Did you know...?

- Malaga will be Tim Walsh's first Series tournament as Australia women's coach since their historic victory on home soil in Sydney in January 2018 – an event which saw them become the first team in Series history (men's or women's) to win a title without conceding a single point
- Australia have won back-to-back tournaments at the start of a Series for the third time, having also done so in their title-winning campaigns of 2015-16 and 2018
- They will be bidding to replicate their start to the 2015-16 Series in Malaga with a third consecutive Cup title (their longest run of titles)
- Australia reached 200 Series victories in Dubai (R2) – a milestone only New Zealand have achieved
- Their round one triumph in Dubai was their first Cup title on the Series since Sydney in 2018
- They have won 11 matches in a row on the Series, three short of their record tally set in 2018
- Only one of their 10 Cup titles have come in Europe, in London on the 2014-15 Series
- Rio 2016 gold medallists Shannon Parry, Emma Tonegato, Chloe Dalton and Ellia Green have joined Emilee Cherry in leaving from the sevens programme

- They finished third in the opening round of the Championship in Lisbon and fifth in the second in Moscow to finish joint-fourth overall with Scotland

- Brazil qualified for Rugby World Cup Sevens 2022 in South Africa on 13 November as winners of the Sudamérica Rugby Sevens in Uruguay – Brazil's 19th regional title
