Commissioner O'Loughlin moved that the Secretary be directed to incorporate them in the Minutes of the meeting and to send copies to the Park Department, Borough of Brooklyn.

Hon. Philip Berolzheimer, Chamberlain, appeared to confer with the Park Board on questions relating to the 1925 outdoor music season in the city parks and the proposed open air opera performances.

President Ĝallatin asked that it be put upon the Minutes that on January 29, 1925, he had been notified by telephone by Miss Rokus, Secretary, Mayor's Office, that the \$50,000 additional music appropriation in the Park Board budget had been inserted at the instance of the Mayor, and that it was intended that it should be spent under the supervision of the Chamberlain. The Chamberlain is in charge of the public park concerts, under the provisions of a resolution of the Park Board.

President Gallatin suggested that the Chamberlain as well as the members of the Park Board should be required to give him sufficient advance notice for the preparation of Open Market Orders for concert contracts, and that no commitments for performances be recognized except the Open Market Orders signed by the President of the Park Board on the notices thus called for. He asked if the Chamberlain would agree to such a requirement and the Chamberlain heartily assented.

Chamberlain Berolzheimer talked at considerable length upon the various features of park music including the contributed concerts from private sources and by the City Department Bands.

In connection with these department band concerts Commissioner O'Rourke reported that he had had nineteen cancellations of such concerts, some of the cancellations being given with hardly more than an hour's notice. He said that in some cases the cancellations were an imperative necessity on account of department business, the occasions for which should have been foreseen when the schedules were made up and the performances tendered to the Park Department.

An important feature of the discussion of the contributed concerts question was a consideration of the Goldman Band Concert series in Central Park. The Chamberlain reported that this series of sixty concerts was only to be secured for 1925 under the condition that the performances should all be given on The Mall. He had found that there was a strong public sentiment in favor of permitting more than one musical organization to be heard in that place in the three summer months. He also found that the Park Commissioners and the public of the other boroughs vigorously objected to being kept from sharing in the benefits of this large number of contributed concerts.

Park Commissioners Hennessy, O'Loughlin, Benninger and O'Rourke all said that they were aware of this feeling and shared in it, Commissioner O'Loughlin being especially vigorous in criticizing the discrimination against Prospect Park, Brooklyn, whose concert grove is a shrine for music lovers.

Commissioner O'Loughlin offered the following resolution, having accepted the amendment of Commissioner Hennessy to have it general instead of applying only to the Borough of Brooklyn, as at first offered:

Resolved, That the action of the Chamberlain in endeavoring to provide first class outdoor concerts for all the boroughs and to avoid restricting the use of the wonderful band stand on The Mall to one organization and in arranging to allow it to be used by other bands and orchestras which the public has shown the desire to hear, be, and the same hereby is, approved by the Park Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallatin, Hennessy, O'Loughlin, Benninger, O'Rourke—5. On motion at 5:20 p. m., the Board adjourned.

The last named officials attended to arrange for the cooperation of their several departments in connection with the free outdoor operatic performances to be given next summer in Ebbetts Field, as an adjunct to the public park music.

The Band Concerts will include those of the Seventh, Twenty-second, and Seventy-first Regiment Bands and those conducted by Leaders like Walter Rogers, Thomas Shannon, Gustave D'Aquin, Lieut. Fred W. Simpson, Joseph F. Meduna, Patrick Conway, Frank Martin, Dr. G. E. Conterno, Paul E. Clifford, and Amedeo Passeri. The Symphony performances will be given by the New York Symphony Orchestra, the Chamber Symphony Orchestra, the Waldorf-Astoria Orchestra, and by Conductors like Franz Kaltenborn. Dr. Hugo Riesenfeld Maximilian Pilzer and Josiah Zuro. Among

like Franz Kaltenborn, Dr. Hugo Riesenfeld, Maximillian Pilzer, and Josiah Zuro. Among the vocal offerings will be concerts by the Associated Glee Clubs, the Oratorio Society of New York and the Peoples' Chorus of New York.

In Carl Schurz Park and Mount Morris Park there will be concerts by the larger bands, one a week in each park.

The Bronx

In Pelham Bay Park and Van Cortlandt Park, The Bronx, there will be Sunday afternoon concerts on alternate Sundays, making one every week in all, In Devoe Park, Poe Park and St. Mary's Park one evening a week in each park.

Brooklyn

In Prospect Park, Brooklyn, concerts will be given on two evenings a week, with Sunday performances at 4 p. m. On occasion an evening concert a week will be given in Winthrop Park and in Sunset Park. Supplementing the Brooklyn Park music schedule will be an out-door operatic season in Ebbetts Field of free public performances.

Queens

Two evening concerts a week will be given in the new Band Stands in Forest Park and Astoria Park, Queens. Some of them will be evening performances during the week and some of them afternoon Sunday affairs. Highland Park will have an evening concert every Sunday; King's Park, Jamaica, an evening concert every week and a weekly performance will be provided for a music stand extension to the Rockaway Beach Board walk at the foot of 116th Street, Rockaway Park.

Richmond

The Curtis Athletic Field will be furnished with one large Band or Symphony Orchestra evening concert every week. Similar provision will be made in Thompson Field. The new Band Stand in Westerleigh Park will be opened with a gala concert. Concerts will also be given in Tottenville, Great Kills, and New Dorp.

Incidental to the discussion of the concert schedule, Chamberlain Berolzheimer recounted the story of the negotiations over the Guggenheim family's offer to again contribute a series of five band concerts a week to the public. He called particular attention to what he described as studied misrepresentation to create the impression that the music offer had been ungraciously spurned by the City, the fact being just the reverse. The Mayor and the Park authorities repeatedly expressed every appreciation of the public spirit and liberality of the Guggenheim offer.

The officials directly concerned with the management of music matters thought, however, that it was advisable to make the permit for the use of the Mall for only three concerts a week and to have the other two performances given elsewhere. This would enable the people in other parts of the City to enjoy the fine Guggenheim concerts as well as allow other Bands, Orchestras, and Singing Societies to share in the use of the wonderful Naumburg Band Stand and unexampled seating accommodations on the Mall to give their friends and followers the pleasure of seeing and hearing them there.

Mr. Berolzheimer said that many complaints and objections were made in the past two years against the idea of having those facilities monopolized by a single organization and for one kind of performances. It was urged that the music public was not composed entirely of devotees of Band Music or followers of an individual or admirers of a single organization. The donors of the concerts would not meet this requirement of three concerts a week and it therefore seemed to Mr. Berolzheimer that it should be said that the concerts were refused to the park instead of the park being denied to the concerts.

Mr. Berolzheimer considered the trivial restriction to three performances a week to be justified to quiet the complaints and objections and deplored the resort to abuse and vituperation which had complicated and obstructed the negotiations in the matter. He absolved the Guggenheims from any share or part in these tactics. He had no fault to find with the most zealous partisans of the Bass Drum and Brass Horn. He recognized the good faith and musical standing of many of the advocates of the unqualified acceptance of the Guggenheim offer and the turning over of Central Park to one phase of musical entertainment. All of these would not have served to prevent eventually reaching an arrangement satisfactory to both sides.

He said the real harm was done by the agitators and accelerators who thrust themselves into the consideration of the subject for purposes of their own. The most of these agitators made their purposes perfectly plain. Their personnel ranged from the comparatively innocent and harmless self-advertiser to the sniper and the guerrilla in political and partisan warfare. And they so persistently and vehemently made the Mayor their target that their inspiration was entirely obvious, though they well know that he had nothing to do with such details.

Mr. Berolzheimer was asked about the million dollar endowment feature and replied: "Mr. Guggenheim's statement that he never offered me a million dollar endowment for concerts is true to the letter. His statement further says that he had considered such an endowment. That information was conveyed to me and I did not cross examine on the question whether he had authorized the telling. I heard it first eighteen months ago and have heard it more than once since then. It always came from those who could be presumed to know about Mr. Guggenheim's plans and purposes. "My statement should have appeared in a different form, though this was probably not an intentional misrepresentation. It should have read that I would not consider a million dollar concert endowment under such conditions."

A full discussion followed the Chamberlain's talk and every one was heard in turn. On motion the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we hereby endorse, ratify and approve of the action of the Chamberlain in connection with the concerts on the Mall in Central Park for the season of 1925 in stipulating that no more than three performances a week should be given by the same organization and in arranging for a variety in the concerts with some symphony orchestral programmes and some vocal or choral programmes. And be it further,

Resolved, That, after very full and free discussion, we declare in hearty support of the Chamberlain's schedule of concerts and selection of bands, orchestras, and choral organizations in the firm belief that the result will be more and better music for the people in the peoples' parks.

In connection with the projected free open-air operatic performances undertaken at the instance of Mayor Hylan, Chamberlain Berolzheimer spoke feelingly of the tragedy of the deaths of Charles H. Ebbetts and Edward McKeever, officials and owners of the National League Baseball Team and Grounds in Brooklyn, who had consented to the public spirited gift of Ebbetts Field for the purpose of presenting free public opera. He said that he was advised that their successors in the ownership would not wish to make any change in the arrangements which had been entered into.

Mr. Berolzheimer announced that the plan was to give three operas, absolutely free to the public, and one grand massed Band Concert with a huge choral adjunct. The Ball Grounds will be available during the second western trip of the ball players from July 27th to August 12th. The operas will be Aida, Saturday, August 1st; Pagliacci and Cavalieri Rusticana, Wednesday, August 5th; and Faust, Saturday, August 8th. The Mammoth Concert will be given on Sunday, August 9th.

The Chamberlain stressed the point that every effort will be made to secure American talent for every possible principal role. Two of the operas are already published in English and it is expected that the third will be available in English by that time so that none of the singing will be in a foreign tongue.

Mr. Berolzheimer added that Mr. Josiah Zuro who will manage the production of the operas is well known here as a Conductor and the promoter of the Peoples' Symphony. He has a record of successful production of out-door opera in California and also in Ebbetts Field last summer.

Report of the Landscape Architect who was designated by the Park Board to represent them at the Convention of the American Institute of Park Executives held at Rockford, Ill., Sept. 14th to 18th, inclusive.

To the Honorable The Park Board The City of New York. Honorable Sirs:

On my trip westward I felt it would be advantageous to visit several cities along the line and look over the park systems.

Cleveland was the first stop. I spent the entire day going over the Municipal and Metropolitan Systems. The city parks are very fine but cannot be compared with our parks. The Metropolitan System which is only in its infancy will be wonderful when developed. It is the intention of that Commission to acquire upwards of 30,000 acress of land, including forest preserves, streams and lakes, surrounding the entire city of Cleveland, and to maintain them in their natural beauty, except for the clearing, building of drives and trails, tourist camps, etc., where the traveler and city folk may go for recreation and commune with nature.

Chicago was the next city visited. Saturday and Sunday were given to an inspection of their parks. The improvement now in progress on the Lake front is one that cannot be excelled anywhere. In going over the plans of the proposed Lake front improvement I am informed by the Park Officials that the expenditure will reach one hundred million dollars. However, the improvement will warrant every dollar of the expenditure when completed. To give a detailed description of this enormous undertaking would take too long.

I urgently suggest that our Park Board visit Chicago to ascertain what is being done in order that our water fronts may be developed in a like manner. Such gigantic schemes are not for the time being, but for all time to come and as our various boroughs are surrounded by water, such improvements should be foremost in our minds. It requires but a start to initiate such grand and noble work. I know of no better time than now.

Milwaukee's Park Commission is also adopting an improvement of its Lake front similar to that of Chicago. Having only a few hours to spend in Milwaukee I was not able to obtain detailed information of their work. However, it is very gratifying to know that the Park improvement is well under way to make the water front cities a thing of beauty and a joy forever to the general public.

Allow that the Fark inprovement is wen under way to make the water none cites a tilling of beauty and a joy forever to the general public. Rockford, the Convention city, had many agreeable surprises. It is a beautiful city of approximately 85,000 inhabitants. Its parks comprise about 800 acres, two golf courses, playgrounds and neighborhood parks, all beautifully kept. Fortunately for Rockford, it has no apartments or cliff dwellers as they are called in New York. Its streets and avenues are beautifully kept; the houses stand back sufficiently far from the curb to permit a front lawn with trees and shrubs and flowers, making as a whole, a beautiful sight to drive through and find each citizen taking great pride in his grounds.

Attached hereto is a convention programme. I had the honor, conferred upon me by the President of the Society, to address the Convention on the subject of "Training Park Executives," in place of Mr. Allen S. Wooten of Vancouver, B. C., who was unable to be there. I was highly complimented by the delegates on my address.

I also had the honor of presiding at one of the sessions of the Convention, and was made Chairman of the Resolution Committee.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Park Board for its kindness in selecting me to represent its members, and for the courtesies extended.

Our next Convention will be held in Houston, Texas, in 1926, that city having been selected by the delegates.

Commissioner Gallatin offered the following:

Resolved, That the proposal of the lowest formal bidder for furnishing all labor and materials necessary or required for reconstructing the Central Park Bridle Roads, together with all work incidental thereto, received by the Park Board October 15, 1925, be forwarded to the Comptroller for his approval of sureties, and when so approved that a contract for the same be entered into and executed by the President for, and on behalf of this Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes-Commissioners Gallatin, Hennessy, O'Rourke-3.

The Park Board then went into a joint session with a representative from the State of New York, State Council of Parks, pursuant to an arrangement made by Hon. Robert Moses, chairman of the Council.

On motion, put by President Baldwin, President Francis D. Gallatin was appointed to act as Chairman of the joint session, and Secretary Willis Holly to act as Secretary. After Secretary Holly had read the letter of President Moses which had served as a

call for the joint session, Mr. Smith made a brief exposition of the attitude and action of the Board of Estimate of the City of New York, in collaborating with the various Borough Presidents, the Commissioner of Plant and Structures, and the members of the Park Board in relation to a comprehensive programme of park extension and development in the City and plans for coordinating with State Park Commissions and County Park Com-missions in connecting and associating all the different park systems wherever possible to do so to public advantage. Mr. Smith said that a very considerable appropriation had been recording and the Board had been recently made in furtherance of the interest taken by the Mayor and the Board of Estimate in the park situation.

Chairman Gallatin asked Chairman Moses to give the meeting the benefit of his knowledge of the subject as a preliminary to any action.

Chairman Moses at some length pointed out the difficulties of the problem of relating and combining park action even where State and City functions seem to connect geographically. It must be recognized that the State Parks in and near the Metropolitan District were substantially of as great interest to the people of the City as their own City parks were. He therefore welcomed the indications of the willingness of the City accuration it is consider them in connection with their announced purpose of acquiring more up with State and County park lands in the less built-up boroughs and connecting them up with State and County Park provisions, actual as well as those in prospect.

Chairman Moses was very comprehensive and interesting in giving details of the State and County Commissions' work in Westchester and Nassau Counties and especially in connection with the transit questions relating to their accessibility and usefulness to the people of the City's crowded districts. He said that similar work was being done in other parts of the State by both State and County Commissions but he made a particular point of the interest that the people of the City had in the broad vision of the plans and the great importance of the achievements of the Westchester Park Commission. The importance of the traffic question and its intimate relation to the park plans was thoroughly gone into. Chairman Moses suggested roads suitable for commercial traffic alongside of railroads and even park roads at points where park sight lines and features would not be interfered with.

Chairman Baldwin of the Westchester County Park Commission briefly supplemented what Chairman Moses had said about the importance of the various parkways traffic.

At the close of the talk of Chairman, President Gallatin asked him to take the chair as his familiarity with the subject and acquaintance with the personnel of the gathering

would be an advantage in the proceedings. Chief Engineer Downer of the Westchester County Park Commission traced in further detail the Saw Mill Valley, the Tibbitts Brook, the Hutchinson River and other pro-posed parkway entrances to the City and elaborated upon the suggested use of parallels to the railroads and park thoroughfares.

Chairman Baldwin of the Westchester County Park Commission briefly supplemented what Chairman Moses and Engineer Downer had said about the importance of the park and traffic questions at the boundaries of the City and the County of Westchester

Major William A. Welch, Chief Engineer of the Palisades Interstate Park Commission, said that the geographical location of the Interstate Park, with its nearest point to the City in the State of New Jersey and across the North River, put it out of the same line of consideration that was called for in the matter of the Westchester County park system, though the new Bear Mountain Bridge might pour some additional traffic into lower Westchester County on the way to New York.

In answer to a question from Chairman Moses as to the effect of the "buffer park system" afforded by the Bronx parks and of the accommodations of the Palisades Inter-state Park upon property and living conditions in Westchester County, Major Welch said emphatically that without these parks New York's influx of day pleasure seekers would have rendered the near-by Westchester Country districts uninhabitable. Major Welch also said that the Bear Mountain section of Interstate Palisades Park was becoming so congested that it was seriously considered to provide another point to which the steamboat excursion traffic from New York could be diverted. He said that the counted visitors on some Sundays ran up to some 160,000 and none could say how many there were that were not counted. This was a count of visitors for the day and the census were that were not counted. This was a count of visitors for the day and the census of campers, often including 8,500 children, was not included in the figure. Captain A. W. Brandt of the State Highway Commission, on request from Chair-man Moses, gave some particulars of the projected State Roads in Nassau County.

Col. Henry L. Bowlby, Chief Engineer of the Long Island State Park Commission, detailed the facts of the negotiations for utilizing for park purposes some of the land of the old Brooklyn water system. Of the 4,000 acres, there were 3,000 available for park uses and the protection of the water supply from pollution would not be impaired. Col. Boelby also reported upon the project for making bathing beaches available for the pub-lic of Long Island and of New York City. The town beaches of Hempstead. Oyster lic of Long Island and of New York City. Bay, Babylon and other towns were to be made available and the Ocean front and the Great South Bay beaches utilized. Col. Bowlby's details of the plans for connecting the Brooklyn parks and parkways with Long Island State parks and thoroughfares, including a Cross Island Parkway and the Freeport Causeway were especially interesting. Chairman Moses reverted to the proposition relating to the acquisition of park land

in Richmond and Queens for the needs of the future and Park Commissioner O'Rourke told of his efforts in the past to secure desirable woods and fields, giving figures of the difference in cost if they had been taken then and what it would be now.

Thomas P. Smith, Jr., Chief Clerk of the Board of Estimate, added somewhat to his exposition of the attitude of that body, saying that the requirements of schools, tran-sit and other pressing needs had prevented the appropriations for parks and not any lack of recognition of their necessity.

Park Commissioner Hennessy suggested that the talking over the projects, however interesting it was proving to be, did not seem to him to be calculated to get anywhere. He suggested that it would be necessary for the Park Board as it would be for the joint body, to have something reported to it in concrete form. As Park Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx he was particularly interested in the proposals of Mr. Downer and Mr. Baldwin and he would like to have them confer with the Park engineers of the Bronx and make some sketches of the plans as they had outlined them.

Chairman Moses asked if it would not be well to have a sub-committee of the joint body meet with the engineers and confer on the nature of the plans to be prepared and there being no objection, he named the following as such committee: Park Commissioners Hennessy, O'Rourke and Benninger, Chairman Moses, President Baldwin and Counsellor Warren.

Commissioner O'Rourke said that he was not well enough posted in a technical way to serve on such a committee and that he would designate Landscape Architect Burgevin to represent him.

Mr. Burgevin hoped that the plans submitted would be very full and explicit for the territory contiguous to the City line, both in the Westchester and the Long Island districts.

Chairman Moses said that he hoped to be able to call another meeting of the full joint body by Thursday, November 12th.

On motion, at 4:55 p. m., the Meeting adjourned.

Resolved, That the proposal of the Evans Clearing Corporation, as the lowest formal bidder, for felling dead and defective trees, pulling up stumps, filling the pits resulting therefrom and removing and disposing of fallen trees, logs, stumps and rubbish, all in Inwood Hill, Isham and Fort Washington Parks, Manhattan, be forwarded to the Comptroller for approval of sureties, and when so approved that a contract for the same be entered into, and executed by the President for, and on behalf of this Board.

Commissioner Gallatin said that Chief Clerk McCarthy and Forester Leach had called upon Assistant Corporation Counsel in connection with the handling of these proposals, showing him the specifications and the statements submitted in reference thereto. Mr. Pascal gave it as his opinion that, on the statement of the facts which should appear on the minutes, the low bidders' proposal was not a formal bid and did not comply with the requirements of the specifications calling for a statement of equipment, tools, appliances etc., etc., that the Commissioner and the Park Board shall deem adequate for the satisfactory completion of the work.

Commissioner Gallatin presented the following communications to be incorporated in the minutes:

EVANS CLEARING CORPORATION

98 Pine Street, New York. Honorable Francis D. Gallatin, President of the Park Board, Arsenal, Central Park, New York City.

Dear Sir:-

On this day, we submitted a bid for felling dead and defective trees, pulling up stumps, filling the pits resulting therefrom, and removing and disposing of fallen trees, logs, stumps and rubbish, all in Inwood Hill, Isham and Fort Washington Parks. The writer has examined the bid sheet of the Fox, Reynolds Co., Inc., and found that

none of the equipment listed can be used to advantage on this class of work, it being equipment decidedly for general contracting, and not in any way adapted to the highly specialized class of work required in this contract.

Any one familiar with the growth in Inwood Hill could readily understand that this equipment could not be used without doing irreparable damage to the young live growth in this area.

Their statement, "If successful, we propose to use Fordson Caterpillars, Tractors and Hoists," is prima facie evidence that they realize that the equipment they mentioned is inadequate for the proposed work.

As you are aware, the work you have at hand is the most particular class of land clearing known, i.e., "thinning out," which in no way is comparable with straight clearing or the cutting through of streets, where all growth is taken out, regardless, within given boundaries. Further, their statement that they have two men who were brought up in lumber regions and are fairly familiar with timber work, in no way qualifies them, inasmuch as logging off or lumbering is not analagous to the taking out of stumps in

City Parks. We hereby protest the award of this contract to this concern, on the ground that they have failed to comply with the stipulations in paragraph 3-A, of the proposed contract.

In accordance with your directions, I have investigated in company with Mr. Mulligan, my assistant, the equipment of the Fox, Reynolds Co., at 233rd Street and Prevost Avenue, Bronx.

On Friday, October 23rd, at 12 Noon, we visited 233rd Street and Prevost Avenue yard of the said Fox, Reynolds Co., we met one of the Company's employees, a Mr. Oran, who informed us that they had no cables, tractors, stump pullers, or any other equipment we asked to see, that we know by long years of experience a contractor would need in

the class of work required to be done as specified in this contract. He stated that the Company intended to buy necessary equipment if they got the contract. We were unable to see any equipment that could be used on this contract. Regarding their experience, Mr. J. J. McCarthy, Chief Clerk of this Department, and myself, upon the advice of Mr. Pascal, Asst. Corporation Counsel, visited the Department, to have done at Otisville, N. Y., for said Board of Health. We desired to see the class of work and whether it would apply to the class now required in this contract of Inwood Hill Park. We were advised by Mr. Mullane, in charge of contracts, that the Depart

ment had no records of any work or contracts performed by this Company at Otisville, N. Y. The removal of trees and stumps in connection with cutting through of streets cannot be compared with park clearing work, which requires the protection of the small trees, sapling, and large trees which cannot be replaced.

Any one familiar with the growth in Inwood Hill Park can readily understand that the equipment mentioned in this Company's list could not be used without doing great damage to the live growth in this company s has company to be used whold down and pred-that the Fox, Reynolds Co., cannot perform the work in accordance with the specifica-tions of this contract for felling dead and defective trees, pulling up stumps, filling the pits resulting therefrom, and removing and disposing of fallen trees, logs, stumps and rubbish, and that the best interest of the City would be served by the rejection of their bid.

Mr. Moses stated that this motion of Judge Scudder's was to be considered as apply-ing only to the larger park developments. The matter of playgrounds would be discussed separately.

Motion made by Mr. Lawson Purdy, seconded by W. B. Roulstone and carried: "That it is the sense of this meeting that the sum of approximately \$10,000,000 should be provided for playgrounds in the several boroughs, to be segregated later, on the report of a representative committee of persons interested in this subject cooperating with the city authorities and that such playgrounds and small parks may in part be paid for by assessment of the property benefited and attention should be given to the use of excess condemnation in appropriate cases."

Motion made by Mr. Lawson Purdy, seconded by Albert S. Bard and carried: "That in any condemnation of land for the larger parks and parkways as well as for the playgrounds consideration should be given to the use of excess condemnation.'

Motion made by Richard S. Newcombe, seconded by W. Lynn McCracken and

carried: "That it is the sense of this meeting that a city-wide park, parkway and playground the inverse of corporate stock exempt from the program should be financed through the issuance of corporate stock exempt from the The life of the bonds to be about fifty years and that this method pay-as-you-go policy. of financing is preferable to assessment on the city at large under Section 247 of the charter.'

A memorandum was presented on the proposed city parks and parkway extensions, as follows:

"In accordance with the provisions of the State Conservation Law the City and State Park Authorities have been in conference on connections and relations between state and local parks in the metropolitan region. The problem, as the conference sees it reduced to its essentials, is to provide additional recreational facilities within the city on a large scale and also additional local playgrounds to establish proper highway and parkway connections between state and city park and parkway systems and further cooperation in the joint development of the urban and suburban parks so that camping and other facilities will be provided outside the city by the state for city residents who have the time and opportunity to enjoy them and so that the city on the other hand will provide the necessary recreation within its borders for those who must have facilities near at hand which can be reached at a low fare. The problem is not only a New York State and City problem but also more and more affects New Jersey not only in the Palisades region but further south through the building of tunnels and bridges. The recreation The recreation problem on Staten Island cannot possibly be solved without reference to the new bridges and the close relationship which will be established through them between Richmond and Jersey.

"The problem in New York City is particularly urgent with reference to the acquisition of land for the proposed extension and connections of the City park and parkway systems which have been under discussion for some time and which are now available on maps. It is a fact beyond dispute that unless these areas and rights-of-way are acquired early in the next year their acquisition will be entirely impossible because of real estate speculation, building plans and other developments which already involve a considerable part of the areas under consideration and which if not interrupted by acquisition by the city will undoubtedly result in the solid building up of these areas. Thus the greater part of the program will become entirely impossible and what little can be carried out ultimately will require the expenditure of vast sums of money in the future in the condemnation of settled property, tearing down of buildings, and the disturbance of communities which will have grown up on these tracts. The wooded areas in Queens on the borders of Nassau County between Hillside Avenue and the Long Island Sound afford a good illustration. These are the last of the natural forest areas in New York City outside of Richmond. The areas proposed to be acquired have practically all been sold and some of them have been subdivided within the last six months. Plans are already going ahead for housing developments in this section similar to those found south of Hillside Avenue. These developments even include the area adjoining the Creedmore State Hospital for the Insane which has less than half of the land which it requires for the use of inmates of buildings under construction. It requires little imagination to visualize the problem which will result if houses are built all over this area up to the Nassau border even surrounding and hemming in an institution for the insane with numerous buildings, but with inadequate grounds for the inmates. The effect on the Wheatley Hills section of Nassau County under such conditions can also be predicted with absolute certainty. Not only will the City and Nassau County be faced with an impossible problem in providing services of all kinds for a densely settled area in which no plans have been made for a large population, but it is impossible to conceive where recreational facilities will be found for the people who live in this section. Similar problems exist in other boroughs. There is, of course, no perfect solution of the recreational problem in New York City. It is too late for that but the present conditions on Manhattan Island need not be perpetuated in other boroughs.

"The specific plan which follows and which is indicated on the maps includes suggestions which have been under consideration by various authorities for years. It has been carefully studied on the ground and is believed to be sound. No originality is claimed for it excepting that it brings together into one plan proposed to be financed on a city-wide basis, projects which have been discussed separately for years and which will never be solved piecemeal. Past experience shows that there is no hope of solving this problem on a local or borough basis or by any method of local assessment. It is a citywide problem which must be passed on and financed on a city-wide basis either through the issue of corporate stock exempt from the pay-as-you-go policy or through assessment over the city at large spread over a number of years.

"The proposed plan provides for acquisition of land only. This is the important thing. The developments can come later on. These developments will be more than paid for through increase in assessments and through other inevitable results of park and parkway improvements. It will be seen that this plan calls for the expenditure of Thirty Million Dollars. Twenty Million for the acquisition of the major park and parkway areas and Ten Million for playgrounds to be segregated later on. This is not a large sum in the light of the cost and increase in value of present city parks and parkways. As already indicated the program must be undertaken at once if at all."

LAND PROPOSED TO BE ACQUIRED FOR CITY PARK AND PARKWAY ACQUISITIONS AND EXTENSIONS CO-ORDINATED WITH STATE PROGRAM

MANHATTAN AND BRONX:

Acquisition of land for the extension of Riverside Drive and for various connections with the Westchester system, also for Belt Line Parkway. These plans are shown on map together with Westchester plans. Estimated cost of acquisition of land Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000).

QUEENS:

Acquisition of park lands on the border of Nassau County including Alley Pond and Wigmore Properties and several areas along the North Shore on the Long Island Sound as indicated on the accompanying map. Total acreage to be acquired about fifteen hundred (1500) acres. These developments are shown on the accompanying map with Long Island park and boulevard developments and main boulevard developments in the Borough of Queens. Estimated cost of land acquisition Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000).

RICHMOND:

Acquisition of areas adjoining Silver Lake Reservoir and in other areas on ridge for park, golf course and recreational purposes to be connected by a high ridge parkway, and also to connect with shore front areas at Great Kills, Princess Bay and Tottenville. Total acreage in parks and parkways approximately four thousand (4000) acres. Estimated cost of land acquisitions Four Million Dollars (\$4,000,000).

BROOKLYN:

Acquisition of land for the extension of Shore Road through the United States Military Reservation at Fort Hamilton, through Dyker Beach Park and thence as a parkway to a point north of Coney Island Ship Canal, thence easterly to connect with the Marine Park at Gerritsen Basin, through the Marine Park, northeasterly to Highland Park, and to connect with Conduit Boulevard into Nassau County and State park system. Acreage to be acquired cannot be exactly estimated. Estimated cost of these land acquisitions Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000).

The total cost of land acquisitions in all the boroughs, Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000).

Playgrounds in the several boroughs, Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000), to be segregated later by a special committee of representative citizens interested in playgrounds cooperating with the Borough Presidents and the Park Authorities of the City.

This program to be financed either by city wide assessment spread over a considerable period of years as provided by Section 247 of the City Charter or by fifty-year bonds exempted from the "pay-as-you-go policy" by special act of the legislature. On motion at 5:30 p. m., the Conference adjourned.

I hereby inform you that the duplicate final decree of the Supreme Court relative to acquiring title in fee to the real property required for an Addition to Bensonhurst Park lying between the present northeasterly boundary line of said Park and Cropsey Avenue, together with the bounding street laid out on its northeasterly side, extending from Cropsey Avenue southwestwardly a distance of about 120 feet, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, has been deposited with the Comptroller.

The final decree herein was duly entered in the office of the Clerk of the County of Kings on the 10th day of December, 1925.

The title in fee to the real property acquired in this proceeding for an addition to Bensonhurst Park lying between the present northeasterly boundary line of said park and Cropsey Avenue, together with that portion of the bounding street laid out on its northeasterly side extending from Cropsey Avenue southwestwardly a distance of about 120 feet, became vested in The City of New York on the 1st day of December, 1924, pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on November 21, 1924.
