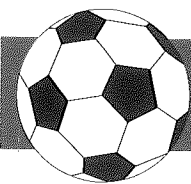

WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME

Why was the nickname, Bulldogs, selected for Northeast Missouri State? O.C. Bell in 1908 referred to his performers as Bulldogs, but it wasn't an official designation. So far as is known, this term wasn't used again until the spring of 1915.

At the time, a committee of students, including the late President Emeritus Walter H. Ryle, recommended the adoption of the "Bulldog" as the official emblem because of the beast's tenacity and ability to hold on and fight desperately to the end.

The spirit of the Bulldog has been evident since the name was selected 79 years ago. It's not unique though, as 16 NCAA schools have adopted the "Bulldog".

Trishia Harting (No. 17) scored the winning goal in the Lady Bulldog's 1993 battle with Air Force.



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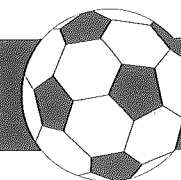

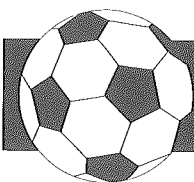

LADY BULLDOGS EXPERIENCED IN 1994

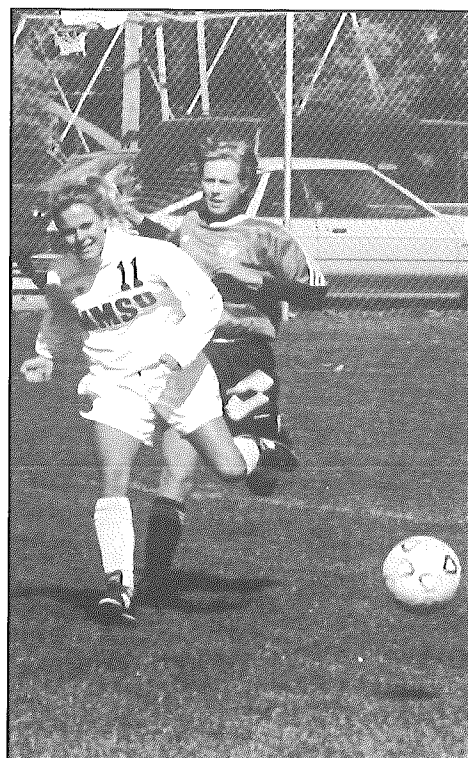
Experience, that is what second-year head coach Mike Cannon has when he looks at the 1994 Northeast Missouri State Lady Bulldog soccer team. Cannon has 12 top returnees and six key starters from last season's 4-11 record. Seven incoming freshmen provide more depth and support than personnel on the previous team.

"We should be pretty strong because we have a senior at every position, one in goal, one in back, two in the middle and one up front," said Cannon.

GOALKEEPERS

Leah Hollcroft is back for her senior year as Lady Bulldog netminder. Hollcroft started all but one game last season and had an impressive 2.34 goals-against average, with three shutouts. Cannon is counting on Hollcroft to be "more vocal in the backfield, and to help quarterback the defense." Cannon added, "Hollcroft has been really working hard and in the best shape of her career. She hopes to have a good senior year."

The backup goalkeeper this season is freshmen **Kirsten Abel**. Cannon said, "Kristen has got good size and has a lot of potential to be a great keeper, if she watches Hollcroft and works hard."

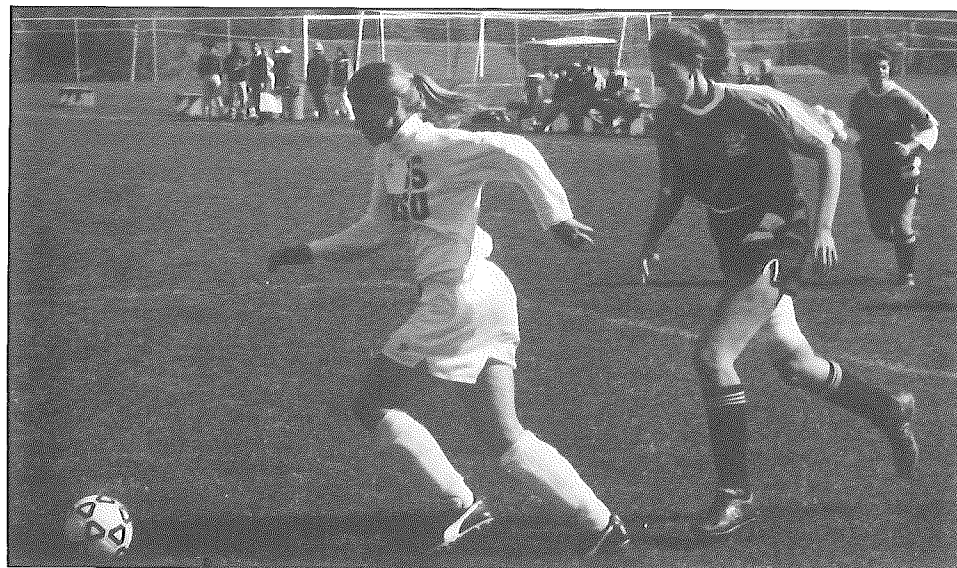


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Returning starter Tiernan Fehling passes the ball to a teammate.

DEFENDERS

Even with the graduation of Shelly Landa, Cannon believes the defense will be as strong or stronger than last year, "We're pretty strong in the back, so it's just a matter of who goes where," he said.



Bridgit Garthe scored seven points for the Lady Bulldogs last season in a reserve role.

Cannon who like to play with three defensive backs to push up more offense.

Senior **Mindy Holcomb** will be the anchor of the Lady Bulldog backfield. She is a hard-nosed player, who should have a tremendous year, according to Cannon. Junior **Cathy Bussjaeger** and sophomore **Keryi Wichenhauser** should be contending for starting positions.

Cannon was not sure whether junior **Mary Ann Flynn** would play defense or midfield. "Flynn is more of a thinking-type player, which we need out on the field, so it's not a matter of where we put her," said Cannon. The incoming freshmen on the backline will be **Kendra Bollin** and **Ann Wiesler**.

MIDFIELDERS

Cannon said the team was stacked on the outside. Junior **Tiernan Fehling**, who Cannon feels "if you pencil her in your starting lineup, she will just go." Also returning is sophomore **Chris Zitko**, "who has improved her ball handling skills and can fly up and down the wing."

Senior **Susana Mendoza** is back after being red-shirted last season due to an injury. "She is probably going to play inside and be a key player, one to orchestrate the offense," believes Cannon. Junior **Bridgit Garthe** could

see a lot of playing time either at midfield or at the forward position. One of Cannon's top freshman recruits, **Jill Benson**, could make an immediate impact on the team.

"Benson is quick, has a great shot and could be a really good player," said Cannon.

FORWARDS

Cannon will look toward senior **Stephanie Barrowclough** to lead the team up front. With goal scoring capabilities and quick speed, Barrowclough, should be a key on the offensive attack, according to Cannon. Sophomore **Trishia Harting**, who led the team with six goals last season, will try to improve on her performance.

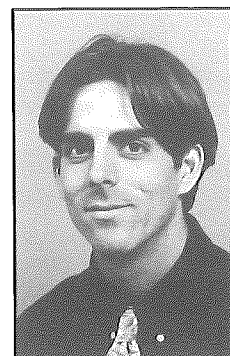
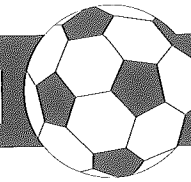
"Harting has a great touch on the ball, and is a target-type player," said Cannon. Junior **Amy Zander** could see playing time either up front or at the midfield position.

Another of Cannon's top freshmen recruits is **Carie Toczykowski**. "Toczykowski has good size, great speed and shot and comes from a rich soccer background," he said. "She may crack the starting lineup."

SCHEDULE

A smaller midwest region has given the Lady Bulldogs a better shot at reaching the NCAA Division II national tournament this season. There are now 16 teams in the region and Northeast plays all but two. The schedule includes seven home games, up from five last year. Cannon feels, "If we beat the teams we need to beat, we could potentially earn a berth in the playoffs."

HEAD COACH MIKE CANNON



Beginning his second season as the Lady Bulldogs' head soccer coach, Mike Cannon is looking to expand upon last year's 5-8-3 performance and rebuild the program with hopes of returning it to the power and glory that it once enjoyed.

The former NMSU men's soccer standout is only the third coach in Northeast women's soccer history. He will begin the year with 11 holdovers, including three seniors, two of whom were 1992 all-region selections.

Cannon's goals include more than wins and losses. He wants the program to be more involved with the university and the Kirksville community, especially in service-oriented projects. He wants people to see that the program is something more than just a soccer team.

Cannon takes a teacher-student oriented approach toward the

team. He wants his players to become students of the game, understanding its situational intricacies, rather than just reacting to the ball. He also wants his students to pursue excellence academically as well as on the field. Cannon says that he does not expect perfection, but he encourages strong efforts in both spectrums.

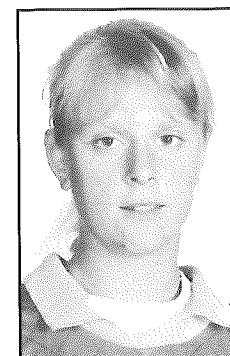
He was an assistant coach for NMSU's men's soccer team in 1992. From 1988-91, Cannon played for the Bulldogs as a marking back and midfielder and was named the team's most valuable player his senior year.

As a junior, he was selected as NMSU's most improved player for his contributions during a campaign in which the 'Dogs qualified for the NCAA Division II national playoffs for the first time.

Cannon is a graduate of Bishop DuBorg High School in St. Louis, where he was a recipient of honorable mention all-state, all-conference, all-city and all-county accolades.

He graduated in 1992 from NMSU with a bachelor's degree in English.

ASSISTANT COACH SHANNON PRESLEY



Shannon Presley will assist Mike Cannon for the first time this season. She is a member of the Houston Hot Shots of the Continental Indoor Soccer League and ended her first season with the team this past September.

Presley is part of the first husband/wife duo to play professional indoor soccer on the same team and one of two women in the league.

She is a native of Humble, Texas, and attended the University of Virginia where she helped her team to the NCAA Division I semifinal game against North Carolina.

Presley's husband, Matt, will assist the Bulldog soccer team this season. He played for the Bulldogs from 1989-91 and was an all-Midwest selection for Northeast.

STUDENT ASSISTANT COACH AMY MANGELS



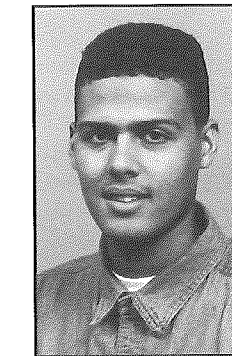
Amy Mangels will be the new assistant coach for Mike Cannon this season. Mangels, who completed four years as a Lady Bulldog last season, scored 13 goals, had six assists and earned 32 points over her four-year career. She is ranked fourth in goals and points on the NMSU all-time career lists and was named the team's most valuable player and tri-captain for the 1993 campaign.

In high school, Mangels was a four-time letterwinner in soccer. She served as the team captain two years and was the offensive MVP three consecutive years. Mangels was an all-conference selection in volleyball and was on the state championship team as Washington High School, in Washington, Mo.

1993 In Review



Trishia Harting was the leading scorer for the Lady Bulldogs in 1993 with 14 points.

It was a difficult first year for head coach Mike Cannon.

The Lady Bulldogs posted a disappointing 4-11 record in 1993 and suffered their fourth consecutive losing season.

Northeast opened the year on an upswing, winning two of its first three games with victories on the road over Missouri-Rolla (3-0) and Bellermino (Ky.) (5-0). Leading the way for the Lady Bulldogs was junior forward Stephanie Barrowclough, who scored two goals in each victory.

Northeast then suffered three straight defeats before earning its third victory with a 4-3, come-from-behind, triumph over the Air Force Academy. Freshman forward Trisha Harting knocked in a three-goal hat-trick in the contest.

Then, after suffering a 6-0 loss against Park College, the Lady Bulldogs exploded with a 12-0 thrashing of Southwest Baptist University. Four NMSU players posted two goals a piece against the Bearkittens with a total of eight different scorers.

But that would be the last taste of victory for NMSU. The Lady Bulldogs lost their last six games of the season and were outscored 20-3.

At the end of the year, honors were bestowed upon senior tri-captain Shelly Landa. For the third year in a row, the NMSU backfielder was selected to the all-South Central region second team. Over her career at Northeast, Landa scored 10 goals and dished out seven assists for 27 points. She ranks sixth in goals and points, and seventh in assists among the NMSU all-time career leaders.

Amy Mangels also finished her career at NMSU. The Lady Bulldog forward scored 13 goals, had six assists and earned 32 points over her four-year career. Her efforts rank fourth in goals and points on the NMSU all-time career lists.

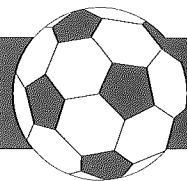
Shauna Putnam, a former forward for the NMSU women's soccer team, was selected to the honorable mention list of the 1987 Central Region All-American Team for Division I and II.

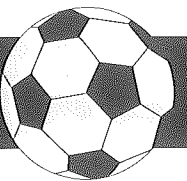

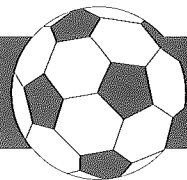

SOCCER BASICS & TERMS

NCAA soccer uses a field of play not more than 120 yards nor less than 110 yards in length and not more than 75 yards nor less than 65 yards in width. The recommended size is 120 yards by 75 yards. Northeast's field of play is 120 yards by 75 yards.

Each team shall field a squad of 11 players, one of which shall be a goalkeeper.

Substitutions may occur only on a goal kick, a corner kick, after a goal has been scored, between periods, in the event of an injury or equipment change, or when a player is warned.

Once a player has been substituted, he may not re-enter the game in the same period, including the overtime periods. Goalkeepers and cautioned players, providing they are removed from the game at the time of the caution, may re-enter the game in the same period.

The game shall be two equal periods of 45 minutes. In case of a tie, two extra periods of 15 minutes each are played. Half-time intervals shall not exceed 10 minutes. The time lengths may be changed only by consent of the referee and both coaches.

In tournament play, if the score is still tied after the two overtime periods, a series of 10 penalty kicks is taken in alternating order until a winner is determined. The team which wins the shootout is awarded a team goal and a win. In regular season play, the game is declared a draw at the end of the overtime periods.

The clock is stopped only when a goal is scored, when a penalty kick is awarded, when a player is carded or when the referee signals that the clock should be stopped.

TERMS

Center/Cross—To pass the ball from a wide position on the field into the penalty area.

Charging—Pushing the opponent off balance legally by shoulder to shoulder contact.

Clear—A throw or kick by the goalkeeper or a kick by the defender in an attempt to get the ball away from the goal area.

Corner Kick—Taken by a member of the attacking team when the ball passes over the goal line, having last been played by a member of the defending team.

Defender/Back—Primarily a defensive player who assists the goalkeeper in protecting the goal.

Dribble—A way of advancing the ball past defenders by a series of short taps with one or both feet.

Forward—Primarily an attacking player whose responsibility is to create and score goals.

Goal Kick—Taken by a member of the defending team when the ball passes over the goal line, having last been played by a member of the attacking team.

Goalkeeper—The last line of defense. The only player who can use his hands within the field of play. He is limited to using his hands only within the penalty area.

Half-volley—Kicking the ball just as it is rebounding off the ground.

Hands—Illegal act of intentionally touching the ball with the hands or arms.

Heading—A method of scoring, passing and controlling the ball by making contact with the head.

Marking—Guarding an opponent.

Midfielder—Both an offensive and defensive player who is primarily responsible for linking the forwards and defenders.

Offsides—In the attacking third of the field, when a player is between the ball and the goalline, unless two defenders (including the goalkeeper) are between the Player and the goal.

Overlap—The attacking play of a defender going down the touchline past his own winger.

Pitch—Another name for the field of play.

Penalty Kick—Awarded for any infringement of the rules by the defending team within the penalty area (18 yards from the goal).

Red/Yellow Cards—Warnings issued to a player by the referees for gross violations of the rules. The first warning is a yellow card, or caution, the second warning is a red card and results in the player's ejection from the game, without replacement.

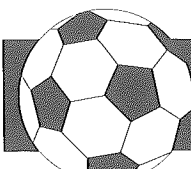
Save—The goalkeeper stopping an attempted goal by catching or deflecting the ball away from the goal.

Screen—Retaining possession and protecting the ball by keeping your body between the ball and opponent.

Shin Guard—All players are required to wear shin guards, which are leg covers, usually made of plastic, worn under the players socks for protection.

Slide Tackle—Attempting to take the ball away from the opponent by sliding on the ground.

Throw In—Taken to put the ball back into play after it has passed over the sideline.



AROUND NORTHEAST



Northeast Missouri State University is the statewide liberal arts and sciences university for Missouri. Nationally recognized as one of the best public universities in the country, Northeast's innovative approach to education has attracted the attention of colleges, universities and media across the country and abroad.

Over 20 years ago, Northeast began a program of assessment that is being emulated by colleges and universities nationwide. Northeast was clearly ahead of its times, as assessment and accountability became "buzzwords" in higher education almost 15 years after Northeast initiated its program. Assessment at Northeast not only is directed toward student outcomes, but the program is used extensively in improving the University and its academic and cocurricular programs.

In 1993, Northeast was the only university in Missouri to choose the "highly selective" mission category as prescribed by the Missouri Coordinating Board for Higher Education. Northeast offers 49 challenging areas of undergraduate study and nine selective graduate programs among 10 academic divisions. Northeast's 6,000 students study with a full-time faculty of 328. Despite decreasing numbers of high school graduates nationwide, Northeast is bucking demo-

graphics with continually increasing numbers of admission applications.

Northeast is recognized as a low-cost alternative for high-quality education. The 1995 edition of *Money Guide's* "Best College Buys Now" ranked Northeast "Fifth in the Nation" as a best buy in education. *Money's* latest guide also lists

Northeast first among schools in the Midwest.

According to the *National Review College Guide*, "Northeast Missouri is ... a school that has remade itself into an image of what a university should be." In 1994 publications, Northeast was one of 10 universities profiled in the *Fiske Guide to Colleges* and ranked sixth in academic reputation among midwestern colleges and universities by *U.S. News & World Report's College Guide*.

A list of other leading publications have featured Northeast. *Changing Times* magazine picked Northeast as one of the nation's "Best of the Bargain Colleges."

Northeast has also been the subject of articles featured in *USA Today*, *Money* magazine, *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, *The Chicago Tribune* and *The Chronicle of Higher Education*.

Northeast's 140-acre campus has experienced a rich history of more than 125 years. From a private normal school to periods as a teachers college, a regional state college and a regional state university, the heart of campus has been situated around a spacious, shady quadrangle. PRESIDENT JACK MAGRUDER



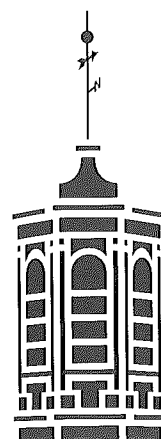
Jack Magruder became the 13th president of Northeast Missouri State University on July 1, 1994.

Magruder, who began his career at Northeast in 1964, had served as vice president

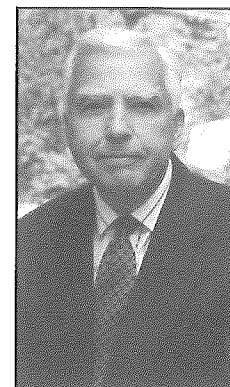
for academic affairs since 1989. He previously served as head of the Division of Science for three years and as a member of the faculty for 22 years, achieving the rank of professor of chemistry education.

When Alan Graham announced this summer he was resigning as Northeast athletic director, President Jack Magruder's choice to replace him was a person with a long-time association with the University and its intercollegiate sports program.

Magruder appointed Walter H. Ryle IV as the interim athletic director on a full-time basis. Ryle, who has chaired the University Athletic Committee since 1973 and was president of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association between 1988-91, is a 1954 graduate of Northeast and began a teaching career in 1955 at the University. He is currently a professor of history.

In announcing Ryle's appointment, Magruder said, "Walter Ryle has unique talents and experiences which make him a natural selection for the position. He has served in various roles in athletics for more than 20 years, and he has the academic credentials and perspective which are so important in heading an athletic program at a liberal arts and sciences institution. His alumni ties and long-standing community relationships will help him to promote and support Northeast athletics."

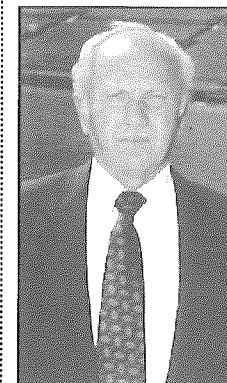

SAM NUGENT ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



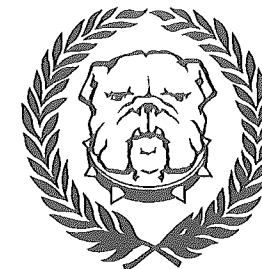
Sam Nugent has overseen the maintenance and care of athletic facilities and has assisted the athletic director with the administration of home athletic events.

Nugent directed the Bulldog baseball program 24 years and served 21 years as the football trainer.

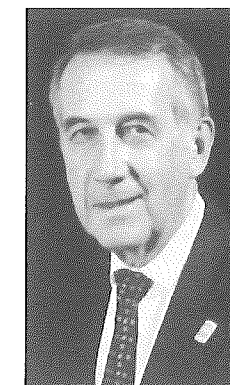
A 1961 graduate of Arkansas State University-Jonesboro, he entered Northeast the same year

This past summer, Cable received the Warren Berg award, presented annually to a College Division SID.

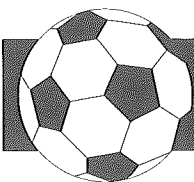

FACILITIES

The Bulldogs' Soccer Complex is located on the southwest side of campus, next to Campbell apartments.

The complex features one natural grass playing field and one practice field, both running in an east-west direction.

There are aluminum bleachers on the north side of the playing field that will seat approximately 250 people. But the complex has the capacity to seat up to 1,000 on portable bleachers that are used on the south side of the playing field when needed.

Also on the north side of the field is a wooden press box area, that has a capacity for six media personnel, statisticians and camera personnel. Admission to the press section is by pass only.

The players bench area is located on the south side of the playing field. Both teams use locker rooms located in nearby Pershing Arena.

The soccer complex was constructed in



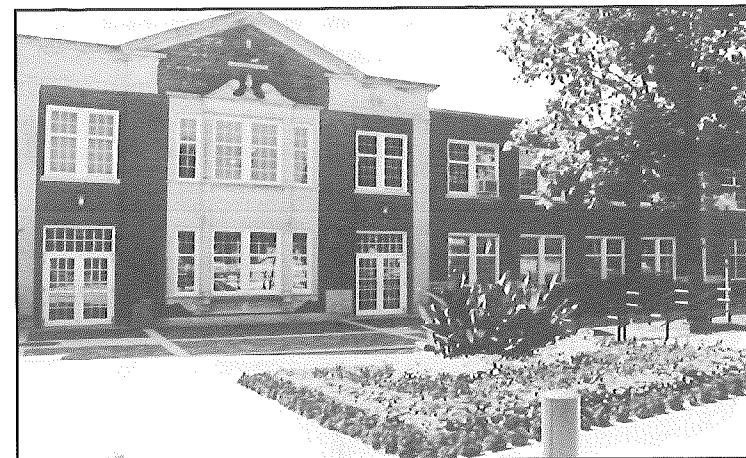
1982 and used for the first time in 1983.

Before 1983, the 'Dogs used the football playing and practice field areas in Stokes Stadium.

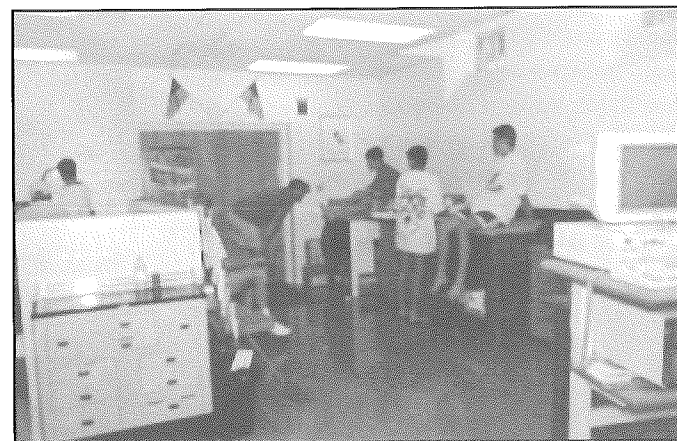
Other facilities provided by the Northeast Athletic Department include Pershing Arena, Stokes

Stadium, a baseball and softball field, and tennis courts.

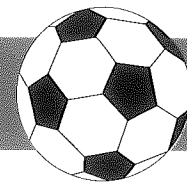
Pershing Arena features a variety of equipment, including a main gymnasium, three weight rooms, a 1/12-mile indoor rubber track, indoor racquetball courts and complete athletic training facilities. It also includes a natatorium, with a six-lane, 40-yard pool and a separate diving well.

NORTHEAST ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission to Northeast Missouri State University is based upon high school curriculum, with a college preparatory course of study carrying a greater weight; high school grade point average and rank; standardized test scores (ACT, PSAT, SAT); special abilities, talents or achievements and an original essay.

Students applying for admission for the

1994-95 school year, Northeast will require the completion of 13 units; for the 1995-96 school year, Northeast will require completion of the 16-hour core curriculum. Students who have not completed the core requirements will be required to demonstrate a higher level of achievement on the ACT or SAT examination.

Notice of Non-Discrimination.

Northeast Missouri State University recognizes the worth and dignity of all persons, and the University does not discriminate on any basis not related to the applicable educational requirements of students or the applicable job requirements of employees. The commitment to the consideration only of bonafide qualifications, and the avoidance of improper discriminatory practices, includes but is not limited to the forms of discrimination prohibited by law. Therefore, the University observes and complies fully with federal and state laws prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, or handicap in admission or access to, or treatment or employment in, its programs and activities. The President of the University is designated by the Board of Governors to coordinate the University's compliance with the applicable statutes and regulations, and he or she is authorized to delegate assignments to one or more other persons to assure compliance.

Discriminatory practices based on reasons not expressly stated in the policy, such as sexual orientation, veteran status, disability, marital status, and bankruptcy, which are not related to educational or job requirements, are prohibited by the University's non-discrimination policy even though such reasons are not specifically named in the policy. Any person having inquiries concerning the University's compliance with the regulations implementing Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972, or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, is directed to contact Dr. Joyce Hearn, at 101 McClain Hall on the University campus, Telephone No. 816-785-4476. Dr. Hearn has been designated by the President of the University to coordinate the institution's efforts to comply with regulations implementing Title VI, Title IX, and Section 504. Any person may also contact the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Education, regarding the institution's compliance with the regulations implementing Title VI, Title IX, or Section 504.

NCAA ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

The NCAA requires a high-school student athlete, who pursues an opportunity to compete at a Division II program, to satisfy the requirements of NCAA Bylaw 14.3 (also known as Proposition 48).

Bylaw 14.3 requires the student athlete to:

1. Graduate from high school.
2. Attain a grade-point average of 2.0 (based on a maximum of 4.0) in a successfully completed core curriculum of 11 academic courses per 14.3, including at least the following:
3 years of English
2 years of mathematics
2 years of social science
2 years of natural or physical science (including at least one laboratory course, if offered by the high school)
2 additional academic courses [in any of the above areas or foreign language, computer science, philosophy or non-doctrinal religion (e.g. comparative religion courses)]
3. A minimum 700 combined score on the SAT verbal and math sections, or a minimum composite score on the ACT of 15 (if taken prior to Oct. 28, 1989) or 18 (if taken on or subsequent to Oct. 28, 1989) or 17 (for student-athletes who took the test subsequent to Oct. 28, 1989, and who are first entering a collegiate institution on or after Aug. 1, 1992). The required SAT or ACT score must be achieved under national testing conditions on a national testing date [i.e., no residual (campus) testing or regional testing dates]. (Revised: 1/10/90, 1/10/92)

Effective Aug. 1, 1995, student-athletes entering collegiate institutions must have completed an additional two years of courses in English, mathematics or natural or physical science.
