LIGHTHOUSE SCORES OFFICIAL INTEREST

When GRT's Lighthouse certified for their first RPM Gold Leaf A ward (for outstanding sales) of their initial album release for the label, Ross Reynolds, President of the Canadian firm, arranged for Premier William Davis (Ontario) to take part in the ceremonies at the Bandshell of the Toronto Fair. Ironically, there was an election on the way and the voting age limit had been reduced to 18. Naturally Davis was out for the youth vote — hence his appearance for the presentation.

However, a few months after the election and with four full years ahead of him and also a full schedule of establishment events lined up, it was hardly expected that he would turn up for Lighthouse's second Gold Award. But Bill Davis, the politician, did agree to lay the Gold on Lighthouse proving that he was still keenly interested in Ontario's youth. Much credit for his appearance must go to Reynolds and his marketing manager, Ed LaBuick.

The Science Centre show was broad-

cast "live" over CHUM-FM with Larry Green doing the introductions and general on-air description of the event. First on was Premier Davis who presented the two large Gold Leaf Awards to Skip Prokop, leader of Lighthouse, and to Jim lenner, producer of the set.

Mrs. Pat Pearce, Commissioner from the Canadian Radio-Television Commission, presented individual artist's award plaques to Paul Hoffert, (accepted by Skip Prokop in Hoffert's absence), Ralph Cole, Bob McBride, Louis Yacknin, and Don Dinovo.

Mr. Germain Cadieux, assistant director of Broadcast Programming of the CRTC presented Awards to Richard (Dick) Armin, Larry Smith, Keith Jollimore, Howard Shore, and Mike Malone.

Further Awards were presented to Thunder Sound Recording Studio, where the set was taped. Moses Znaimer and Phil Sheridan accepted; and to GRT's president Ross Reynolds and Marketing Manager Ed LaBuick.

Marguerite Vail, of GRT, assisted in the presentations.

INDEPENDENT PROMOTION FIRM FORMED

Skip Fox, formerly with Ampex Music of Canada, has announced the formation of an independent promotion firm to handle music industry clients. The outfit, Media Man, is based at 5 Roxborough Street in Toronto. Media Man will function as a press agency and promotion outlet with emphasis on mass media coverage by mail across the country, in the United States and throughout the world.

One of the prime factors in the founding of the new company is Fox's belief that the only basic difference between the enormous success of a large country in entertainment and the negligible success of a small country is exposure and promotion.

Media Man's four published aims are, "To promote and publicize Canadian talent in both live and recorded performances, to encourage the hiring of Canadian entertainers for domestic and foreign productions, to develop and maintain the highest standard of reputable communication between entertainers and the media in Canada and throughout the world, and to consistently strive for the common interest in all representations on behalf of and for deserving Canadian talent."

For some time, industry observers have noted a serious need for a qualified independent promotion operation to supplement company efforts, which, in many cases are stretched fairly thin. Fox expects to fill that need.

First client to head for Media Man's

Door is Ocean through WBM management. The group will benefit from cross country promotion by Fox, who will also be pushing the group's second album, set for recording in January.

BISCUIT BOY'S "GOODUNS" DRAPED IN FLOUR BAG

This has been the year for unique packaging and Love Productions' King Biscuit Boy presents yet another. His Daffodil set, "Gooduns" is packaged in "a real Arkansas flour bag". Capitol, who distribute the label in Canada, have laid on a healthy national promotion for the album release, already indicating signs of catching — nationally.

The Daffodil Boy has just returned from a successful European tour where he received good stage notices and reviews for his album, which has been released in the U.K.

While in England, Biscuit Boy visited the United Biscuit Company in Middlesex and so impressed the cookie VIPs that it's possible the British firm may unveil their own crumbler, King Biscuit Boy. The Daffodil variety later rapped with programme director Neil Spence and Adrian Love (on-air personality) who work for the United British Network, a British radio station servicing employees of the United Biscuit Company.

King Biscuit Boy is back in Toronto and commences his Canadian tour with a York University opener, December 17.

MERCEY'S SHOWCASED ON HAMILTON IV'S U.K. SHOW


RCA's popular brother act, The Mercey Brothers, have all but swamped the UK with their recent appearance on George Hamilton IV's television series as well as a tightly prepared tour of the important centres. Rumour has it the BBC are close to asking the Elmira Brothers to become permanent fixtures of Blighty's "telly".

Hamilton's series, his second in as many years, has become one of the highest rated "up country" shows in the U.K. With all the series in the can, Hamilton returned to this side of the pond and an engagement at Toronto's Riverboat. He interrupted this gig to return to England where he received Top Honours from the Country Music Association of Great Britain Ltd. (not associated with the CMA of Nashville). His biggest selling album in the UK is "Canadian Pacific" with "Countryfied" in as best selling single.

It's interesting to note that while on his short trip back for the Award Presentation he met Canadian Charles Williams Jr., now owner of the Nashville Room (Pub) as well as a string of Pubs throughout the U.K. His London Pub is fashioned after Toronto's Horseshoe Tavern. Williams became familiar with the popular Toronto country showplace while working at the Inn On The Park.

Hamilton also ran into Ralph McTell, Paramount recording artist, dubbed England's Folk Laureate, and has recorded his "Streets Of London", included on McTell's album, just released in Canada.

Many radio stations have said they are willing to play any good record and only want to see sales result from the airplay of Canadian records they program. They also add that the record must be selling before they will chart the record.

So what we have here is a bunch of stations that claim to be playing 30% Canadian content while listing 3 or 4% Canadian content on their charts and asking the industry to continue to supply them with programming material (at next to no cost) to help the broadcasters meet the Canadian content quota. Perhaps this is starting to read like an endorsement of the SRL hot potato that went by a few months ago. In fact, there may have been some merit in what the SRL was trying to do. Perhaps the blame lies elsewhere, but somewhere we have to get this Cancon ruling together or forget it.

While there are some who would argue that Canadian records have never fared as well on the charts internationally, you must note that the records that are doing well are just a repeat of what is becoming ancient history.

Okay, so we have established Guess Who, Anne Murray, The Bells, The Stampeders, Lighthouse and Gordon Lightfoot. Can the programmers expect only these acts to do enough to continue the 30% quota. What is going to happen when the second stage of the ruling comes into effect in lanuary?

What the programmers should do is form a club that could create

"a hit a month by a new group". That would give the programmers more to program and put some badly needed money into the Canadian talent coffers. (Certainly the record companies have made some good attempts at making records for the broadcaster.) The broadcasters may have turned a deaf ear to some records of great potential too often and created a situation that is now rewarding them with a struggle to meet the regulations. Didn't we predict the lack of money flow in this column a number of months ago when we talked about the diminishing returns of record production?

Songwriters? We got them! Studios? Engineers? We got them! Arrangers? Musicians? Producers? We have them, but what we may be missing are broadcasters and programmers with guts enough to propel the industry into something that can excite the business.

What is this strange game we are playing that is holding back the industry? Nothing is going to take the place of some damned good airplay and chart listings of some damned good records that are coming out and getting an automatic reject from the radio stations that are playing oldies and psuedo-Cancon and wondering why more records aren't being made in Canada.

The record companies aren't to blame. If I were a record company, I would think twice about the next dollar I spent on Canadian production. The odds are stacked too heavily against getting the action you need to make Canadian records a "playing proposition."

Some big names made the scene including Rocco Laginestra (RCA from New York) - all the RCA Canada crew headed up by Bob Cook; George Struth (Quality); Stan Kulin (United Artists); Arnold Gosewich and Paul White (Capitol); and Johnny Williams (Columbia).

Fred Balling, handling PR and promotion for True North's Syrinx, reports stepped-up national action on their latest set. Most of the action still in the west - unusual, considering they're a Toronto group.

Astra's & Kurt & Noah, now in fifth week of a two week engagement at the popular Montreal disco - Alti-theque.

London ready with a Rolling Stone discextravaganza containing many of their past biggies. The double set is titled "Hot Rocks".

RCA's biggest single seller is still "Mammy Blue" by the Pop Tops - according to their Quebec promotion man, Pierre Bellemare. The Roger Whittaker French version isn't any slouch either.

Tom Williams, Kinney's national promotion

manager for Warner/Reprise product (you can't believe everything you read in the Directory), reports a big one with the Audience set, "House On The Hill" - on the Elektra label. Add Elektra to Williams' roster.

Steel River, still trying for the brass ring now with "Mexican Lady" will get a boost from the U.S. where the deck has been released on the Evolution label.

Ginette Reno into Toronto's Manta Studios for one of the largest (orchestral) get togethers since the studios opened. Jack Richardson looked after the production chores. The CBC will be doing a television special Feb 16 for this French Canadian beauty with Richardson also overseeing the sound. The Corporation is arranging a simulcast airing over the FM network for the show.

True North's Murray McLauchlan was featured on the CBC-TV's "The Hart and Lorne Terrific Hour" (Dec 16).

Polydor's Five Man Electrical Band, who just certified for Canadian Gold for their "Signs" set, into Toronto for a taping of "Rollin' On The River".

The Mom and Dads taping of the "Tommy Hunter Show" (CBC) was a sensation. They were presented with their Canadian Gold for their first album, which surpassed the 100,000 sales mark.

True North is the first independent label to have three Canadian albums on the RPM 100 and all moving up. They are: "Long Lost

Relatives"/Syrinx; "Song From The Street"/Murray McLauchlan; and "High Winds White Sky"/Bruce Cockburn. The latter's single, "One Day I Walk" has reversed its downward trend.

The Frank Mills' deck, "Love Me, Love Me Love", has been released in the U.S. on the MGM label, and has already been aired on CKLW and received the nod from Kal Rudman's Friday Morning Quarterback.

Let's get the Audio Atlantic Recording Studio thing straight, once and for all. Owners are Vern and Grant Kennedy. Bob Stone of World Records does use the facilities for recording and has opened offices in the same building. They've just signed five top Atlantic Provinces' groups and will shortly be releasing a country budget line.

Quality Records threw a press and radio bash at the Variety Club for Dawn (Tony Orlando). This was one of the most intimate and successful record parties in a long time - a credit to the label's Ontario promotion manager Mark Robbins.

A lot of CRTC brass into Toronto including Pierre Juneau for a go on CFRB's roundtable talk'show. Shef Frankin, researcher for FM programming (CRTC) also into Toronto for talks with programmers.

AN AWESOME BURDEN TO LABOUR UNDER

This column will be difficult to put into print. All the tears keep getting in my way.

Why the tears? Well just consider the facts. Some broadcasters have just pointed out that they labour under the awesome burden of insufficient definition of Canadian content. If I understand the charge, some malicious record companies are pawning off suspicious product as Canadian content. For anyone running a tight 30 per cent Canadian playlist, you see, that one invalid "Canadian" record could be enough to sell the station's license down the river.

First off, let's make it very clear that I'm not about to condone the activity of ascribing mythical qualities to any recording. Still, there's a homily that goes "You can't cheat an honest man". In other words, no record company could be able to deceive a really honest broadcaster — at least consistently.

What is honesty? Well perhaps it would be valuable to review what the CRTC regulations were trying to accomplish. If memory serves, the idea was that the regulation would give a bunch of Canadians the opportunity to be heard in this country. If, in

the process, our balance of payments was aided and a few studio owners could make more than commercials, we wouldn't complain.

Getting back to honesty, then, what actually happened? Some stations, you may be shocked to learn, began looking for obscure links between Canada and established artists. Perhaps you've heard the one about calling the Four Seasons Canadian because producer Bob Crewe was born in Newfoundland. Such prominent all-Canadian kids as Joni Mitchell, Neil Young, and Steppenwolf received unprecedented attention. Now tell me, is that helping Canadian talent?

You bet it's not. Helping the California or New York camps of expatriates was the last intention of the regulation. The real aim was to give the Toronto die-hards, and their brethren from Vancouver to Halifax, a chance at the big time — here in Canada. Who really cares about the people who couldn't hang in there and fight for a better common deal?

Think of what the Guess Who mean to Canada's trade balance and what they contribute in income tax. What does a Joni Mitchell or a Neil Young contribute in income tax. What does a Joni Mitchell or a Neil Young

contribute to the Canadian economy? The answer is a negative number.

And this brings us to the crux of the argument. Anyone who is a resident of Canada, working out of here on a regular basis (and it's surprisingly easy to check on how much time a person spends out of the country) is, believe it or not, a Canadian. A person with a couple of houses in California is as Canadian as Ronald Reagan.

So we come to the unfortunate stations who practice a tight 30 per cent play list. That amount of Canadian content doesn't strike me as an artistic act of the heart. It strikes me more as a half-hearted attempt to keep that precious license. Now these stations start to cut corners here and there. They play a record by someone who owns a Labrador retriever, someone who honeymooned in Niagara Falls, or someone with a taste for Annapolis Valley apples. These stations are looking for trouble and they know it.

There's a fable concerning broadcasting, something about helping the community. You can see statements of that sort on any license application. Still, no matter how much in the way of ostentatious "community service" programmes these low-content stations

Yes sir, we've got a lot to be proud of this year. A LOT TO BE PROUD OF. A lot to be proud of. A lot to be proud

God what a great lot we are. We've got gold records scattered across the country for Ocean's Put Your Hand in the Hand. It's the biggest-selling Canadian record in history, with the total now over 4,000,000 units. That's something to be really proud of.

We've been able to lose two incredibly fine records by one of the most talented singing groups in the world, Doctor Music. Not one, but two. The second one was probably the best MOR-pop disc ever produced in this country. We lost it. CHUM didn't even allow it a chance by giving it a number. Now the group is in imminent

danger of collapsing under its own numerical (and financial) strain. We can be proud of that.

We can be proud that the finest group in Western Canada, Chilliwack, have a gold album within two weeks of release and no hit single in the East. Lonesome Mary has gone top five in almost every market in the country yet Toronto and Montreal can't see it.

Chilliwack have declared that they will quit the music scene if this album doesn't get them off. The album needs that single.

We can be proud that the Bells soared Canada to new musical heights with a series of format hits. We can be proud that loey Gregorash was able to get off with a version of Neil Young's classic, Down by the River. We can be proud that so few (if any) of our

masterful interpretation of the song.

We can be proud that we've been able to pass off Joan Baez, Rare Earth, Matthew's Southern Comfort, Rita Coolidge, and countless other foreigners as Canadian content. We can be proud that we've been able to express our gratitude to Paul Anka's roots by somehow discovering his magnificent new single in the new American releases.

CKLW can be especially proud of how much it has done for Canadian music. Ocean, the Bells, B S & T, Sea Train, Janis Joplin, Chairman of the Board, R. Dean Taylor - heavies we swear. And those two dozen other Canadian records which Rosalie blurted were hits and were then summarily dropped after three weeks, thus deflated in the U.S. market

We can be proud that as fine a record label as True North has still not had a national hit single. It was a tough job stopping Bernie and the boys from slipping through under our guard.


We can feel tall and strong that Greg Hambleton still hasn't had a hit single in Toronto. We can be proud that it was an American radio station that discovered Signs by the Five Man Electrical Band. Or that If You Could Read My Mind was broken in Seattle.


We can be proud that Jack Richardson RICHARD continued on next page














has reduced the activities of the Nimbus label to simply putting out the new Guess Who material, while he concentrates the rest of his activities on producing for U.S. majors.

We can be proud that we did not allow prejudice to intrude upon our first listenings of anything Jack cut with anybody other than the Guess Who. We can be proud that Maclean's described the Guess Who as a bubble gum band. Such a tasteful turn of phrase.

We can be pleased that the Guess Who's most adventurous album, So Long Bannatyne, is their least successful on the sales front. We can be proud that Daffodil's biggest selling record is a collection of contemporary Mozart impressions by a South American conductor living in Spain.

We can be proud that Anne Murray's one and only monster single was Snowbird. It wasn't easy to stop the other five. We can be proud that Pepper Tree, Everyday People and the Perth County Conspiracy still haven't clicked.

We can be proud that we've done so much to inform the public of local appearances by Canadian artists.

We can be proud that we have so frequently recognized artistic integrity and that we've pushed un-commerical records by highly talented performers,

not yet capable of commercial contortions.

We can be proud that almost all of our Canadian hits have sounded identical to most American records. We can be proud that our record companies have released so few of those "weirdo" albums — music for music's sake.

We can be proud that our studios are getting so much work from American artists who've got the inside word from CKLW. We can be proud that it's still not possible to cut a decent lacquer in this country.

We can be proud that we haven't done a damn thing about the continued existence of an American musicians' union in Canada, when it clearly represents no help to our musicians trying to work in the U.S.

We can be proud that we almost always ignore the records broken by our perceptive colleagues at Western stations. We can be proud that we've managed to keep almost all trace of French Canadian music off English rock stations

We can be proud that we've continued to mercilessly copy the U.S. charts, even if we've had to drop 30% of their hits from our playlists.

We can be proud that it's still next to impossible to break a non U.S. hit (read unproven) foreign disc in this country (as recently witnessed by Danyel Gerrard's Butterfly and more importantly,

by Donovan's Celia of the Seals).

Ah yes folks, it's been a good year ... one to be proud of.

Close the book and let's have another drink. It's still snowing anyway. I swear it.

MORE SONGS FOR THE SEASON


Although there is a great shortage of new Christmas material, some of the older releases that are still available are being used by many programmers across Canada.

come up with, the fact remains that they're helping to drain the nation's collective pocket while bleating about their good intentions.

No, Canada doesn't need a board to rule on Canadian content. We do need people who will go out of their way to help their countrymen. Look around — there are a few stations that needn't worry about their content, being so much over the minimum mark that a few slips here or there don't really matter. The Canadian material is there and they use it.

To those stations that are working on clear consciences, my best wishes. To the others, I say let them burn. The CRTC has enough to do without holding your hands.

Total weekly circulation jumped twenty six per cent to 231,600. Station's largest advances occured after 4pm. Compared to a year previous, the outlet added 20,300 women and 37,900 men to its audience, primarily in the 18 - 34 group.

CHUM FM went "progressive" in the summer of 1968, providing the only programming of its kind in the area. Audience figures have grown fairly consistently since that time.

QUALITY ACQUIRES "FACE OFF"

Harold Winslow of Quality Records has advised us that the company has acquired the rights to the soundtrack of the Canadian-made movie "Face Off", produced by Agincourt Productions. Quality will manufacture and distribute the soundtrack in Canada on the Agincourt International label. Winslow reports that the album already has a heavy advance order.

The company is now preparing to release a single from the album titled "The Hub" f/s "Morning Sun". Extensive promotion will be aimed at dealers, rackers, radio, reviewers and theatres.



Roberts' interest in country music started at the young age of six when he first heard "Wilf Carter" on a windup phonograph record player. It wasn't long before he was learning the words to many country songs, and at the age of 11 he wrote his first song. He got his first guitar in 1943 and soon started playing

FOUR QUALITY ARTISTS INTO FORUM



and singing at jamborees or whenever he got the chance. This led to a talent contest and first prize. His next big step was an appearance on TV at station CKCW with much success.

Shortly after this with a desire to become a professional country singer and a lot of determination he headed for Toronto. This turned out to be a good move that eventually led to his first recording contract. He was so successful at the "Horseshoe Tavern" that he stayed there for eleven months. He appeared on a show at "Massey Hall" and received eight encores for the Jimmy Rodgers classic "Mule Skinner Blues". He was successful wherever he appeared and gathered many fans during this time.

All this success made Roberts well known as a top country music singer. In 1965 he signed a contract with Market Productions who in turn leased the master tapes to Apex Records resulting in his first LP. Several songs were chart successes such as "The Sound That Makes Me Blue", "Will You Miss Me While I'm Gone", "The Working Man", "The Dum Dum Song" and his number one hit "The Alcan Run". This LP did indeed prove to be a winner with good quality, good country songs and the "Roberts" touch.

Roberts disappeared for a short time, from the turntables, but he remained a part of the country music scene touring Ontario and Quebec plus writing many songs. He is now making a comeback with a new recording contract, a new single and LP plus a new "Bud Roberts".

On September 7th 1971, Roberts signed a long term recording contract with Jury Krytiuk of Boot Records. Boot records has world wide distribution and unlimited promotion for their artists. Soon after the signing of this contract Bud went to the R.C.A. studios in Toronto for a recording session. This resulted in a new single with distribution in the U.S.A. and Canada. The "A" side is a Bud Roberts composition "I've Got The Bottle". The "B" side is a tune written by Jimmy Simpson "The Longest Run", Jimmy also wrote Bud's number one hit "The Alcan Run". This was released on November 15th along with his new LP "This is Bud Roberts" -Boot -BCS 7105. On this LP are several Roberts' tunes including "Broken Hearted Love, Affair" and "I Can't Win". Also included are two songs from the pen of Bud's friend Tom Connors "Benny The Bum" and "The Flyin' C.P.R."

Also due for release in January is another single containing two more songs with the "Roberts" touch.





ALLAN J. RYAN WANTS YOU TO KNOW HIM

By WILDER G. PENFIELD III

The singer-songwriter is having a hard time. Small parts of his potential audience know one aspect or another of him. Regular viewers of CTV's public affairs magazine, W5, may remember his flip political songsatire. Some people, especially those influenced by the Cancer Society recently, may know his latest single, "True Fine Virginia", the anti-smoking song they have adopted, (and more will know the flip, "Be My Friend"). Many religious leaders are probably aware of his spiritual views.

But Ryan's only album so far, "For You To Know Me", did not find him many new friends. For all its potential appeal, it was difficult to categorize and received little airplay. Mostly it was the people in Toronto who already knew him who bought it. Even so, it did not get much beneath his surface.

Recently he has changed tack. Now at 26 he is making friends by means of a two-part concert, a series of musical snapshots of his family, of his schooling as a commercial artist, of the events big and small in his life. After almost three hours of music, his audiences have been leaving with a satisfying and remarkably complete self-portrait.

This should not suggest that Ryan is following the current vogue for gloomy introspection; he is too good an entertainer for that.

'Entertainer' is probably his best label. He has a good middle-of-the-road ballad voice, a folk guitar strum, rock mannerisms, and head-shop interim monologues.

Moreover he still has the layer of jazz feeling given by bassist Bill Prosser, and now has formed a trio by adding Don Horsburgh, a splendid pianist with a

classical background and contemporary musical wit, currently studying conducting in Montreal.

In small ways, the new approach has been a help. For two weeks this past Fall, for example, Ryan was exposing himself on the stage of Grumbles' coffee house, and the place was filled nightly with musical voyeurs.

Nonetheless, only two gigs have yet been confirmed for next year: a concert at the University of Toronto's Convocation Hall on January 14, and one the next evening



at Bishop's University (where last year he got an excellent reception warming up for Fleetwood Mac.)

A number of people who are concerned about his widespread anonymity have suggested that Ryan's best move now would be to make a live recording of the highlights of his current show. Just this past week, indeed, the rumor was circulating that such plans had already been made.

And why not? Columbia has already

picked up his option for a third album without yet making any definite plans for his second. Besides, Columbia people who were previously aware only that Ryan was a talented composer, became convinced by his shows at Grumbles that he had considerable strength as a performer.

But they deny the rumor as a remote possibility, of a size, as John Williams (who does the Canadian talent thing for Columbia) put it, comparable to "looking at the head of a needle from a thousand yards away".

They are not sure what the best route is, but their hope is to "leapfrog Ryan to success" through hit singles. In the wings for a January release are two sides, "Leaping Lily" and "Maureen", which the execs speak of with guarded optimism.

If one of them does click, people will at least know Allan J. Ryan's name.

GAMMA'S INSTANT RALSTON RELEASED ON U.S. SCEPTER



The deck was recorded at Thunder Sound Studios in Toronto under the direction of Lazare. Flip side of the deck is "Rock and Mole".


RECORD PRODUCTION UP IN OCTOBER



Groups showcased on "Up Tight" over the past three years include: Lighthouse, Sea Dog, Thecycle, Everyday People, The Bells, Stampeders, Fludd, Tapestry, Pagliaro, Joey Gregorash, Wool, Eric Mercury and Paul Clinch.

The Programmers OF THE WEEK

"What is the nature of content you expect from your air personalities?"

Gary Summers-CKOC Hamilton

Management at CKOC demands our jocks to be tight in format yet well informed about the city and the world we live in. The last thing we want to be is a "juke box". A good jock can express himself and show his interesting personality in making every word count, while holding the length of his comment to ten seconds or less.

In the biggest of American markets a contemporary station can win, with 12% of the metro market, while in most Canadian cities, a 12% would leave you as an "also ran". In the July BBM (last figures available) 926,000 people each week listened to the three Hamilton AM stations and one FM station. CKOC had more than 33% of this total at 309,000. We didn't do it by being a "juke box".

J. Robert Wood-CHUM Toronto

Our jocks try to relate to what our audience is doing, feeling, thinking, or aware of according to the time of day, week, or season. Generally speaking, they try to project

awareness of what is going on in the audience's immediate environment.

Chuck Chandler-CFRW Winnipeg

We desire brevity in the jock's material. It should include topical bits concerning news stories - not just jokes which sound like they're being read on the air. Try to keep everything within 15 second time limit.

Ken Singer-CKCK Regina

Jocks content should include crossplug of contests as well as reading one-liners. Any bit or humour should be related to entertainment, sports events, crossplug jocks. We try to discourage joke bits, unless jock is naturally funny.

George Johns-CFRA Ottawa

In the way of content, CFRA stresses heavily topicallity. Our jocks are aware and relate what is happening in the city at that particular time. All remarks must be related in some way to the city, current events, other personalities, or the music.

Bob Robertson-CKXL Calgary

Within the bounds of format I expect all personalities to be constantly aware of what's happening in their community, in their country, and the world. And to show indications of this on the air, whether it's done in humourous vein, or just well-said it's got to be there.

Jerry Stevens-CHLO St. Thomas

A good air personality must understand his station's objectives, what it is trying to ac-

complish. He must be completely aware of what's happening musically, if he is to present it effectively. He must understand who he is trying to reach when he's on, and what topical information he can inject into his show which can relate best to the majority of his audience.

Wayne Bryant-CHED Edmonton

We expect a professional attitude towards being involved in community and relating it to the listener. Above all, being No. 1 is the most important.

Roy Hennessy-CKLG Vancouver

We require at least one hour preparation per show; to be up-to-date on current events — day by day. Some guys do humourous bits - subscribe to services. Keep up to date on industry developments. Up to date on format, including jock crossplugs - format runs on hourly clock.

John Mackey-CKGM Montreal

We expect total awareness. Awareness of available audience at that time of day and what they are doing, awareness of the weather, local events, music, environment, sports and news and items of interest. We expect our jocks to communicate this awareness creatively, within the structure of the format. The ability to sound exciting and aware, separates the pros from the amateurs.

Alden Diehl-CKLW Windsor

Jock's content consists of crisp, concise execution of format and constant good




BBM RATINGS BUOYANT

The figures for B.B.M. survey for November have been released. This is a market by market indication how each of the stations fared in nine of the country's biggest cities.

It is important to note that this is merely a small portion of the total survey. The following figures represent the total cumulative audience; Monday to Friday; 5 am - 1 am and for the total coverage area of the station. Therefore, a station might be number one in the city where it is situated, yet not have the audience of another station because of signal limitations. There is no demographic breakdown giving an indication as to the number of men, women, teens, who make up the audience. In subsequent issues we hope to provide a different market break-down each week, making this information available. However, from the following figures (B.B.M. Survey November 71) one can get a good picture of each radio station's total audience.







I expect my jocks to prepare consistently - humour, current event comments, and music tie-ins - the key word is "consistently". Honesty in execution of format is another high priority we look for. Doing the two things of preparation and format execution will make an average jock an asset to any station. Another quality we don't really expect, but appreciate, is a jocks getting involved in outside community promotions, also making an effort to develop and build knowledge in other station areas, such as sales, news, production.




