just missed his place in the quarter finals after a great run. Prean had never lost to Haldan before, but always with his favourite rubber. At the stage in the fifth game of the eighth-final when Prean led 18-17, it looked as though he would do it, but Haldan is an improved player and he showed his class by stopping the English star who has now shown that he is a member of the young group of European men emerging to the top. So far, Sweden have not got a youngster in that class, or if they have, he is being kept under wraps!

THE RUBBER TROUBLE — THE FACTS

LENTEC long pimples marketed from Coventry by Stan Lenton's organisation has been registered and approved by the ITTF for several years. For some reason best known to Mr Lenton the annual fee was late, very late, arriving at the Hastings office of the ITTF. When it did arrive, the cheque was returned as being 'out of time'. I guarantee that anywhere else in the world, with the two associations offices in the same town, a friendly phone call advising that the Lentec rubber was off the list would have saved all the trouble before it started. But no such luck, the England squad went to Paris with 'illegal' rubber on three players bats — no-one in the England administration had realised the sad outcome. Whether Carl Prean would have been the European champion now if this had not happened we will never know. What is quite certain is that for seven days he was hitting the ball harder and more accurately than his opponents. He swept aside top world players like Waldner and Lindh and yet without the proper rubber he said his bat 'felt light', and that let Halden through and not Prean .- JW.

STOP PRESS: The sequel — the ETTA telexed the ITTF president Ichiro Ogimura in Tokyo. As a result the ban was lifted on 5 April in time for the England juniors in the Belgian Open to use Lentec coverings. The rubbers will be 'legal' until the new list is issued in June or July.

Silver medals for England men's team best for ten years

ENGLAND's outstanding performance, the best in Europe for ten years, in defeating six countries and then dragging Sweden through a desperate fight before the holders won 5-3 in the final, is the sort of happening that was always on the cards, although

only the most optimistic observers believed it possible.

The achievement of Carl Prean, Desmond Douglas and Alan Cooke who played unchanged throughout the four days of the team event is quite remarkable. Winning the silver medals will also reflect on the successful tactics employed by England captain Don Parker, who skilfully guided his three men to

victory.

Parker's decision was to play Douglas in the 1, 5, 9 order, giving him two games rest between each visit to the table and an 'ace on the table' if the situation climaxed at 4-4 as it did twice, against France and Russia. In both cases, Douglas's experience seemed to unnerve his opponents from France and the Soviet Union.

Pressure

Giving Desmond the No 3 role, put more pressure on Alan Cooke, who often faced the opposing No 1 first, whilst Carl Prean seemed to have on most

occasions the best order of play that suited him to such an extent that he won a splendid 14 wins and only four losses, two of them to Sweden in the final, although like Alan Cooke, they both defeated Jan-Ove Waldner.

Two years ago in Prague when Jorgen Persson won his European crown, I had doubts on his ability to maintain the pace, but those doubts proved to be without foundation. It was Persson who held his side together in the final against England with a maximum, a feat against England achieved only by Jean-Philippe Gatien in the opening game against France.

The new breed is emerging by ALAN RANSOME

IN JANUARY at the Leeds Euro-Asia in Cleveland and at the English Open in Brighton, it was clear that the gap between Asia and Europe in men's table tennis terms had eroded or perhaps even disappeared altogether which in itself is a very healthy sign for European table tennis. A second encouraging signal came out of the European Table Tennis Championships in Paris in that a new breed of young European players is emerging led by Carl Prean and Alan Cooke.

England did magnificently in the men's team event to win the silver medal. The team no longer relied on Desmond Douglas in fact if anything Carl Prean pro-duced the best performance although all three clearly played a vital part in the success.

In the final both Carl and Alan beat the European No 1, Jan-Ove Waldner of Sweden. In the semifinal against the USSR Prean excelled to win three including a victory at 4-2 down against Andrei Mazunov. Cooke produced good wins beating Jindrich Pansky, Zoran Kalinic and Boris Rosenberg in the team matches. In the singles Prean beat Erik Lindh despite the rubber fiasco.

From a European viewpoint it is not just England that are producing the future top stars. France, the host country, have a brilliant player, Jean-Philippe Gatien who won three in the team event against both England and Yugoslavia. Russia have a very attractive young team with great potential shown by Andrei Mazunov's younger brother, Dmitri. Yugoslavia have two emerging stars in Zoltan Pri-morac and Ilija Lupulesku whilst Hungary have Zsolt Harczi and Czechoslovakia has Tomas Janci. West Germany has Jorg Rosskopf as their new big hope. He reached the semi-final of the men's singles. Another talented youngster Steffen Fetzner is backing him up.

All of these players come from a country with a traditional history of strong table tennis but

another emerging nation with great potential is Belgium with Jean-Michel Saive and former Hungarian Andras Podpinka. Saive in fact beat Mikael Appelgren the eventual singles winner in the team event.

With all this talent around and the Asian gap bridged the future for European table tennis looks rosy. But what about Sweden?

The Swedes clearly had a marvellous championship having four players in the last eight of the men's singles and winning the team event plus of course Appelgren winning the singles for the second time.

Although the current squad have been around for some time Appelgren beat Waldner in the final of the European Championships in Budapest in 1982, they are still quite young, with Waldner 22 and Persson only 21. They are setting the standard for the rest of Europe to aim at. That standard is high but it is my guess that in two years time when the Swedes host the Europeans, they will have their work cut out to repeat there successes in Paris.

Russians, Czechs in command

AS EXPECTED Russia and Czechoslovakia dominated the women's team event with the Soviet Union winning the final 3-1 against the Czechs.

England women's team started off at a great pace. On the first day they-were unbeaten, halting Romania 3-2 and Denmark 3-0, two very respectable wins but there the winning stopped for the English ladies, starting with a four 3-1 defeat by West Germany. There were some bright spots - Lisa Lomas beat Valentina Popova, the former European champion from Moscow but it became all downhill.

At the end of the team event

England playing for seventh-place lost 3-2 to France and finally finished eighth, further proof it it were needed that English women's table tennis is way behind the men, similarly European women are far behind the standard of the Asians.

Almost every team in Europe has people from other countries in their teams. Not content with two Romanians — Georg Bohm and Olga Nemes — in their national team the Germans have now come up with a useful Korean player Jin Sook Cords, but she was beaten by England champion Alison Gordon in the team

Magnificent England! SWEDISH RHAPSODY

I SAW every point involving England's men's team in the European Championships and I cannot recall any other table tennis event that was more exciting to watch. England were magnificent. Des, Cookie and Carl played their hearts out and the team spirit on the bench from Skylet Andrew and Donald Parker, in addition to the resting pair, was such that each opponent found himself fighting five Englishmen at once. The play was superb and the atmosphere so tense and electric one could not help becoming emotionally involved.

We came so close to winning the European title against Sweden, now considered at least on a par with world champions China, that our team can now tackle any opponents with a good chance of success. I give Don Parker a lot of credit for this. He prepared a fit, confident, fighting outfit with a team spirit second to none.

Time for Change

I think the time has come for the European Championships to be split so that Team and Individual events have an interval between them possibly as long as one year. The suggestion was made to me in Paris by Jacques Secretin and I agree with him.

The reason is that the general standard of play in Europe has improved to such an extent that it is no longer possible for players to raise their game for two major events in the same week.

In my day, we could afford to rest our leading players against such countries as Holland, Austria, Bulgaria and the Scandinavians and win without difficulty. But now players are under pressure from the first point because there are no weak teams in the top two groups. Paris provided a good example.

Apart from Mazunov of the USSR, who wilted in the final, not one of the eight men with best results in the team events was able to progress further than the last 8 in individual events. The 1990 European Championships are due to be staged in Gothenburg. I urge the European TTU Executive Committee seriously to consider one year's break between team and individual events. This would enable players to be at their peak for both, it would be a treat for the public and also provide two bites at the cherry from a financial point of view. If the ETTA were to propose this I think that most other countries would support

Lessons

Carl Prean just might be European singles champion today if his bat had not been banned. The

only thing wrong with the brand of rubber Carl was using - and has used for the past five years was that the manufacturer had somehow failed to pay Approval Fee when it was due so the ITTF withdrew it from its list without the knowledge of most of us.

In these circumstances, were the ITTF right in mid-season to penalise players who had spent up to £40 for their bats? Surely 6 months notice should be allowed before making a rubber illegal? And what about the method of announcing the ban? This could scarcely be called adequate. If the son of the ETTA chairman didn't know he was using an illegal bat covering, how should anyone else from international to club level be expected to know?

I'm not blaming anyone in particular. Frankly, I don't think the powers-that-be realised the extent of the problems they were creating by banning a particular brand of rubber without sufficient notice. The least we might have expected would be a prominent advance notice displayed in TABLE TENNIS NEWS. must not happen again.

Ichiro Ogimura, the former world champion and current President of the ITTF, and his colleagues, have always been most considerate and sympathetic towards players of all standards throughout the world. I am confident that now with hindsight, they will produce a new, fairer rule which will quite correctly penalise the manufacturer without sabotaging the players interests.

IN THE palatial POPB Sports Stadium of Paris - Bercy, the exciting players from Sweden dominated the men's competitions winning three titles - the men's singles, the men's doubles and the team event. The supremacy of the Swedes can be gauged by the fact that four of their players reached the last

eight of the singles.

The semi-final between Mikael Appelgren and Jan-Ove Waldner was a classic that brought the crowd to its feet and made the eldest forget their varicose veins. Table tennis at this level is something to be experienced rather than explained, there was tension, excitement, inspiration, frustration, joy, athleticism and breath-taking brilliance. We are now becoming accustomed to the Swedish players turning up at a tournament, just doing what comes naturally and walking away with the top prizes. The semi-final we witnessed in Paris however, was something special and although it made the final pall in comparison its impact was a marvellous advertisement for table tennis. The winner of this epic was Mikael Appelgren at 19 in the fifth and he went on to bewilder and tame the spirited Russian, Andrei Mazunov, in the final. It says much for the strength in depth of the Swedish team, when it is realised that Mikael Appelgren, the European champion was not even selected for the team event final. It is my considered opinion that Sweden has the finest team of 'shakehands' grip players in the world and even the whirlwind 'penholders' from China will have to look to their laurels at next year's World Championships.



The young ladies of the USSR showed their superiority by winning the team event, women's singles and the silver medal in the women's doubles. Much of their success centred around the talented Fliura Bulatova whose patience and immaculate defence tamed the more venturesome 'loopers', topspinners and all out hitters. The final of the women's singles was another crowd pleaser in which a young Romanian girl, Ottilia Badescu, with a style in many ways reminiscent of the former Czech champion, Marta Luczova, made a terrific fight of it for four games, only to find the resilience of Miss Bulatova just too much in the fifth and final game. Sadly our girls met with mixed fortunes, they performed adequately but their challenge in the team championship fell lamentably short when they finished in eighth position.

PARIS POPULAR WITH THE JOURNALISTS

A RECORD number of journalists, 267, were accredited in Paris. Worried by the large numbers the French tried to get the AIPS (Association Internationale de la Presse Sportive) to apply a closed shop (professionals only, which is contrary to ITTF policy. Alan Ransome and Brian Spicer were amongst a group who filed copy for British papers but were without the AIPS cards. But after negotiations the British Press Corps — Eaton, Woodford, Ransome, Spicer was installed.

PREAN ALMOST WINS JOOLA

CARL PREAN's stunning play that startled everyone in the team events almost captured for him the Joola Trophy — he came second to Andrei Mazunov — with 52 points against Mazunov's 57. The trophy is presented by the AIPS (Association Internationale de le Presse Sportive), which is the organisation for professional sports writers.

The points system is 3 points for a win in the first stage of the team event with increased points for the later stages.

Fiuira Bulatova (USSR) won the Joola women's trophy with 41 points, easily from Bettine Vreisekoop with 34. A second win in the final against Sweden would have given Prean the Joola cup.

EMOTIONAL EUROPEAN OCCASIONS

TABLE TENNIS played at such a high level in a huge stadium can have a surprising affect of people's emotional state. Weeping is of course, medically, a natural release of tension.

Three Britons wept in Paris at least, there may have been more — Skylet Andrew was overcome when he lost to Ulf Carlsson in Round 3 in the fifth game 26-28, after holding a match point seconds earlier. Jill Parker was in tears as England were beaten in the men's team final.

Dundee-based photographer Brian Webster wept in his hotel after he had been roughly handled by security staff trying to obtain entrance to the Press Centre to take a photograph of Carl Prean at a press conference. Webster paid £100 to take photos and was only allowed on the floor on three occasions. He has vowed never to return to the tournament.

I talked to Neil Bevan in Stroud last February, he told me that he began playing some five years ago and became England Schoolboy Champion Under-19, also England Schools International Under-16 — Eng-Ireland.

Neil got as far as the last 16 in the European Championships in Athens in the extreme heat of summer '87, and became player of the month in the Nat British League during December 1987.

One of the most level-headed lads that I have ever interviewed Neil has no illusions of grandeur regards table tennis, he fully realises at 14 years of age that as a player, you have to be very very good to make even a decent living out of the game, thus it did not surprise me at all when he mentioned the possibility of entering banking as a chosen career. This hardened old pen-pusher most certainly wishes you Neil — all the success in the world — both in your chosen career and in table tennis.

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JERMYN LONDON CHAMPION

LONDON's Thames Insurance Central League held their Annual Closed Championships in March at the Brixton Recreation Centre.

Peter Harry was the Men's Singles No 1 seed with Mike Hammond at No 2. However, Hammond's non-arrival left the bottom half of the draw open to surprise results. Richard Beckham beat No 3 seed Joey Kennedy 14, -14, 17; and Mike O'Leary beat Percy Collino 10, 17. Beckham went on to beat O'Leary only to lose to Steve Davis in his semi-final. In the top half Peter Harry had a tough draw having to beat Clifford Grant and Dave Svenson in his group. Nevertheless he reached the semi-finals with a win over Peter Norcott from Essex.

Middlesex veteran Trevor Campbell beat Surrey veteran Frank Hams only to be knocked out by the in-form Richard Jermyn. Both Harry and Davis fell to Jermyn as he took the title comfortably.

The four Men's Doubles seeds were Kennedy/Jermyn, Collino/ Hammond, Beckham/Harry and Norcott/Campbell. Last year's runners-up, Mike O'Leary and Mike Loveder were unseeded but reached the final again with wins over Brian Garroway and Steve Davis and Dave Svenson and Bernt Vogelmann in the closing stages. A magnificent come-back

'IT MAY have been the end of our promotion hopes, but I am confident it will prove a new beginning.' So I ended my Notes last month. It seems a good way to start today. Defeat against Holland WAS a bitter pill. In Paris our players picked themselves off the canvas and staged a magnificent come-

I was proud of our girls. Both Alison and Lisa had excellent wins, the former's against Otila Badescu (Finalist in the singles), the latter's against Valentina Popova (a former European champion) and the team victory against Rumania being particularly good. Plenty of hope for the future and plenty to think about, to find the difference between winning regularly and occasionally at this level.

The 'Blue Riband' .

The 'Blue Riband'...
Our men's silver medal in the blue riband event, the men's team championship, gave us some unforgettable days. After a desperately difficult match against the hosts, France (5–4), some of Europe's top nations were swept aside by big scores, finally Yugoslavia (in the semi-finals of the World Championships last year) by no less than 5–1. There followed that epic against Russia, a 5–4 semi-final win after being 4–2 down. Only Sweden defeated us in yet another midnight classic. We were closer than the score suggests. The door seemed to open, but we did not quite manage to walk through it.

The Chinese of Europe

However, our men had played quite superbly. This time we must maintain the momentum and then go on to even greater things. Success brings both new dangers and opportunities. One recalls Tokyo where we reached the semi-finals of the World Championships in 1983 and how everything then fell apart. This time we must keep moving forward. moving forward.

Some years ago I described the Swedes as the Chinese of Junior Europe. One can now add 'Senior Europe' as well. The new champion Mikael Appelgren was not even in their team, at any rate not in the closing, important matches. One presumes the first four positions in Europe's ranking list will be occupied by Swedes and two more will not be too far behind. Some think they may now be even better than the real Chinese. Dortmund next year will see a real contest.

Ticket to a high class party? How good is our team? Will we have a ticket to that high class party where Swedes and Chinese fight for the supremacy of the table tennis world? I hope so, but we shall have to do an awful lot right in the meantime. We tend to be distracted by a lot of minor diversions en route to the main events and targets. The players can't do it all. They need support from all of us, from a united sport.

Worthy Champions . . . Appelgren and Sweden were worthy champions. Both deserve our admiration as winners and entertainers. I hope very much we shall be able to present these great players to our public next season. They are

a credit to the game.

I have already mentioned Carl Prean for which, I hope I shall be forgiven. I would like to pay tribute to both our new champion Alan Cooke and to Des Douglas for their skill and dedication in these championships. It was a real team effort. Each played an indispensable part, each deserves an equal share in our victories. A special word of praise for Skylet who had to sit on the bench for day after day and then came out with world class performances in the singles. He is quite right. Our players are being consistently under-ranked in Europe, but perhaps that will end now.

How goes the 'Revolution'?

On my return the Editor sent me a copy of Pat Snoxell's unusually interesting letter, which you can, indeed should read (see *Mailbox*). The drop in membership of 4.6% he lists merely establishes a

possibly more hopeful trend, since earlier years have shown bigger drops. That 57 Leagues have increased their memberships at least

shows this can be done.

When I ran for election I listed three major points. Membership was one of these. It has remained an absolute priority. The main contribution the governing body can make on that front is to give the sport a higher national profile. This will be achieved by greater media, particularly TV exposure. Two sports shop managers told me that the day after our TV appearances there was a 'run' on bats. The purchasers bought these to play table tennis, one hopes within our clubs and leagues. Equally I hope that each time the sport is in the public eye, more and more people will begin to take an interest in the sport. The results of years of neglect, of failure in the market place certainly will not be reversed overnight. I can see some hopeful trends. Much remains to be done. We CAN claim a 'marvellous recovery' in terms of publicising and advertising our sport. We compete with at least a hundred sports for TV time. We have made a great start in my terms of office. Both the English Open (BBC) and Euro-Asia (Channel 4) were outstanding successes. The latter blazed new trails in sheer artistic excellence. It made the sport look good, something many of our own members doubted at one time. When I ran for election I listed three major points. Membership was something many of our own members doubted at one time.

I return from time to time to this recurring theme. It takes two to tango. I have always said that the sport has room for all people of goodwill who want to work for it. It is self-evident that the sport has made considerable progress in a short time. In my own mailbag the positive letters outnumber the negative ones by at least 20 to 1. However, the latter usually write to the magazine, the former to me personally, which creates the illusion of a coherent 'opposition' when, in fact, there is none, as two consecutive elections have shown. It is right that there should be free criticism, but equally that the sport should move forward, so that it satisfies our own members and attracts new ones. If it does not do this then, as Pat says, it will have been a false dawn and I shall have worked many thousands of hours for nothing. I do not think this for a moment. The future has never looked brighter.

Our teams apart, it was not an event which will long stay in my heart. To list a long string of complaints would be all too easy, but boring to my readers. What was missing can be expressed in one word: WARMTH.

It was a magnificent stadium. Every day, no matter how unimaginative the scheduling, there were thousands of spectators, perhaps as many as 12,000 on peak occasions, but the enthusiasm and friendships of Cleveland and Brighton were missing. It was a chilly and often officious occasion. It was not a good one for Table Tennis, except that the event inevitably generated its own grandeur and this rescued it from the mistakes and irritations.

Deputy-Chairman Alan Ransome and I did good business for the Association and a number of promising initiatives are now in the pipeline. Our trips will not cost the members one penny.

Another cause celebre . . .
You will have read about the sudden banning of a bat rubber as the tournament was nearing its closing stages. There was, of course, nothing wrong with it except that someone was alleged not to have paid registration or renewal fees. Be all that as it may, it seems very odd to cut off my neighbour's electricity if I don't pay my bill and that, roughly, appears to be how that matter was dealt with. Three English players had to change their bat rubber at short notice. One of them had at that point been thought by some experts as having a fair medal had at that point been thought by some experts as having a fair medal hope. That we shall never know, but it seems a very strange way to decide major championships. Very strong protests will go to the ITTF. In our view, innocent players got a raw deal as a result of clerical formalities outside their control. That is no way to run a sport or to gain the respect of our fellows.

The vanishing defender . . . I could not see a single defender in the Men's Category 1 matches, the result of the red/black rule change earlier — much applauded then, but were these predictable consequences considered or foreseen? Is anyone thinking about how we shall find the next Bergmann or Takashima or will future generations of men do nothing but topspin at each other?

Most of today's great players defend well from the barriers, none more so than the Champion Appelgren. Waldner, Persson and Carlsson are not far behind.

The hero of Cleveland, Waldner, had a strange tournament, including a 13 and 5 beating from Carl Prean which must have been painful before perhaps 10,000 spectators, but suddenly he again looked a winner as he led Appelgren by two games to nil in the semifinals. It was not to be. The Russian Mazunov had a superb tournament, though he had little left in the Final. He won the Joola Troubly (head or points a warded in the term events) Carl Preserves.

THE Leeds Euro-Asia in Cleveland contest highlighted the gap between the European and Asian women's game, whilst the European men clearly demonstrated that they are now on a par with the Asians. Furthermore, apart from a few spirited individual performances, our women did not feature at all in the final contests.

Both the president, Maurice Goldstein, and the chairman, John Prean, have individually expressed their concern about our apparent lack of progress in the women's game and therefore I have agreed to undertake a project to consider what can be done to bring our performance closer to the Europeans and Asians.

This will necessitate assessing the situation at the grass roots level through to the national teams and formulating a plan of action to encourage greater participation and to provide better opportunities for women players.

The role of women in the sport has always been a subject dear to the heart of Jose Ransome. This is another attempt to whip up some enthusiasm and to try and find out why in England and Europe we are so far in arrears of the Asian ladies — J. W.

THE NEW COACHING QUALIFICATIONS

by STUART SNEYD, Vice-chairman selection and coaching

WITH effect from 1 April, 1988, the old coaching qualifications will be superseded by new ones as shown below:

OLD
Club coach
League diploma coach
County diploma coach
Diploma 2 Star coach
Diploma 3 Star coach

NEW ETTA assistant coach ETTA coach

ETTA senior coach

Strong links

The new qualifications, borne partly out of a need to 'professionalise' the art and partly out of a desire to remove the 'boxes' of club, league and county, will have strong links with the Leeds-based National Coaching Foundation. Student coach registration will cost more but the package which drops through the letterbox will be well worth the money and will include seven NCF booklets covering the whole of the coaching scene. Twelve hours theory and 12 hours practical will be required (no change) prior to assessment for the award of assistant coach.

Written paper

The next level, that of coach, will require 12 months service as an assistant coach, 12 hours advancement theory, attendance at three half-day or evening NCF courses and the purchase of an NCF booklet dealing with physiological aspects. Assessment for the coach award will include a written paper to be submitted in advance.

Two years service

The highest award, senior coach, will require two years service as a coach during which time it will be necessary to attend two NCF weekend courses. This award, along with its NCF attendance, will be by way of nomination only.

The majority of the NCF courses chosen have a strong psychological bias in a deliberate attempt to cover a serious weakness within the coaching scheme. Psychological aspects are become significantly more important and must figure predominantly in our future development.

The date changes

Syllabes for the new awards are available from the coaching administrator at Hastings.

From 1 April 1988 all existing league and county diploma coaches will become ETTA coaches. Similarly, existing Diploma 2 and 3 Star coaches will become ETTA senior coaches. New badges will be available at £3 each. Existing club coaches will be given a year's grace in which to qualify (without any NCF input) as ETTA coaches. If this option is not taken up, automatic regrading to ETTA assistant coach will take effect from 1 April 1989.

NICKY Jarvis has resigned as National staff coach. His decision has been based on a number of factors but, contrary to a comment made in the *Daily Telegraph* has nothing whatever to do with the national coaching situation.

Just prior to his departure Nicky stated 'I have worked well with Stuart Sneyd and Donald Parker in restructuring the national coaching scheme and prospects for the future are exciting. I am looking forward to continuing my involvement with the association as a volunteer.'

Vice-chairman, selection/coaching, Stuart Sneyd, has already offered Nicky the job of coach education officer. This has been accepted and from the start of the new season he will be responsible for running all ETTA courses for the new ETTA coach qualification.

Opening of Kingfisher Club

TABLE tennis took one small but significant step forward last month when the latest addition to the meagre number of purpose-built clubhouses in England was opened in Berkshire.

Lack of adequate playing facilities remains table tennis' greatest problem as a participation sport in this country and every additional building acquired for table tennis is crucial.

The new Kingfisher Club building was formally opened by Johnny Leach, MBE in front of many honoured guests including John Redwood, MP for the Wokingham district in which the clubhouse is situated. The building was the culmination of four years hard work, in the first instance the ambition of the old Omega Club and (when Omega found they had bitten off more than they could chew) from the half-way stage combined with Woodley table tennis club. Friends from past and present of both these now wound-up clubs were at the opening to celebrate a major achievement. Reg Hart, cofounder with myself of Omega, came from Derbyshire for the evening and was amazed at the quality of the self-help building. Where previously had been a lawn, there was a four match (six practice) table venue with coffee bar, rest room and toilets; all warm and comfortable and well decorated.

Exhibition

The opening evening passed extremely well and was enjoyed by all. Buffet and wine were supplied in quantity, a commemorative programme supplied, an entertaining table tennis video was screened and the whole evening was capped by some great exhibition match play by members, Dave Barr, Matthew Syed, Sean Gibson, Chris Oldfield, Alison Gordon and Mandy Sainsbury. Dave Fairholm was the MC and the exhibition organiser.

Presentations were made to Jim Hodder and his wife Jean in acknowledgement of their contribution to the building of the clubhouse and to Johnny Leach for taking the time and trouble to be our guest of honour for the even-

ing.

The 'main man' behind the finished article has been Jim Hodder. As a long-time member of both Woodley and Omega he helped bring them together to form the new club but more than that he was the architect, the builder and a good proportion of the labour force in getting the clubhouse erected. Literally, without him there would be no Kingfisher Club premises.

He would acknowledge, I am sure, that without the energy injected into the project by Woodley at a time when the impetus was flagging, there would have been nothing to open last month.

Proud chairman

Equally, without the provision of the land by Berkshire County Council, the project would not, quite literally have got off the ground. Many other people and organisations too numerous to mention helped along the way. It is now hoped that Kingfisher becomes a club in the spirit of its

members as well as a club with a superb headquarters.

I am proud to be Kingfisher Club's first chairman and to see an ambition come to fruition - I hope the players take advantage of the facilities available. John Fenton (president), Colin Dyke (secretary), and John (treasurer) complete the officers of this brand new club. These and the rest of the committee, Sue Stoute, Mike Bullock, Mike West, Brian Halliday, Jim and Steven Hodder, Derek Crombie and Shane Kirton are treading pastures new with such a building to administer but are hoping to set Kingfisher on the path for a successful future.

The combination of Omega's skill at producing a succession of national and international standard players; Woodley's expertise of running a large, well organised and friendly club, together with the talents of new Kingfisher members augurs well for the future of a club which provides table tennis for all.

Tam available for coaching in Sussex and am working as a regional coach with Father Bernard Rowley for the ETTA,' he said.


The new company is Alan Hydes Sports Ltd with Alan the director and his wife Jenny as company secretary. Seems like a winning combination and it's - welcome back to the South!

SENIOR Premier — Middlesex, after 6 successive years as champions are deposed. The scene was set at the Railway Institute, York when Middlesex and Derbyshire, both unbeaten, met in the last match of the series. And what a finale! The match score stood at 1–1, 2–2, 3–3, 4–4! Final set of the final match and it was down to Colin Wilson (Mddx) and Bradley Billington (Dy). Bradley got on top and won 15 and 16 to dethrone Middlesex and clinch the title for Derbyshire.

A vital factor for Derby was Alan Cooke returning from Sweden to represent his county. Alan convincingly won all his singles events and the mixed doubles with Julie Billington. Bradley Billington, who played in both series of matches, was also great — he lost only one singles event, to John Souter. Julie Billington had a vital win in the match v Middlesex beating Lesley Tyler 23 and 13. John Holland also played his part with 6 singles wins of the 10 he played and, with Bradley Billington, won 5 of their 7 doubles.

In an earlier match Middlesex had been 1-4 down to Lancs but made a great fight back to win and keep their hopes alive.

There were some tense struggles in the relegation zone. When the last round of matches began 4 teams were in danger of relegation with Yorks at the foot of the table. Yorks, with 3 junior players in their team, then had a fantastic 8–1 over Leics. This left Essex and Surrey for relegation — Essex after just one season. It was hard luck for Surrey who lost 3 matches at 4–5.

Press officers are hard-pressed

THANK you for another interesting TT News February 1988. Having received the magazine since 1953 up to 1968 with Kent in mind and up to the present with Avon, I must agree with the South-West Region news by Alf Peppard. Caving represented Weston-Super-Mare TTA on the Avon Management Committee over many years, it is a disappointment that Avon has only had I suggest 5 at the most Counties' reports (I stand to be corrected on the exact number) but you have to know the background. In the past offers have been made to do press officers post but at the AGM (or even before) its been turned down.

The gentleman who holds this post has two positions on the County Committee and, may I add, he does one of these with first class honours, but in all fairness this means that the press officers job suffers.

I feel very strongly that one position should be filled by one person only (especially if there are volunteers about). But with all groups of people, personalities and other aspects, these take their place and TT suffers.

It must be remembered that if you stand at the AGM you are expected to stand together despite personalities and to be seen to fulfil your role, with only one aim in mind, the furthermore of our sport.

I do realise unless information is forthcoming to the press officer, to some extent it does not help, but on the other hand information has to be sought.

One important factor regarding my statement of one person one position does mean more people are involved in the administration at county level and should, if possible, be drawn from all the leagues within the county structure (officers as opposed to delegates). Thus spreading the load all round the county, not relying on the few to do all the work, which so often happens.

There is no doubt about this situation too few people doing too many jobs, which in the end result that certain aspects must suffer, also excepting the fact all the people concerned do this hard work on a voluntary basis, getting pleasure out of giving others on organised sport and the enjoyment that goes with it.

Mr Shepherd has this to say . . .

IN the manner of the Test and County Cricket Board, our own ruling body, the ETTA has always been in the habit of shooting itself in the foot. The much loved Charles Wyles was at the helm in 1977 when Denis Neale was thrown out of the England team on the eve of the World Championships and then meekly reinstated following legal action on behalf of the player. The late lamented Tom Blunn spent most of his period of office attempting to defend his policies against the onslaught of our present leader.

Now that we have 'John' the friend of the people in charge, we have successfully seen the 'redundancies' of two of our finest coaches, the resignation of yet another, and the imposition of a swingeing fine upon our No 1 player for an alleged breach of contract. Following hard upon the heels of this has come failure to win promotion from Division 2 of the European League due largely to the inability of our disgruntled top player to beat Dutch players ranked miles below him in the European Ranking List.

Coming to the domestic scene, I have gone carefully through the monthly articles of the chairman in the hope of finding some mention of the steps he might be taking to revive the County Championships and/or the British League. After all, everything which happens in table tennis in this country stems from the administration of the game by the County Associations.

Without them there would be no coaching, no umpires and no organisation of the many facets of the game. So is it too much to ask that the County Championships should be allowed to take place with the best players available.

I have just discovered that at the final weekend of the County Championships my own county (Essex) and Surrey were relegated. It is not sour grapes to point out that Skylet Andrew and Nicky Mason were unable to represent these two counties because the ETTA, heavily in the red if 'John's is to be believed, had seen fit to send them off to play in a minor international open tournament in the Middle East. As far as I know the counties mentioned were not even asked if they minded. I cannot help commenting that the main impression one gets of the Chairman's articles is one of selfcongratulation which does not appear to be justified.

Nicky Mason and Skylet Andrew as professionals could hardly be expected to turn down an invitation to play (and win) an international open to play in the county championships instead, unfortunate that both their counties being relegated. The chairman will answer Mr Shepherd's other missiles:

Chairman's reply:

Mr Shepherd is certainly an expert at shooting himself in the foot and must be listened to with respect on that topic. I thank him for his topical recollections (circa 1977, Charles Wyles and Denis Neale). The implication that a top player lost matches because he was 'disgruntled' I find insulting to the player. He played his heart out against Holland when he lost and against Belgium when he won. I was there on both occasions.

I have said all I want to say on the honouring of contracts and redundancies. Both topics were fully aired and in this magazine and National Council. One thousand players play in the county championships. A few years ago I was one of them and I had a very happy time. Similarly the British league is in very good shape. We found good sponsor-ship for both of them. It is not clear why Mr Shepherd should think either is in need of 'revival'. Both are cornerstones of the ETTA and will have our best endeavours. As for his great 'discovery', I am afraid his facts are at fault. The 'minor . . . tournament in the Middle East' to which he refers is the Israeli Open to which English players have gone for three years. The decision whether to play or not was that of the players. The trip was not funded by the ETTA. It is correct that we were 'heavily in the red' when I arrived. With my team I have worked energetically to put this right and some success will be reported. As for 'self congratulation', it seemed ironic that on the day I first saw Mr Shepherd's unpleasant little letter, another member wrote that there had never been a chairman who sketched so clearly and openly the many problems facing the Association and yet helped to keep morale high both as a result of attitude and achievements. You pays your money and you takes your choice.

12 hours a day

The achievements of the sport during my time as chairman have been substantial and that is why the members have re-elected me. I work 10-12 hours per day unpaid and with very great enthusiasm. I leave false modesty to those who have, as Churchill put it, much to be modest about.

Brighton: as the ATTP co-ordinator saw it . . .

AS a spectacle, Well Done! Layout was good, viewing also, our Sponsor's banners displayed at every opportunity, the Officials as smart as ever in their blazers, and the hotel superb as usual.

But oh! The scheduling of important matches! What on earth is wrong with the Tournament Committee, that despite all their preparation and hard work, they can still carry on with the same old system that has been complained about so many times?, and still make bad jugdements in specific placing of good matches?

An interesting Men's singles, last 16 or quarter-final (I can't remember which) was first called for table 11, at the far corner of the hall, right away from either main grandstand or small stand viewing, when two or three front tables were free! Thankfully, someone saw, or was made to see, sense, and switched the match to one of the free tables before it started; yet earlier the Referee had several times called for spectators not to stand in the aisles to watch matches on those distant tables! What does he expect, if some of the most interesting singles matches are played there?

There are still too many of these men's last 16 matches, which everyone wants to watch, being put on at the same time, so that one doesn't know which one to concentrate on, and misses a great deal of the action; this is very disappointing, and we cannot accept the necessity. I noticed Alan Pascoe stalking the hall and viewing from every vantage point, no doubt he will have some comments to make.

Irritating?

The ATTP has previously put a complete tournament scheduling system, including the later stages, to the ETTA, devised after much thought by David Parr some years ago. Of course, this had the usual effect of irritating the 'powers that be'.

However, this was before the new regime, and perhaps John Prean's sweeping changes and business-like approach will bring a change of heart in committee.

The worst piece of scheduling I saw was undoubtedly the shabby way an obviously injured World Champion was forced to play first a three-set Mixed Final, then almost immediately a five set last 16 v Des, and 10 minutes later the five-set Quarter-Final with Persson. In my view this contributed greatly to his defeat.

For me, and many others, Jiang was actively and potentially the best player on view, and I would have reached that conclusion even had I not known he was World Champion. His sheer speed and athleticism had to be seen to be believed; his concentration so intense that I got the impression that he often wasn't aware of the score!

And what a sportsman! — Twice at crucial stages, once v Des and once v Persson, he deliberately gave away a point when an edge was claimed against him, but the Umpire would not award it (why, when both players agree?), and received a loud, appreciative ovation from the crowd each time. His happy, smiling personality was likewise a joy to behold, both on and off the table.

In company with many other players, I was once again very disappointed with what was televised, and the quality (or lack of) commentary.

Surely we can make representations to the TV companies to allow us to make a positive contribution towards a successful format, which will project our game to the viewing public in the most interesting way?

Prepared

The BBC has recently been asking for viewers comments on all sports presentation, and the ATTP is quite prepared to tackle this very important part of all our ambitions for increasing the popularity of the game, if the ETTA is disinclined to do so.

Likewise, we would be pleased to provide a knowledgable player to advise the TV commentator, and to give informed comment when required. Table tennis is now a very deceptive, as well as a fast and exciting game to watch, and some explanation is needed when apparently unforced errors are made by world class players, and how different styles of play affect each other. In particular, the 'sleight of hand' used in services employing spin and non-spin, and the interaction of Asian 'penhold' and European 'shakehands' strokeplay.

Why do the TV companies always spend most of the airtime on the Men's singles finals, which are almost always a complete anti-climax and 'turn-off' (literally) as this one was?

True, they did on this occasion first show more exciting semifinal between Song Hui and Waldner, but why on earth couldn't they have had a camera there earlier to record the terrific five-set fighting performances from English players? I'm quite sure that Des v Jiang, Alan Cooke v Waldner, or Andrea Holt against No 3 seed Jiao Zhimin

would have provided much more interest and excitement.

Similarly, there was several other superb men's matches in the last 16 and Quarter-finals of which a compilation of the most exciting rallies would have really shown our sport and its top players to best advantage.

It seems to me that we *must* persuade the TV companies to either provide a video camera and technician during the later rounds of major events such as this, or allow *us* to do it ourselves, and provide them with film to edit, preferably in consultation with ourselves.

The New world: will it ever arrive?

THE revolution of John Prean was long overdue but there is real danger that the years of gentle stagnation may have resulted in irreparable damage to the game. The recent tournaments at Brighton, Thornaby, and Crawley were all successful and the organisers deserve full credit. The Cleveland Tournament backed by the traditional enthusiastic supports unique to the North East and Donald Parkers expert TV commentary was particularly outstanding.

As a result everybody's talking about a 'new world in the morning' which may never arrive. It is easy for calm reason to be swept aside in a mood of euphoria but excess hype will be counter productive. Richard Eatons claim that 'English Table Tennis is making a marvellous recovery' is premature and we all remember previous false dawns which have been quickly followed by disillusionment.

Analysis

The real guide to the true state of the game is provided by the membership figures and I have compared the values for the same Leagues using the ETTA electoral registers for 1987 and 1988. Analysis of the membership figures for the 40 counties and the one non-county group show that only three increased in number Wilts and Lines, each by I and Surrey by 4 teams. The total number of teams declined over the year from 13,097 to 12,498 and the 599 fall represents a further 4.6% drop. John states that 'numerous Leagues have increased their membership' and according to my calculations, 57 out of a total of 252 showed an increase but this is more than offset by the majority still in a state of decline.

Influenced

It is unlikely that the new team's decision to join was influenced by changes at the top but it is due to the efforts of a small hard working minority at grass roots level. John is correct in stating that 'expanding Leagues have active youth schemes' but many are more concerned with veterans activities. In my own experience, there is generally apathy regarding declining numbers amongst the average once a week players who are not concerned for the future.

Crisis

With low membership, the game will be in a permanent state of financial crisis and there will be nothing to spare for the Table Tennis centres that would attract new players. This is the dilemma that will continue to plague the game and it will need a tremendous effort to reverse the decline within the next five years but I hope that I am over pessimistic.

Membership fell in Cleveland from 94 to 84 teams during the past year and the degree of success of the recent Tournament should be assessed not by the volume of applause but the 1989 entry.

Essential

Unity is essential if Table Tennis is to stand a chance of real and not cosmetic recovery. Inevitably, John Prean has upset some individuals during the period of transition but past feuds should be forgotten in the cause of progress. There is still a long way to go but at last, we are at the end of the beginning. PAT SNOXELL

When McKim and Edmonds finally met in a repeat of the previous week's Northampton final, McKim got quickly into his stride, and an Edmonds win seemed as remote as an Eddie Edwards gold medal.

Not hungry

However, with the first end under his belt, McKim appeared to lose his appetite for the destruction of a long-time colleague and Edmonds, riding his luck, gradually came to terms with the situation levelling the match with a flourish.

With former record holder, Dick Cole a close observer, Edmonds continued in similar vein to take a 5–1 lead in the third and then maintained a narrow advantage as McKim struggled to find his true form. Trailing 17–16, McKim faced his moment of truth and was not found wanting, as he reeled off the final five points with some superb attacking play to complete a sixth successive victory.

McKim and Chris Handshaw also repeated a Northampton success in the Men's Doubles, having more difficulty with Rafe Miller and Richard Elliott in the semi-final than they did with Steve West and Steve Kendall in a one-sided final.

Lenient

A third success went McKim's way when he took advantage of a lenient mark to win the Premier Division Handicap. Playing off minus nine, he eased his way into the final where he met Kristina Cox, who starting with a 17-point advantage played with so much flair that the resulting duel stirred the emotions of the respective supporters, but at the end of it all there could only be one winner, and that was McKim.

Miss Cox featured in three other finals, going down to Alison Boxall — the sixth name to go on the Ladies' Singles trophy in the last six years, partnering her conqueror to victory in the dou-

TSB Sussex Closed Championships

IT is a firm belief now in Sussex table tennis that Phil Smith, for so long a top name in the county, will never win the coveted All Sussex crown. This follows his latest attempt at the title when seeded number one he lost to Bexhill's Stephen Moore in the final round, 21–19, 21–16.

In fact it was the first time Smith, 32, had ever reached the final whilst Moore was trying to regain the crown he lost in 1985. This clash gave Smith the chance for revenge after losing a semifinal in that year after leading 20–17 in the final game.

At the outset Smith seemed more determined playing aggressively down the Bexhillian's backhand, but then Moore slowed the pace down with clever topspin mixed with a long chop-ping game. Smith still led 19-16 before Moore played some spectacular shots to pinch it 21-19, Smith was clearly distraught at the start of the second game and despite some excellent rallies he fell 15-5 behind. It was only then that Smith really threw caution to the wind with some blinding counter hitting to grovel back to 19-16 down. Once again though Moore found his composure and range to clinch the match 21-16. So in the absence of his brother, Adrian, Stephen had put the cup back on the Moore mantelpiece.

Both the top seeds reached the final with victories over the 3rd and 4th seeds. Smith hammered and dethroned the 1987 champion Ritchie Venner 21-11, 21-14, gaining revenge for his West Sussex defeat earlier in the season. Moore had a fight before seeing off Hayward Heath's Paul Elphick 26-24, 21-18 in an encounter which saw Elphick lead all the way through deuce and 7-1 in the 2nd only to blow his chance. In earlier rounds 16 yearold Alan Cole produced the real shocks of the day defeating both Robin Stace and the 6th seed Tony Murrell before being subdued by Venner.

To make the day complete for the Moore family Teresa won the Women's title for the first time since 1985 — and what a way to win it with a final victory over the top seed and Scottish International Janet Smith, 24–22, 21–17.

Moore was as psyched up as I have seen her for this final and she was as fiery as ever with her shots on the table neutralising the Scottish girls big attacking forehand. Despite trailing in the first game Moore pegged Smith down the backhand to go 20–15 ahead, Smith reacted with some

good serving to level at 20–20 before Moore held her nerve to win 24–22. Tactically Moore played as well as I have ever seen her play and the same pattern followed in the 2nd game with Moore exploiting Smith's back-hand flank to take the title at 21–17.

BOOK REVIEW

The Lentec Table Tennis Manual

by RON CRAYDEN

ALTHOUGH classified as a minor sport, table tennis, over the years, has had a surprising number of books written about it, in fact my own private collection is now approaching the 400 mark. Most of these literary outpourings however, have been 'teach-ins' directed towards the development of an individual's game. Valuable as such books can be, they do of course have limitations.

Refreshing

It was therefore, most refreshing to receive the Lentec TT Manual, a unique publication devoted exclusively to equipment and its usage. As far as I know, something never previously attempted or indeed achieved. When asked to review the manual, I envisaged myself ploughing through a dull and boring text of technical theories, but I was mistaken as from the beginning I found it to be interesting reading. I must point out however, that the manual is essentially for the table tennis enthusiast and its main purpose is to impress upon the reader the most important things to know about the properties and use of blades, rubbers and sponges.

Concise

It covers the subject in a concise and forthright manner. The complete text has been written with considerable forethought and skill and reflects the needs of players with different styles and abilities. Although it could be

described as a product of scientific research it describes the equipment in understandable terms and never becomes a boring exposition of technical details.

Recommendation

This is a publication that I would recommend to any table tennis person, whether an aspiring beginner or an experienced, campaigner.

Ogimura spends few hours in Paris

ICHIRO OGIMURA, President of the International Table Tennis Federation flew into Paris to visit the European Championships. After talking to a few people he held a press conference and flew out again. He is clearly making progress in his target of visiting eighty countries.

With the Olympic Games only months away, the pace of life is extremely high. He told journalists 'Juan Samaranch (President of the IOC) needed assistance from the ITTF with the Korean issue, we were able to help him try to solve some of the problems concerning the political situation between the North and the South.'

'For a decade the Olympic movement suffered from the Munich killings — a decline boycott started from Munich. The IOC needed new and enthusiastic recruits — table tennis is one of them,' he said.

On Seoul he said, 'There are some problems with the sun getting in through the roof of the gymnasium and the floor needs some attention. The quarter finals onwards will be televised live.'

'I am very impressed with the enthusiasm for table tennis worldwide. We are setting up a seminar in June. I am asking for a number of expert lecturers including Mr Albert Shipley of the ETTA,' he said.

Amongst a host of other interesting points Mr Ogimura mentioned the setting up of a new event for the future, the China Open and that in Japan, table tennis is the No 1 participant sport, above all others.

OFFICIALS ROBBED

PARIS appeared on the surface to be a fairly safe place at night. But Hans Gabe, president of the West German Association was robbed in Paris; fortunately he was not hurt by a street gang.

On the way to the tournament on a night train a Swedish official taking cash to the tournament to pay for the Swedish party's expenses was robbed.

No shocks at team finals

RESULTS went very much as expected when the National Finals of the Dunlop National School Team Championships took place at Lea Green, Matlock, on 19 March.

Two schools - Kesteven & Grantham Girls and Cumnor House, - successfully defended their titles, Brookhouse (Girls' Under-13), Parkview (Boys' Under-13) and Selby High (Boys' Under-16) were new names on the trophies, whilst The Grove, Market Drayton (Girls' Under-16) chalked up their ninth national title.

Ifield Community College, winners of the Leach-Carrington (Boys' Under-16) trophy last season stepped up a gear to lift the Boys' Under-19 title for the first time. Their match against Budehaven - led by England Under-14 champion and No 1, Neil Bevan, was expected to be close but the Sussex boys all played well. Even though Alan Cole was one of Bevan's victims this was the Cornish boys only success. Highlight of the 7-1 encounter was Scott Greenbrook's 25-23 win over Bevan, fighting back from a 15-20 margin.

Kesteven & Grantham Girls were head and shoulders above their opponents, Luton and Stoke Sixth Form Colleges, holding on to their Girls' Under-19 Crown with 8-0 and 6-2 verdicts.

Opportunity seized

Selby High became North Yorkshire's first-ever finalists and seized their opportunity well with 6-2 wins over Mayflower and Brislington.

Cumnor House, led by the talented Darren Blake, raced to their third successive victory in the Boys' Under-11 event - a considerable achievement.

Last year three Barrow-in-Furness teams finished in runners-up places but this year Parkview and Yarlside Primary (Girls' Under-11) made no mistake.

The closest contest came in the Under-13 Girls' event where Brookhouse, Bucknall (one of three Staffordshire girls' finalists) had some anxious moments before No 2 Julie Bickerton clinched the decisive fourth set, going on to win 5-3 over debutantes, Bredbury.

Euro-Asia: Full marks again . . .

TABLE tennis became a great sport once again over the weekend of 16-17 January when the stars of both Europe and the crack Asian countries converged on Middlesbrough for the Euro-Asia spectacular. I was one of the lucky ones — I was there.

What I saw that weekend was in a word unbelievable. Everything from the breathtaking play to the organisation of the event was first class. On the organisation side it would be unfair to single out one person yet referee Tony Chatwin and the organiser Alan Ransome must take enormous slaps on the back. One person whom many people did not see but were always reading his thoughts was Les Wooding on the electronic scoreboard. All weekend his nimble fingers were working away at messages which brought news of joy, frustration, results and encouragement mainly for our English players who performed with such distinction over the weekend.

Carl Prean could not have started the tournament off better when early on Saturday morning when many people were still drifting in he defeated the world champion Jiang. This result must have inspired not only the English players but also the Europeans who threw all they had at the Asian players — despite the fact that three Asians reached the semi-finals.

First rate

The effort of our English players was first rate but in particular both Prean and Nicky Mason came out with the honours both reaching the knockouts stages. Mason's victories over the two Japs to qualify were brilliant. Our two top juniors Bradley Billington and Matthew Syed performed with great maturity and will be a force for the future years. Alan Cooke had a tough group (but who didn't!) but he also performed well before succumbing to the top German Bohm. Our ladies performed as well as any of the other European women there but Alison Gordon had the best result beating Daniela Guergueltcheva in her group. The Asian women are at this moment in a class of their own in world table tennis and this was shown at both Middlesbrough and later in the week in Brighton.

Ice-cool

At the end of the day talent shone through when the ice cool Swede Jan Ove Waldner threw

the Thornaby Pavilion into frenzies of excitement, firstly to come from the brink of defeat to win against Kim Song Hui and then thrash the chopper extraordinaire Lu Hung Sang. What was to follow has seldom been seen in this country as he took on Yoo Nam Kyu in the final. Clapping and cheering was usually the limit but as well as this we had shouting, stamping of feet on the wooden floors and whistling mostly when Waldner won a point. Some of the table tennis the Swede played when he had established a lead in the final game was breathtaking. At the end the crowd went beserk and a standing ovation followed as the Swede raised his arm to salute the crowd who had supported him so well. When the tournament had finished my hands were red and my voice was gone but it had been more than worth

The exhibition which followed between Jiang and Teng Yi fell flat on its face following what had gone before it — mainly thanks to a Swede called Waldner who had entertained us beyond belief. A European upstaging the Asians — unheard of until that weekend! PAUL ELPHICK 29 Franklynn Road,

Umpires are not cracking down

I WRITE as head coach for the Norfolk County Association and the Norwich and District League, also as a county umpire. To express my concern at the lack of consistency by umpires in respect of the service rule.

The two worst aspects are flat hand (or lack of it) and the height the ball is projected upwards. The law is clear. It states the hand shall be flat! and the ball shall be projected upwards at least 16cm!

Umpires do not have discretion to decide whether or not players are gaining advantage or not the facts are that these are not complying with the law, therefore illegal and should be called.

It makes our task as coaches extremely difficult when our players see county matches, international matches and tournaments where the service law is being broken and players not being faulted.

to Kate Goodall from Yorkshire.

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

The Centenary of Table Tennis

by GERALD GURNEY

TABLE TENNIS is about a hundred years-old, but when exactly should we celebrate its centenary? The game was probably first played - with improvised equipment and no formalised rules - in the 1880s, but this is too vague to count as its 'invention'.

No firm dates are known before the 1890s when several patents were registered, the earliest being David Foster's cricket/ football/lawn tennis parlour game of 24 December 1890. It was long thought that this item might never have been put into production, but one example has been found and is now in the Gurney Collection. It is mostly in very good condition - and remarkably complete, with only one piece missing from a total of 53.

Service direct

As the photograph shows, this game is very much lawn-tennison-a-table, with tennis markings (on a baize surface), strung rackets, about 18 inches overall, and a 'fence' to prevent the balls going too far astray. No rules survive, but it is almost certain that service was direct over the net. This is the first miniature variation of lawn tennis for the table in a manufactured form, but can it be regarded as table tennis?

In 1891 John Jaques & Son registered their 'Gossima', but there is no evidence that this was put into production then (or

later) though some examples of their 'Gossima or Ping-Pong' sets (with rules) have survived. This is certainly the 'modern' game, the cloth and 'fence' now having been dispensed with - though the 'one-bounce' service continued for some time. But we have no firm date for Jaques' production of these sets.

Game formalised

In December 1901, within a few days of each other, the Table Tennis and rival Ping-Pong Associations were formed. The game was then formalised, most unfortunately with two separate codes, but it had definitely arrived.

Perhaps the 1990 English Open should be declared the special event to mark the first hundred years; and no doubt there will be plenty of other ideas for celebrating the occasion.


This would promote The Leeds at county level and directly involve those outside ETTA affilia-
