E. Other Information

Akha is a language spoken by close to half a million people in Myanmar, China, Laos, Thailand and Viet Nam². Akha has oral vowels occurring on three level tones³:

and laryngealized vowels occur on two level tones:

Lahu is spoken by over half a million people in China, Laos, Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam.⁴ There are several orthographies in use. The Protestant orthography uses⁵:

We are proposing the addition of MODIFIER LETTER LOW CIRCUMFLEX ACCENT. We considered requesting the addition of MODIFIER LETTER LOW CARON but decided that U+02EC MODIFIER LETTER VOICING would be suitable for the Lahu and Akha needs and would cause less confusion for the identity of U+02EC. We also considered using U+02EF MODIFIER LETTER LOW DOWN ARROWHEAD and U+02F0 MODIFIER LETTER LOW UP ARROWHEAD for both characters. However, they are based on arrowheads and Lahu and Akha needs tone marks based on the circumflex/caron design.

If MODIFIER LETTER LOW CIRCUMFLEX ACCENT is approved, we would request U+02EC be annotated as also having the function as a tone mark for Lahu and Akha. We also request the cross-referencing of MODIFIER LETTER LOW CIRCUMFLEX ACCENT, U+02C6, U+02C7 and U+02EC to establish the intended tying together of all 4 as a family of “wedges” that should have similar shape in font design (see D.3).
