"Meat and Romance," Picture at Auditorium

A showing (open to the public) of the sound motion picture on nutrition, "Meat and Romance," will be held by the Food Preservation class at Bolivar High School on Tuesday evening, May 4, at 8:30 o'clock.

The picture is of particular importance in wartime because it shows in an interesting manner how to select economical cuts of meat, proper methods of cooking and carving to prevent waste, and the nutritive values of various meats.

"Meat and Romance" is said to be the most authentic and interesting presentation of the story of meat ever made. It was produced for the National Livestock and Meat Board, a non-profit organization, in collaboration with the United States Bureau of Home Economics.

Filmed partly in color, the picture is as entertaining as it is instructive. It tells the story of a young married couple who learn from unexpected guests how to plan meals properly and make their food dollar go farther. They find that careful buying of the less well-known cuts of meat and varying the meat courses served is really fun.

Much mis-information about meat is corrected. The audience receives the benefit of the best advice about cooking, the relative merits of high and low temperature cooking, as well as seeking how different cuts of meat should be cooked.

The place of meat in the diets of infants and young children is shown. Women will particularly enjoy the section of the movie that explains how they may retain their figures without half-starving themselves, while men will be interested in the sequences that demonstrate the proper methods of carving. The facts on nutrition are presented with simple clarity.

Before the picture from 8:00 to 8:30 P. M., a short demonstration on "How to Can Rhubarb" will be given in the Home-making department.

Little Genesee Hall Destroyed by Fire

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the Community Hall in Little Genesee about 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon together with kitchen equipment, including a new cook stove and plumbing, dishes, silverware, etc., as well as carpets, rugs, tables and a piano in a room on the second floor. The Grange saved practically all of its equipment. The loss is estimated at \$2,500; insurance on building \$1,000.

The fire broke out in the attic in the rear of the building, whether from a short circuit or other cause is not known. It was discovered by a passing truck driver, and a general alarm was given. Firemen from Bolivar, Richburg, Allentown and Portville responded promptly to the alarm and did good work in preventing the flames from spreading to adjoining property, especially the home of Mrs. Amy Crandall.

The Hall, a frame structure, about 42x78 feet in size was built more than 50 years ago. It was equipped with a stage and scenery for presenting home talent plays. Of late years the Hall was owned by the Little Genesee Seventh Day Baptist Church and operated for it by a Hall committee. The Grange, Boy Scouts and other local organizations held their meetings in the Hall where also church suppers and other community social gatherings were held.

Harvey Bros., Moore & Co. Buy Farm at Ceres

Harvey Brothers, Moore & Company have purchased the Irwin D. Pace farm located one mile east of Ceres and on Route 17. The farm, one of the largest in this section, comprises 240 acres, 80 acres crop land, 90 acres of timber, balance pasture. Included in the sale is one gas well, two houses, two barns, four-car garage, granary, silo and milkhouse, besides 50 head of Jersey stock, five head of horses and all farm equipment.
