



NUMBER OF INHABITANTS

Population of the Territory.—Alaska was acquired by purchase from Russia in 1867 and was organized as a Territory in 1912. The population of Alaska on October 1, 1939, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 72,524, which represents an increase of 13,246, or 22.3 percent, as compared with the population of 59,278 on October 1, 1929. The total land area of the Territory, as shown in table 3, is 571,065 square miles. There were 12.7 persons per 100 square miles in Alaska in 1939, as compared with a density of 10.4 persons per 100 square miles in 1929.

Table 1 shows the population of Alaska from 1880 to 1939, together with the increase or decrease during each intercensal period. The first enumeration of the population of the Territory was made in 1880 and consisted of a canvass of all accessible settlements, supplemented by estimates based mainly on records and personal knowledge of missionary priests for those areas which could not be visited. A similar practice was followed in 1890, but the area actually canvassed in that year was larger than that visited in 1880, and at each subsequent census the enumeration has been more nearly complete and accurate. Because of the unusual climatic conditions, the wide dispersion of the small population over large areas, and the inaccessibility of certain regions, the last two censuses of the Territory have been taken as of October 1 of the year preceding the official census date.

¹ Because of the unusual climatic and geographic difficulties the period of enumeration extends over several months. However, in 1939 and 1929 the population was enumerated as of place of residence on Oct. 1 and in 1920 as of Jan. 1. For the censuses of 1880 to 1910 it is not possible to specify an exact date.

Geographic subdivisions.—In tables 2 to 5 the population of Alaska is shown by judicial divisions, recording districts, cities, towns, villages, and other places, with some comparative figures from previous censuses.

Incorporated places of 1,000 or more.—There are eight incorporated places in the Territory that had a population of 1,000 or more in 1939. Table 2 shows the population of these cities and towns at each census for which figures are available, together with the increase or decrease at each decade. Juneau, the largest city and the capital of the Territory, had a population in 1939 of 5,729.

Judicial divisions.—Alaska has no county organization, but in 1909 the Territory was divided into four judicial divisions, which are treated for census purposes as equivalent to county areas. Table 3 shows the

population of these four judicial divisions from 1920 to 1939, together with the land area of each division and its population per 100 square miles in 1939. Each of the divisions increased in population between 1929 and 1939.

Minor geographic divisions.—Table 4 shows the population of each judicial division by recording districts, cities, towns, villages, and other places. Following the precedent of previous censuses of Alaska, a large number of unincorporated places have been returned separately, and have been designated as "villages." In addition, other places of settlement with 10 or more

inhabitants have been returned separately under the local names of the areas. The villages and other places, together with the incorporated cities and towns, are shown under the recording districts in which each respective place is located. Those unincorporated villages and other places for which population is given only for 1939 were not reported as separate places in 1929 and 1920.

Cities, towns, villages, and other places.—Table 5 shows the population in 1939 and 1929 of all of the cities, towns, villages, and other places in Alaska. In this table, which includes all of the places listed in

table 4, the places are arranged in alphabetical order, each followed by the number of the judicial division and the name of the recording district in which the place is located.



Population of American Samoa.—American Samoa was acquired by the United States in accordance with a convention between the United States, Great Britain, and Germany, signed December 2, 1899, ratified February 16, 1900, and proclaimed by the President of the United States on the latter date. Under an Executive order of February 19, 1900, the islands were placed under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy for use as a naval station. The high chiefs of the Tutuila voluntarily ceded the islands of Tutuila and Aunuū to the United States on April 17, 1900; and the islands of the Manua group (Tau, Olosega, and Ofu) were ceded by their high chiefs on July 16, 1904. By joint resolution of Congress, approved March 4, 1925, Swains Island was annexed to American Samoa.

The population of American Samoa on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 12,908, which represents an increase of 2,853, or 28.4 percent, as compared with the population of 10,055 on April 1, 1930. The total land area of American Samoa is 76 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 169.8, as compared with 132.3 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of American Samoa from 1900, the year in which the first census was taken, to 1940, together with the increase during each intercensal period. Local censuses of population were taken by the naval governors in 1900 and 1912. In 1920, 1930, and 1940 the population of the islands was enumerated in conjunction with the regular decennial censuses of the United States, the field work being done under the supervision of the naval governor in accordance with plans prescribed by the Director of the Census. Capt. Edward W. Hansen, United States Navy, who was governor in April 1940, was in charge of the Sixteenth Census canvass of American Samoa.

Districts and islands.—American Samoa is divided into four districts: Manua District, comprising Ofu, Olosega, and Tau Islands; the Eastern District of Tutuila Island, which also includes Aunuū Island; the Western District of Tutuila Island; and Swains Island. Table 2 shows the population of these four districts from 1920 to 1940, and also the population of the individual islands. Rose Island, a coral atoll included in the American Samoa group, was uninhabited in 1940.

Population of Guam.—The island of Guam was ceded by Spain to the United States under the terms of the Treaty of Paris, signed December 10, 1898, and ratified in April 1899.

The population of Guam on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 22,290, which represents an increase of 3,781, or 20.4 percent as compared with the population of 18,509 on April 1, 1930. The total land area of Guam is 203 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 109.8, as compared with 91.2 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of Guam from 1901, the year in which the first census was taken, to 1940, and of Agaña city from 1920 to 1940, together with the increase during each intercensal period. Local censuses of population were taken by the naval governors in 1901 and 1910. In 1920, 1930, and 1940 the population of the island was enumerated in conjunction with the regular decennial censuses of the United States, the field work being done under the supervision of the naval governor in accordance with plans prescribed by the Director of the Census. Capt. James T. Alexander, United States Navy, who was governor in April 1940, was in charge of the Sixteenth Census canvass of Guam.

Minor civil divisions.—The municipalities of Guam are divided into towns and barrios, with the exception of Agaña municipality, which is coextensive with Agaña city. Agaña, which had a population in 1940 of 10,004, is divided into districts. Table 3 shows the 1940 population of Agaña city by districts and of the other municipalities by towns and barrios. Figures for 1930 are not presented because of numerous changes in boundaries between 1930 and 1940.



Population of the Territory.—Hawaii, by voluntary action of its people, ceded its sovereignty to the United States in 1898 and was organized as a Territory on June 14, 1900. The population of Hawaii on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 423,330,¹ which represents an increase of 54,994, or 14.9 percent, as compared with the population of 368,336 on April 1, 1930. The total land area of the Territory, as shown in table 3, is 6,420 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1940 was 65.9, as compared with 57.4 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of Hawaii from 1832 to 1940, together with the increase or decrease during each intercensal period. The figures shown for the period from 1832 to 1896 are from censuses taken under the direction of the Hawaiian Government. The census of 1900 and subsequent censuses were taken under the direction of the Bureau of the Census at the same time as the regular decennial censuses of the continental United States.

Geographic subdivisions.—In tables 2 to 4 the population of Hawaii is shown by counties, islands, districts, cities, towns, and villages, with some comparative figures for previous censuses. The districts shown in table 4 are judicial districts. Data for census tracts are presented in table 5 and for representative districts in table 6.

Cities of 5,000 or more.—Six urban places in the Territory had a population of 5,000 or more in 1940 and for purposes of census classification are designated as "cities." This classification of urban places in Hawaii has been adopted because none of the urban places are incorporated, and none have local governments other than those of the counties of which they are a part. These places have no legally established boundaries, and it was necessary, except in the case of Honolulu city, for enumerators to determine for each dwelling place whether it was locally considered a part of the urban place. In the case of "Honolulu city," the area so designated comprises Honolulu district exclusive of Palmyra Island. This practice conforms to local usage and corresponds to the designation used in previous censuses.

Minor civil divisions.—The counties of Hawaii are divided into districts which are the administrative units for judicial, educational, taxation, and election purposes. Table 4 shows the population in 1940 of each county by districts, together with comparable figures for 1930 and 1920. The population of cities, towns, and villages is shown in table 4 in *italics* under

the districts in which the places are located. As indicated above, none of these places are incorporated. For the purposes of census classification, places with 5,000 or more inhabitants have been designated as cities; places with 2,500 to 4,999 inhabitants have been designated as towns; and places with fewer than 2,500 inhabitants have been designated as villages.

Part of Makawao district annexed to Wailuku district, and part of Wailuku district annexed to Makawao district, in 1932.

Census tracts.—At the 1940 census, population figures for census tracts were collected for the first time. Census tracts are small areas into which the Territory has been subdivided for statistical purposes, through cooperation with local committees made up of representatives of governmental and nongovernmental agencies. While this subdivision into tracts has been more or less arbitrary, several principles have been followed in general in laying out the tracts for the Territory. The tract areas are established with a view to approximate uniformity in population, with

some consideration for uniformity in size, and with due regard for natural barriers. Each tract is designed to include an area fairly homogeneous in population characteristics. In all cases the tracts have been laid out in such a way as to form subdivisions of districts. The tracts are intended to remain unchanged from census to census, and thus to make possible studies of changes in social and economic characteristics of the population within small sections of the Territory. The 97 tracts are grouped in table 5 according to the counties, districts, and cities in which they are located.

Population of the Canal Zone.—The United States acquired sovereignty over the area now constituting the Panama Canal Zone, under the terms of a treaty with the Republic of Panama, signed November 18, 1903.

The population of the Panama Canal Zone on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Census, was 51,827, which represents an increase of 12,360, or 31.3 percent, as compared with the population of 39,467 on April 1, 1930. The gross area of the Canal Zone is 553 square miles, comprising 362 square miles of land and 191 square miles of water. The average number of inhabitants per square mile of land area in 1940, as shown in table 2, was 143.2, as compared with 109.0 in 1930.

Table 1 shows the population of the Panama Canal Zone from 1912 to 1940, together with the increase or decrease during each intercensal period. The first census of the Canal Zone was taken as of February 1, 1912, by the Department of Civil Administration of the Isthmian Canal Commission. In 1920, 1930, and 1940 the population of the Canal Zone was enumerated in conjunction with the regular decennial censuses of the United States, the field work being done under the

supervision of the Governor in accordance with plans prescribed by the Director of the Census. Brig. Gen. Clarence S. Ridley, United States Army, who was governor in April 1940, was in charge of the Sixteenth Census canvass of the Canal Zone.

Canal Zone employees living in the Republic of Panama are not included in the enumeration, since all persons are enumerated at their usual places of abode, i. e., the places where they regularly sleep. According to the annual report of the Governor of the Panama Canal Zone for the fiscal year 1939, approximately 700 American citizens and 5,000 aliens, employees of the Panama Canal and the Panama Railroad, were living outside of the Canal Zone.

In tables 1 to 3 the population of the Panama Canal Zone is shown by residence in civil and military areas. The military area is that area lying within the several military and naval reservations, radio stations, etc., maintained by the military and naval forces of the United States. The remainder of the Canal Zone, lying outside of the military area, is designated as the civil area.

Court districts.—The Canal Zone has no county organization, but is divided into court districts, which are treated for census purposes as equivalent to county areas. Table 2 shows the population of the two court districts of the Panama Canal Zone from 1920 to 1940, together with the land area of each district and its population per square mile in 1940. This table also presents the population of the civil and military areas of each district from 1920 to 1940. In 1937 part of Cristobal district was annexed to Balboa district, and there have been numerous changes in the civil and military areas. The figures shown for each year relate to the area as constituted at that time.

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

La isla de Puerto Rico fué formalmente entregada por España a los Estados Unidos en octubre de 1898, y de acuerdo con el Tratado de París, firmado el 10 de diciembre de ese mismo año, al finalizar la Guerra Hispanoamericana, cedida a los Estados Unidos, junto con Vieques, Culebra y otros islotes adyacentes. En el año 1899 el Departamento de la Guerra tomó un censo de Puerto Rico, y la isla fué incluida en los censos regulares decenales de 1910, 1920, 1930 y 1940. Se efectuó además un censo especial en 1935 bajo los auspicios de la Administración de Reconstrucción de Puerto Rico.

Población total.—La población de Puerto Rico el 1º de abril de 1940, de acuerdo con el Décimosexto Censo Decenal de los Estados Unidos, ascendió a 1,869,255 habitantes, lo cual representa un aumento de 325,342, o sea un 21.1 por ciento, comparada con la población de 1,543,913 habitantes el 1º de abril de 1930. El aumento durante el período del 1º de diciembre de 1935 al 1º de abril de 1940 (4½ años) fué de 145,721, o sea un 8.5 por ciento, que representa un coeficiente por año un poco más bajo que el aumento de 11.6 por ciento durante el período de 5½ años entre el censo de 1930 y el de 1935. El aumento anual correspondiente durante el período entre los censos de 1935 y 1940 fué de 1.90 por ciento; para el período de 1930 a 1935, de 1.95 por ciento; y para la década de 1920 a 1930, de 1.69 por ciento.

La tabla 1 muestra la población de Puerto Rico según los informes del censo de 1940 y los otros censos arriba mencionados, así como también de los nueve censos tomados anteriormente por el gobierno español a intervalos irregulares entre 1765 y 1887.

Población urbana y rural.—En los censos decenales de Puerto Rico, así como en los censos de los Estados Unidos continentales, la población urbana se define como aquella que vive en ciudades, pueblos y aldeas de 2,500 o más habitantes. En el censo especial de 1935 se presentaron cifras sobre el territorio urbano según la definición que incluye solamente las ciudades y pueblos de 2,500 o más habitantes, y además cifras sobre la población total de todas las ciudades y pueblos. La población urbana que se da en la tabla 1 representa en todos los casos la población de las ciudades y pueblos de 2,500 o más habitantes, y la población rural comprende todas las personas que viven fuera de tales ciudades y pueblos, incluyendo los habitantes de los pueblos más pequeños.

The island of Puerto Rico was formally surrendered by Spain to the United States in October 1898, and by the treaty of Paris, signed December 10 of the same year, at the close of the Spanish-American War, was ceded to the United States, together with Vieques, Culebra, and other small adjacent islands. A census of Puerto Rico was taken by the War Department in 1899, and the island was included in the regular decennial censuses of 1910, 1920, 1930, and 1940. A special census was taken in 1935 under the auspices of the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration.

Total población.—The population of Puerto Rico on April 1, 1940, according to the Sixteenth Decennial Census of the United States, was 1,869,255, which represents an increase of 325,342, or 21.1 percent, as compared with the population of 1,543,913 on April 1, 1930. The increase between December 1, 1935, and April 1, 1940 (a period of 4½ years), amounted to 145,721, or 8.5 percent, which represents a slightly lower rate per year than the increase of 11.6 percent in the period of 5½ years between the census of 1930 and that of 1935. The equivalent annual increase for the period between the censuses of 1935 and 1940 was 1.90 percent; for the period between 1930 and 1935 it was 1.95 percent; and for the decade between 1920 and 1930, 1.69 percent.

Table 1 shows the population of Puerto Rico as returned in the census of 1940, in the other censuses mentioned above, and in nine earlier censuses taken by the Spanish Government at irregular intervals between 1765 and 1887.

Urban and rural population.—In the decennial censuses of Puerto Rico, as in the censuses of continental United States, urban population has been defined as that living in cities, towns, and villages of 2,500 inhabitants or more. In the special census of 1935 figures were presented both for urban territory defined as including only cities and towns of 2,500 or more, and for the aggregate population of all cities and towns. The urban population shown in table 1 represents in all cases the population of cities and towns of 2,500 inhabitants or more, and the rural population comprises all persons living outside such cities and towns, including the inhabitants of the smaller towns.


El territorio urbano de 1940 incluye dos aldeas que no se informaron separadamente en 1935 ó 1930. Estas aldeas adicionales, sin embargo, compensan solamente en parte la pérdida de territorio ocasionada en la clasificación urbana por la reducción en el área de enumeración correspondiente a algunos de los pueblos, y que se explica a continuación bajo el epígrafe "Ciudades y pueblos." La población de todas las ciudades y pueblos (77 en 1930 y 80 en 1940) aumentó de 489,584 habitantes en 1930 a 625,670 habitantes en 1940, o sea de 31.7 por ciento de la población total en 1930 a 33.5 por ciento en 1940. La proporción del total que vive en el territorio urbano de acuerdo con la definición arriba establecida (eso es, en ciudades y pueblos que tienen 2,500 habitantes o más) aumentó de 14.6 por ciento en 1899 a 27.7 por ciento en 1930, y aún más en 1940, a 30.3 por ciento.

El diagrama siguiente muestra la población urbana de Puerto Rico, así como también la población de los pueblos más pequeños, de acuerdo con los censos desde 1899 hasta 1940.

Distritos senatoriales.—La tabla 2 da la población de los siete distritos senatoriales de Puerto Rico. Las municipalidades que componen cada distrito se muestran en el mapa enfrente de la página 1.

Densidad de población.—La superficie de Puerto Rico, incluyendo los islotes adyacentes que pertenecen a la Isla, es de 3,423 millas cuadradas. El promedio de habitantes por milla cuadrada en 1940 fué, por lo tanto, 546.1, comparado con 503.5 en 1935, 451.0 en 1930, y solamente 278.5 en 1899.

Municipalidades.—Para los efectos del gobierno local, Puerto Rico está dividido en 77 zonas llamadas municipalidades. Las islas de Culebra y Vieques constituyen una municipalidad completa cada una; los otros islotes adyacentes forman partes de municipalidades. El número de municipalidades en 1940 fué igual al número en 1930. Entre los años 1920 y 1930 se organizó una nueva municipalidad—Cataño, la cual se segregó de Bayamón. Sin embargo, entre el 1910 y el 1920 se hicieron muchos cambios en las demarcaciones municipales, de manera que las comparaciones que se hagan en relación a fechas anteriores a este último año, no son muy satisfactorias. En la tabla 3 (página 3) se muestra la población por municipalidades para 1940, 1935, 1930 y 1920, además de la superficie de cada municipalidad y su población por milla cuadrada en 1940. Esta tabla muestra también la población urbana y rural para los años 1940, 1935 y 1930.

The urban territory of 1940 includes two villages which were not reported separately in 1935 or 1930. These additional villages, however, only partly offset the loss of territory from the urban classification resulting from the reduction in the area covered by the enumeration for some of the towns, which is explained below under the heading "Cities and towns." The population living in all cities and towns (77 in 1930 and 80 in 1940) increased from 489,584 in 1930 to 625,670 in 1940, or from 31.7 percent of the total population in 1930 to 33.5 percent in 1940. The proportion living in urban territory as defined above (that is, in cities or towns of 2,500 or more) increased from 14.6 percent of the total in 1899 to 27.7 percent in 1930 and further to 30.3 percent in 1940.

The diagram on this page shows both the urban population of Puerto Rico and the population living in the smaller towns for the censuses from 1899 to 1940.

Senatorial districts.—Table 2 shows the population of the seven senatorial districts of Puerto Rico. The municipalities making up each district are shown on the map facing page 1.

Density of population.—The land area of Puerto Rico, including the adjacent and dependent islands, is 3,423 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile was, therefore, 546.1 in 1940, as compared with 503.5 in 1935, 451.0 in 1930, and only 278.5 in 1899.

Municipalities.—Puerto Rico is divided, for purposes of local government, into 77 areas called municipalities. The islands of Culebra and Vieques each constitute an entire municipality; the remaining small adjacent islands form parts of municipalities. The number of municipalities in 1940 was the same as in 1930. Between 1920 and 1930 one new municipality was organized—Cataño, formed from a part of Bayamón. There were many changes in municipality boundaries, however, between 1910 and 1920, so that comparisons going back of the latter date are not very satisfactory. The population is shown by municipalities for 1940, 1935, 1930, and 1920 in table 3 (page 3), together with the land area of each municipality and its population per square mile in 1940. This table also presents the urban and rural population for 1940, 1935, and 1930.

Ciudades y pueblos.—La ciudad de San Juan, que tenía una población de 169,247 habitantes en 1940, es coextensiva con la municipalidad de San Juan. Hay también otros dos lugares, Ponce, con 65,182 habitantes, y Mayagüez, con 50,376 habitantes, que por lo general se llaman ciudades. Sin embargo, la ciudad de Ponce ocupa solamente una pequeña porción de la municipalidad que lleva su nombre, la cual comprende además 21 barrios; la municipalidad de Mayagüez también comprende 20 barrios además de la ciudad.

El sitio en que está ubicado el gobierno de las 74 municipalidades restantes se designa siempre en este informe como un pueblo. En todos los casos exceptuando uno (Dewey, en la municipalidad de Culebra), el pueblo lleva el mismo nombre que la municipalidad—aunque el pueblo cuyo nombre ahora oficialmente es Loíza, hasta hace poco era conocido por Canóvanas. Se presentan también cifras referente a 1940 para tres aldeas, a saber, Ensenada en la municipalidad de Guánica, Aguirre en la municipalidad de Salinas, y Loíza Aldea en la municipalidad de Loíza. Esta última era en años anteriores la sede del gobierno de la municipalidad y se conocía entonces por Loíza.

Entre 1935 y 1940 el área cubierta por el censo en ocho de los pueblos—Corozal, Hatillo, Hormigueros, Jayuya, Lajas, Las Marías, Loíza (Canóvanas) y Villalba—se redujo algo debido a que ciertas áreas principalmente rurales en sus características parecen haber sido incluidas en censos anteriores. Las cifras de 1940 para estos pueblos, aunque más pequeñas que las consignadas en los informes para 1935 y 1930, no indican necesariamente (exceptuando a Dewey) una reducción de la población. La población total en 1940 correspondiente al área cubierta en cada uno de los casos por las enumeraciones de 1935 y 1930 se presenta en la tabla 6.

En 1940 nueve ciudades y pueblos de Puerto Rico tenían una población de 10,000 o más habitantes. La tabla 4 muestra la población de estas ciudades y pueblos en cada censo desde 1899 hasta 1940, y el aumento o descenso habido durante el intervalo entre censos.

La población de todas las ciudades y pueblos desde 1920 hasta 1940 se presenta en la tabla 5 (página 5).

Cities and towns.—The city of San Juan, with a population of 169,247, is coextensive with the municipality of San Juan. There are two other places, Ponce, with 65,182 inhabitants, and Mayagüez, with 50,376, which are generally called cities. The city of Ponce, however, occupies only a small part of the municipality bearing the same name, which contains in addition 21 barrios; and the municipality of Mayagüez contains 20 barrios in addition to the city.

The place in which the government of the 74 remaining municipalities is located is in this report uniformly designated a town. In all cases except one (Dewey, in the municipality of Culebra) the town bears the same name as the municipality—though the town whose name is now officially Loíza has been known until recently as Canóvanas. Figures for 1940 are also shown for three villages, namely, Ensenada in Guánica municipality, Aguirre in Salinas municipality, and Loíza Aldea in Loíza municipality. The last named was in earlier years the seat of the government of the municipality and was then known as Loíza.

Between 1935 and 1940 the area covered by the census in 8 of the towns—Corozal, Hatillo, Hormigueros, Jayuya, Lajas, Las Marías, Loíza (Canóvanas), and Villalba—was reduced somewhat, since it appeared that some territory mainly rural in its characteristics had been included in earlier censuses. For these towns the 1940 figures, while smaller than those shown in the reports for 1935 and 1930, do not necessarily indicate a decline in population. The total population in 1940 of the area covered in each case by the enumerations of 1935 and 1930 is shown in table 6.

Nine of the cities and towns in Puerto Rico had a population of 10,000 or more in 1940. Table 4 shows the population of these places at each census from 1899 to 1940, together with the increase or decrease during each intercensal period.

The population of all cities and towns from 1920 to 1940 is shown in table 5 (page 5).

Divisiones civiles menores.—Las municipalidades de Puerto Rico están subdivididas en áreas más pequeñas, denominadas barrios. Ni los barrios ni las ciudades y pueblos que ocupan el territorio densamente poblado, tienen ninguna otra forma de gobierno local que el de la municipalidad en que están ubicados.

Además de los barrios, hay en las municipalidades de San Juan y Cayey reservas militares y navales, y una estación de faro en la isla Culebrita de la municipalidad de Culebra.

La tabla 6 (página 6) muestra la población de Puerto Rico por barrios. Bajo el nombre de cada municipalidad se anotan primero el pueblo, seguido por sus subdivisiones si las tiene, y después los otros barrios en orden alfabético.

Minor civil divisions.—The municipalities in Puerto Rico are divided into smaller areas called barrios. Neither the barrios nor the cities and towns which occupy the closely settled areas have any form of local government distinct from that of the municipality in which they are located.

In addition to the barrios there are military or naval reserves in the municipalities of San Juan and Cayey, and the Culebrita Island lighthouse station in the municipality of Culebra.

Table 6 (page 6) shows the population of each municipality in Puerto Rico by barrios. Under the name of each municipality are given, first, the town, together with its subdivisions if any, and then the other barrios arranged in alphabetical order.
