Criminal Damage



Members have marched with the Lib eral Democrat Youth and Students' banner at two major rallies recently – both against the *Criminal Justice and Public Order Bill*. The first culminated in a rally at Trafalgar Square in May, whilst on 2 July a group of us went to participate in the mass trespass at Twyford Down, together with MP Simon Hughes. The Trafalgar Square rally was led by the freedom-to-rave group Advance Party and the LDYS will be supporting a second mass rally there on Sunday 24 July.

In the House of Commons Liberal Democrat Home Affairs Spokesperson, Robert Maclennan, shamefully supported the attacks on hunt saboteurs (he didn't think they went far enough) but defended the right to silence – possibly partly due to LDYS lobbying – and ridiculed Tory plans to send 12-14 year olds to secure training units at a cost of £150,000 each per annum: "more than it costs to live in the Savoy".

In contrast to feeble opposition by Labour and Liberal Democrat MPs, peers have leapt to the defence of civil liberties and inflicted four defeats on the Government—on cuts in compensation for victims of crime, twice on secure training units, and most recently over repeal of the obligation on local authorities to provide sites for Gypsies. These defeats will probably be reversed in the Commons but should now delay Royal Assent for the Bill until October. The Caravan Sites Act 1968

which provides for sites for travellers and is now to be repealed was a Private Member's Bill by Liberal MP Eric Lubbock, now Lord Avebury. He was a key player in the all-Party move to defeat the measure, backed by such apparently unlikely groups as the Save the Children Fund and the Church of England's Children Society.

A further welcome reform by the Lords has recognised male rape for the first time in an amendment to the Criminal Justice and Public Order Bill. The clause accepted by the Government will mean that a man who penetrates another person anally or vaginally without consent will in future face a maximum life sentence (previously, the top sentence was ten years). This follows Bob Maclennan's co-sponsorship of Edwina Currie's push for equal age of consent at 16 (defeated by Labour votes) which Earl Russell in the Lords declared would be the inevitable outcome in the end.

DYS are launching a major environmental campaian this summer.

The national campaign will focus on the issue of road building and will feature a series of high profile demonstrations all round Britain.

- Youth & Student activists will be joining protesters at road building sites in key locations.
- A national petition calling for government spending to be switched from motorway widening to public transport and cycling is being organised.
