Methodology

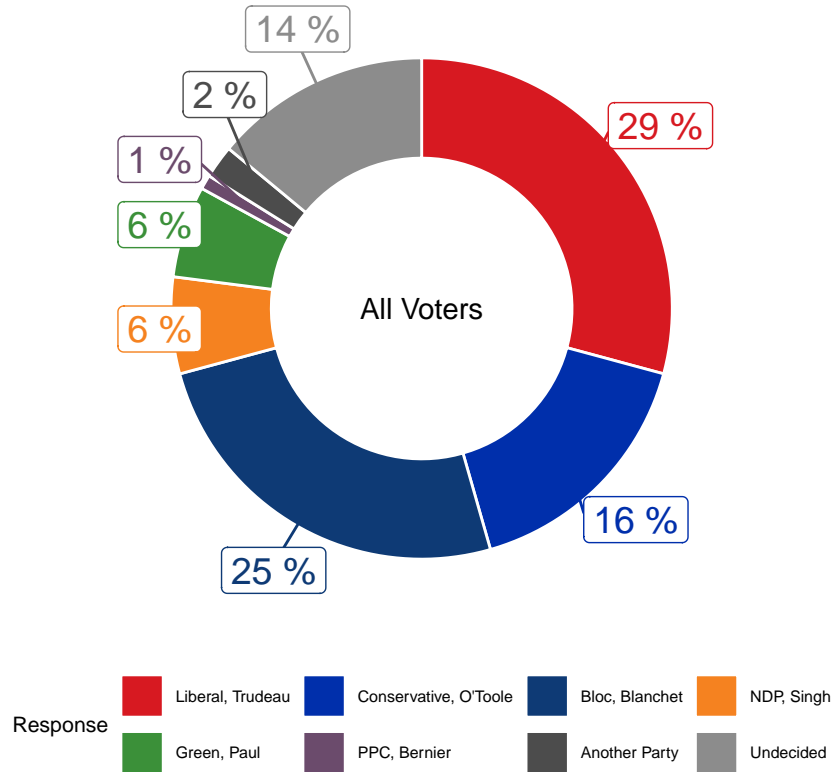
The analysis in this report is based on results of a survey conducted on September 4th, 2021 among a sample of 370 adults, 18 years of age or older, living in the federal electoral district of Châteauguay—Lacolle. The survey was conducted using automated telephone interviews (Smart IVR). In the case of telephone interviews, respondents were interviewed on landlines

and cellular phones. The survey is intended to represent the voting population in Châteauguay—Lacolle.

The margin of error of this sample size is +/- 5.1% at the 95% confidence level. Margins of error are higher in each subsample.

Totals may not add up 100% due to rounding.

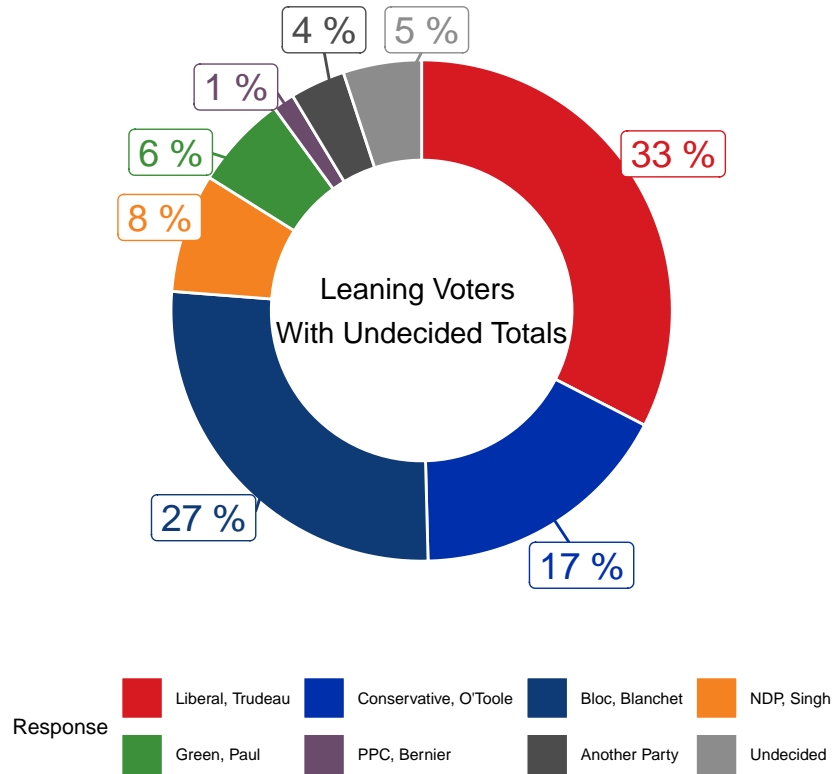
If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? (all voters)

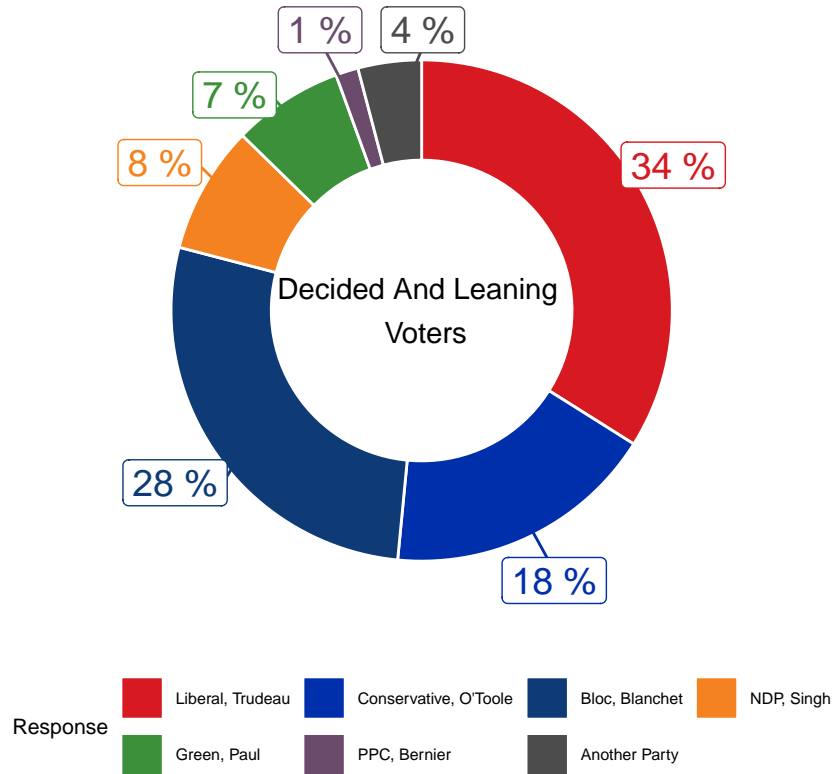
If a federal election were held today, which party would you vote for? (leaning voters with undecided totals)
