

### Jewish Region Plans Second Group Meeting

#### Convention Set For Sunday, June 13, At Young Israel Home, Jamaica

Plans for the second regional convention of Long Island Congregations, arranged by the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, were completed at a luncheon meeting of active leaders of the region, which was held recently and which was attended by the regional president and executive director, William Weiss and Rabbi Max J. Wohlger, respectively.

The convention, which has definitely been set for Sunday, June 13, will be held at the Jamaica Young Israel Building. It is also planned to have special sessions dealing with the significance of the Union's work preached from various pulpits of the synagogues on the Sabbath preceding the sessions.

Details of the program and other arrangements for the all-day meeting will be decided upon by a special convention committee which will gather at the home of Mr. Jacob M. Marcuson, 1 Beach 15th street, Far Rockaway, on Tuesday evening, April 27th. All orthodox congregations in Long Island have been asked to appoint two delegates each to serve on the convention committee.

Rabbis and synagogue presidents of Astoria, Arverne, Babylon, Cedarhurst, Corona, Edgewater, Jackson Heights, Lawrence, Maspeth, Middle Village, Richmond Hill, Ridgewood, the Rockaways, South Ozone Park and other Long Island Communities are cooperating in planning the national convention in planning the convention. Sol Rashin, vice-president of the Long Island region and member of the Administrative Council of the Union, is in active charge of preparations for the convention, with the assistance of Rabbi Samuel Berliant of Jackson Heights and Cordelia A. Stern of Richmond Hill.

### Negroes To Aid Boy Scout Drive

#### Participation Committee Has Goal Of \$750

Formation of a Borough-wide Negro participation committee to raise funds in the campaign now being conducted by Queens Council, Boy Scouts of America, was announced today by Supreme Court Justice Victor M. Daly, general chairman.

The chairman of the Negro participation committee is Walter Reifer, Negro Democratic leader in Corona. He announced that Dr. F. B. Pettis of Corona and Edmund Letwitz of Jamaica will work on the committee as vice-chairmen. Committees are now being built among the Negroes in those sections of Queens where Negro Boy Scout troops exist.

Four Negro troops are affiliated with Queens Council, according to City Court Justice Charles W. Frossell. They are located in Corona, Jamaica, Far Rockaway and Flushing. Other Negro troops are in prospect in the near future, according to Justice Frossell.

Chairman Reifer declared today that his committee has accepted a Borough-wide quota of \$750 as its share of the campaign now being waged to raise \$27,500 to guarantee a continuance of the activities of Queens Council.

"We expect to reach our goal," said Chairman Reifer today. "Scouting is proving of tremendous benefit to Negro boys in Queens who have been and are affiliated with the various troops. It is the sort of good citizenship movement that appeals to boys of all races and conditions in life, because of its training in good Americanism and preparation for substantial citizenship. Our Negro participation committee is glad to be working shoulder to shoulder with other committees and community organizations in furtherance of the movement to secure the money necessary to guarantee a continuance of the activities of Queens Council."

### Warn Children Of Tuberculosis

#### Dr. H. C. Reisman Addresses Workers

More children die from tuberculosis than from any other communicable disease, said Dr. Henry C. Reisman, addressing a group of nurses, teachers and social workers today at the second in the series of tuberculosis lectures sponsored by the Health Education Section of the Queensboro Tuberculosis and Health Association, meeting at the Medical Society Building, Forest Hills.

Dr. Reisman also stated that more than 75 per cent of tuberculosis infections occurring in children are directly traceable to an adult member of the family who has the disease. It is almost impossible for children to escape being infected if they live in close contact with an adult suffering from an "open" case of tuberculosis. All children who have been exposed to tuberculosis should be examined by means of the tuberculin test and if the reaction is positive an X-ray of the lungs should be taken.

### LaGuardia Heads Speakers Marking Subway Opening

#### Ceremonies Planned Saturday Celebrating Hillside Avenue Extension

Mayor LaGuardia heads the list of speakers at the luncheon at the Franklin Hotel, Jamaica, Saturday, marking the opening of the Hillside avenue extension of the Queens boulevard subway from Kew Gardens to 160th street, Jamaica.

Other speakers include Borough President George U. Harvey, Aldermanic President William F. Brunner, John H. Delaney, chairman of the Board of Transportation; Frank X. Sullivan, Queens member of the board, and Frederick A. Macnutt, president of the Queensborough Chamber of Commerce. Thomas F. Malone, president of the Jamaica Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the Jamaica Subway Celebration Committee, will act as toastmaster.

The luncheon will follow the formal inspection of the extended route and the ribbon-cutting ceremony at the Parsons boulevard station, Jamaica. A parade along Hillside avenue in which more than 20,000 persons will take part will follow the luncheon. Mayor LaGuardia will lead the parade at Hillside avenue and 130th street and march as far as the reviewing stand in front of the Vocational High School between 102nd and 103rd streets, Jamaica. The mayor's speech from the reviewing stand will be broadcast by Station WNYC. He and other members of the official party will remain there to review the parade, which will proceed as far as 170th street and disband.

Military, veteran, civic, political, business, social, fraternal and youth groups will comprise the 16 divisions in the line of march. Floats will be featured in the parade.

#### Principal Roberts Tells Of War Letters

With an assembly yesterday, the peace program in Newtown High School, rose to a culmination. The peace program offered at Newtown consisted of the reading of a peace theme written by Sidney S. Alfred S. Roberts, principal of Newtown, gave a very invigorating talk on war. Mr. Roberts emphasized the fact that war is not noble unless the persons fighting are fighting for a great and honorable cause. Stating that he had read all of the letters exchanged between countries before the World War, he condemned them as trivial and containing much trickery.

There was a brief diversion during the peace assembly when a group from the girl's health education department in Newtown gave some of their dances on the stage. The orchestra was under the direction of Mr. Fisher and the Choir under the direction of Miss Behrens, a teacher in the Music Department.

There were many programs given throughout the school on the subject of Peace. This year's Year Book, published by the Senior Class of June, 1937, will have their theme centered around Peace. The newly formed Poster Club of Newtown has made arrangements with the Women's International League of Freedom and Peace, whereby the League has offered prizes ranging from a first of 15 dollars down to a low one of three dollars. These prizes will be offered to those in the Poster Club submitting the best posters on peace. The posters must have slogans and be on cardboard (30x20) and painted in bright colors.
