Names of Oil Pioneers

For FutureLibertyShips

VOL, LH., No. 38,

The names of Col. Edwin L. Drake and Orville P. Taylor promise to adorn the mastheads of new Liberty ships of the United States Maritime Commission and carry the names of these oil pioneers across the seven seas. It was Col. Drake who drilled the first oil well at Titusville in August, 1859, cpening the great Pennsylvania oil fields and Taylor who completed Triangle No. 1, at Petrolia, in June, 1879, and opened the productive Allegany County, New York, oil field. The suggestion made in a letter

dated March 3, 1943 to Secretary of the Navy Knox by John P. Herirck, of Olean, N. Y., that two of the many new warships planned by the Navy be named for ploneer oil trail blazers, Col. Edwin L. Drake and Orville P. Taylor, was endorsed by the National Petroleum Association, the New York State Oil Producers Association, and many civic and business organizations. Congressman Daniel A. Reed heartily approved of the suggestion as did other members of Congress. The oil region press gave wide publiciy to the suggestion and some of the newspaper men and many prominent oil producers wrote personal letters to the Secretary of the Navy, approving the suggestion.

The bureau of naval personnel after giving the matter consideration advised Mr. Herrick that while certain civilians had been honored by having war vessels named for them, that Col. Edwin L. Drake and Orville P. Taylor did not fall under the prescribed classification, which was restricted to such as secretaries and assistant secretaries of the Navy, members of Congress who had been closely identified with Naval

memory of deceased officers and enlisted men of the American Navy. have rendered distinguished service for their country above and beyond the call of duty.

Battleships are named for states, and cruisers for cities of the United States. An exception was made a few days ago when a cruiser was named for the city of Canberra, Australia. The Secretary of the Navy in his letter suggested to Mr. Herrick that he communicate with the Chairman of the United States Maritime Commission advising him of the desire of the oil producerh to have vessels named for the two oil pioneers, as vessels constructed by them are named for deceased Americans who have contributed notably to the history and progress of the United States. A letter received by Mr. Herrick under date of April 15, 1943, from Mark O'Dea, Director of Public Relations of the Maritime Commission states that the names of Col. Edwin L. Drake and Orville P.
