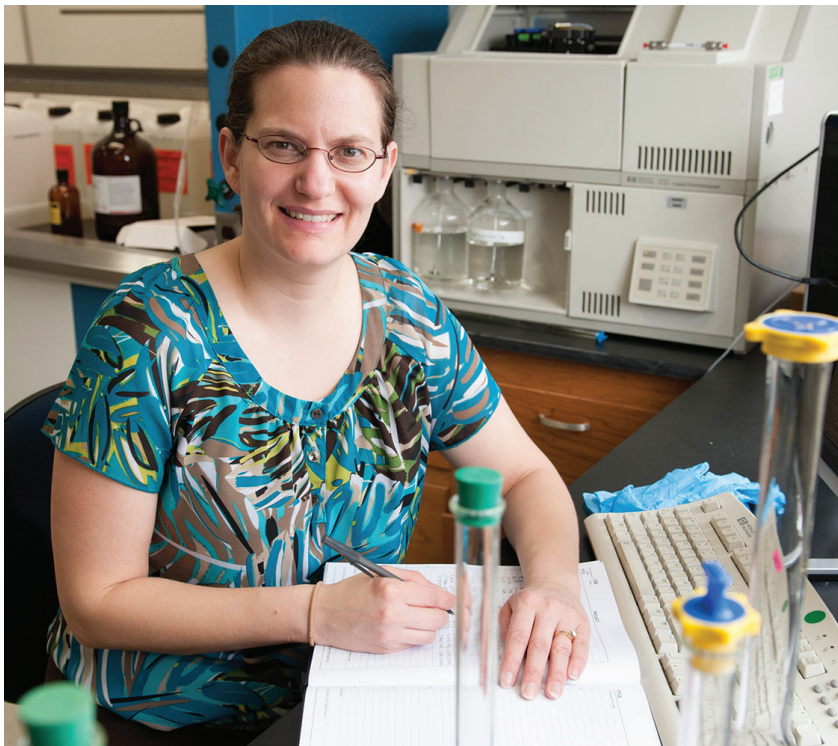

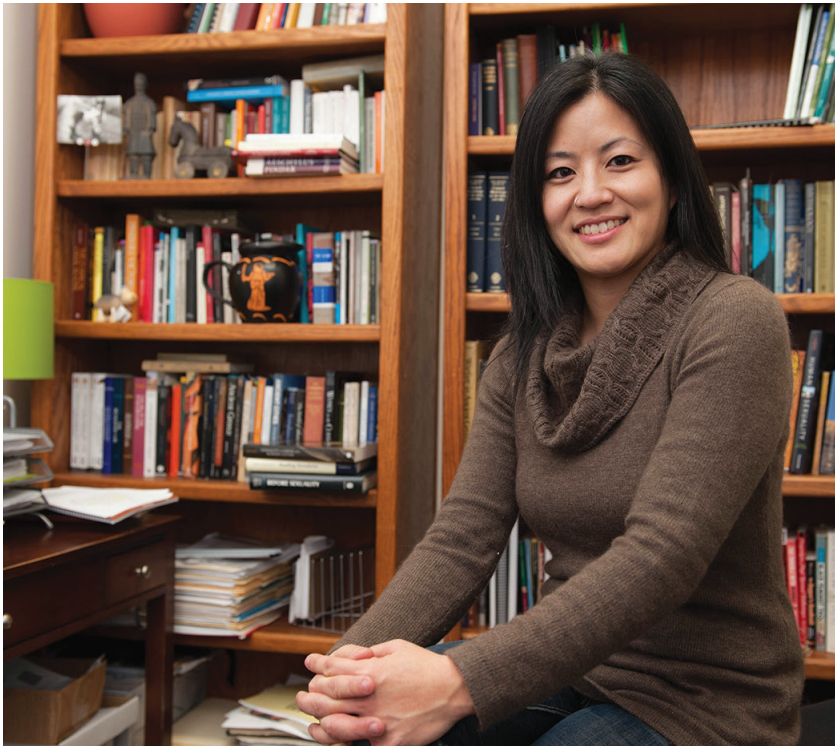

ELIZABETH BAER, PhD, recipient of the 2012 Faculty Scholarly Accomplishment Award.

Professor Elizabeth Baer does not sit still for long. “She is always, ALWAYS hard at work on an article, book review, or book-length manuscript,” says a colleague of hers, “and she shares her expertise generously.” Her track record of scholarship is as wide-ranging as it is extensive. Her work spans the fields of history, biography, religion, pedagogy, literature, and women’s studies. She has lectured, traveled, and taught in every continent—barring perhaps Antarctica—and garnered major awards including a fellowship from the Bush Foundation and a Fulbright, a Pew Scholarship and a fellowship at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum.

In addition to numerous essays and articles and innumerable book reviews, Professor Baer has published four books. *The Blessed Abyss: Inmate #6582 in Ravensbrück Concentration Camp for Women* is a critical edition of the memoir of Nanda Herbermann, a German Catholic imprisoned at Ravensbrück. Stanford historian Mary Roberts describes it as “a very important historical contribution to the history of the Holocaust. *Shadows on My Heart: The Civil War Diary of Lucy Buck of Virginia, 1861–1865*, was described by one reviewer as “extraordinarily revealing.” *Experience and Expression: Women, the Nazis, and the Holocaust* is an anthology of essays on gender and the Holocaust. Her most recent book, *The Golem Redux: From Prague to Post-Holocaust Fiction*, traces the history of the Golem legend from the third century to the present.

A *leitmotif* of Professor Baer’s scholarship is the tenacity with which she investigates important and difficult issues such as sexual violence in the Holocaust and genocide in Rwanda. In January 2012, she co-taught a class on the U.S.-Dakota War of 1862 and organized an accompanying lecture-series, which attracted more than 1,000 audience members. Characterized as “the most important IEX course ever offered on this campus,” the event shined the spotlight on the injustices perpetrated right here in our community at the very time Gustavus opened its doors 150 years ago. The final student project was a 12-panel museum-quality exhibit that debuted at our Building Bridges conference and was subsequently displayed at the Lincoln Cottage in Washington D.C., at Fort Snelling, and at libraries and historical societies all across Minnesota and the Dakotas. The display received national recognition from the American Association of State and Local History (AASLH) after being nominated by the Minnesota Historical Society, and ultimately received an invitation to be displayed at the Smithsonian’s Heye Center in New York and then at the Smithsonian’s National Museum of the American Indian in Washington D.C., during the summer of 2014.

Professor Baer is the epitome of the public intellectual who lives out the mission of the College in her scholarship.

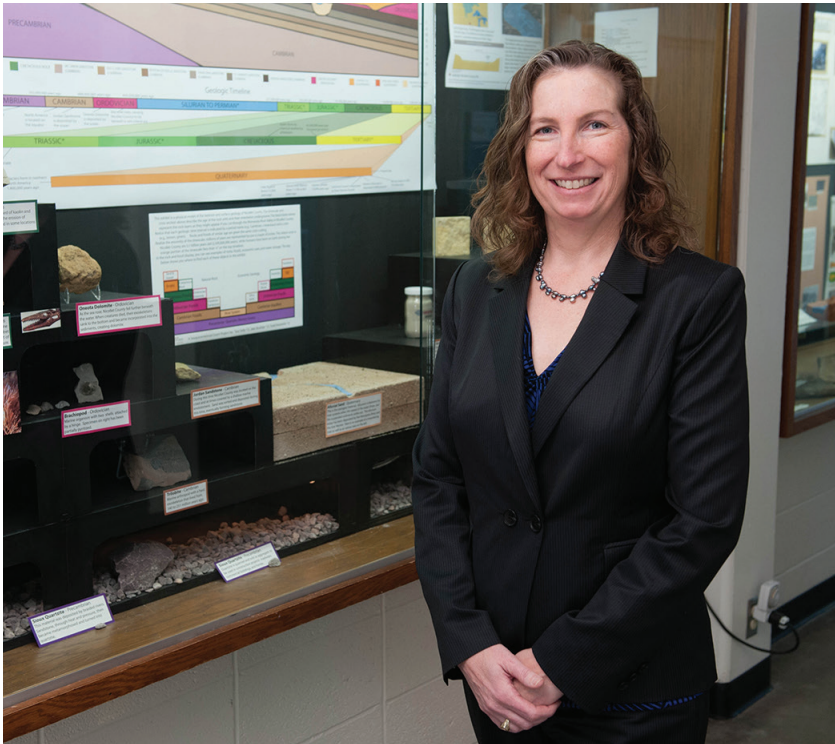

JANINE WOTTON, PhD, recipient of the 2013 Faculty Scholarly Accomplishment Award.

Professor Janine Wotton embodies all the characteristics of an excellent scholar: curiosity, collaboration, dedication. She has published eleven peer-reviewed articles in top-tier journals and four book chapters, and has made more than two dozen presentations with Gustavus students at conferences in the past decade. She has received major grants and awards from Sigma Xi, the National Science Foundation, and other granting agencies. Her curiosity is revealed in the wide range of interdisciplinary topics and methodologies in her work, including physics, mathematics, psychology, and biology. Her research focuses on a topic vital to all of us: understanding the way the brain processes and codes sensory information to enable humans and animals to perform everyday tasks. What a grand thing that her curiosity yields new knowledge about how we hear and see and speak!

Professor Wotton not only embodies curiosity but she also epitomizes scholarly collaboration. She has been invited to collaborate with faculty in neuroscience, cognitive, and bioengineering programs at Brown University, Boston University, and the University of Minnesota. Equally impressive is the mentoring and collaboration she has done with our students who are now completing graduate degrees in very prestigious venues.

Rachel Keuseman, now a medical student at the Mayo Clinic, testifies to her relationship with Professor Wotton, which was crucial to her development as a scientist: “I know I would not be on the path I am without her. I approached

Dr. Wotton as a hesitant and inexperienced student and was met with much enthusiasm. She provided me with a list of background articles and got me involved in research right away. She taught me how to design a research project, conduct statistical analyses, the importance of avoiding source bias, and the fundamentals of writing manuscripts.”

Another former student, Cathryn Nelson, now in a PhD program in occupational therapy at Creighton University, is also full of praise: “Even in the more entry-level classes that she taught, she was bringing in recent scholarly articles to give us a well-rounded and up-to-date educational experience.”

Finally, Jean Paul Noel, currently a Fulbright Scholar at the Brain and Mind Institute in Switzerland, recalls, “In my first and second years, Professor Wotton provided me with the comfort and confidence many underclassmen need. When I was a senior psychology honors student, she provided me with her own personal lab space, and revised drafts and drafts of research manuscripts.”

Professor Wotton shares with her students not only the skills they need to establish themselves as scholars and to go on to successful careers, but also the joy of experimentation and discovery and the excitement of making a difference through science. She is the paradigm of a curious, collaborative, and dedicated scholar.

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THE JOHN S. KENDALL CENTER FOR ENGAGED LEARNING, named to honor the longtime faculty member and 12th president of Gustavus Adolphus College, aims to assist faculty in two specific areas: disciplinary expertise and pedagogical proficiency. GUSTAVUS ADOLPHUS COLLEGE is a private, coeducational, liberal arts college affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and sited on a 340-acre campus overlooking the historic river town of St. Peter, Minnesota, 70 miles southwest of the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul. Since its founding in 1862, it has valued its Swedish and Lutheran heritages.

The College has developed a distinguished academic reputation and is known for its strong science, writing, music, study-abroad, and service-learning programs. Gustavus has hosted a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa since 1983 and is internationally recognized for its annual Nobel Conference.





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
