1. What is your profession and for how long? I am self-employed, and have been the owner of Custom Ideation for 3.5 years. My background is in business operations/organizational development/sales/marketing in

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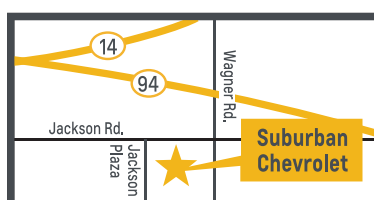

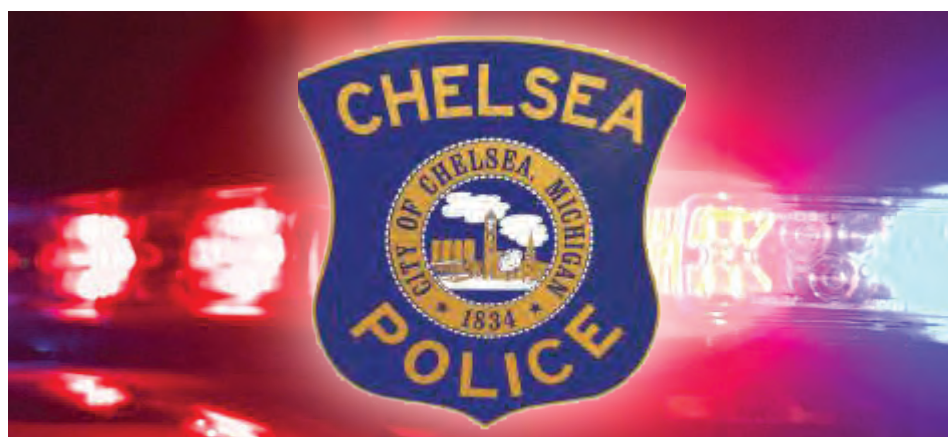
