**Greetings** in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the peace and power of the Holy Spirit.



A new conference drawn toward a vision of Christ-centered mission and ministry, vibrant congregations, and bold and effective leaders.

May our engagement with Jesus, with each other, and with the world to which Christ calls us demonstrate God's goodness to everyone. May we share our time together with glad and generous hearts.








## Welcome to Annual Conference!

We hope your time at Annual Conference is pleasant and want to make your visit to the Grand Traverse Resort and Spa as enjoyable as possible. If you find yourself in need of assistance or additional information there are many people waiting to serve you:

#### **CONFERENCE MATERIALS**

#### **COST**

Now that annual conferences of the Michigan Area are meeting together, there are only a handful of venues in the state that can accommodate an event of our size. Annual conferences in the North Central Jurisdiction hold their events in similar conference venues. The Michigan Area is in-line with costs of other annual conferences. This year the Commission on the Annual Conference Session negotiated lower hotel room rates and reduced dinner rates by over 40%.

#### **EMERGENCY**

#### **HEALTH SCREENINGS**

The Health Clinic is located in the hotel hospitality room 218 on the Lobby Level. Detroit and West Michigan Conference subscribers and dependents age 18+ (active plan only) enrolled in the conference group health insurance plan are eligible to receive the health screening at no charge. Retirees and others may receive the screening at a cost of \$150 payable to Personal Health Partners at the time of the screening. Results are completely confidential and are mailed directly to participants in an easy to understand format with explanation of significant findings. Fasting prior to the screening is recommended, but not required.

The Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians own two major businesses which are marketed under the tradename Grand Traverse Resort and Casinos.

The gaming business is owned and operated by the GTB Economic Development Corporation, a federally chartered corporation. The GTB-EDC operations include Turtle Creek Casino and Hotel, the Leelanau Sands Casino and Lodge and the Eagle Town Market.

Its hotel and resort business is owned and operated by the Grand Traverse Resort and Spa LLC, a Michigan limited liability company. GTRS LLC has its own Board of Directors and its' management operations and financials are separate from the GTB-EDC.

#### SCRIPTURE AND REFLECTIVE PRAYER

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus.[j] "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

Holy God - I strive to follow you in all I do and say. But I know I often come up short. Each day I set out to love my neighbor. But I'm often too busy, or too distracted, or too worn out with my own problems to really reach out. Each day, O God, I try to do what is required of me... to love you and love your people. Continue to guide me as I fumble, continue to lead me as I fear, and continue to forgive me as I fall short.

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity.

Creator God - we see ourselves in this gospel message. We have neighbors in our community that we would rather simply pass by. We have been the priest, crossing the street to avoid a fearful situation. We have been the Levite, avoiding confrontation and conflict in order to maintain our comfort or ignorant bliss. Help us, O God, to be the Samaritan you teach about. Help us to create places of community where no one turns their face away, or avoids the path of another. Make for us places of peace and sanctuaries in the streets.

He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii,[k] gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?"

In our world, O God, which of these three are we? In our Global church, O God, which of these three are we? When we hear of people without access to clean water, or little girls without access to education, or global diseases with cures but no access to healing, we feel stuck. You call us to radical hospitality, yet we continually wonder what the bare minimum is that we can get away with. You call us to care for the whole person, yet we pick and choose which causes to champion or vote for. You call us to love, yet we try to make that love about us. Forgive us, when our global reach is only far enough to pat ourselves on the back.

He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."







Preach – Share the Good news of Jesus' love:
Preached to 3 folks on a snowy morning. A Catholic congregation of well over a thousand. Funerals with hundreds in attendance or like the one with funeral director, the vault guy, and the deceased. Preached a Valentine's day wedding with 600,000 viewers on TV, and

shared Jesus with a tiny one with four in attendance. Preaching has been the most humbling and blessed experiences.

Pray-From thousands of prayers during the regular church events, to lifting Lord's name blessings boats, classic cars, houses, and bicycles. Graduations, band concerts and softball games, and bowling alleys, township halls, jail and prison. ERs, delivery rooms, morgue, gravesides even of the neighbor kid's pets. Prayers with the suicidal, the seeking and the lost. There were prayers answered by miracles of God (to my amazement), medical healings, water from a well, even held off rain ten minutes once!

Now for the die-on-the-spot part. The unexpected DS worship visit and I can't pronounce Habakkuk to save me. There was the moment I realized the communion steward had us serve moldy green grape juice. Or the morning—observing I have preached for ten minutes with my shirt tail out my fly. Then there was the wedding where I used the bride's sister name instead of hers, twice. Cardiac arrest when I forgot the briefcase with all the VIM team passports and trip money in the Haitian tap-tap. Oh yes, the Christmas Eve service, when my six-year-old son stormed the platform with his new turquoise out of tune guitar, that had a giant cartoon platypus on it. Determined to accompany the congregation singing "O little Town of Bethlehem" while playing the guitar over his head like an 80's rock star.

I thank God for calling me to serve in pastoral ministry. Many years ago I was blessed by the Holy Spirit as I heard Romans 8: 37 – 39 read. We called an ambulance, collected information from Viola about her medications and I followed the ambulance to the South Haven hospital. Having never been there before I wasn't sure how to get home to Richland in the dark but eventually found my way. I realized this would be no ordinary job God had called me to. I realize that all five churches went through a new roof project during my time appointed there. After a time of Sabbath I pray for God's guidance for the next chapter in my life.

#### PATRICIA BROOK

Throughout life's journey, I have come to recognize God's claim and call on my life through the presence of others, whether it is in a comfortable silence, through words being received and spoken, or through the shared experiences of life.

In reflection, I now recognize God's presence on every path of my journey – while walking down the road with my mother, brother and sister to Millett Methodist Church in the 1950s; through a pastor who recognized and drew out gifts long hidden; in shared experiences in college - as a church camp staffer one summer, as a student in religion and humanities classes, and during late night conversations; and in the ordinary and delightful privilege of raising children. Recognized in the moment or not, God was surely present then. And today I know and depend on God to be present in hospital room conversations, at death bed vigils, during pastoral conversations, through the rituals of the Sacraments and worship, during sermon preparation and reflection, in Bible study sharings and silences, and in the ordinary and delightful privilege of simply being grandma.

In these moments of reflection, I have begun to understand God's call to me to be one of being present to God and to others in the moment, embracing the example and teaching of Jesus Christ. It is a call that began to be realized long before I recognized it as a call to ordained ministry and it is a call that will continue to be realized in retirement.



I've been in church all of my life but answered God's call later in life. God prepared me for being a pastor in the most interesting ways. I was in the field of law as a legal secretary, legal assistant, and legal administrator getting the appropriate degrees and credentials for the positions while serving for over 25 years. 

I won't forget traveling with youth and adults around the country and Mexico on

mission trips that were visible expressions of unconditional love. Never will the images leave my memory of youth tipping their canoe--all our kitchen gear sinking to the bottom of that beautiful, God-created waterway--requiring young disciples to wrestle with the challenge of loving neighbor through hardship. Never will I forget those moments in which loved people suffered painful losses: a call to a home after a father & husband took his own life; another home where a faithful elderly man died in his bed and being asked to help carry him down the stairs from his second floor apartment; visiting with those who found themselves incarcerated and needing to know God still loves them; listening to couples who have grown angry and irreparably distant. Never will I forget the KKK coming to Midland and clergy successfully encouraging people to stay away from their rally of divisive hatred. Instead we invited people to attend an ecumenical service celebrating God's gift of diversity the very next day. Midland FUMC was filled and we raised some \$8,000 for the "Burned Churches Fund". Never will I forget the generosity of congregations who supported trips to Israel and Greece where my own faith experience was more deeply informed and shaped through exposure to the geography, cultures and rich history of those places that served as crucibles for the evolving Christian faith. Never will I forget the privilege of presiding in wedding ceremonies and then baptizing the babies of those couples. Never will I forget breaking the bread and offering the cup to any and all who chose to come. Never will I forget this most challenging and exhilarating journey.

"Love God. Love your neighbor. Do this and you will live" and "Don't go into it unless you can't stay out of it" entered my thoughts repeatedly over 34 years. Thanks be to God and to all of you United Methodists with whom this journey has been shared.

But the legacy I leave comes through Christian camping and youth ministry. Carry on, next generation!

**Bishop:** As with a unity candle, two lights join together.


All: Yet the glow from their separate flames continues to burn.
