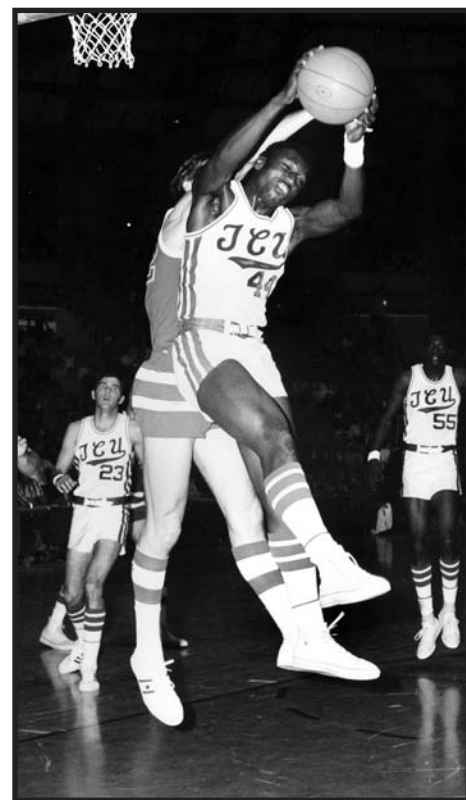

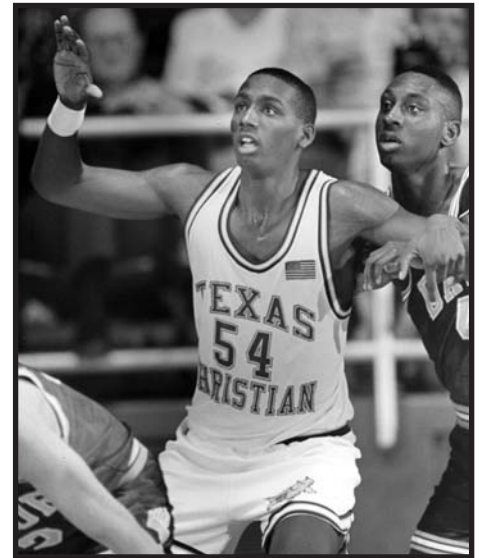

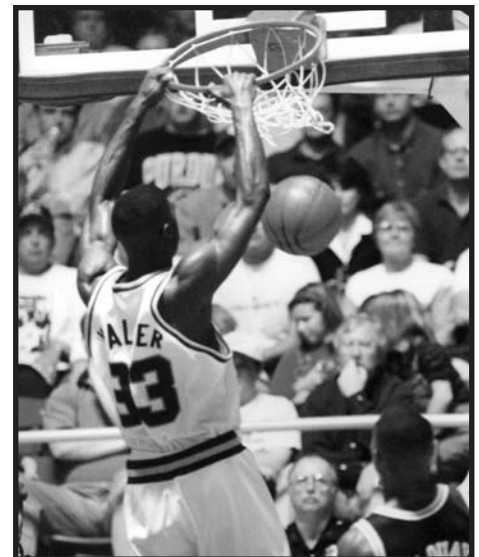

J.R. Langley 1908-1909 (2-3 overall)

TCU's first coach guided the Horned Frog basketball team through its first official season of play in 1908-09, but he was better remembered for being the first football coach in TCU history to compile a winning record for his career. J.R. Langley's hoops career consisted of just five games, but he holds a special place in TCU history as the first football coach at the school to produce consecutive winning seasons. His 1908 squad compiled a 6-3 football record while registering three shutouts and outscoring opponents 155-68. His 1909 grid squad went 5-2-1, garnering five shutouts and allowing just 33 points for the season.

F.M. Cahoon 1914-1915 (11-12 overall)

The Horned Frogs embarked on an unheard-of 23-game schedule in F.M. Cahoon's lone year as the head coach. The slate was highlighted by a two-game road trip to play a pair at Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif. Cahoon's most notable victory was a 28-14 win over arch-rival Baylor in Fort Worth, marking the first time that a TCU squad had defeated a Bear quintet after six mostly lopsided losses.

E.Y. Freeland 1915-1916 (1-3 overall)

Former all-around athletic star at Vanderbilt, E.Y. Freeland had built tiny Daniel Baker College into a football power in just three seasons before assuming head coaching duties at TCU for football and basketball. Freeland's one-year stint at TCU was a turbulent one. His last Daniel Baker football team had squashed TCU, 33-0, in 1914 and TCU administrators hoped he would bring similar success to Frogland.

But those hopes were quickly dashed when his squad suffered a 72-0 thrashing at the hands of the University of Texas in the opener of the football season. He rebounded to lead TCU to a 43-0 strumming of SMU in the second game, but his grid season ended badly with a 4-5 record as his team suffered shutout losses to Oklahoma A&M (13-0) and arch-rival Baylor (51-0). His hoops team earned just one victory in a short season. Faced with the graduation of most of his footballers (many of whom also played basketball), Freeland departed the scene at the end of the 1916 spring semester.

T.D. Hackney 1919-1920 (1-7 overall)

In his only season as head coach, T.D. Hackney fielded a competitive squad but not a successful one. The Horned Frogs managed only a victory over Austin College (37-33) sandwiched by a series of close setbacks. Five of TCU's seven losses were by fewer than 10 points, but a 50-20 loss at Rice was the most notable of the season.

W.L. Driver 1920-1922 (8-7 overall)

William L. Driver came to TCU after a five-year stint as athletic director at Texas A&M, a job which also included leading the Aggies in all sports. An ace recruiter for the time, Driver had engineered a

pair of Southwest Conference football titles for the Aggies. His impact at TCU was similar, as the Frogs immediately dominated the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA) on the gridiron.

Driver led a short-lived renaissance for TCU in basketball as well, as his excellent grid recruits enjoyed an 8-4 season in 1922 after going 0-3 in a truncated 1921 campaign. The team captain on both of Driver's squads was Horned Frog football star Dutch Meyer, who would go on to a distinguished coaching career of his own at TCU.

John McKnight 1922-1923 (3-13 overall)

Another former A&M man, John McKnight came to TCU in 1921 to assist with the football team, but he took over the Horned Frog hoopsters for the 1923 season. He became head football coach upon Driver's departure for the 1922 season and directed the Frogs to a 2-5-3 record which led to his departure after the 1923 school year. McKnight led TCU through similar hard times on the hardwood, as TCU managed just three wins in 16 games under his command.

Madison "Matty" Bell 1923-1929 (71-41 overall; 49-30 conference)

A Fort Worth native and graduate of North Side High School, Madison "Matty" Bell was the head man during TCU's transition from the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA) to the Southwest Conference.

A former football and basketball star at Centre College in Danville, Ky. (where he starred on Centre's national powerhouse grid team with fellow Fort Worth legend Harold "Bo" McMillan), Bell was the first TCU hoops coach equipped with a legitimate basketball background. Bell distinguished himself as one of the best players in Kentucky's college ranks during his career at Centre. Bell, whose collegiate athletic career ended before his senior season because he chose to enter law school, adhered to TCU's early tradition of splitting his coaching duties between football and basketball.

Bell is credited with bringing respectability to TCU basketball in the early days of the SWC. He began his coaching career at Haskell Indian School in 1920, coaching the school through the 1921 season before taking a similar post at Carroll College in Wisconsin. Bell took the post of head football and basketball coach at TCU in the spring of 1923. Bell gave TCU's basketball program an identity apart from the football team. For the first time in school history, the majority of the basketball team was comprised of true basketball players, instead of football players using the sport as an activity to maintain fitness in the offseason.

Bell immediately turned around the Horned Frog basketball program from a 3-13 finish in 1923 to a 16-4 record (15-4 in the SWC) in 1924. The 1925 squad posted a 14-5 record (11-3 in the SWC). TCU narrowly missed winning an SWC title under Bell's leadership, coming closest in 1925. That proved to be the zenith of Bell's roundball career at TCU, as the team dropped to 13-9 (7-5 in the SWC) in 1926. In 1927, TCU went 9-8 (6-4 in the SWC) and 9-8 in 1928, a

season marked by the first losing record in SWC history for TCU. The 5-7 conference mark was duplicated in 1929 during a 10-7 season. After garnering a 33-17-5 record as football coach, Bell left TCU in January of 1929, to take over as head football coach (without basketball duties) at Texas A&M.

Bell's teams set the stage for his successor, Francis Schmidt, to become the winningest football and basketball coach in TCU history. Bell served five seasons at A&M before being fired following the 1933 season. Bell returned to the SWC in 1935 as the SMU head football coach, leading the Mustangs through the 1949 season at SMU and serving as the school's athletic director from 1935-42 and 1945-65.

Francis Schmidt 1929-1934 (72-24 overall; 41-19 conference)

As head coach at the University of Arkansas, Francis Schmidt not only was present at the birth of Razorback basketball, but created a program that became dominant in SWC basketball and the conference's first squad able to compete with schools from around the nation. Schmidt agreed to terms with TCU to become football and basketball coach on Feb. 8, 1929.

A native of Nebraska, Schmidt played football at the University of Nebraska before earning a law degree. He began his coaching career at Arkansas City (Kansas) High School, where he enjoyed tremendous success before taking a coaching job at Kendall College in Tulsa, Okla. (now the University of Tulsa). Schmidt enjoyed even greater success at the Tulsa school, where both his football and basketball teams produced wildly high-scoring marks for the time. Coaching at Kendall from 1915-22, Schmidt garnered a 73-26 record in basketball.

At the end of the 1922 season, the University of Arkansas hired Schmidt to take over its football program and create a basketball program. Schmidt turned around Arkansas' football fortunes and quickly developed the Hogs into a basketball power. Schmidt was the winningest coach in football and basketball at both Kendall and Arkansas before accepting the same dual roles at TCU.

Schmidt made an immediate impact at TCU, leading the Horned Frogs to their first SWC football championship and inspiring local civic leaders to raise funds to build a new football stadium, what is now Amon Carter Stadium. He had a similar impact in basketball, although not an immediate one. His first season was his worst at TCU, a 7-10 season with a 4-8 conference mark. After that, Schmidt won 65 of his next 79 games on the TCU hardwood. Schmidt's Frogs won the SWC crown in just his second year and became the dominant team in the region for the remainder of his time in Fort Worth. The Horned Frogs finished just a game off the league title in 1932 and 1933 before regaining the SWC throne in 1934.

Schmidt lured several TCU legends to play for the purple and white, including future head coach Byron "Buster" Brannon (also a quarterback on the football team), Ad Dietzel (TCU's first basketball superstar) and Wendell "Doc" Sumner. Schmidt left TCU shortly after winning the 1934 conference championship, taking over as head football coach at Ohio State. He coached seven seasons at OSU and compiled a record of 39-16-1, winning two Big Ten titles.

Dutch Meyer 1934-1937
(10-37 overall; 5-31 conference)

Taking over the program at the age of 33, Dutch Meyer had already been a mainstay at TCU, having spent 16 years since high school on the Fort Worth campus. Meyer continued TCU's tradition of splitting between head football and head basketball coach coaching duties.

Though he was to have a successful 19-year tenure as TCU's football coach (compiling a 109-79-13 record on the gridiron, winning SWC titles in 1938, 1944 and 1951 and national championships in 1935 and 1938), Meyer's basketball coaching career was less successful. The Horned Frogs slipped from their preeminent position in SWC basketball after Meyer took over, winning just 10 of 47 games overall and going 5-31 in SWC competition during his three seasons as head basketball coach.

Meyer is a legend in TCU athletics, having a longer association with Horned Frog athletics than any person in history. His relationship with TCU began as a ballboy when the school was still Add-Ran College in Waco. Along with his duties as head coach, Meyer served as athletics director at TCU from 1935 to 1953.

Lester "Mike" Brumbelow 1937-1941
(22-64 overall; 2-46 conference)

A former football and basketball player at TCU, Lester "Mike" Brumbelow was a two-time All-Southwest Conference guard in football and was team captain and most valuable player of the Horned Frogs' 1929 SWC champions (the school's first conference football championship).

A native of Jacksboro, Texas, Brumbelow's greatest impact on TCU athletics may have been his influence on future Horned Frog football coach Abe Martin, his college roommate, who followed Brumbelow to TCU after developing a close friendship with him in high school.

Known as "The Jacksboro Irishman," Brumbelow served as line coach for Dutch Meyer and kept that job while taking over the head basketball coaching job for four seasons. Brumbelow's teams had little success, finishing last in the SWC all four seasons. Brumbelow remained loyal to TCU, serving as Dutch Meyer's top football assistant well into the 1940s.

H.R. "Hub" McQuillan 1941-1948
(66-104 overall; 32-52 conference)

He came to TCU from Texas A&M in 1941 as an assistant football coach and took over the basketball reins for the 1942 season. Hub McQuillan immediately breathed life into the basketball program, garnering TCU's first winning season since 1933 in his inaugural year. The Frogs were 13-10 and bolted from the Southwest Conference cellar into a tie for third in the SWC.

The Frogs improved to 18-9 in his second season

and a fourth-place finish in the SWC. McQuillan kept TCU competitive in the SWC through the 1946 season, never finishing below fourth in the league before a drastic dropoff in his final two seasons. McQuillan remained line coach for the TCU football team under head coach Dutch Meyer through the 1950 season.

Buster Brannon 1948-1967
(205-259 overall; 104-144 conference)

Aside from Dutch Meyer, A Byron "Buster" Brannon's relationship with TCU athletics probably ranks as the longest association with Horned Frog sports. Brannon was a star quarterback in football (1931-32) and a standout guard in basketball at TCU from 1931-33 (All-SWC in '32 and '33), served 19 seasons as head basketball coach (1949-67) and was an assistant to the athletics director from 1967-75.

A star at Athens (Texas) High School, along with Wendell "Doc" Sumner, Brannon came to TCU to play for then-new basketball/football coach Francis Schmidt. Brannon and Sumner joined with Ad Dietzel to form the nucleus of a TCU team that won the Southwest Conference championship in his sophomore year and narrowly missed repeating the feat in 1932 and 1933.

A 1933 TCU graduate, Brannon coached at high schools in several Texas cities (Van, Dublin and Odessa) before ascending to the college ranks. His college coaching career began when he succeeded Jimmy Kitts at Rice as head men's basketball coach for the 1938-1939 season.

A proponent of fast-break basketball, a style rarely embraced at the time, Brannon built Rice into a dominating power in the SWC, leading the Owls to a 25-4 record, the SWC title and an NCAA Tournament appearance in just his second season (1940). Rice again won the SWC crown in 1942, earning another NCAA Tournament berth. Near the end of the 1943 season, Brannon went into the military for the duration of World War II, but his team went on to a berth in the National Invitation Tournament. In 1946, Brannon returned to Rice but was replaced after a 10-11 season.

Brannon took over the TCU basketball program following the resignation of Hub McQuillan in the spring of 1948. In 1950, Brannon gave TCU its first winning season since 1946, but the Frogs lost the outright SWC championship and NCAA tournament bid in a playoff against Texas A&M in Waco. TCU reached the top of the conference in 1951. Brannon's teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament and won SWC titles in 1951 and 1952. The play of center Dick O'Neal highlighted his teams of the mid-1950s but a conference title eluded TCU until 1959.

That season, Brannon produced his best coaching feat as the under-rated Horned Frogs won a surprise SWC championship and another NCAA Tournament berth. Brannon was at the helm when TCU finally constructed a new arena to showcase basketball (Daniel-Meyer Coliseum) in December of 1961.

Brannon retired from coaching following the 1967 season, but remained at TCU as an assistant to the athletics director, while occasionally serving as a color analyst on TCU radio broadcasts.

Brannon was inducted into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame, the Texas High School Basketball Hall of

Fame and the TCU Lettermen's Hall of Fame. He remained in his post at TCU until his death in 1975. His career coaching record (including his stint at Rice) was 290-296 overall, 144-165 in SWC games.

Johnny Swaim 1967-1977
(102-151 overall; 56-88 conference)

A guard on Buster Brannon's early TCU teams, Johnny Swaim lettered for the Horned Frogs from 1951-53 and first earned distinction as the only TCU basketball player ever to start on three Southwest Conference basketball championship squads.

A native of Jean, Texas, Swaim also played baseball at TCU and earned two letters as a pitcher. A 1953 TCU graduate, Swaim returned to Fort Worth as coach of the freshman basketball and freshman baseball teams, in addition to duties as a physical education instructor, in the fall of 1956.

He became a full-time varsity assistant coach and assistant to the athletic director in August of 1964. Swaim was handpicked to succeed Brannon as head coach following Brannon's retirement in 1967.

Swaim shocked the region by becoming the first coach in SWC history to win the league title in his inaugural year as a head coach in 1968. That team was the first in school history to advance to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, knocking off Kansas State in the first round. He led TCU to another SWC championship in 1971 and posted winning records in three seasons.

Swaim earned SWC Coach of the Year honors during both championship seasons. Surprisingly, he abruptly retired in the fall of 1977 and remained in the Fort Worth area for the remainder of his life. Swaim spent 22 years at TCU as either a student-athlete or coach. He worked in private business until his death Oct. 5, 1995.

Tim Somerville 1977-1979
(10-43 overall; 3-29 conference)

At the young age of 32, Tim Somerville took over the TCU head coaching job just months after joining Johnny Swaim's staff. Somerville was an assistant coach when Swaim announced his retirement just four days prior to the start of the 1977-78 season.

Prior to coming to TCU, Somerville was the head coach at Concord College in West Virginia, an NAIA school. He compiled a record of 31-27 in two seasons as head coach at Concord. A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Somerville played college basketball at East Carolina, graduating from ECU in 1969.

He began his coaching career at Aurora (Ohio) High School in 1969 and served as an assistant coach at Georgetown College in Kentucky in 1971, earning a master's degree in secondary education while there. From 1972-74, Somerville was an assistant coach at Ohio State.

Somerville's two-year reign as head coach at TCU resulted in little success and he resigned shortly after the end of his second season.

Jim Killingsworth 1979-1987 (130-106 overall; 64-64 conference)

A seasoned coach who molded winning teams at every stop, Jim Killingsworth became head coach at TCU in the spring of 1979. "Killer" took what was the worst team in the Southwest Conference and molded the Horned Frogs into a two-time SWC champion and an NCAA Tournament entry ranked among the top 20.



Killingsworth

A native of Checotah, Okla., Killingsworth served in the Army Air Force during World War II. He graduated from Northeastern Oklahoma University in 1948 and began his coaching career at Stidham (Okla.) High School that year. During a 12-year high school coaching career, he also served at Schuller, Lindsey and Pawhuska high schools and compiled a 305-50 record. He also found time to earn a master's degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1954.

Killingsworth's collegiate coaching career began in 1961 as the freshman coach at the University of Tulsa, a post he held for three seasons.

He then moved on to Cerritos Junior College in California prior to the 1964-65 season and compiled a 158-47 record in six seasons. His first team was undefeated in conference play, and his 1968 team went 31-3 and won the California Junior College championship. He became head coach at Idaho State in 1971, spending six seasons there and winning conference titles in 1974, 1976 (tie), and 1977, while compiling a 110-54 record.

He took the head coaching job at Oklahoma State in 1977 and was 22-31 in two seasons before coming to TCU. Killingsworth brought stability and steady improvement to TCU, and in 1982 the Frogs posted their first winning season in 10 years and won an SWC postseason tournament game for the first time.

In 1983, TCU had its best season since 1968 with a 23-11 record and advanced to the third round of the NIT postseason tournament. In 1986, the Frogs shared a three-way tie for the SWC championship and earned another NIT berth.

Killingsworth's final TCU team went 24-7 and won the SWC title in 1987. In addition, the Frogs defeated Marshall in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Killingsworth announced his retirement two days following TCU's one-point, second-round loss to Notre Dame.

Moe Iba 1987-1994 (196-108 overall; 44-62 conference)

As a high school star during his playing days in Oklahoma, Moe Iba turned down a scholarship offer to play college ball for TCU and then-head coach Buster Brannon. The son of coaching legend Henry Iba, for whom he played at Oklahoma State, Moe Iba took the lessons he learned from his father and applied them to the modern game.

Named head coach at TCU on March 23, 1987, Iba led the Horned Frogs for seven seasons and compiled a record of 96-108 and one postseason appearance. Iba's college coaching career began at Texas Western (now UTEP). There, Iba, the son of one legend

worked for a man who would soon become one, Miners coach Don Haskins. Iba led four Miners freshman teams to an amazing 65-4 record in four seasons while assisting Haskins with the varsity squad that won the NCAA title in 1966.

From there, Iba landed his first head coaching job at Memphis State and produced a 37-65 record in four seasons. Iba next surfaced as an assistant at Nebraska for eight seasons before taking over the program in 1980. He produced a solid program at Lincoln, twice earning Big 8 Conference Coach of the Year honors and leading the Huskers to four postseason berths, including an NCAA trip in his final season of 1986.

His Nebraska record of 107-70 with six winning seasons in six years led to his arrival at TCU. Under Iba, the Horned Frogs notched four consecutive winning seasons (1989-92) and he earned SWC Coach of the Year honors from the *Waco Tribune-Herald* for TCU's 18-10 performance in 1991. His 1992 team was his best at TCU, going 23-11 and earning a spot in the National Invitation Tournament. But the fall from grace was swift for Iba at TCU as his 1993 team finished with a 6-22 mark and his final team went 7-20 in 1994.

Billy Tubbs 1994-2002 (156-95 overall; 65-53 conference)

Long considered "the man who builds college basketball programs," Billy Tubbs did just that in redirecting the TCU basketball program over his eight seasons in Fort Worth. Tubbs announced on Nov. 5, 2001, that the 2001-02 season would be his final year at TCU.

A veteran coach who excelled at every level of coaching, Tubbs made history at TCU. His 2001-02 team compiled yet another winning season, a school-record eighth straight. His high-scoring Horned Frogs won 81.0 percent (107-25) of their home games under Tubbs' tutelage.

While his most recent Horned Frog squads added luster to an already sparkling coaching record, it was Tubbs' 1997-98 squad that will go down as one of, if not, the best team to ever take the court at TCU. That

team went 27-6 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament as the No. 4 seed. It was the school's first NCAA appearance in 11 seasons. In addition, Tubbs earned his 500th career victory in the process.

The previous campaign, 1996-97, was TCU's first in the Western Athletic Conference, and Tubbs guided the Horned Frogs to a 22-win season and the championship game of the WAC Tournament.

Tubbs began working his magic from the moment he first set foot on the Fort Worth campus. Tubbs led a team that had won just 13 games over the previous two seasons into a national story over the next several years. During his time, the fast-paced Frogs led the NCAA in scoring offense, broke numerous school records and featured the nation's individual scoring and rebounding leader. Tubbs ranks in the top 30 among the NCAA's all-time winningest coaches.

Neil Dougherty 2002-Present (61-92 overall; 24-56 conference)

Neil Dougherty embarks on his sixth season at the helm of the Horned Frogs' men's basketball team in 2007-08. Dougherty, who was hired on March 25, 2002, as TCU's 18th head coach, owns an overall record of 61-92 over his first five seasons.

Since Dougherty's arrival, TCU has made tremendous strides in terms of facilities. A new locker room for the basketball team was built in 2002, a new playing surface in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum was installed in 2003 and the Ed & Rae Schollmaier Basketball Complex opened in 2004.

In addition, the Horned Frogs have made strides on the court. The 2004-05 team posted a 20-win season and earned TCU's first postseason tournament appearance since 1999. The Frogs made a late-March run all the way to the NIT quarterfinals despite playing all three games on the road. TCU battled to wins at Miami (Ohio) and Western Michigan before falling in a hard-fought game at Maryland 85-73. When it was all over, the Frogs came out with a 21-14 record – the 11th 20-win season in school history and the most wins for the program since 1998-99.

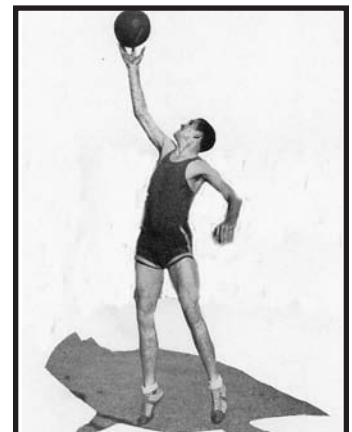

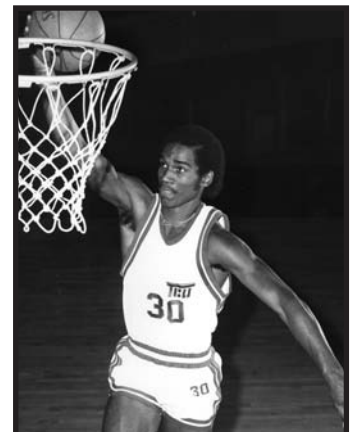

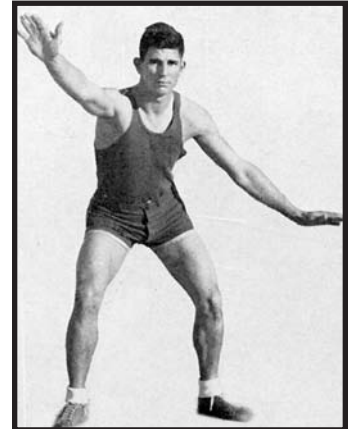

AD DIETZEL

A key factor in the rousing success of head coach Francis Schmidt's teams at TCU was Ad Dietzel, at 6-foot-6, a towering player for his time who was part of Schmidt's first recruiting class. Selected to the *New York Sun*, *Humor* magazine, and Chick Murray All-American squads in 1931 and the Helms Foundation All-America Team during his junior season of 1932, Dietzel forever holds the distinction of being TCU's first basketball All-American.

Dietzel played center for the 1931 Southwest Conference title team, and helped lead the Horned Frogs to a two-year SWC record of 18-6 before departing prior to his senior season. One of the Southwest's first true big men, Dietzel set a TCU single-season scoring record with 168 points in 12 SWC games and earned a spot on the Chick Murray All-American squad honoring the nation's top five college players as a sophomore. In addition, Dietzel tied the TCU record for points in a game with 26 in a 41-36 victory at Texas on Feb. 17.

His junior season of 1932 was even more spectacular, as he regularly surpassed the 20-point mark during a period when entire teams struggled to score 30 to 40 points per contest. Dietzel enjoyed a 24-point night in a victory against Rice and lit up the Owls for 22 when the Frogs visited Houston later in the season. Dietzel's 20-point outing against SMU in a 52-19 win over SMU on Feb. 19 broke his own SWC scoring record. However, a 20-point effort in his final TCU game left him nine points shy in his quest to become the first conference player to score 200 points in a season. Dietzel's 191 points did set a new SWC record.



WALLACE MYERS

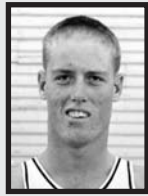

He was not the typical high scoring star of his own team, but Wallace Myers garnered enough attention as one of his region's best all-around players to warrant legitimate first team All-American mention by the Helms Foundation for his performance during the 1934 season.

While helping lead the Horned Frogs to a Southwest Conference championship during head coach Francis Schmidt's final year at TCU, Myers served as team captain during his senior season. Playing what would today be called point guard, he gained much of his acclaim from his excellent ball handling and floor leadership.

The 6-foot-1 Myers often keyed TCU to victory by creating turnovers and converting them into points by dishing to high-scoring 6-foot-5 forward Richard Allison and 6-foot-4 center Hershel Kinzy. Myers' best effort may have come in TCU's stunning 59-13 rout of Texas in which he led the Horned Frogs to the conference's top offensive output of the season.



GEORGE MCLEOD

One of the great all-time scorers in TCU history, George McLeod led the Horned Frogs in points scored in all three of his varsity seasons from 1950-1952. As a result, he became TCU's first member of the 1,000-point club, finishing his career with 1,013 points.

In addition, McLeod led the team in field goal percentage in each of those campaigns and his efforts earned him a spot on the All-Southwest Conference team all three years. At 19.4 points per game, he led the conference in scoring his senior season.

His career-best 419 points that year propelled the Frogs to a 24-4 overall record, culminating in a conference championship.

He then proceeded to lead TCU to its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, which included a defeat of New Mexico A&M in the consolation round.

After his tenure at TCU, McLeod was drafted in the 1952 National Basketball Association draft by the Milwaukee Hawks, where he played one professional season.



H.E. KIRCHNER

At 6-foot-10, H.E. Kirchner was the tallest man ever to don the purple and white until Bill Bozeat came to TCU in 1973. A dominating presence at that size, Kirchner also dominated opponents for his three seasons as a Horned Frog, but it was his senior year in 1959 that earned him spots on two All-America lists.

In 1959, Kirchner garnered 18 double-doubles – especially impressive considering assists and blocked shots were not recorded statistics at that time – en route to TCU's Southwest Conference championship. Named the SWC Most Valuable Player, he led the conference in rebounds, with 13.4 per game, and scoring, with 19.6 points per game. That year he also paced the team in field goal percentage, a feat he accomplished in each of his three varsity campaigns.

Following the regular season, Kirchner led the '59 Frogs to TCU's third-ever NCAA Tournament appearance. There, he registered 24 points and a career-high 24 rebounds in the consolation round defeat of DePaul. Kirchner finished his career with 783 rebounds, which is good for seventh on TCU's all-time rebounding list.

A three-time All-Southwest Conference selection who also received some All-America acclaim, O'Neal remains one of TCU's all-time greatest players nearly 50 years after his final game. O'Neal left TCU with ownership of most of the individual game, season and career records and remains prominent in the Horned Frogs' record book.

O'Neal scored in double figures in all 36 SWC regular-season games during his career and led the team in scoring all three seasons. His 49 points scored against Rice in 1955 set a SWC record and was the TCU standard for 41 years. During his career, O'Neal scored 40 or more points three times (all during his sophomore season) and notched 30 or more points 17 times.

The 6-foot-7 center regularly racked up double-digit rebounding totals. His top single-game total was 26 against Abilene Christian on Jan. 29, 1955. He also had a 24-rebound performance against Austin College earlier that season, a game in which he scored 45 points.

A native of Fort Worth and a graduate of Polytechnic High School, O'Neal was a two-time all-state honoree during his prep career. Called his greatest player by longtime head coach Buster Brannon, O'Neal dominated other players of his era in the Southwest Conference despite playing on several of Brannon's least successful TCU teams.

Playing during the era in which varsity play was allowed beginning with the sophomore year, O'Neal enjoyed his greatest success during his sophomore season of 1954-55. Setting marks that would stand for four decades in the TCU record book, O'Neal averaged 28.2 points over the 24-game season, while scoring 676 points (ranking him fourth nationally in total points).

As a junior, O'Neal totaled 593 points and averaged 24.7 points per game to rank 12th nationally in scoring. His senior year average of 18.9 was enough to garner All-America accolades for the third consecutive season, a school record.

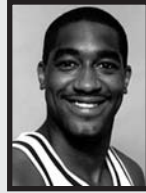
No player in TCU history underwent a transformation from role player to dominating superstar such as Kurt Thomas. Stifled during his first two seasons at TCU, the 6-foot-9 Thomas' career is clearly demarcated between his first two seasons - injury-riddled years that culminated with his sitting out his third year at TCU with a medical redshirt - and his final two seasons.

Plagued by injuries his first two seasons, Thomas did not become a starter until his junior year. He suffered a broken ankle late in his sophomore season, then re-injured the ankle less than a year later, forcing him to miss the entire 1992-93 season. He had a breakthrough season as a junior, his first year as a starter, averaging 20.7 points and almost 10 rebounds per game despite playing the final three-fourths of the season with a broken left wrist. The arrival of head coach Billy Tubbs for Thomas' senior season led to his best year ever. Thomas became only the third player in NCAA history to lead the nation in both scoring and rebounding, as he averaged 28.9 points and 14.6 rebounds per contest.

Thomas was the team's Most Valuable Player as a junior and senior and earned All-Southwest Conference honors both seasons. The 1995 SWC Player of the Year, Thomas earned All-America honors by the National Association of Basketball Coaches, the *Associated Press* and *United Press International*.

Thomas left TCU as the career record holder for blocked shots and was voted the 1995 SWC Athlete of the Year. The native of Dallas grabbed at least 20 rebounds in a game four times, led by a 25-rebound performance against Baylor in 1995. In 2005, he was elected to the TCU Lettermen's Association Hall of Fame.

Thomas was the 10th pick in the 1995 National Basketball Association's Draft, selected by the Miami Heat. The NBA veteran, who has spent the bulk of his career with the New York Knicks, currently plays for the Phoenix Suns.

Perhaps the most talented forward ever to play for TCU, Lee Nailon posted two-year career totals unsurpassed in Horned Frog basketball annals. The 6-foot-9 forward from South Bend's Clay High School matriculated to TCU after making junior college stops at Southeast Iowa Community College and Butler County Community College in Kansas.

Nailon's junior season was his most successful, as he scored a school-record 796 points and set single-game records for points and field goals made in a 53-point outing against Mississippi Valley State in which he hit 23 shots from the field.

His totals ranked him third in the NCAA in scoring (24.9 ppg) and earned him first team All-America honors by *Basketball Times* magazine. He had four 40-plus scoring outings during the 1997-98 season, earning him the Western Athletic Conference scoring title and first team All-WAC honors.

As a senior, Nailon became TCU's first preseason first team All-American (*Associated Press*) and followed that acclaim by winning another WAC scoring championship by averaging 22.8 points and 9.3 rebounds per contest. His 44-point scoring outburst against eventual NCAA Sweet 16 team Gonzaga was the highest output by any NCAA Division I player during the 1998-99 season.

Nailon's consistency allowed him to reach several scoring plateaus faster than any previous TCU player. He reached the 1,200- 1,300- 1,400- and 1,500-point milestones in fewer games than any Horned Frog ever. Nailon was a second-round draft pick (43rd selection overall) by the Charlotte Hornets in the 1999 NBA Draft and currently plays for the Cleveland Cavaliers.
