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EDITORIAL Changing With The Times

Last week while Nashville was celebrating Country Music Week, it was a good opportunity to see the performers and preview the new product coming out. But, we had the feeling that a lot of the showcased product didn't sound like it had Nashville roots. The artists' names were familiar but much of the material and arrangements didn't seem to fit.

We couldn't help but feel that some of Nashville's soul was being lost in deference to gaining crossover appeal. Maybe the music was shedding some of its old trappings and modernizing like jazz fusion or black contemporary music recently have. Maybe the music is taking a major step within its own art form.

Whatever is happening, Nashville is still alive with musical creativity. It still hosts a convention that is well-planned and supervised by such sincere people that it almost makes you believe that you are spending a couple of days in your old neighborhood.

The Nashville-based record companies are still small enough so the employees can easily relate to the artists, producers and writers. They are closer to the artist and the music than most of their counterparts in New York or Los Angeles. Since Nashville is a small community where news travels fast, the people working for record companies always keep a good handle on "what's happening." Nashville executives are bright people who seem to be aware of their product, their business, their direction and "the street."

We eagerly look forward to the coming year and anxiously await how the millions of country fans and the country music programmers take to the musical changes. One thing is for sure, there are no record executives in Nashville sitting in ivory towers.

Large, Small Retailers Differ **Over Benefits Of Bar Coding**

NEW YORK - In the aftermath of CBS's announcement that bar-coding of their new releases would be instituted by 1979, a Cash Box national survey of retailers revealed that, while bar coding is perceived as beneficial to large retailers, smaller retailers are far less optimistic about its benefit. Furthermore, even larger retailers expressed caution, pending announcements from the rest of the industry, further knowledge about the information contained in the CBS coding, and the development of less expensive scanning equipment.

Joe Bressi, vice president of the Stark-Camelot chain was optimistic about bar coding. "We're looking forward to it," he said. "In fact, we've hedged on doing any computerization of our inventory on our own, waiting for the industry to come up with a system. Now that CBS has made the announcement, I think everyone else will jump right in line. We are studying the matter very carefully, and at this point, I would say that we're going to implement

FCC Petitions **Appeals Court For** WESH Rehearing

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The FCC last week petitioned the U.S. Court of Appeals for a rehearing in the WESH-TV Daytona Beach, Fla. case. Earlier the court had overturned the FCC's decision to renew the license of Cowles Communication's WESH in the face of a competing application from Central Florida Enterprises, Inc. (Cash Box, Oct. 7).

At the same time, the commission is working to develop a new policy for comparative renewal cases that will stand up under scrutiny by the court.

In the past, the FCC has given preference to incumbents in comparative renewal hearings; barring serious offenses, renewals have been almost automatic. But Judge Malcolm Wilkey, who wrote the appeals court opinion, said a renewal applicant must demonstrate a "superior" record of service. And a challenger might prevail on the basis of comparative criteria such as diversification of media ownership and integration of ownership and management,

WCI Enters Manufacturing; Will Acquire Specialty Plant

NEW YORK - Warner Communications Inc. plans to begin manufacturing records and pre-recorded tapes by 1982, when the corporation's present custom pressings contract with Capitol Records expires.

The first pressing plant in WCI's newly formed subsidiary, WEA Manufacturing East, will be located near Scranton, Pennsylvania. Richard Marquardt, currently the chief executive officer of Specialty Records Corporation, a major record manufacturer, has been named president of WEA Manufacturing, East, and will oversee the building and operation of the new plant.

Under an agreement in principle reached between WCI and shareholders of Specialty Records, WCI is expected to shortly acquire Specialty's stock. In addition, the new WCI plant will be built near Specialty's pressing plant in Olyphant, Pa., a facility which will eventually be phased out of operation. At that time, WCI officials indicated, Specialty's employees will work at the new WEA plant.

Specialty's present custom pressing accounts will continue to be serviced by WEA Manufacturing, East, WCI spokesmen said. These accounts include Atlantic, RSO, Casablanca, ABC and Fantasy.

WCI also announced that several more pressing plants would be built in locations near WEA distribution centers by 1982.

Horowitz Promises Quality

David Horowitz, office of the president in charge of music and music publishing for WCI, cited three specific objectives which were responsible for prompting WCI's entry into manufacturing. They include:

An assurance that WCI record com-

panies (Warner Brothers, Elektra/Asylum/Nonesuch and Atlantic) and their artists will have "a continuing flow of quality records and tapes:

A reduction of WCI's cost of records and tapes and the institution of "a new profit center in custom record pressing and tape duplication."

A substantial increase in record pressing capacity "required by reason of the continuing explosive growth of record sales."

Horowitz also promised that WEA Manufacturing "will produce records and prerecorded tapes at the highest level of (continued on page 74)

\$8.98 LPs Make **Impact Felt On** Top 200 Chart

LOS ANGELES - The debuts this week of Steve Martin's "A Wild And Crazy Guy" and Ted Nugent's "Weekend Warriors" mark the first chart appearances of single disc, non-soundtrack, studio albums released, shipped and sold as \$8.98 LPs.

Martin's album has entered the Top 200 Albums chart at #56 bullet while the Nugent LP comes in at #97 bullet in its first week. This week's chart contains eight \$8.98 albums, six of which are CBS releases which became \$8.98s as of Oct. 23 (Cash Box, Oct. 21).

Boston's "Don't Look Back" on Epic is the highest charted \$8.98 LP, standing at #5 after 10 weeks on the chart. Following Boston, in order, are: Heart's "Dog & But-

Phasing Out Of Pop 'Twofers' Attributed To Rising Costs And New Pricing Trends by Leo Sacks

NEW YORK - When the "twofer" record was first introduced to the industry, it was designed to sell at a list price of a dollar above that of a single album. It was presumed that the twofer would enjoy increased sales because of the low price, and that it could serve as an introduction to new artists. For instance, the first Chicago album on Columbia, a double-pocket set, was priced at \$6.98 because they were a new band at the time. Similarly, A&M shipped Peter Frampton's "Alive" double album at a \$7.98 list since the material was live and had been previously released.

But escalating costs to the manufacturer in the areas of raw materials, artist royalties, and advertising have seriously

threatened the future of the twofer as far as pop releases are concerned. The cost analysis of those kind of

packages at a dollar above list can't be justified anymore," said Harry Losk, vice president of national sales for Mercury Records. "It proved to be too good a deal, given the overall inflationary spiral that our industry is in.'

A survey of the industry's top marketing executives reveals a commonly held belief that consumers will pay more for recorded music than was once thought. "Our market research tells us that if consumers like the music, they're going to buy it," said Joe Mansfield, vice president of marketing for Columbia Records. "You just can't afford a list price of \$8.98 for a two-pocket set anymore. Materials, packaging, and royalties have made that price unrealistic. The bottom line is that this is a business, and every corporation expects a certain

profit spread for the amount of investment that they put into an LP.'

Though most of Columbia's recent double LPs have been priced at \$13.98, a live Willie Nelson album is about to be shipped. at an \$11.98 list. Mansfield explained that the album is priced with special consideration for the country consumer, since most of the material is available on Nelson's other LPs.

"Pricing has a lot to do with what's best for the artist," he continued, "and we'll bend the rules for things that we believe in. So \$13.98 is not an automatic list, because we would never do anything to hurt an artist's career if we thought we were asking too much for their LP

Holiday Price

Mercury Records has adopted a similar stance in pricing its double LPs. Though the label is currently marketing "The Best of Chuck Mangione," as well as a new Paul Kossoff album on DJM, at \$11.98, the company recently released a repackaging of two Statler Brothers albums in September at a \$10.98 list. Harry Losk noted that, while an \$11.98 list "is our concept of double packaging today," the Statler Brothers set was specially priced for the holiday season.

Radio Chains Worry About Rewrite, Remain Optimistic

LOS ANGELES - While the nation's radio chains are bullish about their future, especially on the FM side, they are also concerned with government regulation and the changes that could come about with the passage of a rewrite of the Communications Act of 1934.

8,000 Stations

There are approximately 8,000 radio sta-tions serving some 3,000 communities in the U.S. There are well over 200 radio chains or groups with three or more radio properties. More than 20 percent of the nation's radio stations are parts of a chain.

Keith Richards **Gets Probation** For Heroin Bust

TORONTO - Rolling Stones guitarist Keith Richards, 34, was sentenced to a one-year probationary term Oct. 24 in York County Court in Toronto, after he pleaded quilty to possession of heroin. As part of his sentence, Richards will have to give a benefit performance "by himself or with some friends" for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind "for the people there," Judge Lloyd Graburn said.

The much-publicized trial was preceded by some adept plea-bargaining on the part of Austin Cooper, Richards' lawyer. Two other charges, those of possession of cocaine and possession of heroin for the purpose of trafficking (a much more serious charge than the other two) were dropped by the judge.

Judge Graburn ordered Richards to obtain the services of a probation officer within 24 hours of sentencing, and ordered him to appear in Toronto before the officer on May 7 and Sept. 24 of next year. Graburn ordered Richards to continue being treated for drug addiction at the Stevens' Centre in New York, where it was intimated he needed six or 12 months more treatment to fully overcome his drug habit.

Richards sat quietly throughout the two days of proceedings. On Monday (23), the defense called NBC Saturday Night Live producer Lorne Michaels to the stand, who called Richards "the catalyst" of the Rolling Stones, "the number one group in the world." Freelance music writer Jack Batten testified that "most of the music of the Rolling Stones comes out of his head."

Richards was charged in Feb. 1977, after police searched his Toronto hotel room, where officers said they found a pouch containing 22 grams of heroin. The Rolling Stones were in Toronto at the time to record a live performance at the El Mocambo rock club

A survey of leading radio groups revealed that most all radio executives favor the deregulatory aspects of the proposed rewrite, including an end to logging, license renewal and ascertainment, but many believe that the Van Deerlin bill contains harmful sections and ambiguous language. The most unpopular point is the spectrum use fee that would fund public broadcasting and minority ownership programs as well as a new regulatory agency to replace the FCC.

Another section of the rewrite particularly worrisome to radio chain executives is the limitation of group ownership to a total five stations, AM or FM or both. Current limitations are seven AM and seven FM, a total of 14 stations.

Jankowski Speech

Many executives express agreement with Gene Jankowski, president of the CBS broadcast group, and his comments before the House Subcommittee on Communications concerning the rewrite. Jankowski praised the efforts of the legislators "to move broadcasting decisions out of the hands of the regulators and back into the free market," but he added that "ambiguous language" in some parts of the bill could be "considered a mandate to restructure the broadcasting system that has served the American public so well."

French Concern **To Buy Korvettes**

NEW YORK — Controlling interest in Korvettes, the 50-unit retail department chain may soon be owned by Agache-Willot Group, a French retail and manufacturing corporation

Arlen Realty & Development Corporation has agreed in principle to sell 51% of Korvettes Inc. to Agache-Willot for more than \$30 million.

However, the boards of both Arlen and Agache-Willot must first approve the transaction, according to Arthur Cohen, chairman of Arlen-Cohen who added that Arlen intends to retain 49% ownership of Korvettes. Robert Stewart, president of Arlen, said that the Agache-Willot transact on will provide Korvettes with the infusion of capital the chain needs to achieve its sales potential.

In the past year, Korvettes has narrowed its losses and increased sales. For the fiscal second quarter ending August 26, Korvettes had a pretax operating loss of \$715,-000 compared with a \$3.7 million loss for the year-earlier period.

David Brous, president of Korvettes, said the only changes currently being planned as a result of the transaction would be an acceleration of Korvettes' current store refurbishings and the company's "Other Korvettes" advertising campaign.


The Oak Ridge Boys were formed during World War II in Knoxville, Tenn. Originally called the Country Cut-Ups, the band, which played primarily gospel songs, often played at the atomic energy plant in Oak Ridge for workers who were not permitted to leave the base for security reasons, and the group soon adopted the name The Oak Ridge Boys. The group disbanded shortly after the war only to reform in the mid-'50s. It was at that time that Bill Golden first heard the band which he would join some fourteen years later. It was Golden who assem-bled the current collection of Oak Ridge Boys which includes Duane Allen, Richard Sterban and Joe Bonsall.

Following three Grammy Awards, 15 Dove Awards and a tour of the Soviet Union, the group decided to leave the field of gospel music to adopt a contemporary country sound in 1975 after joining ABC Records. With the release of their "Y'all Come Back Saloon" LP the group was named best country group at the Wembley Festival of country music in England, while two songs from the album became hit singles in the U.S.

The Oak Ridge Boys have recently released their second LP for ABC, titled "Room Service." Produced by Ron Chancey, the album contains the group's single "I'll Be True To You."

Polar Bears

"We were going to be called the Dinosaurs but I thought with a name like that we were pretty much extinct before we even got started," says Jules Shear, singer/songwriter and leader of Jules and the Polar Bears, who recently released their debut album "Got No Breeding" on Columbia Records.

"We didn't want a tough rock band name and we all like animals, so Polar Bears just seemed like a natural," Shear says. "It sounded sort of friendly.

But finding a name wasn't what had concerned Shear just a few months ago. At that

time he was looking for a band. As a staff writer for Chappell Music, Shear had been having a difficult time finding artists to cover his songs which he says "are not exactly Olivia Newton-John material." The most receptive ears Shear had found during his two-year stint with the company belonged to Columbia A&R director Peter Philbin, who Shear had been sending demo tapes to on a regular basis. Philbin, however, had also had trouble finding artists on the Columbia roster to record Shear's songs. Finally, Philbin said he was interested in signing Shear to the label

"At the time I didn't have a band," Shear says, "so I asked to be left alone for a while so I could find the guys I wanted I'd been doing a lot of demo sessions and using a lot of different guys, so I kind of had a bead on what I thought would make a great band."

Shear collected drummer David Beebe. lead guitarist Richard Bredice, who had given up medical school to play music and Stephen Hague, a keyboardist who had played with Shear in a band called Southpaw.

After hearing the group play twice Philbin said he was ready to sign them. Shear says he was confident all along that the band would get the deal. "It didn't catch me by surprise at all," he

says. "It was the first time in my life that I felt like I was really good enough to front a band. I really felt like it was time to consummate all of what I had learned up to that point

Although he has never had any formal musical training, Shear says he began writing songs at the age of 14 while he was growing up in Pittsburgh. Still, it wasn't until after three years at the University of Pittsburgh as an English major that he decided to get serious about music.

I started going to college because I didn't know how to get into rock 'n' roll,' Shear says. "After a few years, though, I realized that if I went for one more I was going to have to do something serious. So I split for Los Angeles.

In L.A. Shear got a cheap apartment where he began writing "a whole bunch of songs" while working at various odd jobs. At about the time he landed the job with Chappell he really began to bear down. "I felt I wasn't really fulfilling my potential," he says, "so I decided to become more ambitious. I think the harder I work on my songs the more they set themselves apart from a lot of the stuff that's around.

What kind of music does the band play? "I don't like to label my own music, Shear says, "but I think we're a rock band. Some people refer to us as new wave, basically because there's a lot of words in the songs. But we're not on any negativity trip. We're not really an angry group of guys

Though the male soprano, who gives his age as "old enough," first gained fame as part of San Francisco's outrageous drag theatre troupe, the Cockettes, he has been involved with music all of his life. Born in a large "upper middle-class black bourgeois" family in Los Angeles, Sylvester was raised in church and was a child gospel star whose peers included Billy Preston, Merry Clayton, and D.J. Rogers. Another musical influence was Sylvester's grandmother, Julia Morgan, who was "a blues singer during the '30s and traveled all over." As a teenager, Sylvester frequented record shops, buying 78s from the '20s and '30s, and "educated myself musically, with my grandmother's help, of course.

Eventually, Sylvester left the church and stopped singing, but returned to show business during a visit to San Francisco. "I was just basically living and finding my way in the world, and finding out what I wanted to do in life," he says. "I was invited to spend an Easter weekend in San Francisco, and that was as far as I got. I never returned to Los Angeles. All of a sudden there was absolutely no pressure. I could be any kind of person at all, and no one cared." This attitude pervaded the drag theatre troupe. the Cockettes, with whom Sylvester returned to singing. "For the first time I was sing-ing because I wanted to and not because I had to.

Sylvester made his recording debut for Blue Thumb Records in 1973 as part of an anthology called, "Lights Out, San Francisco," as a result of which he was able to record two albums for the label on his own, "Scratch My Flower" and "Bazaar." But Sylvester, who designed his own costumes and stage sets and who is a very visuallyoriented performer, eventually became overwhelmed by his own theatricality. "I had to be on all the time. People were more interested in my costumes than they were in my music." He added, "I became very disillusioned by the record business, and was expecting a lot more than I got."

In 1975, Sylvester went to Europe for four months. On his return to San Francisco, which became an immediate local success and he put a new band together, gained the attention of Nancy Pitts, who became his manager. Pitts called him to the attention of her partner, veteran record artist-turned-producer Harvey Fuqua, who became Sylvester's producer, and he in turn arranged for a recording contract with Fantasy. Sylvester's first Fantasy album was well received, and one cut, "Over and Over," enjoyed tremendous disco success, especially in England.

Although Sylvester is generally pleased with that first album, he feels that it did not realize his full potential. "I didn't know what to do," he says. "I hadn't been in the studio in three years, hadn't kept my music current and didn't know what direction I wanted to go in. Still," he reflects, "it was somewhat successful for getting my name out there again. But for my latest album, "Step Two," I did quite a bit of the writing, arranging, and production. By this time I knew what I wanted to do and what I was up against. I mean, in order to compete with the music that's out there you've got to be that good and better.

Managers' Series: **Smith Moved From Concert Promotion To Management** by Leo Sacks

NEW YORK - Tony Smith was one of England's top concert promoters in the early '70s when he got his first taste of management as an advisor to Monty Python. He had joined his father's concert production firm in 1968, and one of the first shows he presented was The Who's Lon-don premiere of "Tommy." He coordinated subsequent tours for the Rolling Stones and Led Zeppelin, and by 1973, was booking 350 shows a year. One of the acts he was handling at the time was Genesis.

"They were so disorganized on the opening night of their first major European tour that they had to cancel it," he recalls. "It was apparent that they needed management, since nobody in the organization knew what they were doing. So I gave it a try.

Smith's first objective was to make Genesis a more efficient touring unit. Intriqued by the visual excitement of their live performances, he determined that the best way to promote them was to further develop their stage show. Under his guidance, they put together an act that eventually included the installation of a special laser operating through a series of revolving mirrors and a transparent stage with lights beneath it. The idea was to make the lighting come from "unexpected directions," says Smith, "as a way of emphasiz-



Third Qtr. Profit Of WCI Music Group Is Stable

NEW YORK - Warner Communications' recorded music and music publishing division's operating income for the third quarter, ending September 30, 1978, amounted to \$17,303,000 up only slightly from last year's third quarter total of \$17,158,000.

Steven Ross, chairman of WCI, ex-plained the figures by stating that "the decline in profit margin stemmed primarily from an increase in promotional and advertising expenditures required to launch a wide variety of new artists.

The music division's third quarter revenues, however, soared to a record \$137,379,000 up 15% from \$119,947,000 for the year-earlier period.

Operating income for WCI's recorded music and music publishing division for the nine-month period ending September 30 also posted gains, rising to \$59,415,000 from \$53,811,000 in the year-earlier period. In addition operating revenues for the ninemonth period rose significantly to \$404,-600,000 from \$347,005,000 for the ninemonth period in 1977.

WCI's total income from continuing operations for the three-month period rose to a record \$19,802,000 up 27% from \$15,-621,000 for the third guarter in 1977. The corporation also posted record third quarter operating revenues, as the figures rose 16% to \$316,563,000 from \$272,853,000 for the year-earlier period.

For the nine-month period, WCI's income from continuing operation rose to \$55,858,000 from \$47,973,000 for the yearearlier period. WCI's operating revenues for the nine-month period rose to \$904,-427,000 from the 1977 nine-month figure of \$747,893,000.

Homewood House Publishing Has Small But Active Catalog

LOS ANGELES — The three principals at the 1½-year old Homewood House Music Publishing Company, Peter Burke, Susan Pomerantz and Jim Golden, do not try to hide the fact that as a small company they have a relatively small catalog of songs from a limited number of writers. It is this fact, they feel, that has brought them the success they have already achieved at their fledgling firm.

Their most recent success has been with the song "Too Much, Too Little, Too Late," written by Nat Kipner and recorded by Johnny Mathis and Deniece Williams, which gave Homewood its first gold single. The song also brought Mathis and Williams their first gold 45s.

"Homewood House is a small company and we have a small catalog," says Pomerantz, whose background includes extensive experience as a journalist as well as first-hand knowledge of music, publishing and songwriting. "But we know every song in that catalog. They don't just sit in a vault somewhere and get lost."

"Consequently, producers often tell us

A welcoming cocktail party is set for Wednesday evening Nov. 1. John Frisoli, president of Polygram Distribution, and Jack Kiernan, vice president of sales for the company, will address the meeting Nov. 2, and various Polygram department heads will conclude the morning session with remarks on company policy regarding inventory, shipping, sales administration, and finance.

Representatives from Phonogram, Polydor, Capricorn, RSO, Casablanca, Millennium and Parachute will address the meeting in the afternoon. The next day, branch singles specialists will meet with the national singles department, comprised of Rick Bleiweiss, national singles director Herb Greene, national singles supervisor, and Victoria Carlotti, national singles sales coordinator to discuss sales objectives, airplay coverage, returns and special programs. they are impressed with the high percentage of quality songs we have and even if they can't use one particular song they always tell us to bring them more," adds Burke, who has spent more than a dozen years in the publishing field.

More recently, another song by Kipner, "I Just Can't Get Over You," was released with "That's What Friends Are For" by Columbia as a double "A" sided single for Mathis and Williams.

The trio gives much of the credit to the Australian writers they represent through Homewood's subpublishing arrangement with Image Music in Australia.

"A lot of these artists have #1 albums and singles in Australia," Burke says, "but when they come over to America there is no one here to greet them, no crowds waiting at the airport like in their native country. The record companies often treat them like a kid who has had a regional hit in Iowa. They've lost their 'star' status. *Proven Artists*

"The advantage for us," he adds, over the writer who has had a regional hit in a small city, is that "we are working with #1 writers and artists who have already proven themselves in one country."

Besides Nat Kipner, they also pointed to some other Australian artists who are starting to make names for themselves in the United States, including Steve Kipner (Nat's son) who records for RSO Records, Little River Band, Sherbet, Brian Cadd, Richard Clapton and Dragon, not to mention the Bee Gees and Olivia Newton-John.

"Through Image, we are connected with most the Australian acts in some way," says Burke, adding, "All the major labels now have Australian acts. It's trendy to have Australian artists on your label. We think we are fostering something of a major movement here. We expect to have 'Australian invasion' similar to the British invasion of the 1960s."

"We never would have had 'Too Much, Too Little, Too Late' without the Australian connection," said Pomerantz. "Nat arrived here with a flight bag filled with 300-400 of his songs. 'Too Much . . . ' had been sitting in someone else's catalog for five or six years." (continued on page 62)



Some of the panelists that have been added to the convention's workshops are: LeBaron Taylor, vice president of Black Music Marketing for CBS Records; Lenny Petze, vice president of A&R for Epic Records; Lewis Horwitz, senior vice president of Entertainment Industries Division for the First Los Angeles Bank; Jay Oliver, managing director of Beacon Broadcasting (U.K.): Rick Stevens, vice president of A&R for Polydor Records; Giuseppe Gramitto Ricci, president of Curci Caroselli S.P.A. (Italy): David Keiner, assistant vice president of the Third National Bank; and Norman Wain, president of Metroplex Communications Inc.

Among the aritsts selected to perform at MUSEXPO's artist showcase are Switch (Motown), Mother's Finest (Epic), The McCrary's (Portrait). Don Williams (ABC), and Brenda Lee. Five new Australian acts will also perform for the first time in the U.S. at the showcase.

A number of companies will participate in the 24-hour video showcase, which is being offered for the first time. Some of the companies that have provided videotapes to be programmed throughout the hotel include: Epic. London, Parachute, RCA, CNA, Chrysalis, ABC, and CBS.

CBS Artists Rake In Gold And Platinum

NEW YORK — Four current releases by CBS recording artists have been awarded gold and platinum status by the RIAA. Columbia recording artists Chicago and Billy Joel have had their current LPs, "Hot Streets" and "52nd Street," certified platinum, while Columbia recording group Santana's "Inner Secrets" LP has been certified gold. Portrait recording group Heart's new album "Dog & Butterfly," has also been certified platinum by the RIAA. RIAA, Warner Bros. Records, and Improvising Artists Inc.

Joe Cohen's presentation was the most comprehensive from the standpoint of showing the diverse attitudes of the record industry toward the emerging video phenomenon. Cohen's basic pitch was that many record retailers would be very willing to become more involved with video if the video industry came through with support in the form of more software, merchandising materials and advertising. "The hard facts," he said, "are that, even though record merchandisers today present a total entertainment opportunity, your industry has done very little to encourage them to deal in your product"

Retail Pioneers

Cohen then showed slides of several record retail outlets where video is being successfully merchandised. The Wherehouse on the west coast was cited as an example of a chain that is crossmerchandising audio and video hardware with records and tapes, as well as video software. Cleveland's Record Rendezvous, said Cohen, has seen a video cassette turnover of four times a year, and video software sales are approaching five percent of the chain's dollar volume. And Nickelodeon, which was opened in Los Angeles less than six months ago, is allocating 10% of its 4,000 square feet to displaying video cassettes in the front of the store

According to Cohen, approximately 40%

Beach Boys fan who says he came west to search out the California myth expressed in the songs of the Beach Boys and Jan and Dean. "The 1970s are one long, nostalgic look at a better time," Leaf writes in his introduction. "That means movies like 'American Graffiti,' TV programs like 'Happy Days,' and rock groups like the Beach Boys. While the first two are idealized and cleansed versions of what it was like in the late '50s and early '60s, the Beach Boys are still the original." Despite his love for the group, Leaf attempts to objectively examine what made the group and their songs of fun in the sun and drag racing popular. He notes that while the three Wilson brothers - Brian, Dennis and Carl - continued to work together on and off throughout the years, theirs was not a particularly harmonious family. There is no way to measure precisely the effect of such an upbringing, but it can be safely said that the troubled adulthood of the Wilson brothers can be attributed partially to their difficult childhood." He chronicles Brian's decision to leave the group in 1967 and his "reemergence" several years later and the number of resulting problems in between. In sum, he writes, "Even though they are balding and paunchy, they are all we have left to remind us of our own golden summers. The Beach Boys, like Southern California, are a fading jewel The Beach Boys' music created a myth that didn't work, for them or anyone else, and







GREATEST HITS - Steely Dan - ABC AK-11707/2 -Producer: Gary Katz - List: 11.98

This two-record set effectively traces Steely Dan's career through its six ABC albums, featuring such early tracks as "Dolt Again" and "Rikki Don't Lose That Number" along with such later hits as "Peg" and "Josie." The album also displays the duo's transition from a straight-ahead rock delivery to a more streamlined, jazz-flavored execution. With the Dan currently at the height of its popularity, this is an indispensable collection of intriguing, innovative, yet highly accessible works.

LIVE BOOTLEG — Aerosmith — Columbia PC2 35564 — Producers: Jack Douglas and Aerosmith - List 13.98

Aerosmith has always been regarded as an exceptional live outfit, and this two-record set captures the hard-rock power and sexual swagger of the group. "Bootleg" was recorded in a variety of settings, ranging from Aerosmith's usual hockey arena gigs to its intimate club performances as Dr. J. Jones and the Interns. Steve Tyler's vocals are in top form here, as are the 🍇 band's raucous guitar exchanges. Contains such hits as "Walk This Way," "Dream On" and "Back In The Saddle.

TO THE LIMIT — Joan Armatrading — A&M SP-4732 — Producer: Glvn Johns --- List: 7.98

Since the beginning of her affiliation with A&M, Joan Armatrading has been one of the most popular and respected singer/songwriters in Europe. Her commercial growth in the U.S. has been slower, but with "To The Limit" she is primed for a breakthrough. Already receiving heavy airplay, this LP showcases Armatrading's exquisite, insightful songs and her low, instantly recognizable vocals. Also noteworthy is the meticulous production of Glyn Johns.

HEMISPHERES — Rush — Mercury SRM 3743 — Producers: Rush and Terry Brown --- List: 7.98

It was 1974 and out of Toronto came Rush: a power trio with a lead vocalist whose high-pitched timbre defied description. Six albums later suddenly all criticism and pessimism levelled on the group seems pointless: Rush is, in essence, one of the most talented, intelligent "heavy acts" working today. "Hemispheres" is no exception to the standard of quality these three professionals have erected over the past four years.

LOU RAWLS LIVE — Philadelphia International PZ2 35517 — Producer: John L. Fairth - List: 13.98

Recorded at the Mark Hellinger Theater in New York City, this two-record package captures the spark, vitality and spontaneity of Lou Rawls in concert. Accompanied by a crisp rhythm section along with the elegant horn and string charts of MFSB, Rawls ably performs renditions of his hits, a few jazz and pop classics, plus even a brief plug for his favorite beer, Budweiser. Rawls' engaging baritone voice remains in top form throughout.

STAY WITH ME - Kiki Dee - Rocket BXL 1-3011 -Producer: Bill Schnee — List: 7.98

Kiki Dee has only enjoyed intermittent success in America to date because her albums have been uneven, but she seems to have moved onto firmer artistic and commercial ground with this LP. The key here is Bill Schnee's refined production, the tasteful selection of outside material, plus of course Dee's energetic vocals and appealing self-penned compositions. The title song and "Talk To Me" are among the LP's many highlights.

ENERGY - Pointer Sisters - Planet P-1 - Producer: Richard Perry - List: 7.98


"Eneroy" is the first release for producer-extraordinaire Richard Perry's Planet Records and it's an all-star effort. The Pointer Sisters are fine vocalists and Perry has turned them loose on a wide ranging selection of songs sunh as Bruce Springsteen's "Fire," Sly Stone's "Everybody Is A Star" and Bob Welch's "Hypnotized." With solid support by a number of top studio musicians, "Energy" is pure pop dynamite.

Looking for a new challenge? Try to keep from dancing to the two disco-length cuts on side one of "Good Thang" by Faze-O This lineup of Chicago funk gangsters have already machinegunned their way to #50 bullet on the black contemporary album chart. There's no telling how high their sights are set. Fun percussion and hotmixes make the title track, "Party Time," and "Funky Lady" wax to stack at your next R&B funkathon or disco extravaganza.

THANK YOU ... FOR F.U.M.L. (FUNKING UP MY LIFE) -Elektra 6E-144 — Producer: Donald Byrd — List: 7.98

Leading off with the funky, catchy title track, Donald Byrd's latest affair is a thumping, danceable effort which centers around his crisp, fluid trumpet licks. Byrd here is backed by numberous session cats, including Wah Wah Watson on guitar and the vocals of Jim Gilstrap and Syreeta Wright, but the key to this LP's success is Byrd's horn mastery and his flair for jazzflavored funk-rock

YOU HAD TO BE THERE - Jimmy Buffett - ABC AK-1008/2 - Producer: Norbert Putnam — List: 11.98

Last summer Jimmy Buffett embarked on an extensive national tour, and this two-record set (recorded in Miami and Atlanta) vividly showcases the colorful, humorous personality of this singer/songwriter. In addition, "You Had To Be There' spotlights the tight, versatile playing of Buffett's backup band. Including such Buffett favorites as "Margaritaville," "Come Monday" and "Why Don't We Get Drunk," this LP is a satisfying documentation of Buffett's music as well as his all-around craziness.

PLEASURE & PAIN - Dr. Hook - Capitol SW-11859 -Producer: Ron Haffkine — List: 7.98

Throughout its career, this pop-rock configuration has always displayed a warmth and colorful personality in its music. The group has racked up several Top 20 hits, and as usual "Pleasure & Hain" has its share of hit single candidates. Spearheaded by the bulleting single, "Sharing The Night Together," and such affectionate tracks as "Sweetest Of All" and "Storms Never Last," this LP boasts tender, flowino melodies plus the distinctive vocals of Ray bsawyer

TNT - Tanya Tucker - MCA 3066 - Producer: Jerry Goldstein - List: 7.98

Tanya Tucker? Sweet, young country singer, right? No way! As the title of her new LP implies, Tanya is stepping out as a dynamite rock 'n' roller who can sizzle on upbeat numbers as well as caress a tender ballad. With guest vocals by the likes of John Prine and Seals & Crofts, and material such as "Heartbreak Hotel" and "Not Fade Away," Tanya is on the verge of a major pop breakthrough. For Top 40, AOR and proggressive country playlists.

ANTHOLOGY — The Band — Capitol SKBO-11856 — Producer: The Band — List: 10.98

It would be difficult to say which album is the definitive Band compilation ("Rock Of Ages," "The Last Waltz" and "Best Of The Band" are the likely contenders), but this new package undeniably contains a solid representation of the quintet's best works from all of its Capitol albums. Including such rock stan-dards as "The Weight," "Stage Fright," "Life Is A Carnival," "It Makes No Difference" and 16 others, this two-record set also features revealing liner notes by journalist Robert Palmer.

TRAVOLTA FEVER — John Travolta — Midsong International Producers: Bob Reno, Jeff Barry and John Davis — List: 9.98

Due to the recording success of his duets with Olivia Newton-John, John Travolta is currently a strong music attraction as well as a hot niovie commodity. This two-record set is basically a repackaging of his first two albums on Midsong prior to his breakthrough with "Saturday Night Fever." "Travotta Fever" includes the singer's earlier Top 10 hit, "Let Her In," as well as a previously unreleased track, "Right Time Of The Night

MIDNIGHT EXPRESS (Original Soundtrack) — Casablanca

NBLP 7114 — Producer: Glorglo Moroder — List: 7.98 This soundtrack recording of "Midnight Express" is a com-petling, sophisticated work which suitably articulates the intense, dramatic tone of the motion picture. Composed and produced by disco electronics wizard Giorgio Moroder, the album is highlighted by the fast-paced "Chase," which boasts rapid-fire synthesizer runs and bristling rhythms. Also noteworthy are the LP's two vocal performances, "Istanbul Blues" and "(Theme From) Midnight Express."

BRINSLEY SCHWARZ - Capitol SWBC 11869 - Producer: Br nstey Schwarz and Dave Robinson - List: 9.98

As individuals, the members of Brinsley Schwarz have been leaders in the English pub-rock and new wave movement over the past three years - Bob Andrews and Brinsley Schwarz as two-thirds of The Rumour, and Nick Lowe, as a recording artist and as producer for Elvis Costello, Graham Parker, etc. This reissue of the group's first two albums features a countryock sound, although traces of Lowe's infectious pop-rock can be hea d on a few of these tunes.

Z-LICIOUS - Zulema - LeJoint/London LEJ 17000 -Producer: Zulema Cusseaux — List: 7.98

Zulema's self-produced, self-arranged and primarily selfwritten collection of tunes stands as an impressive label debut. The album has six separate tracks, all within the three to fourminute range, but there is also a track to track continuity which makes it almost a theme album complete with prologue and epilogue. "Change" is perhaps the outstanding disco cut, while "I'm Not Dreaming," a duet with Van McCoy, and "Praying For A Miracle" are the most inviting ballads.



FCC Planning To Test Deregulation

WASHINGTON, C.C. — The Federal Communications Commission recently surprised the broadcast community by announcing its intention to experiment in several large metropolitan areas with greatly reduced regulation of radio broadcasting. The move toward deregulation is in keeping with the widespread belief that the secondary role radio plays to television and the number of stations on the air in most communities has created a situation where the government no longer needs to police radio programming.

Details of the plan are yet to be worked out, but FCC Chairman Charles Ferris indicates he expects the pilot test plans to be completed before the end of the year. The plans will then be subject to public comment and the FCC tentatively intends to have the program in operation by early fall, 1979.

Affected Areas

Among the areas expected to be affected are commercial load restrictions and public service requirements. Radio broadcasters are currently restricted to 18 commercial minutes per hour and a maximum 10 percent of the total hours a station is on the air. The floor for non-entertainment programming is six percent, although exceptions to these limits may be requested.

The pilot deregulation program is also expected to free broadcasters from having to ascertain community concerns when applying for or renewing a license or purchasing a station.

'Public Interest'

Some FCC commissioners have expressed concern over how the proposed deregulation would square with the "public interest" standard that now governs broadcasting. But other commissioners have suggested that the standard could still be upheld by judging broadcasters on a market-by-market basis rather than a station-by-station basis.

The FCC experiment will test many of the proposals included in the rewrite of the Communications Act of 1934 now under consideration by a House subcommittee. If the experiment goes according to plan, the FCC test will apparently take place well before any radio legislation is passed by Congress.

NBC Grabs Brady

NEW YORK - Al Brady has been named director of programming of NBC radio's four FM O&Os. Brady, currently program director of WHDH/Boston, will move to NBC in late November. He will report to Walt Sabo, executive vice president of the NBC FM group.

NBC's four FM stations are WYNY/New York, WKYS/Washington, D.C., WKQX-/Chicago and KYUU/San Francisco


NEW YORK - Bob Chambers has been appointed to a new vice president/general manager position with ABC radio. Chambers will direct both affiliate affairs and the sales department.

the court said, "The federal Communications Act fairly precludes any preference based on incumbency per se," Wilkey wrote.

The case, which directly affects multiple station owners and has broadcasters openly worried, also has the FCC concerned. The commission reportedly feels it is imperative that it retain discretion in developing a comparative renewal policy, rather than leave the ground rules open to judicial intervention. While the vote to seek rehearing of the WESH-TV case was divided — 4-to-3 with Chairman Charles Ferris in the minority - an FCC spokesman said the division was over strategy.

The broadcast establishment fears the court ruling will open the door for a flood of challenges to renewal applicants. NAB president Vincent Wasilowski called the WESH-TV decision "the most disturbing from an industry stability standpoint in a long time.'

Related Cases

At the same time, two related developments have drawn industry attention.

The still pending proceeding involving WPIX-TV New York will be held up pending the outcome of the WESH-TV case. The FCC has petitioned the Appeals Court and the court agreed - to hold that case in abeyance. Forum Communications Inc. is challenging the Tribune Co.'s WPIX-TV in that case and has appealed the FCC decision renewing WPIX's license. The FCC says the final decision in the WESH-TV case would have direct bearing on the arguments made in the WPIX renewal.

Also, the Appeals court has rejected a petition from the National Black Media Coalition which was attempting to get the FCC to set specific standards for renewals. The NBMC told the FCC it had a First Amendment right to set program standards in order to decide license renewal cases. In a seven-page decision, the court rejected that assumption and ruled that, in fact, the FCC might violate broadcasters' First Amendment rights if it set specific percentages for required program types. UItimately, the FCC is free to set standards but is not compelled to do so, in the opinion of the court.

The WESH-TV decision is the first instance of the court reversing the FCC in a comparative renewal case. Broadcasters, admitting they are troubled by the ruling. predict that the case will give them added incentive to push for legislation on comparative renewals in the rewrite of the Communications Act. Rep. Lional Van Deerlin (D-Calif.), chairman of the House Communications Subcommittee working on the rewrite, said the WESH-TV decision "should help" the rewrite project.



of retail record stores carry some audio hardware, and those that have also begun selling video hardware have experienced considerable success with their new line. Among the chains cited were Record Rendezvous and the Sam Goody chain, headquartered in the Northeast. In addition, Cohen noted, all three Franklin Music stores in Atlanta have been carrying home video hardware and blank video cassettes for the past 18 months. "The compatibility of audio and video products encouraged them to begin cross-merchandising. They are very satisfied with the results and find that blank video tape buyers buy in quantity. Franklin Music has carried 60 titles in pre-recorded video cassettes for the past five months."

At the same time, however, Cohen warned that there are still major problems to be solved before video can become a major item for record retailers. First, he said, "video software programming must be designed to fit not only the regular record store customer, but the man in the mall whom the retailer is trying to attract into his store." Second, he reiterated the need for the video industry to provide support materials to the retailer, similar to record merchandising displays. And third, he noted that the price of video software must come down.

Regarding the advent of the videodisc, Cohen said, "I see videodisc as being ex-tremely well received when it enters the record and tape marketplace." He added that he has been told by Pickwick International spokesmen that the videodisc, "by its very physical format," is more compatible with other products sold in record stores than the video cassette.

Videodisc Revolution Dave Rothfeld was also enthusiastic about the potential of the videodisc. "We are on the threshold of the biggest revolution in home entertainment," he said. "My opinion is that the videodisc will not only prevail, but will be the most important new entertainment product since audio tape."

But he also noted that, whether it is on disc or tape, "We at Korvettes are gung-ho on video entertainment."

Rothfeld expressed two concerns about the immediate future. First, he said he hoped that video formats would soon be standardized, and pointed out that lack of standardization was one of the things that killed quad. He also was concerned about merchandising video software in a way that could encourage customers to consider the

Rothfeld wondered whether or not people would want to see movies over and over at home, and said he thought that a strong soundtrack could be the determining factor. Citing the huge success of the "Saturday Night Fever" and "Grease" albums, he said,"I'm talking about a product that's audio only. Can you imagine the potential of something like this in videodisc format?"

Currently, Rothfeld said, video products are being sold in Korvettes' TV department. But he foresaw special video sections within record and tape departments which would be cross-merchandised with different types of music that appeal to different kinds of customers.

Manufacturers' Position

Dan Davis pointed out that Capitol started a video department "because of our needs for promotional materials. However, he added, "We are all aware that (home) video does exist, and we are poised and ready to go with it."

According to Davis, Capitol uses its video footage on recording artists both instore and on television, where the clips can be adapted to music and talk shows, as well as commercials. In addition, he said, the footage is in great demand abroad. He closed his presentation with sample video spots for Sammy Hagar and Gentle Giant.

Along the same lines, John Weaver of Keefco and Carol Goss of Improvising Artists showed footage of music concerts that made use of innovative techniques. The basic thrust of their argument was that unusual visuals coupled with music would make saleable programs for the home video market.

Rounding out the music industry speeches, Floyd Glinert noted that, as record labels have learned, attractive packaging helps sell albums. He urged video software manufacturers to devote an equal amount of thought and effort to packaging their product.

Videodisc Demonstration

One of the highlights of the ITA seminar was the demonstration by Magnavox of the videodisc player that they will start test-marketing in December. Although the machine will be capable of playing discs that are either 30 minutes per side or an hour per side, most of the initial software will apparently be only half an hour per side. Initial cost of the new unit will probably be around \$600, with hour-long edited movies retailing for about \$15-\$16

There was a great deal of controversy at the conference about the future of prerecorded video cassettes after the introduction of the lower-priced videodisc.

Some observers felt that video cassettes will continue to be primarily used for recording TV programs, unless the cost of pre-programmed cassettes comes down considerably from the present range of \$40-\$70 for non-pornographic material. (The key to this problem is high-speed duplication. A practical method for doing this could easily be developed, but the feeling is that software companies would not want to make the large investment required until they see which way the market is going.) Others felt that, at least until the mid-1980's, videodiscs will pose no threat to video cassette manufacturers, who already have a solid foothold in the U.S. market. By the end of this year, it is expected that 750,-

000 video cassette recorders (VCRs) will be in American homes; as many as 1.2 million units could be in use by 1980. In contrast, the most sanguine observers estimate that there will be 250,000 disc players in homes by 1980.

Little Price Difference

A major reason for the continued optimism of video cassette proponents is the fact that, even at \$600 per unit, videodisc players will be hardly any cheaper than VCRs, which are now discounted to as low as \$750. And, while a substantial number of videodiscs must be available before consumers will buy players, VCRs can be sold strictly on the basis of their recording capability.

Eddie Harris, Now With RCA, **Would Rather Sing Than Sink** by Alan Sutton

LOS ANGELES - After a long and rewarding association with Atlantic Records which lasted more than a dozen years, Eddie Harris recently switched labels to RCA. The reason, according to Harris, concerned a change in musical direction.

For years one of jazz music's most versatile and innovative players, Harris began to devote more attention to vocals in the late '60s and early '70s. But he says the Atlantic brass felt he should play more saxophone

"| started singing," the 42-year-old musician, composer, singer recalls, "and they thought I couldn't hold a tune. So I just figured I should go elsewhere.

'No Future'

Harris' decision to become a singer is as much a commentary on the plight of jazz artists as it is a reflection of his iconoclastic "I looked at all my personality. predecessors - guys who I felt were good saxophonists - and I could see no future in my going down the same path," he says. "The late (John) Coltrane and (Charlie) Parker had to play and play, going from one club to another, and they could never afford to take off and spend some time with their families. So I got into singing to elevate myself financially.

'I don't know what it is, but people just seem more in tune to singing. You can play a horn for 10 or 15 years and go unrecognized, whereas a singer can come along after only a short time and blow everyone away. That's why I got into that end of the business - because I could see the future for an instrumentalist was really a whirlpool of financial disaster.

Harris' last several albums for Atlantic reveal a narrative track that capsulizes societal hangups over such topics as sex and obesity. "Is It In?" and "That Is Why You're Overweight," which became the unofficial anthem of Weight Watchers, are indicative of the songs from this era. And in his debut album for RCA, "I'm Tired Of Driving," he continues to catharsize his personal gremlins by singing about them.

'Tired Of Driving'

The title track, for example, is a bluestinged tirade against our inescapable

dependence on the automobile: "driving bumper to bumper during rush hour/I feel the tension down to my feet." Similarly, in "What Is Wrong With The World Today," Harris poses the question that has been foremost in the minds of serious thinkers everywhere since the onslaught of the atomic age.

Harris covers a variety of styles on the album's other vocal tracks. "You Are The

LIVE IN TOKYO — Johnny Griffin — Inner City 6042-2

Producer: Yasohachi Itoh — List: 7.98 Griffin's return to the U.S. after a fifteen-year residence in Europe has been cause for considerable celebration. This double album (recorded live in Japan) is his first LP in the States for many years. His tenor is in bristling form, and a sterling rhythm team led by pianist Horace Parlan is all he needs to achieve his own brand of hard-swinging jazz. There is little Griffin around and there should be lots of calls for this

NON-FICTION — Steve Kuhn — ECM 1-1124 — Producer: Manfred Elcher — List: 7.98

Kuhn played piano with John Colfrane in the early '60s at the dawn of eclectic era, and his latest ECM album clearly shows Trane's influence - harmonically, rhythmically and in the extended length of the compositions. Fronting a trio that includes Steve Slagle on sax and flute, Harvie Swartz on bass and Bob Moses on drums, Kuhn offers an inspired acoustic performance on tracks such as "Firewalk," "A Dance With The Wind" and "Alias Dash Grapey."

DANCING IN THE SUN - Richard "Groove" Holmes Versatlle MSG 6003 — Producer: Ed Taylor — List: 7.98

On his debut LP for Versatile, veteran organist Holmes covers a wide range of musical styles including calypso, poprock, mainstream jazz and R&B. In addition to working out on the organ, he plays synthesizer on "Highway of Life" and "Dancing In The Sun." The album's most compelling track, though, is a 12-minute rendition of the Johnny Burke-Errol Garner standard, "Misty." Outstanding packaging and graphics

On their first direct-to-disc album, Louis Bellson and his big band tackle a wide range of charts, from the opening number, the Latin-flavored "Sambandrea Swing" by Don Menza, to the avante-grade passages in "Odyssey In Rythm," to updated arrangements on three standards. The no-tape, no-editing recording process brings out the excitement of the performances, and the humorous cover art should help build retail sales.

THE NEARNESS OF YOU — Houston Person — Muse 5178 — Producer: Houston Person - List: 7.98

Person had a strong seller in his last Muse, and this one seems destined to improve upon that. Charlie Earland, Melvin Sparks and Grady Tate lend stellar rhythmic support. Several standout tunes here: "Freddie The Freeloader," "Pretty Please," and "Please Mr. Person" (featuring Etta Jones' vocal). Good for jazz and R&B playlists.

Laredo Finishes Seven-Disc Rachmaninoff Piano Cycle

NEW YORK — Ruth Laredo has achieved an impressive feat. With the recording of Rachmaninoff's "Polka On A Theme By W.R.," she recently finished waxing all of that composer's solo piano works on seven discs. Four of the albums have already been released, and the other three will be out within the next year on Columbia.

Interviewed shortly after she completed the four-year project, Laredo still seemed tensed for action. But at the same time, the petite pianist was beginning to feel relief and a desire for relaxation. Asked whether she was ready to embark upon on another massive project — say, Chopin's complete solo piano music - she replied, "Right now I'd like to play something easy and short and simple, without huge leaps and strenous octaves. I'd just like to play some Bach or Schumann — nice and clear, no inner voices. Something plain, because Rachmaninoff is fancy; there are always millions of things going on at once. Nothing is just straightforward.

How did Laredo become involved in the Rachmaninoff project? "It happened because Columbia Records approached me four years ago. I had just completed the Scriabin sonatas for another record company, and for some reason they thought that I was the one to do this. I don't know anyone else who would have — it takes a lot of time and a lot of work — but they asked me to do it, and it was an offer I couldn't refuse. So I decided to plunge in. But it was unexpected. It was not something that I decided to do myself."

Nevertheless, Laredo admits that she has always loved Rachmaninoff. She fondly remembers hearing Horowitz play the Third Piano Concerto "when I was very small. This was long before he (Horowitz) quit playing (during the '50s), and long before all the furor that we know about right now. But I just loved those piano concertos, and I never dreamed that I would do what I have just done."

Serkin's Influence

Laredo, who is now 40, comes from Detroit. She began taking piano lessons

when she was three, and had already played with the Detroit Symphony by the time she began studying formally with Edward Bredshell at 11 years of age. Later, she studied with Rudolf Sorkia at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.

Serkin had the most formative influence on her playing of any of any of her teachers. Although she never studied Rachmaninoff with him, she notes, that "he knew Rachmaninoff very well. He and Horowitz were the young ones, and Rachmaninoff was the old master when Rudy was growing up... He and his friend Horowitz would go to the concerts and study the performances."

Laredo was aware of Rachmaninoff's piano roll recordings of his own works before she began to record them. However, she denies that they were a major source of inspiration to her. "I would say that I get whatever inspiration I have from sources unknown," she said. "I don't copy anybody. Hove Rachmaninoff's playing, and Hove the (continued on page 46)

CLASSICS IN CONCERT NEW YORK — Two of the world's premier violinists — an old pro and a young master — recently played here in separate concerts. Isaac Stern performed Brahms' Violin Concerto with the New York Philharmonic at Avery Fisher Hall, and Itzhak Perlman played J.S. Bach's Sonatas and Partitas for Unaccompanied Violin in two installments at Carnegie Hall.

installments at Carnegie Hall. Judging by the first of Perlman's two concerts, his traversal of the Bach works must have been very successful as a whole. Perlman is not well-known for his interpretations of Baroque literature (although he made a very nice recording of Vivaldi's "The Four Seasons" on Angel with the London Philharmonic). However, it is not unusual for romantic concerto specialists to tackle the supreme masterpiece for their instrument. A quick scan through Schwann shows that both Nathan Milstein and Arthur Grumiaux have recorded the complete set; and even Jascha Heifetz has recorded (continued on page 46)





MOZART The Seven Last Symphonies English Chamber Orchestra Jean-François Paillard, conductor

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AL ALBUM REVIEWS PAGANINI: 24 Capricci; Variations on "Nel cor piu non mi sento," "God Save The King," and "Duo Mervaeille." Salvatore Accardo, violinist. DG 2707 107. List: 17.98

Accardo established himself internationally with his recordings of the Paganini concertos, and Paganini remains his specialty. Although some listeners may be unmoved by Accardo's playing, his technical proficiency in the diabolically difficult Capricci cannot be questioned. Whether he has to tackle double trills, double octaves, or the polyphonic devices that pepper these grandiose studies, Accardo rises to the challenge.

LUCIA DLUGOSZEWSKI: Tender Theatre Flight Nageire; C. CURTIS-SMITH: Unisonics; Music for Handbells. CRI SDA 388. List: 7.95

"Tender Theatre Flight Nageire" is unusually communicative for an avant garde piece. More than just an abstract college of instrumental sounds, its trumpet glissandi and chimes, answered by gurgling trombones, convey a very human message. "Unisonics," on the other hand, is more of a study than a piece of music; Smith's striking "Music For Handbells" gives a better idea of his talent.

MOZART: The Seven Last Symphonies. English Chamber Orchestra, Jean-Francois Paillard, conductor. RCA CRL 3-2931. List: 15.98

Everyone has their own favorites among recordings of Mozart's final half-dozen symphonies (the first movement of No. 37, included here, was actually written by Michael Haydn with an introduction by Mozart). And, with these ideal LPs in mind, it is easy to cavil at Paillard's heavy tread in the first movement of No. 39 or the lack of sparkle in No. 40's finale. Taken as a whole, however, these are very respectable performances — especially the "Haffner" and "Prague" symphonies.



has to be a continuity of presentation. I don't think, for example, that it would be appropriate to have a Cheap Trick coffee muq."

Foreigner Key

Allison Green, assistant to George Salovich, director of merchandising at Atlantic Records, remembered a number of creative merchandising gimmicks used by Atlantic. "We've had a Foreigner eye-chart to correspond to the release of the 'Double Vision' album," she said. "We also made up a dye-cast motorcycle key, the head of which reads 'Foreigner: Double Vision.' The reason for the key is that in the song, 'Hot-Blooded,' there's a lyric that goes, 'Shall I give you my key?' During the group's performance they also throw the key to the audience when they come to that part of the song."

Green cited a couple of examples of the additional mileage that Atlantic was able to get out of the key. "We're also using it in conjunction with a Red Cross drive at the office, where you get one if you give blood. For a more typical retail promotion there are record stores that will give you a dollar off the price of the album upon presentation of the key."

Jack Kreisberg, special projects manager for Arista Records, has also used a number of gimmick items. "This was a big gimmick year for Arista," he said. "Some of the things we've used have included a pyramid-shaped lapel pin with blinking lights, which we used for the Alan Parsons 'Pyramid' album, a 'fever tester' for the Michael Stanley Band's 'Cabin Fever' album, and a lucite paperweight for the soundtrack album of 'Close Encounters of the Third Kind.' " Kreisberg noted that an album theme that lent itself well to gimmick merchandising was the Kinks' "Misfits" album, which his department promoted with a mylar poster, which gives a distorted reflection from any angle and a square, seven-inch record.

How are these merchandising concepts developed? Sire Records, a label that is well-reputed for its gimmick merchandising, has issued a number of items to accompany the release of Talking Heads' "More Songs About Buildings and Food." Ken Kushnick, vice president of artist development, explained, "our merchandising stuff is all made by Warner Brothers (which distributes Sire.) Some of it may be instigated by their merchandising department and some of it by their press department, which is where the pen protector came in. It was an idea conceived of by Bob Merlis in publicity and carried out by the merchandising people. The puzzle was an idea that I had. I had the idea based on the fact that the album cover was an extraordinary piece of art. It was split up into pieces divided by white lines. We found out that Warners has a machine which turns covers. into puzzles, so we went with it.

Kushnick noted that, because of the cerebral nature of Talking Heads' music, they tend to inspire the broadest range of gimmick merchandising. "Basically, the way a record company is structured," he added, "there are different budgets, and lump sums of money that you have access to, and, if you're just working off a straight merchandising budget, then obviously there are limits. But if the act is special enough, or 'itemable' enough, as the Heads have proven to be, then publicity might be willing to dip into their budget for their item, promotion might want to do a button, just as a radio tie-in, and merchandising and artist development might want to do their items, too

Outside Firms

By contrast, Jack Kreisberg relies most on outside firms whose specialty is customizing these merchandising materials. "When I get a release schedule for upcoming albums, I check through the titles very carefully. Sometimes I come up with the idea, sometimes I'll assign it to one of the firms I deal with, and sometimes I'll give an idea to a number of firms to see which ones come up with the best gimmick. I'll also go with the firm that can deliver the fastest, and the cheapest, or who are most capable of packing the more unusually shaped items for shipping.

"In many circumstances," Kreisberg continued, "I prefer to deal with a middleman who has a tie-in with a manufacturer. If I call a manufacturer and I order 500 hats from him once a year I'll get a rotten price, but if I get a middleman who does promotion for 20 different companies for 20,000 hats a year, my price will be much better.

How is the success of a promotional gimmick measured? Kushnick replied, "I knew the Talking Heads puzzle was a success when I actually saw them apart on tables at the homes of friends." But Jim Charne contended that "it's very subjective in deciding what is a success and what isn't. You can't point to a desk calendar and say that 'as a result of giving this away, I've moved a thousand pieces of the album, or I've gotten it played on the radio. On the other hand, you can obviously tell when you've got a hit Tshirt."

Ironically, the obviousness of the T-shirt has made it the first item to have flashed in and out of fashion in a milieu where creativity and immediacy are crucial. Kushnick pointed out that the T-shirt has OD'd as a promotional gimmick. It became such a routinized form of promotion that it lost its specialness." Charne concurred, "First, there were too many T-shirts done badly. Second, why spend two dollars on a T-shirt when you can spend a penny for a guitar pick?"

Greatest Triumph

It has been with a guitar pick — in conjunction with the group Cheap Trick — that Charne and EPA have orchestrated what has been perhaps the greatest triumph of gimmick merchandising. The pick, which guitarist Rick Nielsen flings into the audience during the course of the group's set, has Nielson's name on one side and the Cheap Trick logo on the other. "He (Nielsen) has always used the pick as a prop." said Charne. "It was our suggestion that he have them made up with his name on them."

Finally, there is one rule of thumb pertaining to gimmick merchandising that is unanimously adhered to: the need for the material to correspond to well-made music. "No matter what we do," noted Kreisberg, "if the records are not selling, these gimmicks won't motivate people to buy more records.""

(continued from page 43) three movements from the Partita No. 3.

Perlman's strength in the first half of the cycle was his musicality. He could have been faulted for his rough, scratchy tone — so far removed from the Perlman we are used to — in the Bouree of the Partita #1 or the Fugue of the third Sonata. But somehow, he managed to triumph over these occasional defects by pouring all his deep love for the music into his playing. The Bouree had real gaiety and life, while the passage in the Fugue where Perlman played the melody in the lower strings against upper register chords was unbeatable for sheer excitement.

Another point in Perlman's favor was his exceptional control over the inner voices created by double stops. This was especially noticeable in the dotted-note Allemande of the Partita No. 1. Here, phrases were rendered as dramatically as they are in a romantic concerto, but without insulting the essential purity of Bach's conception.

Sterns playing in the Brahms Violin Conrerto was up to par — which is to say that it was superb — but he was somewhat hampered by he orchestra's performance.

way Horowitz and other people play. But when I do something myself I do it strictly from my own mind, my own heart, and I don't know where it comes from."

On those piano roll discs, Rachmaninoff frequently adds ornaments that aren't in the score, and Laredo agreed that this was a hallmark of his performing style. "Yes, it's like improvisation. He was like a very great cocktail pianist, because he could do that. No matter what he wrote down, he further embellished it in a most gorgeous way. And to try to do that on your own, it's just impossible to reproduce it. But his writing has that quality, anyway, and to learn those notes is really devilishly hard ... He was probably the greatest pianist that ever lived."

Back To Romanticism

Although critics have spotted a trend in recent years back toward a more romantic style of pianism, Laredo feels that the only living pianist who has carried on Rachmaninoff's tradition is Horowitz. "In Horowitz's last broadcast, somebody off camera said, 'He is the last of a great breed of pianists. There will never be one like him again.' I think it's true. It's the great Romantic tradition going back to Anton Rubenstein. I don't think anybody else plays like that who's alive now."

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Although in the first movement the Philharmonic seemed determined to recover their onre-vaunted glory, conductor Zubin Mehta slowed down the pace too much after the cadenza, creating a schmaltzy effect that killed the ending. The Andante was much better, and Mehta drew a beautifully hushed closing from his players. But in the finale, the tempo and dynamics were a bit four-square: one yearned for more rhythmic flexibility and better shaping of phrases.

The opening work on the program was the American premiere of Peter Maxwell Davies' "Symphony." This apprentice piece showed little appreciation of symphonic structure and wallowed in a wishy-washy semi-tonality that often seemed directionless. Only in the Sibelius-like brass climaxes of the outer movements and in some of the small ensemble passages did Davies achieve interesting effects. But these were not enough to save his "Symphony" from artistic failure.

Sometimes his songs lack strong individuality, but Pride overcomes this by delivering tunes in his distinctive, warm baritone. "Burgers and Fries" and "Mem'ries" highlight this package.





BRAND NEW HANK — Hank Thompson — ABC-AY-1095 — Producer: Larry Butler — List: 6.98

A master of the Southwest country-swing music, Hank Thompson has experimented with different styles in the past few years. But on this album, he has gone back to doing what he does best. The result is a genuine, spirited record. Paired with producer Larry Butler, Thompson seems comfortable on the best album he has recorded in some time. "Have A Good Time" and "I Hear The South Calling Me" are standouts.

HANDCUFFED TO A HEARTACHE — Mary K Miller — Inergi ILP-1002 — Producer: Vincent D. Kickerillo — List: 6.98

Mary K Miller is an incredible singer with a broad range; she is backed by the best band money can buy (Elvis Presley's old band); her material is excellent; and she is supported 100 percent by her record company. If she has any flaws, Mary K tends to push her vocals too far. But with another fine album under her belt, Mary K can set her sights right at the top of the business. Best cuts are "Georgia" and "Going, Going, Gone."

OL' BLUE SUEDE'S BACK — Carl Perkins — Jet — KZ-35604 Producer: Felton Jarvis — List: 6.98

Carl Perkins is back. If anyone young or old wants to get a good fix on what true rock 'n' roll is all about, they ought to listen hard to this album. One of the originators of the Sun rockabilly sound and writer of "Blue Suede Shoes," Perkins has gone back into the studio with Felton Jarvis (Presley's producer) and cut a collection of the best rock 'n' roll songs of all time. If there is an honest-to-goodness underground legend in Nashville, Tracy Nelson could throw in her hat as the lady at the top of the heap. Her remarkable vocal quality has hurt her in some respects, because she can sing well in any style. More bluesy than country, Tracy's new LP contains 10 gems by a variety of artists, including Carlene Carter, Randy Newman and Nelson herself.

Mercury's Mel Street Dies From Self-Inflicted Gunshot

NASHVILLE — Apparently depressed over a heavy recording and work schedule, Phonogram/Mercury's Mel Street killed himself Oct. 23 with a gunshot to the head. It was his 43rd birthday.

Street had been eating breakfast with his wife, Betty, and his brother and sister-inlaw, Mr. and Mrs. Cleve Street of Virginia at his home in Hendersonville, Tn. near Nashville. During breakfast, he excused himself, went to his bedroom and a shot rang out a few seconds later.

Street's Manager Jim Prater said "his brother went upstairs and found him lying there on the floor with a handgun beside

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Mel Street him." Street was rushed to Nashville's Memorial Hospital and died at 11:10 a.m. Heavy Schedule

Performing an average of 200 concerts a year. Street had been holding down a strenuous schedule and recently completed one of two albums scheduled to be completed by the end of the year. His latest single, "Just Hangin' On," sits this week at #55 on the **Cash Box** Country Singles Chart. Ironically, the song concerns a man operating under severe strain.

Prater said Street had always been punctual for show dates, but lately had been complaining of his road schedule and work load.

"He had just come off a tour in Texas," Prater said. "The last place he worked was Texas. He was supposed to be at the Mercury Records Show on Wednesday night (D.J. week), but he didn't feel up to it. To date, from the time we started together, he had never missed a show. He seemed very depressed, and it seemed like things were pressing him. They really weren't, but to him, it seemed that way."

A native of Bluefield, Va., Street's biggest hits have been "Borrowed Angel" and "Loving On Back Streets." Street and his wife had four children. Their oldest daughter, Mrs. Sherry Hamilton, is married and lives in Madison, Tn. The other children, Chet, 16, David, 14, and Jenny Carol, 6, live at home.

Maybelle Carter, Matriarch Of Country Music, Dies at 69

NASHVILLE — "Mother" Maybelle Addington Carter, one of the most influential artists in the history of country music and a member of the Country Music Hall of Fame, died at age 69 of a respiratory ailment on the morning of Oct. 23 at her home in Madison, Tenn. She had been in failing health for some time.

Along with her cousin Sara and brotherin-law A.P. Carter, Maybelle Carter was a member of the pioneer folk-country group, "The Carter Family." In August of 1927 in Bristol, Tenn., Jimmie Rodgers and The Carter Family were both discovered and recorded by Ralph Peer for Victor Records.

From that beginning, The Carter Family recorded more than 250 songs on a dozen labels over the next 17 years. The Carter Family officially retired in 1943, but Maybelle Carter continued for the next two decades with "The Carter Sisters" and as "Mother Maybelle." The Carter Sisters and as "Mother Maybelle, and her daughters Helen, Anita and June (wife of Johnny Cash). The Carter Sisters joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1950.

New Generation

With appearances at the Newport Folk. Festival in 1963, Maybelle Carter influenced a new generation of artists which included Bob Dylan and Joan Baez. Carter also appeared on the classic "Will The Circle Be Unbroken" album recorded in the early '70s by "The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band."

early '70s by "The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band." Elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1970, The Carter Family recorded such country standards as "Will The Circle Be Unbroken," "Wildwood Flower," "Keep On The Sunny Side," "Lonesome Valley," "Thinking Tonight Of My Blue Eyes" and "East Virginia."

Maybelle Carter's unique guitar and autoharp style revolutionized country guitar work. Country guitar had generally been limited to rhythm playing, but Carter added lead notes to the melody. Her lead work on "Wildwood Flower" has served as a primer for country and folk guitarists for many years.

Born on May 10, 1909, Maybelle Carter is survived by her three daughters, a brother and by Sara Carter, the only remaining member of the original Carter Family.

Court Restrains 'Elvis' Record

NASHVILLE — A temporary restraining order against further production or distribution of the alleged first recording by the late Elvis Presley, "Tell Me Pretty Baby," on the Elvis Classic Label has been obtained by Vernon Presley and RCA Corporation.

Said to be recorded in the early months of 1954 in Phoenix, Az., the record was placed on the market last month by Andrew Lee Jackson of Dallas, Tx. and distributed by Cin/Kay Distributors here. In affidavits filed by Presley's father, Vernon, and Presley's producer, Felton Jarvis, information was advanced stating the young Presley was never in Phoenix at the alleged time, and that Presley had never in his life mentioned being in Phoenix at that time.

Presley and RCA are seeking damages from Jackson (International Classic Productions). Hal Freeman of Cin/Kay Distributors and are seeking a permanent injunction against the promotion and sale of "Tell Me Pretty Baby." The temporary restraining order remains in effect until Nov. 1.

The Country Column

Columbia's Bobby Bare has been kicking his career back into full gear the past few months. A sleepy-voiced singer with a bunch of hits stored under his well-worn hat, Bare has earned a reputation for recording quality material (his "Lullabies, Legends and Lies" concept album ranks with the best albums ever recorded in Nashville). After a career lull, Bare has signed with Columbia in the past few months, recorded two fresh, interesting albums, signed with Bill Graham Management out of San Francisco and has recently begun working with "Wichita," a San Francisco-based band. Bare's new single, "Sleep Tight, Good Night Man," sits at #20 with a bullet this week on the CB Chart and his brandnew album is "Sleeper Wherever I Fall."



The Songwriter's Hall of Fame, established in 1968, has honored RCA's Dolly Parton with its special "Hitmakers' Award." Frank Sinatra, Paul Williams, Marvin Hamlisch, Bing Crosby and Barbra Streisand are among the artists and writers who have won the award. Dolly has also been nominated for acceptance into the Hall of Fame. Other composers who belong to the Hall of Fame include Irving Berlin, Ira and George Gershwin and Richard Rodgers. For those with a short memory, Dolly also recently won the Country Music Association's "Entertainer of the Year" Award for 1978.

Songwriter/artist Bobby Russell has announced a long-term distribution agreement with International Record Distributing

Bobby Bare Associates for release of a series of singles on his newly-formed Filly Colt Label. Sung by Russell, the first label release will be "Armchair Quarterback. Russell wrote "Honey" and "Little Green Apples.

The Original "Drifting Cowboys," Hank Williams' old band, have signed with Buddy Lee Attractions for personal appearances. The group formed in 1947 and now includes Hillous Butrum, Don Helms, Jerry Rivers, Dean McNett and J.R. Williams. Produced by Charley Daniels and Jim Owen, the group released an album last year on Columbia.

ABC's Don Williams has been awarded a platinum album from the United Kingdom for his album, "Images," on the Anchor Label. A collection of Williams' best-selling overseas singles, the album is rated #1 on British charts and is the first country album ever to be certified platinum in Britain. Williams has twice been awarded "Male Vocalist of the Year" in London and his "You're My Best Friend" single was voted last year as Britain's all-time favorite single record. Williams also recently won the Country Music Association's 1978 "Male Vocalist of the Year" Award.

The authentic Western Group, "Riders In The Sky," will soon open a series of dates for Charlie Walker, Ray Pillow, Peggy Sue and Bobby Wright. "Riders" are fronted by Country Music Hall of Fame public relations director Doug Green.

When Columbia's Bobby Bare taped "Austin City Limits" in Sep-

tember, "Tennessee Pullybone" also appeared on the show. Shoji Tabuchi, a 35-year-old Japanese fiddle player, was recen-

tly named "Entertainer of the Year" at the annual Grapevine Opry "Susie" Awards. Tabuchi was an economics student who played classical violin before he was exposed to country music. He got his American start as a member of David Houston's band.



Elektra/Asylum's Vern Gosdin recently signed with Jan Kurtis Management and the Shorty Lavender Booking Agency. Starting Jan. 19, he will begin a nine-city tour with Epic's Johnny Paycheck and RCA's Jerry Reed.



RCA's Dottsy will be making her debut appearance at the Wembley Festival next year during the April 14-16 show. Wembley Festival promoter Mervyn Conn has also booked Dottsy for a musical variety TV show which will be taped in December in Glasgow, Scotland.

Every so often, circumstances will alter the fate of a particular record and this may be true for Justin Tubb's "What's Wrong With The Way That We're Doing It Now." A strong statement against many of the changes in country music, Tubb sang the song during a D.J. show at the Opryhouse during D.J. week and received three standing ovations. He sang it again that week on The Grand Ole Opry and received strong reaction. As a result, 2nd Generation Records will re-ship the record. "We've been contemplating re-shipping the single for various reasons before this happened," said Pete Drake, owner of 2nd Generation Records. "This reinforces our other reasons. audience." Accordingly, Smith has developed the credo that "marketing records is like marketing soap - or anything else for that matter

Smith notes that one of the inherent difficulties in breaking Genesis in the U.S. has been the "art-rock" stigma attached to their earliest work. This sort of categorization seemed to relegate them to cult status over the years, but Atlantic Records' commitment to the group recently paid off when their latest LP, "And Then There Were Three," was certified gold.

"People still seem to think of Genesis in the same way they regard Yes," he says, "though I'm sure Yes would love to be thought of more in terms of a 10cc or Steely Dan since they feel they write songs as opposed to conceptual pieces. The greatest hurdle we've had to face has been the fact that our career has always been one step ahead in Europe, so that by the time we've come to America, our product has already been test-marketed."

Because of their arty image, Genesis never really broke in this country until the release of the single, "Follow You, Follow Me." "In America, it's radio or nothing," says Smith. "Without its support, your chances of breaking a new act are incredibly tough. Europeans, though, will recognize a new band on the basis of its live performances. The press also plays an important role, but radio is secondary unless you're a singles band, which we've never been. Programmers in this country have hurt Genesis in this respect because of that 'art rock' classification.

'When Genesis sells a million records in Europe on the current LP, we're not talking about a 'cult' any longer. 'Cult' bands don't sell out Madison Square Garden

Chackler commented about the new deal. 'The home staff - in promotion, sales, creative services and marketing - are the best, and the field people, branch and independent distributors are likewise great. I'm looking forward to a highly successful future together.

The international success of Genesis has helped Smith lay the framework for the popular acceptance of Peter Gabriel as a solo artist. "Initially, the people that came to see Peter and bought his first record were Genesis fans. But now he's creating his own identity and audience, which has been our objective all along." Smith stressed that Gabriel's true strength will be tested in his ability to appeal to American radio listeners. "Genesis is more like Strauss," he says. "They're very classically-oriented and conceptual. Peter has those elements, but he can also write and sing country blues.

A further distinction between the two acts are the types of audiences they are playing to on tour. Gabriel's itinerary consists of numerous college dates and showcase appearances, while Genesis' appeal lies with a broader, more fragmented audience. When Atlantic conducted a survey in Pittsburgh recently at a Genesis concert," Smith points out, "the audience listed an amazing amount of different acts that appealed to them, such as Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath and Yes.

Although Smith naturally wants to expand Gabriel's audience, he is glad that Genesis and Gabriel are appealing to different kinds of listeners. The more distinct each is from the other, he feels, the better chance Gabriel will have of becoming firmly established as a solo artist

Crawford Expands Label To Reach All Areas Of Music

LOS ANGELES - Producer/writer Dave Crawford is expanding his three-year-old L.A. Records label to include all areas of music. 

Slow Implementation For AAAA 6-Point Minority Plan

by Cookie Amerson LOS ANGELES — In response to the claim of black media executives that they don't receive their share of national time buys, the American Association of Advertising Agencies earlier this year put together a six-point program to improve market performance and penetration by minority media

According to the AAAA, the program is designed to : 1) develop market research that demonstrates opportunities for the advertiser using minority broadcast media; 2) develop research to document audience response to that advertising; 3) improve minority media sales presentations; 4) improve ability of minority broadcasters to price competitively within local markets; 5) overcome lack of minority sales representation in key advertising markets; and 6) improve performance by rating services to provide full representation of minority segments of surveys. Heated Dissussion

During the recent National Association of Black Owned Broadcasters meetings in Washington, D.C., the panel devoted to a discussion of this program was the most heated of the gathering. Responding to the AAAA proposals, a spokesman for the National Black Network explained, "When we received the proposal, we contacted the AAAA to set up a meeting to discuss their six-point program but to this day have not received a response.

Robert Purcell, vice president of AAAA. acknowledged that there was a bit of a communications gap between AAAA and NBN. He noted further, "Since agencies rely most heavily on the rating services to make their buys, the key is to start working in that area. We have set up meetings between our association, NAB and ARB to discuss the possible misrepresentation of the minority audience '

Robert Beatty, a black advertising executive of the Ross Roy agency, agreed with Purcell's assessment, saying, must work on improving the existing methodology of the rating services. Though there are several alternative services springing up, it can take seven or eight years for them to get into the larger agencies." He added, "Arbitron has complained that some of the suggested methodology (continued on page 62)

Radio Chains Worry About Rewrite, Remain Optimistic

Carl Wagner, executive vice presidentradio for Taft Broadcasting, says that the medium does not need a complete overhaul

"We've taken a stand along with most of the industry in favor of amendments to the current law instead of a rewrite," states Wagner, whose company owns five AM and six FM facilities. "What works should be kept working that way. Why should we throw out everything and start over from scratch?'

Egmont Sonderling, president and chairman of the board of Sonderling Broadcasting, cites Jankowski's questions about the rewrite's proposals for new spectrum allocations, spectrum use fees and its standard of "diversity" and adds that Sonderling "completely and fully endorses the position taken by the CBS president." Sonderling, which is in the process of merging with Viacom International, owns six AM and five FM stations.

"As it stands now," says Sonderling, "the rewrite poses more questions than it supplies answers. It is particularly unclear on renewals, extensions of the spectrum and spectrum use fees. It's a good beginning, but that's all.

The spectrum use fee is clearly the most troublesome part of the rewrite, for groupowned and independent stations.

"The spectrum fee proposal is a disaster," seys Neil Rockoff, vice president of Storer Broadcasting, owner of three AM and two FM stations following the recent sale of its two Los Angeles outlets, pending FCC approval. "With this kind of taxation comes regulatory control. It is a direct blow to freedom of the press.

ABC, owner of six AM and seven FM stations, has gone on record in favor of amending, rather than rewriting, the Communications Act. Mike Hauptman. ABC radio senior vice president, refuses to comment any further on the bill, except to say we are opposed to the spectrum tax.

Some Support

But not all radio chains are steadfastly opposed to the Van Deerlin bill. John Bayliss, president of Combined Communications' radio division, is hopeful that some sections of the bill will be passed by Congress. Combined owns AM and FM facilities in six cities, as well as seven television stations, the Oakland Tribune and Cincinnati Enguirer newspapers and a number of outdoor advertising companies

have guarded optimism about the rewrite," indicates Bayliss. "Tradeoffs will no doubt be made during Congressional debates, but my guess is that radio will emerge with a whole new ballgame. Van Deerlin sees unique radio problems as opposed to television and I think that is good.

In fact, Rep. Van Deerlin has suggested that, in reference to the National Association of Broacasters' expressed opposition to this bill, "those who purport to represent you as broadcasters (NAB) are not operating in the best interests of radio." NAB board chairman Donald Thurston has in turn accused Van Deerling of trying to divide the NAB's constituency as a political manuever to drum up support for his bill.

The concern among radio chains and the rest of the radio industry over the rewrite proposal reflects their overall concern with government involvement with the industry as a whole. Many broadcasters see inter-ference from the courts and regulatory agencies as the most pressing problem facing radio today.

"Government regulation is a terrible problem and I don't see a light at the end of the tunnel," says Combined's Bayliss. "Hopefully the rewrite, aimed at deregulating the industry, will help.

"We are chafing under a constantly in-

creasing volume of rules and regulations that put an awful burden on broadcasters. says Sonderling. "Judging from the evergrowing intrusion of the courts and the FCC I only can only infer that they want to run the broadcast business. Current ascertainment rules are terribly difficult to meet and irresponsible renewal petitions are another big problem. And these things involve tremendous legal expenses.

Bright Side

On the bright side, all of the radio chains surveyed painted a rosy picture of the in-dustry's future. Many indicate that the past few years have seen a marked growth in advertising revenues for group-owned radio.

"Radio can earn big money," reports Irwin Segelstein, executive vice president of broadcasting for NBC, which owns four AM and four FM facilities. "In the past few years billing has gone up from about \$800 million to \$3 billion.'

"The past three or four years have been extremely good," agrees Sam Diggs, president of the CBS Radio division. "Lots of national advertisers have looked at radio mixes as part of their campaigns and found that they work very well." CBS currently owns the full complement of stations allowed by law.

Storer's Rockoff says radio revenues are reaching new high every year, led by FM stations which have been grabbing larger percentages of total listenership for many years

"FM tends to throw off a better profit/cost ratio than AM," notes Rockoff. "AM has bigger plants and is saddled with collective bargaining units. FM doesn't have the expensive morning personalities or unions."

Paul Downs, vice president and assistant to the president of Rollins Inc., owner of five AM and one FM stations, says FM facilities are fragmenting AM incomes

"The future is not as bright on the AM side because of FM's credibility and superior sound quality," comments Downs. "FM has fully come into its own, it's no longer a baby brother situation." Rollins is currently negotiating to purchase two additional FM stations.

Another recurring theme among radio chain executives is the intense competition in nearly every market today. To some, the competition is seen as a blessing, to others it is a problem, but all broadcasters recongnize its existence.

"Radio is innovative due to its intense competition," says Rockoff. "The competition has created diversity on the air which does nothing but turn on the marketplace. especially in competition with other media. TV has let people down and the radio and record industries have seen this and gotten smarter.

Others say that there is an oversupply of stations in almost every market, leading to what is commonly referred to as fragmentation. Market shares have shown a corresponding decrease as more stations pop up and have forced all stations to stay on their toes.

"The fragmentation and competition from good programming makes awareness a priority," says Taft's Wagner. "A station must consistently evolve, not changing too soon or too late. Otherwise you can get blown right out of the market.

The survey found no consensus as to which format is generally most profitable. Almost all the chain executives agree that the best format to program is the one that fills the hole in a market.

"Music formats need fewer people to operate," notes ABC's Hauptman, "but talk/information can carry a greater commercial load, although it is more costly to operate. Format has little to do with profitability - it's more a question of what the market needs and what the competition is offering.

improvements were economically unsound. But if they don't go to the streets, they must improve their telephone retrieval system by using a more representative sampling of the audience market.

Rupert Ridgeway, vice president of research for Arbitron, acknowledged that improvements in methodology were being worked out. Ridgeway also noted, "We are working closely with the NBN, but we also find that many problems people have with our information stems a great deal from misunderstanding of the methodology than anything.

Despite repeated efforts to contact top advertising executives for comments on how they are attempting to implement the six-point AAAA program, Cash Box was unable to pinpoint any specific plans in this regard.

Homewood House

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Homewood House takes on clients on a song-by-song basis, rather than signing them to exclusive songwriter contracts, Pomerantz says.

"It's good for us and it's good for the writers," she says. "This way we can cherry pick and get the very best songs. So while we may not take a lot of one writer's songs, the ones we do have stand a much better chance of being placed, because we continually work each song in the catalog.

Return To Song The last few years, Burke and Pomerantz say, have been encouraging for publishers, especially the smaller ones, because of what they see as a trend on the part of many artists back to using songs written by other writers

"In the early part of the decade, there was a movement by most artists to write their own songs," Burke says. "Now there is a movement back to using outside songs, because most of them realize you are only as good as your last single. It has put the emphasis back on the song again.

Instrumental Success

Through the years as an instrumentalist Harris has had an enviable track record. 'Listen Here," a classic side from "The Electrifying Eddie Harris" (1968), was one of the first jazz tunes to receive substantial AM airplay. "Freedom Jazz Dance," which highlighted his first Atlantic LP "The In Sound" (1965), has been covered by numerous artists and is regarded as a jazz standard. "Exodus," a million-selling single on Vee-Jay, launched him into the national spotlight more than 15 years ago.

Nevertheless, of late, Harris has been best known for his often outrageous vocal exploits. And what few people realize is that he is no Johnny-come-lately singer, having performed at one time with the Mahalia Jackson troupe.

So what about Harris' commitment as a vocalist? Is it artistic? Or, as he seemed to be saving in the beginning, mainly economic?

"I truly believe that if I was properly promoted as a saxophonist, I would never have had to sing," he says. "The truth of the matter is survival."



CHIC - C'est Chic - Atlantic SD 19209 - LP - 7.98

Chic burst onto the disco scene with a celebratory vengence last year, delivering the now classic line "Yowsah, yowsah, yowsah."

This second album was executive produced by Tom Cossie and Mark Kreiner. Chic is now Bernard Edwards and Nile Rogers and although her voice is recognizable on several tracks on this LP, Norma Jean has officially left the group. "Le Freak" is currently charging to the top of the **Cash Box** Disco chart. "Chic Cheer" is a strong cut for disco play. Sparse vocals and tight rhythm guitar repetition make this track work. Whistles and a cheer (aka high school) embellish the cut. Much of the rest of the album is enthusiastic R&B funk with slow ballads like "At Last I Am Free" thrown in for variation.

FANTASIA -- Sweet, Sweet City Rhythm/Summer In The City - TK 102 - 12'' - 3.98 Fantasia featuring Peggy Santiglia is produced by Billy Terrell who was responsible for "Rio De Janeiro." The mix is handled by Richie Rivera. A simple kick drum intro allows easy

entrance into this killer. Percussion textures by the cabasa, upfront bass and fine string and horn arrangement make this a natural after peak record. The break cleans the slate and then the arrangement and vocal harmonies build nicely. City sound effects - jack hammer, traffic — are used effectively. At least one lyric line is a straight lift from the Lovin Spoonful. This track is likely to attract considerable interest. Backed with "Go On And Dance To The Music" which highlights Santiglia's fine singing.

THELMA HOUSTON - Ready To Roll - Tamla/Motown T7-361R1 - LP - 7.98

Thelma Houston needs little introduction. A gifted singer backed by veterans such as "Wah Wah" Watson and Eddie "Bongo" Brown, Houston delivers a lively album which will appeal to R&B, pop and disco play. "Saturday Night, Sunday Morning" has a moderate beat, bright chorus, likely to be a Top 40 candidate and a fine disco takedown. "Midnight Mona" with its mid-tempo funk, steady beat, and piano chording has disco appeal. "Everybody's Got A Story" has a guiding tambourine, sweeping strings and funky keyboards. "Strange" has a rolling break and fine singing

T.K. Records Moves To \$3.98 List For 12-Inch Singles, Effective As Of Nov. 1

LOS ANGELES - Citing rising pressing and fabrication prices and narrowing profit margins, T.K. Records is raising its 12-inch disco disc price from \$2.98 to \$3.98, effective Nov. 1. This move marks a major turning point in the industry-wide trend towards \$3.98 list price which was initiated by AVI Records on Sept. 1. Within the last few weeks, RCA and its affiliated labels have also raised prices

"The profit structure involved with 12inch records is so marginal at a \$2.98 price that it was necessary to post new prices,' says Jim Solmson, national sales for T.K. "The increase helps the dealers by giving them a little more edge to work with and it gives us a little more enticement to put them out. I have talked with a few people at the retail and distributor levels and they are not afraid of this new price. The buyers are out in the marketplace looking for these records and they are ready to pay \$3.98. I think now that we have made the move, others will go too."

The first move to a \$3.98 list was made by AVI on the 12" by El Coco, "Dancing In

Paradise." "We were watching the pressing and fabrication prices going up and the copyright royalty rates going up and we had to make a decision," says Ray Harris, presi-dent of AVI. "The question was whether to go with 12-inch promos only or whether to make 12-inch records for the consumer. elected to go for the consumer. My research has shown me that the consumer likes these records and he will pay for it. We also decided to standardize and make all

12 inch records at 33 rpm. In my recent trip across the country in support of our fall program, there was no resistance to our \$3.98 move. We stood it alone in September. Now everyone is following because they see it is working for us."

The AVI price change applies to all catalog items and subsequent releases on the label

RCA Records raised its list price for all new and catalog 12" records, effective Oct. 4. This pricing also applies to all RCA distributed labels such as Salsoul, Solar, Hologram and Rocket. The first new releases for Salsoul at the new price are 'Ole Ole" and the forthcoming "Mamacita Donde Esta Santa Claus" by Charo.

The rise in pressing prices has contributed to the need for the price increase. Columbia Pressing raised its base price in early September from 43.5 cents for a minimum order to 45 cents for 12-inch records. The sliding price scale brings the price per unit down to approximately 15 cents for high volume runs of 12-inch records.

Other pressing plants across the country have followed suit raising their prices in a similar fashion.

Atlantic Records has raised its price to \$3.98 on a limited number of records. To date, "Le Freak" by Chic, "Workin' & Slavin'" by Midnight Rhythm and the forthcoming 12-inch by Leif Garrett, "I Was Made For Dancing" list for \$3.98. Atlantic created a new 4700 series for the pricing change.

It is widely expected by industry spokespersons that the \$3.98 price will be standard within the disco industry shortly.

"We felt that we could stretch the list price in this instance to give the customer a better buy," he said. "The \$10.98 list was priced as such to create an impact in the market and encourage the consumer in a seasonal way. But we didn't feel that we were presented with the same kind of situation with the Mangione and Kossoff LPs. Pricing involves an examination of what sort of marketing commitment you have to the artist in terms of production costs and royalty ratios. It isn't just an arbitrary decision."

Losk feels there is still a place for the twofer in today's market, "though the current status of spiralling costs have necessitated the need for an increase in list price."

Twofers Not Profitable

Often, these costs are peculiar to a certain category of records. For example, when a record company releases a soundtrack LP to a popular film, it must pay a substantial royalty to the film distributor. Such is the case with Mangione's score to the "Children of Sanchez," which A&M recently released as a two-pocket set for \$14.98.

"There are costs that dictate what you have to charge so that your product is profitable," said Bob Fead, vice president of marketing for A&M. "RSO and Casablanca have proved to the industry that, if you have the right music, the consumer is going to pay for it. I don't think the industry arrives at a retail price based on an arbitrary figure. You have to look at your costs and make your determination from there. It's all a matter of what your financial commitment is to the artist, but I think that the companies sharpened their pencils to find that double LPs priced a dollar above list were not generating a dollar's worth of income."

Capitol Records has just released double LPs by Brinsley Schwarz and Renaissance at \$9.98 and an anthology by The Band at \$10.98. Though most of the material in the three packages was previously released, Larry Hathaway, national sales manager for the label, noted that the acceleration of pressing costs, coupled with royalty commitments to each artist, were the determining factors in the price differences.

"It's not like we're following anyone's lead," he said. "We have stockholders to answer to as well as profits to make, and we have to respond to our costs accordingly. Corporations are in business to make money. Otherwise they wouldn't be in business."

There are exceptions, however, to the high-ticket double LP. Labels such as MCA,

Vanguard, Milestone and Prestige have been marketing previously released and "best of" packages for the past few years, priced between \$7.98 and \$9.98. Milestone recently released a double Sonny Rollins LP, recorded earlier this year, for \$9.98, and Fantasy came out with a new David Bromberg double set at the same price.

Another label that likes to call its double LPs "truthful twofers" is Savoy's gospel line. Savoy topper Fred Mendelsohn pointed out that the label saves on the cost of packaging these \$8.98 list albums by sheathing both discs in a single jacket.

"We could be making more money by putting these albums out in a double sleeve, but my feeling is that we owe the gospel community something," Mendelsohn said. "We're catering to people in a lower income bracket who've got to consider their pennies."

Mendelsohn noted that consumers in the pop market "have shown that they don't care about price anymore. If teenagers will buy a single record for one song, there's no reason to believe that they won't buy a double album for that same song."

ASCAP, Jukebox Firm Close To Settlement

NEW YORK — The first suit brought by ASCAP against a jukebox operator for failing to comply with licensing provisions outlined in the new U.S. Copyright Act is nearly settled, according to an ASCAP attorney.

ASCAP had filed a seven-count lawsuit this summer against the Bronx-based Paramount Automatic Machines Corporation and its principals, Carmen Brachetta and Harry Kolodny, because the defendants failed to comply with the licensing requirements set forth in the new federal copyright legislation. Potential minimum statutory damages are \$1,700.

The attorney said that since only about one-third of the juke box operators in the country are complying with the law, the suit against Paramount was brought to notify operators "that it's going to be a lot more expensive to violate the law than it will be to comply with it."

'Grease' 45 Is Platinum

LOS ANGELES — "Grease," the title track from the RSO Records sountrack album, has been certified platinum by the RIAA. It is the second platinum single from the LP, following "You're The One That I Want," which was certified earlier this year.

Two other singles from the soundtrack — "Summer Nights" and "Hoplessly Devoted To You" — have been certified gold by the RIAA.



"FROGS," a new video game from Gremlin, has "tremendous female appeal," notes marketing chief Jack Gordon. The game is racking up strong earnings at arcades, where most games are usually based on male-oriented themes like shooting, driving, etc., according to Gordon. As for street locations, collections have been "far above our expectations." he said.

TWO NEW PIECES FROM ATARI, "Football" and "Orbit," should be strong sellers based on initial response at Portale Automatic Sales in San Francisco. That's the opinion of general manager Jerry Monday, who added that Atari's latest pin, "Space Rider," should benefit from the continuing boom in interest in electronic flippers. Jerry went on to say that phonograph sales are holding steady and that he is looking forward to the upcoming Rock-Ola showing in nearby Monterey, Nov. 2-5.

AT PRESSTIME, C.A. Robinson distribs was set to host a showing of four new Atari games. In the spotlight, according to distrib vice president Ira Bettelman, will be "Super Breakout," "Space Rider," "Football" and "Orbit."

SPEAKING OF ATARI, the Sunnyvale-based manufacturer recently announced the opening of a new facility in Tiperary, Ireland. Atari Ireland, Ltd. is a wholly-owned sub-sidiary of Atari, Inc. and will soon be turning out video games for the burgeoning European market. The plant will be headed by GII Williams, vice president of manufacturing.

RAMTEK's Don Hutmire notes that firm's new driving game, "G.I. Roadster," is now out on test and racking up some impressive results. The new game will be on prominent display at the upcoming AMOA show along with a five-station version of Ramtek's king size shooting game, "Boom Ball." Until now "Boom Ball" has only been available in a 10-station version and Don feels the smaller unit is ideal for most arcades.

EASTERN FLASHES

Pat Bllotta of Bilotta Dist. in Newark, upon his return from the international Wurlitzer meeting in West Berlin, noted that a number of Americans were in attendance this year, along with the sizeable turnout of factory distribs from all over the world who annually attend this function. The meeting was highlighted by the introduction of the new phono line for 1979 which includes the models X200, Atlanta IV, Niagara, Cabarina, Tarock and Lyric. Pat, who was personally impressed with the new machines, expects that they will be available for delivery sometime after AMOA.

A TWO-DAY GOTTLIEB SERVICE SCHOOL had just concluded at the Mondial-Springfield branch when we spoke with **Tony Yula** this past week. Sessions were ably conducted, he said, by Harry Wahl of the factory's engineering staff. Gottlieb's new "Dragon" pin, by the way, is among the current hit attractions in the showroom. Tony mentioned that Atari's "Super Breakout" has been selling very well and he's presently waiting for samples of the factory's new "Orbit" and "Football" machines. Tony also told us that the Mondial In-ternational export division will be sponsoring a booth, for the first time, at the upcoming AMOA convention — so his coverage of the show this year will include plenty of time spent at the Mondial exhibit.

MUSIC IS VERY MUCH in the spotlight at Rowe-Albany - in the form of "Fiesta" and "Claremont," Rowe's new R-83 phono models. Distrib's territorial showing earlier this month attracted some 70 ops from throughout the territory and, while many comments were passed about the attractive appearance and color schemes of the new machines, ops, for reasons of economics as well as sound, seemed most favorably impressed by the fact that they contain the 125-watt amplifier as standard equipment. Should be another big year for Rowe phonos, said Bob Catlin. Bob will be in Chicago for AMOA and prior to that will greet the Tournament Soccer promo team during their weeklong tour of the territory. The TS-22 table, which has 50 cent pricing, is currently being tested out there and might possibly be the subject of some future tournaments.

Positive Effects On CanCon Seen By Canadian Industry

by Kirk LaPointe

(In the last of a three-part series, Cash Box examines the long-term ramifications of the Canadian content radio legislation from the industry standpoint.)

TORONTO — As noted in the previous installment, the 1971 CRTC ruling, which compelled AM radio to play a minimum 30 percent Canadian music on its stations, has created problems for radio programmers in this country. Artists have also worried that the legislation may have "cheapened" their artistic credib lity.

But the industry has viewed the legislation in a different regard. "For us, it has meant a greater development of the Canadian industry," says a CBS record executive. "There's no doubting it's value," says Brian Robertson, president of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA). "The CRTC rule has led to the fast maturation of an industry that was terribly young and underdeveloped, in comparison to the American recording business."

The ruling has been seen as "a boon" to the rapid growth of recording facilities, pressing plants, and other music-related industries. "I don't know whether it led us to sign Canadian talent to contracts any quicker," says an A&R man at A&M Records in Canada. "In 1971, little was happening up here, period. We didn't have the machinery in place to go about signing the enormous amounts of artists we do now. And under no circumstances do we ever sign talent to cater to radio, although their

playlisting potential is always taken into consideration. We usually sign talent on artistic merit. That doesn't necessarily mean bands that get large amounts of airplay.

Terry McGee, product manager for Epic Records Canada, said, "Much more is involved in the process of artist development than AM play. Radio play may mean something in terms of sales and artist visibility, but there are many other factors involved.

Still, for an industry as young as the Canadian one, the legislation was welcomed by most companies who had experienced difficulty getting their Canadian artists playlisted on radio in Canada. "It may be a little easier for us to get airplay now," McGee asserts. "But we still have to compete with American and foreign songs on all the charts. I just think that Canadian music is getting much better. We seem to be acquiring a professionalism that wasn't evident seven or eight years ago.

Attic Publ. Group **Continues Growth**

TORONTO - The success of the Attic Publishing Group continues as the firm secured Canadian rights to several domestic and international hit recordings.

Among the present successes being experienced by the pubbers in this country are the publishing rights to "Kiss You All Over" by Exile and Crystal Gayle's "Talking In Your Sleep.'

Some of the newer releases whose rights are owned by Attic Publishing Group are the new Zwol single, "New York City," and releases by Supermax, Rick Danko, Claudja Barry, Ronnie Jones, Skye Blue and Plastic Bertrand.

The Exile and Rick Danko releases are part of an exclusive Attic agreement with the Arista Music Group, considered to be one of the strongest music groups in North America.

Attic also represents the Lollipop catalog from Germany, which includes the Claudja Barry and Ronnie Jones releases. Lollipop recently concluded a deal with London Records of Canada as their distributor.

Plastic Bertrand, Two Man Sound and Andre Brasseur are all writers under contract to RKM in Belgium, represented exclusively in Canada.

Stiff Sets Japan Deal

TOKYO - Stiff Records has signed a licensing deal with Victor Musical Industries in Japan. The contract extends for three years and covers the entire Stiff catalogue. Japan is a key territory to be covered by Stiff's international expansion.

Festival In Tokyo Spotlights Songs From 22 Nations

TOKYO - The lineup for the ninth World Popular Song Festival in Tokyo, to be held at the Nippon Budokan Hall from Nov. 10 through 12, has been set by the Yamaha Music Foundation. 36 songs from 22 countries representing the cream of this year's world talent in the popular genre are scheduled to appear on the festival stage.

The three-day festival is sponsored by Yamaha and supported by the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Tokyo Metropolitan Government, Japan Air Lines, Nippon Gakki Co., Ltd. and Yamaha Motor Co., Ltd.

National festivals were held in a number of countries: the Republic of Korea on May 27. at Seoul: Australia July 28. in Melbourne; Hong Kong Sept. 17, and in Indonesia at Jakarta on Sept. 23.

The seven entries from Japan are the most outstanding compositions from the Yamaha-sponsored Popular Song Contest (Popcon), a semi-annual event held each year in the spring and fall. This year's contests drew over 30,000 entries.

The other 25 songs chosen represent 17 countries: Austria, Brazil, Chile, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, East Germany, France, Greece, Holland, Ireland, Italy, Mexico, New Zealand, Spain, Switzerland, the United Kingdom and the U.S.A.

Added attractions at the nine-year-old festival will be appearances by several recording artists: Masanori Sera & Twist, winners of the 1977 World Popular Song Festival Grand Prix, will appear on Nov. 10 On Nov. 11, Grammy award winner Crystal Gavle will present a one-hour show with the 58-member Yamaha World Pops Orchestra

various codes of our own, but it will be a lot easier to scan a bar code. NARM has been working towards this for a couple of years, and I'm glad to see that it's finally coming about."

'Right Direction'

Dave Rothfeld, vice president and divisional merchandise manager for Korvettes, was optimistic but cautious. "I'm a member of the NARM retail Advisory Committee, and we've been pushing for bar coding. However, we may or may not work it into our own system, which is very sophisticated. We've been working certain items through the warehouse with our system on Individual items, and when I'm running a sale that very same afternoon, I can tell you on an item-by-item basis precisely what's been sold in the 50 stores we have. Nonetheless, it's a step in the right direction and it's good for the industry."

Barry Bergman, president of the 82store Record Bar chain, said, "Bar coding is definitely the wave of the future, but we probably are not going to make a commitment to equipment for another couple of years. Anything you bought today would be outmoded in a couple of years. We're going to wait for the technology to improve and for the equipment to become cheaper."

for the equipment to become cheaper." Bergman added, "Even with the advent of bar coding, monitoring the hot 100 will probably continue to require a hand supplement. Computers still can't get that kind of data back to your home office in no time. We also need very much to know how much information the code will contain, especially the price."

But, though the general consensus among major large retailers was that bar coding would help them, they were more divided about how it would help the smaller retailer. Joe Bressi said, "I think it only matters to the bigger operation, and I think that it's being done for the sake of the companies that do huge volume. If I had one store, I wouldn't need it, I could control my own inventory. But with 84, it becomes more difficult, and that's where the need arises."

Contrasting View

George Levy offered a contrasting opinion. "I really don't think the smaller retailer is being left out; he just has to avail himself. Really, there's not much price difference between a good, substantial mechanical register and a register that could handle the bar coding. The difference may be from

The little guy could get a lot of data if he takes it off and has a service bureau process it for him. He could get his readouts in a day."

Smaller retailers were more skeptical about bar coding. Jay Sonin, president of the Record Hunter, which includes one retail store and a wholesale operation, remarked, "I'll believe it when I see it. And it won't be of any use unless the entire industry does it. If they all do it, it will be a terrific thing. I've got in excess of 50,000 different items, and it will be of immense use to me in my reorder patterns and knowing what's moving on a day-to-day basis, particularly with the items that we stock in quantities of five and tens. Of course, it's more to the advantage of the large man than the small man, because the bigger you are, the more employees you have, and the more waste and negligence you have. A smaller guy can run a tighter ship. But right now it's only of use to the internal systems of CBS. If it's going to be of use to people like me or anybody in the industry, the other companies have to do it.

Ben Karol, president of the seven-store King Karol Records chain, reflected the pessimism of the small retailer when he said, "Bar coding has absolutely no meaning to us whatsoever. Having free-standing stores, we are not going to put in any equipment that will read bar coding. Now, if Columbia and the rest of the industry goes into bar-coding, there will be an expense to the manufacturer, so all it could possibly do is raise very slightly the cost of the product to us.

"Furthermore, bar coding would possibly be of great help to our competitors. Big discount operations who really are only on the fringes of the record business — they're racked. Now, if that's going to help my competitor, and it's not going to do me any good whatsoever, what do I have to conclude? Though we do have a wholesale operation, we would never make any use of computerized bar coding. There are very few places in the whole world that use bar coding right now, even though in the supermarket, everything is bar coded.

"There is no question that it's the wave of the future. But right now, anything that helps the huge chains only further jeopardizes free-standing stores like ours."

Miami invited members of the industry, trade and media to mark the closing of Velvet Records 20th Anniversary celebration and the inauguration of their West Coast facilities in Los Angeles.

Present during the evening were Peter R. Schellevis, president of Phonogram International, N.V. Baarn, Philippos Papatheodorou A&R producer of Phonogram Greece and producer of Demis Roussos whose Spanish language LP was just released by Velvet on the Atlas label. Helen Pine, vice president of ABC Records, International Division and Oriando Bru. president of Discolando Records were among guests. From Peru, Alberto Maravi, producer of Los Pasteles Verdes and Manolo Olarqueaga, from "El Universal" of Caracas, representing the Venezuelan press and Jose Siejas Nunez, program director-manager of radio Mundial of Venezuela, also came representing the radio group from that country. Polydor Mexico, S.A. was represented by their newest recording star, Carmen del Valle, whose tour began the following day and would take the better part of four weeks to help promote her LP throughout the west coast area. Andre Toffel, PolyGram's delegate for Latin America and Stan Steinhaus, business manager of the Velvet west coast operation made the presentation of the latest Atlas and Mercurio releases. Atlas and Mercurio are the labels under which all the Polydor and Philips Spanish language repertoire appears in the U.S. and Puerto Rico. Most significant presentation was the new Demis Roussos Spanish LP and the announcement of the forthcoming Richard Cocclante's LP in the same language.

It is expected that by 1980 the combined Venezuela-U.S. facilities of Velvet will have that company developed into the largest independent record operation in Latin America.

Stan Steinhaus, who was instrumental in the assignment of the Polygram license to Velvet during the later part of 1977, will also start the Music Publishing and Special Products Division of Velvet in Los Angeles. Tony Fernandez, sales and promotion manager in Los Angeles, announced the scheduled tour of seven different Polydor Mexico artists during the end of 1978 and early 1979. Besides Carmen del Valle, the Hermanos Bands, Yndio Group, Conjunto Costa Mar, Victor Yturbe, Esquivel and Ario 8 will tour the U.S. at different times. PASADENA CIVIC AUDITORIUM, CA — Whenver Thin Lizzy descends upon a town for a concert, there seems to accompany the group an unexplainable, invisible cloud of fraternity which manages to engulf the entire audience before the night is over.

Lead singer/bassist Phil Lynott and company share a kind of emotional bond with their followers unlike that of any other group. A major part of that hold comes from the primarily-Irish band's songs.


Lyrically, Thin Lizzy does touch upon the usual themes of love lost and love found, but only occasionally. That theme always plays second fiddle to their songs of the camaraderie derived from group activities both inside and outside the law as in their classics "The Boys Are Back In Town" and "Jailbreak." They support this musically with a machine gun-like barrage of twin lead guitar riffs and thundering bass guitar work.

Lynott, dressed in black from head to toe, has a commanding, aggressive stage presence. The good looks and lead guitar of Scott Gorham and the kinetic energy of Garry Moore, filling in Brian Robertson's role as co-lead guitarist for this tour, gives the group an unstoppable front line.

The range they covered ran from the lightly humorous, tongue-in-cheek allusions to the American West of "Cowboy Song" to the punk-like tone of "Suicide" to the raucous, celebrative message of "The Boys Are Back In Town."

By the end of the 90-minute set, when the group was joined by the Doobie Brothers' Jeff "Skunk" Baxter on guitar and Hugh Lewis on harmonica, the crowd was on its feet, with a large majority of the fans pushing their way toward the stage. All in all, Thin Lizzy put on a more compact, more accessible show than its 1977 tour, one that should benefit their debut Warner Bros. album "Live and Dangerous."

BEACON THEATRE, NYC — The idea for this unusual summit meeting featuring three of today's greatest living jazz artists developed last June when they performed together for the first time at the White House Jazz Festival. Though the odds were against it, the experiment seemed to work, a fall tour of the U.S. was arranged, and, judging by their recent stop at this refurbished movie palace, the results have been fantastic.

In more than 20 years of individual recording, Carter, Tyner and Rollins have locked horns with the greatest names in modern jazz. During this time, each musician has defined a particular sound to become a master of his instrument. Carter's skills as an acoustic bassist developed in his apprenticeship with Miles Davis during the '60s. Tyner was an original member of John Coltrane's quartet and one of the first modern soloists to make an impact on contemporary jazz pianists. Rollins first started making records with Davis and pianist Bud Powell in the '50s and at his best, is arguably the most compelling tenor sax improvisor in the world.

With support from drummer AI Foster (another Davis alumnus), the quartet performed two 40-minute sets before a capacity house in a program designed to showcase solo, duet and trio performances by the artists. The evening opened with a sparkling rendition of a Rollins composition entitled "Cutting Edge." Though Rollins has been inconsistent on record of late, the tune was truly a showcase for his roughtoned solos and swinging phrases as he bounces across the stage, gyrating his hips and letting his arms hang as if his horn were in suspension.

Carter demonstrated his virtuosity on the upright in a duet with Tyner called "Alone Together." A lanky, Lincolnesque figure, Carter's subtle rhythmic patterns and textural shadings were pitted against Tyner's remarkably unpredictable punctuations. Each member of the trio performed some fine selections from their current Milesto Is, but it was on the title track to Rollins' "Don't Stop The Carnival" LP that the quartet best synthesized their widely divergent styles and influences. **leo sacks**

ROXY, L.A. — Isaac Hayes brought back the old image, but with a totally new approach during his recent Roxy performance. For his first Los Angeles appearance in several years, the somewhat laid back audience saw a performer who was definitely giving 200 percent of his talent. Hayes was dressed in a white hooded robe which covered a brown bodysuit and very avant-garde vest.

For the packed house that turned out for his performance, Hayes had a 20-piece orchestra with some very eye-catching musicians. The violin player broke a string during a hot solo and, undaunted, proceeded to play the instrument behind his back. Hayes also allowed the talents of the guitar player, the drummer and "Casper" the piano player to be showcased individually. There were also three female back-up singers, who contributed tasty shadings to Hayes' singing.

As Hayes went into a medley of his previous hits, he also went into his old style of talking to the audience, especially the ladies. With several screams from the females in the crowd one would certainly get the idea that he really had not lost his touch.

Hayes did a disco version of "Shaft" from his new album, and a stirring rendition of Billy Joel's "Just The Way You Are."

WHISKY, LOS ANGELES — It was a warm night of classic blues rock 'n' roll at the Whisky with Savoy Brown and Joanne Mackell, and by definition, "classic" defines a style that transcends fashions.


On the faces of members of Savoy Brown, the passage of time is marked only by fine lines etched aroung the eyes. These should be considered badges. Their performance at the Whisky was no freak show of geriatric rock 'n' rollers, but a reminder of how a show should be done by a band who knows.

The emphasis was on the music, straight-forward and unpretentious. A company of three where no one can hide, Savoy Brown is comprised of Kim Simmonds on guitar, Ian Ellis on bass and vocals and Tommy Farnell on drums.

Memorable songs included "Tell Mama" with sassy slide guitar and Ian Ellis' cat-

growling vocals and "Double Love" from "Savage Return" with a beautiful blues guitar solo. The entire performance was characterized by power and precision and "feeling, not just energy."

Joanne Mackell opened and warmed things up with an impressive presentation of originals including "If My Crying Didn't Wake You" and "Trip The Light Fantastic," as well as cover versions of "I Want You" and "Fire Down Below." 


MCCABES, L.A. — John Lee Hooker's recent engagement at this intimate 150-seat showroom provided a rare opportunity to witness this bluesman in solo performance away from his usual bar blues, boogie band format. Accompanying himself on electric guitar, Hooker entered the stage alone and proceeded to deliver an intense, evocative presentation of the Mississippi country blues.

Hooker began his set very low-keyed with a rendition of "Serves Me Right To Suffer," singing in a barely audible voice while accentuating the lyrics with delicate but rolling guitar lines. By opening with such a quiet tone, the bluesman had difficulty immediately stirring up the audience, but with his third number, "Like Jesse James," Hooker captivated the crowd with his humorous but commanding vocal execution.

The concert featured several highly rhythmic, uptempo numbers which focused upon Hooker's brittle, biting guitar runs, but the highlights of the evening were clearly his numerous weary, somber ballads. Such numbers as "When My First Wife Left Me" and "T.B. Sheets" fully captured the emotional depth and conviction of Hooker's predominantly autobiographical delivery. These two songs and others were performed in a sad and despairing tone, but Hooker presented these numbers in such a direct and authoritative manner that they never became melodramatic or overly depressing.

Throughout the show, Hooker, whose latest effort is a live double album entitled "The Cream" on Tomato Records, remained in total mastery of his unique and influential blues style. Now 63-years-old, Hooker shows no sign of slowing down, continuing to tour steadily and winning over blues-loving audiences wherever he plays.





CITY CENTER, NEW YORK— At a time when the success of America's comics is measured by their capacity for triviality, Richard Pryor is a tower of profundity, and his brother-on-the-corner persona comprises equal amounts of outrageous buffoonery and compelling social commentary.

At City Center, where Reprise Records was recording his show, Pryor seemed more the traditional stand-up comic than the social critic. His set consisted of a string of one-liners and quick sketches, a far cry from the tragicomic inner-city character portrayals of his earlier work. Perhaps Pryor is a casualty of the selfpreoccupation that comes with success. His material is less outer-directed, and sketches that dealt with the collapse of his marriage, his heart attack, and his subsequent stay in the hospital were not always funny. Pryor's set, however, did have many funny and thought-provoking moments, ranging from reminiscences about childhood beatings and the differences between the ways white and black men curse to the effects of Leon Spinks as boxing champ on black and white relations.

Patti Labelle, who opened, showed why her star keeps rising higher. Her nine-piece band now stakes out as crystalline a groove as can be heard in a hard-funk context. Labelle's vocals remain as high-powered and exciting as ever. **aaron tuchs**



McCABE'S, LOS ANGELES — A sell-out house was treated to a fine evening of informal but top-flight entertainment recently when Doc and Merle Watson brought their show to town with the help of bass playerbackground vocalist Michael Coleman and opening artist Gove. The father-son team is an established attraction on the countrybluegrass circuit and the tasty dozen tunes they offered showed why.

they offered showed why. Doc Watson is blind, but his handicap does nothing to hinder his performance. His intricate finger picking and heartfelt vocals are inspiring and his folksy approach puts everyone in the mood for an evening of authentic American-heartland music. His son Merle is another virtuoso player, equally adept at guitar and banjo.

The only minor disappointment was the show's brevity, limited to 12 tunes including an encore. Among the strongest material was "St. James Hospital," a poignant tale of a dying man, "The Frosty Morn," "The Beaumont Rag," featuring Doc's flat pickin', and Bob Dylan's "Don't Think Twice, It's Alright."

Gove, who has dropped his last name of Scrivenor, is an endearing tunesmith and a good complement to the Watsons. His autoharp numbers were especially enjoyable and he fit in well with the headliners on their last few songs. **Joev berlin**



THE ROXY L.A. — Riding the crest of the exploding single "Olivia," the Whispers were in top form for the opening night of their recent Los Angeles appearance. In the beginning of the show, the pace of the show only moderately grabbed the audience, building midway through when they began to sing some of their older favorites.

The group showed their versatility in voice and choreography while the material they performed was mostly their own. Their choreography, which is done by one of the members, is very reminiscent of the early Spinners. Their smooth but contemporary moves let you know that in addition to being excellent singers they were also good dancers.

Dressed very tastefully, the harmonies of The Whispers for that evening proved to be at its very height. Their ballads kept the audience on the edge of their seats as did the up-tempo numbers.

Vocal dance trio, Shalamar opened the show dancing. The trio are very attractive with excellent voices, but sound problems detracted from what they probably would have been able to show the audience.
