COUNCIL DISCUSSES TRACK-LESS TROLLEY AND RAIL-LESS RAILROAD SYSTEM

(Continued from Page One)

Considered an important question, Captain, sought to see if you had intended running your interurban system on rails?

Capt. Yates—My intention had been to run on rails from the first, nor have I changed my intentions.

In raising objections you are afraid at a goat and swallowing a camel. My charter empowers me to lay down rails or run a railless system, and it would be the height of folly on my part to install a poor system so unsatisfactory that the public would not patronize it.

The speaker said as to the amendments requiring free passes he did not intend granting these to policemen, firemen and mail carriers, but he saw no reason why civic officials should not pay like anyone else. If he were a labor man he would most assuredly object to free rides for civic officials. He had certain corporate powers and couldn't go beyond these, which covered everything in regard to a tramway system. If Nanaimo insisted upon the word "railway" instead of the word "tramway" they must look elsewhere for another company to build its street car system, as he had no power to construct a railway.

Mayor Shaw reminded Mr. Yates the city of Nanaimo could give his company the power to build a railway within the city limits and Mr. Yates replied that his charter from the government would not allow him to enter into it.

Mr. J. H. Simpson, who is solicitor for the city in the Tramway proposal, remarked that Capt. Yates' article of agreement did not give him power to build a railway, it was his fault and not the city's. He (Simpson) had drafted an agreement with the intention of safeguarding the city's interests and it contained no clause detrimental to any company which honestly intended to build a tramway.

The speaker did not feel inclined to alter the agreement in any way when simple contained what he considered essential as to protecting the city's interests.

Capt. Yates observed that when he came first to Nanaimo, the Council requested him to build a tramway system. He was introduced to the Board of Trade in view of such purpose and spent two or three days going over the proposed route with his engineer. He had found out the provincial government would not grant the city a charter, but after considerable work and at much expense he had secured a charter from the government to build a tramway in the district. The speaker concluded by asking before you gentlemen of your promise and carry out the agreement made with me in December last.

In motion of Ald. Sheehy the committee rose, reported progress, and adjourned to meet again at next Monday's meeting of the Council and in the meantime the agreed tramway agreement will be submitted to Capt. Yates' solicitor for their approval or rejection.

DISMISSALS FROM OFFICE.

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—A Parliamentary session tabled today at the request of Mr. W. L. Mackenzie King, has been adjourned until 1911, and January 12, 1912, to last three months the government will be in power, the dismissals made, exclusive of the Post Office Department, were 352. Mackenzie King, Public Works, 12; Railways and Canals, 50; Internal Department, 50; Marine and Fisheries, 12; Customs, 50; Internal Revenue, 8; Militia, 11; Labor, 14; Prisons, Bureau of Prisons, 2; Immigration, 12; Interior, 10; Agriculture, 8; Trade and Commerce, 11.

In the case of Public Works, the returns show that about half of the 352 whose services were dispensed with during the period mentioned had completed the work on which they were engaged when the present government entered office.

INDIANS PERISH IN FIRE

Kemora, Ont., Feb. 11.—Coroner Chauman left today for White Dog to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of burning to death of two Indians last Wednesday night at Peter Sorenson's Hall Way house at the crossroads. The particulars that reached Kemora were few. Moses Land, a brother of the chief of White Dog, and Dennis Spence, an other Indian, were on their way to White Dog from Kemora and stopped at the Hall Way House that night. There was another Indian, whose name is unknown, with them. Moses Land had \$200 with him, as the chief had just been to Kemora with \$200 for the Hudson's Bay Co.

During the night the canvas-covered shack that was attached to the house, and three which was a store, stayed, burned down, and Land and Spence perished in the flames. The other Indians managed to escape but raised no alarm and disappeared. A few days later he turned up at the White Dog reserve.

FIRE IN TORONTO BLOCKS TRAFFIC

Toronto, Feb. 11.—A comparative fire at the foot of John Street tonight was the cause of a collision in which one of Toronto's finest fire engines and a street car were badly damaged and three persons were injured. It took up twenty-five minutes to transport the damaged street car to the foot of John Street. Westbound traffic on King Street was interrupted for two hours.

The John Street barn and an oil house in close proximity to it, in the ground front yards, were threatened with destruction by the fire, which destroyed the local supply station of the Pullman Car Company, a store room for passenger car repairs, and a plant for painting, which was used for repairing car bodies on dining, sleeping and chair cars for the Grand Trunk.

A fire engine, probably the heaviest of Toronto's fire-fighting apparatus, failed to start, and a street car at King and Spadina Street, two men, a driver, Edward Tanner and Engineer W. J. Walker, who, having the engine and a passenger on the car J. J. McFarlane, were injured.
