


Season Preview

Last season's Cortland Red Dragons won 17 games, reached the SUNYAC semifinals and competed in the ECAC Upstate New York playoffs. The 2004-05 squad will look to build upon its previous success with physically improved returning players along with a group of very talented newcomers. Tenth-year head coach Tom Spanbauer is very excited about the blend of youth and experience as well as the offensive potential of this year's squad.


Although the team appears to be somewhat young, with only two players on the roster with more than one year with the program and a total of eight new faces on the team, Spanbauer has a group of players with significant college experience. Each one of the returners enters the season stronger and in better condition and many of the newcomers bring a physical presence to the floor.

The strength of the team is a deep bench loaded with players who can bring instant scoring punch to the floor. Spanbauer has good size on the perimeter and looks to exploit matchup

problems. The team features a number of players who are very competent on offense, making the Red Dragons a difficult team for which to prepare.



Junior Frank Ranieri was second in scoring and led the team in rebounding last season.

The offense starts at the point, and running the show again this season is senior Justin O'Garrow. O'Garrow had an outstanding junior year, averaging 10.0 points and 5.4 rebounds per game. He led the Red Dragons with 119 assists (4.3 per game) and set a singleseason school record with 86 steals. Last season, he proved he could play with the top point guards in Division III and still looks to improve his overall game in 2004-05. Seeking playing time behind O'Garrow are junior transfer Danny DiMartino and freshman Derrick Fish. DiMartino was a two-year starter at Manhattanville and his experience running an offense is his strength. Fish is a tenacious defender and thrives on pressuring the ball.

The depth of scoring at the perimeter positions hopes to be a strength of this year's team. Sophomore Dave Jutton started all 28 games last season and averaged 9.9 points per game while hitting 64 three pointers. Junior Brian Kirchhoff led the team with 69 treys and averaged 10.0 points and 4.0 rebounds per game. Both earned significant minutes in 2003-04 and are proven long-range shooters capable of carrying

the team. Junior Simon Skrelja is in his third year with the program and averaged 1.6 points and 1.9 rebounds per game in 23 appearances last season. Sophomore Rod Headley played in all 28 games with 10 starts last season and averaged 3.0 points and 2.1 rebounds per game. Skrelja and Headley, along with 6-4 freshman Jamie Procino, have the ability to put the ball on the floor and create off the dribble. Two other newcomers, sophomore Dave Maggiacomo and freshman Michael Jankiewicz, have demonstrated the ability to utilize the threepoint arc within the team's offensive sets.

Junior Frank Ranieri, an honorable mention All-SUNYAC selection last season, is Cortland's most experienced

player. Ranieri is a crafty, blue-collar forward, who is a serious scoring threat from anywhere on the floor. He was second in scoring last season with 12.9 points per game and led the team with 6.4 rebounds per game and enters 2004-05 with an overall improved game. Freshman Quentin Merritt is a smaller but quicker forward, who can score around the hoop and will also be called upon to handle rebounding responsibilities.

While the Red Dragons may be a little small at forward, they do have size in the middle with 6-8 freshman Joe Sargent. Sargent is a true center with a very evident presence on both ends of the floor. Sophomore Chad Perkins, who averaged 2.3 points and 1.8 rebounds per game as a freshman, has improved his strength and ability to defend and will be looking for more playing time this year. Both Sargent and Perkins are competent back-tothe-hoop or face-up scorers. Also competing for time is 6-6 freshman Rich Budde out of Clarence High.

Much like last season, Cortland's overall balance will be critical to the team's success and how far it can go in the conference and in the postseason. While Spanbauer

believes the Red Dragons have improved as a team, he notes that the entire SUNYAC has improved, making for no easy games. The deeper bench should make Cortland competitive in every game and an explosive offense hopes to provide plenty of excitement throughout the season.

Coaching Staff



Tom Spanbauer Head Coach

Tom Spanbauer enters his 10th season as SUNY Cortland's head men's basketball coach in 2004-05. He earned both National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) East Region and New York State Basketball Coaches Association "Coach of the Year" honors twice after leading the Red Dragons to NCAA Division III "Sweet 16" playoff appearances in 1999 and 2000.

Spanbauer has been named the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) "Coach of the Year" three times, most recently in 2001 when he guided the Red Dragons to a 21-7 record, the SUNYAC regular-season title and an ECAC Upstate New York tournament appearance. He also won the award in 1997 and 1999.

Spanbauer's overall record at Cortland is 149-100 (.598), and he enters the 2004-05 season one win shy of matching Pete Corey for career victories at the College.

In the 1999-2000 season, the Red Dragons enjoyed a school-best 24-5 season that featured a school-record 18-game winning streak. They were SUNYAC tournament and regular-season champions. In 1998-99, Spanbauer's squad went 23-7 and captured SUNYAC regular-season honors.

Cortland has played in the post-season eight times since Spanbauer's arrival. In 2003-04, the Red Dragons were 17-11 and qualified for the ECAC Division III playoffs. The Red Dragons were 13-13 in 1997-98, appearing in the ECAC playoffs and winning their fourth consecutive SUNYAC Eastern Division title. In 1996-97, Spanbauer led Cortland to a 19-9 record and the program's first-ever NCAA playoff appearance. In his inaugural season at the helm in 1995-96, the Red Dragons posted a 16-12 record and advanced to the finals of the eight-team ECAC tournament for the first time in school history.

"Our program has a focus on the holistic development of the student-athlete, and we continually strive to expose our players to the best athletic and academic opportunities available at the Division III level," said Spanbauer. "As a result of this focus, many of our players have been recognized through college, regional and national awards and scholarships."

Prior to his arrival at Cortland, Spanbauer was the head coach at Alfred University for one year and an assistant at Alfred for five seasons. His 1994-95 Saxon unit posted a 12-13 record, the best at the school in five years. Spanbauer also handled athletic administrative and physical education teaching duties at Alfred. He was the Saxons' head men's tennis coach for four years and women's tennis coach for one year. He currently serves as Cortland's interim associate athletic director and teaches in the physical education department.

A Niagara Falls, N.Y., native, Spanbauer was a three-sport standout at Niagara Catholic High School. He graduated from Cortland in 1983 with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education and earned a master's degree in 1986 at the College while serving as an assistant varsity and head junior varsity coach. Spanbauer was a four-year letterwinner, two-time team captain and two-time All-SUNYAC selection with the Red Dragons' basketball squad. He finished with 1,106 career points, including a 427-point effort during an All-ECAC and All-State senior season.

Prior to his coaching at Alfred, Spanbauer served as the freshman basketball coach at Albany High School from 1986 to 1988 and as an assistant basketball coach at the University at Albany from 1986 to 1989. He has also been involved with basketball at the Empire State

Games, both as a player (Adirondack Region, 1988, and Western Region, 1990), assistant coach (Western Region 1993-96, including gold medal teams in 1994 and 1995) and head coach (Central Region, 1997-99). In addition, Spanbauer has served as the director of the High Five All-America summer basketball camp in Liverpool, England, and currently is the director of the Red Dragon Basketball Camp.

Maurice Maggiolino Assistant Coach

Maurice Maggiolino enters his third year as an assistant coach on Tom Spanbauer's staff during the 2004-05 season.

Maggiolino has coached at many basketball camps throughout New York State, including Le Moyne, Army, Nazareth and the Adirondack Basketball Camp. He was also the head coach for the Central Region Open men's basketball team at the 2004 Empire State Games and an assistant coach for the Central Region at the 2003 Empire State Games.

Maggiolino most recently served as a student assistant coach for the men's varsity basketball team at Ithaca College. Prior to that, he assisted with the Bombers' junior varsity squad.

Maggiolino is a 2002 graduate of Ithaca, where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Health and Physical Education. While at Ithaca, he competed in the basketball program for two seasons. He is currently studying for his master's degree in Physical Education at Cortland.

A native of Clay, N.Y., Maggiolino graduated from John C. Birdlebough High School in 1998, where he participated in basketball and soccer, earning all-league honors twice in basketball.

Mac Knight Assistant Coach

Mac Knight enters his second season as an assistant coach on Tom Spanbauer's staff during the 2004-05 season.

Prior to Cortland, Knight coached the Ithaca High boys' varsity basketball team from 1993-2002 and the Ithaca High boys' modified basketball team from 1989-92. He also served as head coach of the softball and junior varsity football teams from 1990-94 at Ithaca, where he is currently a physical education teacher.

Knight earned a bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill in 1977, where he played junior varsity basketball for two seasons. He earned his master's degree in Recreational Education from Cortland in 1997.

Knight currently resides in Cortland and has three daughters --Stephanie, Angela and Margaret.

Buddy Mahar Assistant Coach

The 2004-05 season is Buddy Mahar's first as an assistant coach with the Red Dragons. Mahar brings a wealth of experience at all levels of college basketball to the program. Mahar has been head coach at Division I Columbia University and Division III Johnston State (Vt.). He has also been an assistant coach on the Division I level at the University of Vermont and Fairleigh Dickinson (N.J.)







2003-04 Game-by-Game Recap

Williams 85, Cortland 66 (Williams Tournament) (Nov. 21; Williamstown, MA)

Defending national champion and nationally top-ranked Williams shot 51.1 percent from the field on its way to the win. Frank Ranieri shot 5-of-8 from the field and led the Red Dragons with 14 points. Brian Kirchhoff scored 13 points and added seven rebounds in his Cortland debut.

Cortland 84, CCNY 54 (Williams Tournament) (Nov. 22; Williamstown, MA)

Cortland opened up a 47-26 lead at the half as Jon Rother scored 16 of his game-high 20 points. Bryan Ortquist made all seven of his field goal attempts and finished with 16 points. The Red Dragons outrebounded CCNY 43-26 and shot 51.6 percent from the field. Rother was named to the All-Tournament team.

Cortland 71, Elmira 52 (Nov. 25; Cortland, NY)

Cortland used a 20-2 run in a six and a half minute span in the first half to increase an 11-10 lead to 31-12 with 3:40 remaining. The Red Dragons led by double digits the rest of the way. Frank Ranieri scored a career-best 25 points, including 17 in the opening half, and grabbed a team-high nine rebounds. Justin O'Garrow added 11 points, nine assists, eight rebounds and four steals.

Brockport 83, Cortland 76 (Dec. 2; Brockport, NY)

The Red Dragons opened SUNYAC play with a tough loss on the road. After trailing 57-46 with 11:38 remaining, Cortland went on a 17-6 run to tie the game at 63-63 on Jon Rother's layup. Brockport, however, scored the next six points and went on to the victory. Rother and Frank Ranieri led the Red Dragons with 18 points each.

Cortland 93, Fredonia 74 (Dec. 5; Cortland, NY)

Cortland jumped out to a 22-8 lead and never looked back as it hit 54.5 percent of its shots, including 11-of-24 treys, in the big win. Jon Rother led the way with 22 points, while Justin O'Garrow hit 8-of-11 shots for 17 points and added seven assists and six steals. Brian Kirchhoff connected on 5-of-7 three pointers and finished with 15 points.

Cortland 65, Alfred 63 (Dec. 6; Alfred, NY)

Jon Rother scored on a layup at the buzzer to give Cortland the road win. Alfred led by as many as seven points in the second half, but a pair of three pointers by Brian Kirchhoff tied the game at 61-61 with less than a minute remaining. Rother finished with 23 points, Kirchhoff scored 12 and grabbed seven rebounds and Justin O'Garrow contributed nine points and eight assists.

Cortland 64, Ithaca 56 (Dec. 9; Ithaca, NY)

Cortland rallied from a 47-38 deficit with 12:51 left in the game. Dave Jutton tied the game at 51-51, then gave the Red Dragons the lead with a pair of three pointers. Frank Ranieri, who finished with a game-high 21 points, buried a trey to give Cortland the lead for good, 57-54, with 4:17 left. Justin O'Garrow sealed the win with three late free throws. Jon Rother added 18 points and seven rebounds.

Cortland 80, RIT 78 (Dec. 19; Rochester, NY)

Justin O'Garrow hit a driving layup with four seconds left to break a 78-78 tie and thwart a furious comeback by the Tigers. Cortland led, 74-60, with 5:21 left, but RIT tied the game on a pair of free throws with 36 second remaining. Frank Ranieri led five Cortland players in double figures with 19 points. O'Garrow finished with 17 points, six rebounds and six assists.

Cortland 97, Hartwick 65 (Jan. 6; Cortland, NY)

Cortland connected on six three-point shots, including at least one from each starter, in the first 6:04 to open up a commanding 24-8 lead. The Red Dragons pushed the lead to 31-8 and led by at least 19 points the remainder of the game. Frank Ranieri led the offense with 17 points, Simon Skrelja connected for a season-high 13 and Chad Perkins chipped in with a season-high eight points.

Plattsburgh 80, Cortland 65 (Jan. 16; Plattsburgh, NY)

Plattsburgh used a 13-2 run to extend a 51-49 lead to a 64-51 advantage late in the game on its way to the conference win. Dave Jutton scored 21 of his career-high 27 points in the opening half for the Red Dragons. Jon Rother added 16 points and Justin O'Garrow contributed nine assists.

Potsdam 75, Cortland 63 (Jan. 17; Potsdam, NY)

The Red Dragons trailed by one point at the half, 38-37, despite shooting 65 percent from the field, including 6-of-9 from beyond the arc. Potsdam pulled away midway through the second half. Frank Ranieri led Cortland with 16 points. Jon Rother chipped in with 13 and Dave Jutton added 12.

Cortland 76, Ithaca 64 (Jan. 20; Cortland, NY)

The Red Dragons scored 10 consecutive points in the final 1:41 of the first half to stretch a 31-29 lead to a 41-29 advantage and led by as many as 10 points the rest of the game. Jon Rother scored 14 of his team-high 17 points in the opening 20 minutes. Brian Kirchhoff added 14 points and Rod Headley grabbed seven rebounds.

Cortland 81, Plattsburgh 64 (Jan. 23; Cortland, NY)

Cortland raced out to a 19-4 lead in the first 6:48 of the game and led by at least 12 the rest of the way. Brian Kirchhoff connected on 5-of-8 three pointers and scored a season-high 22 points. Jon Rother shot 7-of-10 from the field and added 17 points, and Frank Ranieri connected for 13.

Cortland 72, Oswego 60 (Jan. 24; Cortland, NY)

Cortland took a 37-34 lead into intermission on the strength of a 13-3 run to close the first half and pulled away with a 10-2 surge midway through the second half. Justin O'Garrow scored 18 points, grabbed eight rebounds, handed out seven assists and had three steals. Brian Kirchhoff chipped in with 16 points and six assists and Frank Ranieri added 15 points and eight rebounds.

2003-04 Game-by-Game Recap

Cortland 66, New Paltz 62 (Jan. 27; New Paltz, NY)

Cortland outscored New Paltz, 12-1, over the final 4:08 to earn the come-from-behind road win. Dave Jutton buried a pair of threes and Jon Rother had four points during the run. Rother finished with 17 points and eight rebounds, Frank Ranieri netted 14 points and Justin O'Garrow added 10 points, seven rebounds, six assists and six steals.

Brockport 62, Cortland 56 (Jan. 30; Cortland, NY)

Brockport scored the game's final six points in a game with seven ties and multiple lead changes. Cortland, which had the game's largest lead of eight in the first half, was held without a field goal over the final 6:38. Justin O'Garrow led the Red Dragons with 11 points, five assists and five steals.

SUNYIT 68, Cortland 64 (Feb. 3; Cortland, NY)

SUNYIT took an 8-7 lead early in the game and never trailed again. After Cortland tied the game at 46-46 midway through the second half, the Wildcats pulled away with a 16-5 run. Frank Ranieri and Justin O'Garrow each scored 16 points for the Red Dragons. O'Garrow added seven rebounds, four assists and four steals and Ranieri pulled down eight rebounds.

Geneseo 70, Cortland 64 (Feb. 6; Geneseo, NY)

Geneseo led 38-22 at halftime and held a 63-48 lead with four minutes left before Dave Jutton drilled four treys in a 16-4 run to pull the Red Dragons to within 67-64 with 20 seconds remaining. Geneseo closed out the game, however, by making 3-of-4 free throws. Jutton finished with 21 points on seven threes, one shy of the school record.

Cortland 63, Fredonia 50 (Feb. 7; Fredonia, NY)

Cortland broke open a close game by outscoring Fredonia 23-11 to open the second half. Four Red Dragons scored in double figures, led by Brian Kirchhoff, who poured in 16 points off the bench. Jon Rother added 13, Justin O'Garrow hit for 12 and Frank Ranieri scored 11.

Cortland 77, Oneonta 59 (Feb. 10; Oneonta, NY)

Cortland went on a 14-0 run in a three-minute span midway through the first half to grab a 22-9 lead. The advantage grew to 44-28 at the half and Cortland cruised to the win. Jon Rother had 21 points and nine rebounds, Justin O'Garrow contributed 17 points, five assists and four steals and Frank Ranieri grabbed a career-high 14 rebounds.

Cortland 69, D'Youville 64 (OT) (Feb. 12; Cortland, NY)

Brian Kirchhoff tied the game with a three pointer, his first points of the game, with 10.5 seconds left and nailed two big treys in overtime to lead Cortland to the win. Justin O'Garrow scored 19 points and Jon Rother had 14 points and 13 rebounds. Dave Jutton added 10 points, six rebounds and five assists.

Cortland 80, New Paltz 51 (Feb. 14; Cortland, NY)

Leading 14-12 midway through the first half, the Red Dragons went on a 29-0 tear in a 7:46 span to blow the game wide open. Jon Rother had a game-high 21 points and six rebounds, while Justin O'Garrow contributed 17 points, eight rebounds, five steals, four assists and three blocked shots. Frank Ranieri added 12 points off the bench.

SUNYIT 61, Cortland 60 (Feb. 17; Utica, NY)

SUNYIT erased an early 24-8 deficit and held on late as Cortland had a final possession to win the game. The Red Dragons pulled to within 61-60 on Brian Kirchhoff's trey with 53 seconds remaining and forced a turnover with 19 seconds left but couldn't get off a shot against SUNYIT's pressure defense. Frank Ranieri led Cortland's offense with 16 points.

Cortland 71, Geneseo 59 (Feb. 20; Cortland, NY)

The Red Dragons went on a 19-3 run in a nine-minute span to turn a 37-33 deficit into a 52-40 lead at the midway point of the second half. After Geneseo closed to within 57-51, Cortland had a 14-2 surge that sealed the win. Jon Rother and Brian Kirchhoff each connected for 15 points.

Buffalo St. 75, Cortland 66 (Feb. 21; Cortland, NY)

Buffalo St. used a 22-6 second-half run to turn a 46-45 deficit into a 67-52 lead with 4:33 remaining. The Red Dragons finished the SUNYAC with an 8-8 record and earned the fifth seed in the conference playoffs. Dave Jutton made 5-of-10 three-point field goals and finished with 18 points. Brian Kirchhoff came off the bench to score 15 points, including four treys, and grabbed seven rebounds.

Cortland 73, Geneseo 67 (SUNYAC Quarterfinals) (Feb. 24; Geneseo, NY)

Dave Jutton connected on 5-of-10 three pointers, including four in the first half, and scored a game-high 20 points to lead Cortland to the win. Justin O'Garrow added 13 points, nine rebounds, five assists and four steals and Jon Rother, Frank Ranieri and Brian Kirchhoff each chipped in with 12 points.

Brockport 71, Cortland 42 (SUNYAC Semifinals) (Feb. 27; Utica, NY)

Cortland shot just 26.7 percent from the field, including 2-for-17 from three-point range. Brockport closed the first half with a 20-9 run to pull away from an 11-11 tie and opened up the second half with a 13-3 surge to take a 44-23 lead. Frank Ranieri had seven points and 12 rebounds and Justin O'Garrow grabbed a season-best 11 rebounds.

Skidmore 65, Cortland 49 (ECAC Upstate NY Quarterfinals) (Mar. 3; Cortland, NY)

Skidmore opened up a 12-point halftime lead, 36-24, and stretched the advantage to 54-27 with 12:20 remaining. Jon Rother led the Red Dragon offense with 15 points. Dave Jutton added 13 points and Simon Skrelja contributed four points and a team-high five rebounds off the bench.

About SUNY Cortland

Located atop one of the rolling hills in central New York's "City of Seven Valleys," the State University of New York College at Cortland was founded in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School, which included among its earliest students inventor and industrialist Elmer A. Sperry of Sperry-Rand Corp. fame.

Over the decades, the campus expanded and in 1941, by an act of legislature and the Board of Regents, the institution officially became a four-year college providing courses leading to the bachelor's degree. In 1948, Cortland was a founding member of the State University of New York.

Today, approximately 7,500 students are pursuing degrees within the College's three academic divisions — arts and sciences, professional studies and the school of education. Twenty-three departments with a faculty of more than 400 offer the SUNY Cortland student body 70 majors and 44 minors from which to choose.

The College's main campus covers 191 acres and includes 30 traditional and modern buildings. Fourteen of these structures are residence halls providing on-campus housing for approximately 3,000 students. Cortland also operates its Outdoor Education Center at Raquette Lake in the Adirondacks, the Hoxie Gorge Nature Preserve outside Cortland, and the Brauer Memorial Geological Field Station on the Helderberg Escarpment near Albany.

At Cortland, athletics are viewed as having an important

role in the educational mission of the College. During the fall, winter and spring seasons, Cortland participates in 25 intercollegiate sports — 14 women's and 11 men's — in an attempt to provide a broad program which meets the needs, interests and abilities of its students.

The Cortland athletic program placed eighth nationally out of 430 colleges and universities in the 2003-04 all-sport National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) Directors' Cup Division III standings. The award was

formerly known as the Sears Directors' Cup from 1995-2002. Cortland is the only New York school and one of only six nationwide to finish in the top 20 each of the last nine years. Since 1989, the Red Dragons have captured 12 NCAA Division III team titles.

The College offers its student-athletes excellent athletic facilities. The newly-constructed on-campus stadium features two artificial turf fields. One field seats 6,500 spectators, the other 1,500. The Cortland football, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's lacrosse and men's and women's track and field teams are among those who utilize the facility, which the *New York Times* called "...a new stadium worthy of a major university power."

The Bessie L. Park Physical Education and Recreation Center, opened in 1973, features the Whitney T. Corey Gymnasium with a 3,500 seating capacity; the Olympic-sized Harriet Holsten swimming pool with gallery seating for 1,500; the Alumni Ice Arena, a facility which can accommodate 2,500 spectators; a 500-seat gymnastics arena, racquetball and squash courts, a wrestling room, modern athletic training facilities and the state-of-the-art Francis Woods Fitness Facility.

Nearby Clayton R. Lusk Field House, with its tartantextured surface, is home for the indoor track teams, varsity practice sessions and recreational activities. Cortland's soccer teams play on T. Fred "Prof" Holloway Field, which has lights for night contests and newly installed bleachers. The College also has 22 outdoor tennis courts and two outdoor basketball courts and boasts Robert H. Wallace Field (baseball) and Dragon Field (softball) as part of its 51 acres of athletic fields.
