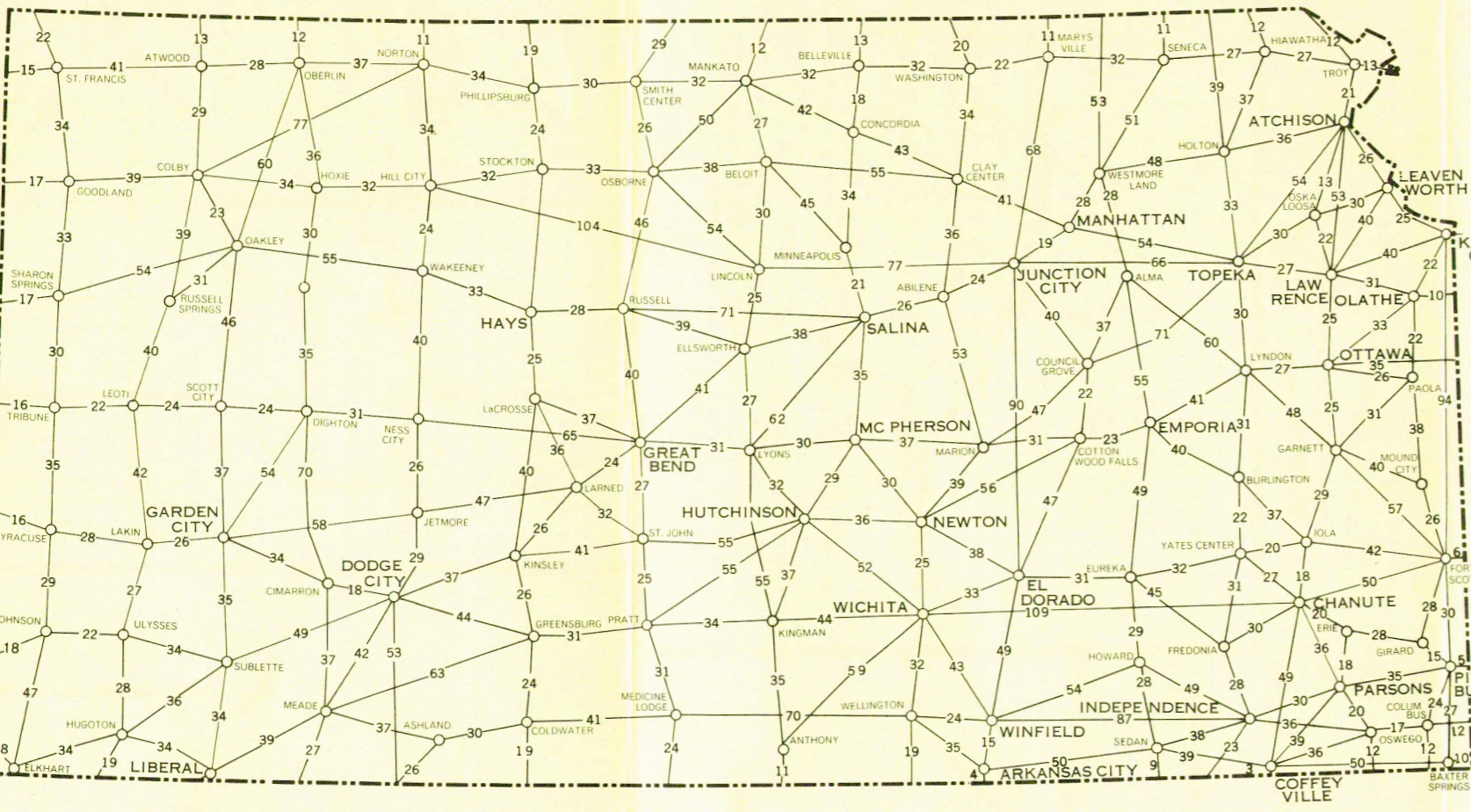

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HIGHWAY SPEED LIMITS (Unless posted otherwise)
Passenger cars, buses, and trucks (8,000 lbs. or less): US or K numbered routes: 70 m. p. h. day, 60 m. p. h. night.
 Interstate routes: 75 m. p. h. day, 70 m. p. h. night; 40 m. p. h. minimum.
Trucks (over 8,000 lbs.): 60 m. p. h. day or night on US and K routes. 60 m. p. h. maximum and 40 m. p. h. minimum on Interstate routes day or night.
School Buses: 45 m. p. h. on unpaved roads; 55 m. p. h. on paved highways.
Kansas Turnpike: 80 m. p. h. maximum and 40 m. p. h. minimum for all vehicles.

SAFETY LAWS AND REGULATIONS
 Kansas Traffic laws are the same general, common sense rules included in the nation's Uniform Traffic Code. Enforcing these laws are the Kansas Highway Patrol and the state's local law enforcement agencies.
 Troopers of the Highway Patrol have two principal duties—to assist motorists in distress; and to protect the public from the minority of drivers who, by their careless disregard for traffic laws, interfere with the rights and endanger the lives of others. When arrests are necessary, Troopers are firm, fair, and impartial. The Patrol Motto is "Service, Courtesy, and Protection."
