PARIS, Aug. 5.—Paris is in a heat haze, but Buffalonians congratulated themselves on being here when they learned that America had been still hotter and heard rumors of a blazing heat along the Riviera that keeps visitors to the beaches in their hotels during the day.

Americans have the reputation for being gypies in Paris. Miss Jean Rosenbloom, of Elmview park, and Miss Elizabeth Brady, daughter of Dr. William Brady, formerly of Agassiz circle, admitted they had moved three times during their first week in Paris.
