

### WTA FINALS - A BRIEF HISTORY

- This is the 51st staging of the event (which began in 1972). This year marks the first time the city of Fort Worth
  will host the WTA Finals. Prior to Fort Worth, the event was staged in Guadalajara in 2021, Shenzhen in 2019 and
  Singapore from 2014-2018. Fort Worth is the 12th different city to host the year-end event
- This year the names for each group will pay tribute to four prominent Americans who made their mark at the WTA
  Finals in the Tour's formative years Hall of Famers Tracy Austin and Nancy Richey (singles), and Rosie Casals
  and Pam Shriver (doubles).
- The singles event features eight players and begins as a round robin event, with four players in each group. Over the first six days of competition, each player meets the other three players in her group, with the top two in each pool moving on to the semifinals. Each of the group winners meets the runner-up in the other group in the semifinals. The winners of each semifinal meet in the championship match
- The current round robin format was re-introduced in 2003 for the first time since 1982
- Twelve players have advanced to the final on their WTA Finals debut; only Serena Williams (2001), Maria Sharapova (2004), Petra Kvitova (2011), Dominika Cibulkova (2016) and Ashleigh Barty (2019) won the title on their debut. Those other players who reached the final on their debut are: Tracy Austin (1979 R-Up), Andrea Jaeger (1981 R-Up), Lindsay Davenport (1994 R-Up), Martina Hingis (1996 R-Up), Simona Halep (2014 R-Up), Sloane Stephens (2018 R-Up) and Anett Kontaveit (2021 R-Up)
- The longest Finals win streak was compiled by Navratilova, who won 21 straight matches in winning five titles between 1983 and 1986 and reaching the quarterfinals in 1987. The next longest win streak in tournament history is S.Williams, who won 16 in a row (2009, 2012, 2013 and 2014)
- Between 1984 and 1998, a best-of-five sets final was used to decide the Finals final; three finals went the distance: 1990 Seles vs. Gabriela Sabatini (the first woman's match in 89 years to extend to five sets since the 1901 Philadelphia Finals); 1995 Steffi Graf vs. Anke Huber; 1996 Graf vs. Hingis. Six finals went to four sets (1986 March, 1987, 1989, 1991, 1993 and 1998)
- Nine times has a Finals winner has not dropped a set en route to the title; Evert achieved the feat three times (1972-73, 1975) and Navratilova (1984-85) and S.Williams (2001, 2012) did it twice; Sabatini did not drop a set in 1988, while Clijsters did the same in 2002
- There have been 24 different winners in 50 stagings; of those 24 winners, 17 have been former world No.1's, only exceptions were Sylvia Hanika (1982), Gabriela Sabatini (1988, 1994), Jana Novotna (1997), Petra Kvitova (2011), Agnieszka Radwanska (2015), Dominika Cibulkova (2016) and Elina Svitolina (2018)
- The top seed has won the title 23 times, most recently Ashleigh Barty in 2019
- Players from 15 different nations have won: USA (18), GER (6), BEL (5), CZE (4), YUG (3), ARG (2), AUS (3), SUI (2), DEN (1), ESP (1), FRA (1), POL (1), RUS (1), SVK (1) and UKR (1)

# 2022 WTA FINALS AMASSADORS: THE LEGENDS, THE LEGACY

Between them, they won 12 of the first 16 editions of the WTA Finals. Hall of Famers, rivals and friends, two of the sport's great icons – **Chris Evert** and **Martina Navratilova** – will serve as Legend Ambassadors in Fort Worth, joining forces to promote the game through a series of community engagement, sponsor and media initiatives.

The WTA Finals started out as the Virginia Slims Championships, the climactic event of the fledgling Virginia Slims Circuit spearheaded by the trailblazing promoter Gladys Heldman. Although the tournament's first staging pre-dates the formation of the WTA itself – by Billie Jean King in 1973 – the competition's significance and prestige was clear from the start.

For the first staging in 1972, players accumulated qualifying points at 21 Slims events across the United States – the Grand Slams and other traditional 'Grand Prix' tournaments were not part of calculations – and the \$100,000 prize money purse marked an exciting new record for women's tennis. Heldman even contributed \$20,000 of her own money to ensure the purse would hit the magic six-figure mark.

A 17-year-old Evert, seeded No.4, defeated top seed King in the semifinals and then sixth seed Kerry Melville in the final – but due to her amateur status was unable to take home the unprecedented personal paycheck of \$25,000.

In 1972, only Wimbledon and the US Open offered more prize money but spread across much bigger fields – \$25,000 was four times the amount King received for winning at the All-England Club, and 2.5 times the size of her payout for her triumph at Flushing Meadows.

In the years that followed, the event survived circuit restructures and date changes to become the spectacle players and fans enjoy today.

#### **Group Names Honor American Greats**

As part of commemorations for the 50th anniversary of the WTA Finals, the round-robin group names for both singles and doubles will pay tribute to four prominent Americans who made their mark at the event in the Tour's formative years – Hall of Famers Rosie Casals, Nancy Richey, Tracy Austin and Pam Shriver.


#### <u>Singles</u>

#### **Tracy Austin Group**

Among her 30 career singles titles, **Tracy Austin** won the WTA Finals at New York's Madison Square Garden in 1980, defeating Navratilova for a victory that secured her the WTA World No.1 ranking for the first time (she had been runner-up to Navratilova the previous year). At Portland, Oregon in 1977, Austin became the first player to win a WTA title on her singles debut and the youngest-ever singles champion (14 years, 28 days). In 1979, she became the youngest US Open champion (16 years, 9 months), defeating Evert in the final, and she went on to capture the title again in 1981 with a win over Navratilova. She also won the mixed doubles title with her brother John at Wimbledon in 1980.

#### **Nancy Richey Group**

Former World No.2 and Texas native **Nancy Richey** reached six Grand Slam singles finals during her storied career, capturing the first major of the Open Era at Roland Garros in 1968 to add to her win at the Australian Championships the previous year. Among her 69 career singles titles she won the US Women's Clay Court Championships a record six consecutive years and her other notable results included runner-up to Evert at the second staging of the WTA Finals in 1973. A four-time Grand Slam doubles champion from six finals, she is a member of the Original 9 founders of women's professional tennis who competed at the groundbreaking first Virginia Slims event organized by promoter Gladys Heldman at the Houston Racquet Club in September, 1970.

#### **Doubles**

#### **Rosie Casals Group**

Among her 11 career singles titles, Original 9 trailblazer **Rosie Casals** won the event that truly launched women's professional tennis: the Virginia Slims Invitation at the Houston Racquet Club in September, 1970. Rising as high as No.3 in singles, she was a finalist at the US Open on two occasions, falling to Court in 1970 and to Billie Jean King in 1971. Her haul of 112 doubles titles, including five Wimbledon crowns with King among nine Slam wins, ranks second only to Navratilova; she also won three mixed doubles majors. Casals won the first two editions of doubles competition at the WTA Finals, with Margaret Court in 1973 and King in 1974.

#### **Pam Shriver Group**

**Pam Shriver** announced herself onto the world stage at the age of 16 by reaching the final of the 1978 US Open, where it took Evert to stop her. She went on to win 21 WTA singles titles and reach a career high ranking of No.3, while also building a legendary doubles career: 106 titles, including 21 Grand Slams (plus one mixed) and an Olympic gold medal with Zina Garrison at Seoul in 1988. Her formidable partnership with Navratilova led to the WTA World No.1 ranking and yielded no fewer than 79 titles, including 10 at the WTA Finals, and a calendar year Grand Slam sweep in 1984.

### **DOUBLES QUALIFIERS**

The doubles event at the WTA Finals features eight teams in a round robin format. The qualifiers below will be split into the Rosie Casals and Pam Shriver groups, with the winners and runners-up advancing to the semifinals next Sunday:

- Barbora Krejcikova & Katerina Siniakova the defending champions have played together sparingly this year, saving their best tennis for the biggest stages. In January, they edged out the surprise package of Danilina and Haddad Maia to win their first Australian Open, following this with more major glory, at first Wimbledon and then the US Open. Success in New York saw them become the first team since Errani and Vinci in 2014 to complete the career doubles Slam
- **Gabriela Dabrowski & Giuliana Olmos –** after a slow start to their partnership, they built momentum in the spring with a semifinal at Indian Wells and then a title in Madrid. Another final appearance followed in Rome before a consistent North American hard-court swing and victory at Tokyo last month
- Coco Gauff & Jessica Pegula it did not take long for the duo to strike up a winning relationship, capturing the
  trophy in only their second event at Doha. They reunited during the clay-court swing, highlighted by a runner-up
  finish at Roland-Garros. Two more titles followed in the second half of the season, success in Toronto and San
  Diego seeing them become the first pairing to qualify for both singles and doubles at the WTA Finals since 2009
- Veronika Kudermetova & Elise Mertens the foundations for their qualification were laid in the early months of
  the season, a semifinal at the Australian Open and title in Dubai helping them win 11 of their first 12 matches.
  This consistency continued for the remainder of the campaign, which brought three more finals, at Doha, Miami
  and 's-Hertogenbosch
- Lyudmyla Kichenok & Jelena Ostapenko their journey to the WTA Finals was characterized by consistency, with 33 wins compiled across 16 tournaments together. They collected two titles, at Birmingham and Cincinnati, and reached the semifinals or better on a further five occasions, including at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon
- Xu Yifan & Yang Zhaoxuan the highlights of their year both came on American soil, with titles at Indian Wells
  in March and San Jose in the summer. There was success elsewhere, with three more semifinals and a run to the
  last eight at Roland-Garros
- Anna Danilina & Beatriz Haddad Maia the tone for the season was set Down Under, with a surprise title in Sydney followed by an even more unexpected run to the final at the Australian Open. While they were unable to replicate this form on either clay or grass, a strong end to the campaign saw the last place in Fort Worth secured when they advanced to the final at Guadalajara
- Desirae Krawczyk & Demi Schuurs despite not teaming up until the spring, they quickly found their groove, winning in Stuttgart and reaching the final at Madrid. As the season progressed, they continued to reach the latter stages of tournaments on a regular basis, highlighted by a US Open quarterfinal, to help secure one of the last remaining spots in Fort Worth

### **ABOUT THE ROUND ROBIN FORMAT**

- In 2003 the current round robin format feeding into a four-player single-elimination draw returned to the WTA Finals for the first time since 1982
- The Top 2 finishers in each group will advance to the semifinals where the top player in each group, will play against the other group's runner-up
- There have been 22 instances where a player has posted a perfect 3-0 record in round robin play, most recently 2019 finalist Elina Svitolina
- Only eight times though has a player posted a 3-0 record and gone on to win the title, including in four of the last 10 Finals (Kvitova in 2011, S.Williams in 2012 and 2013 and Svitolina in 2018)
- Meanwhile only six times has a player posted a 3-0 round robin record and failed to reach the final, most recently in 2015 (both Sharapova and Muguruza)

### **ROUND ROBIN TIE-BREAKING METHODS**


Since 2003, a semifinalist has been decided by the round-robin tie-break method nine times (2003, 2004, 2009, 2011, 2013, twice in 2015, 2016 and 2021). The final standings of each group shall be determined by the following:

- 1) Greatest number of wins
- 2) Greatest number of matches played; or
- 3) Head-to-head results if only two (2) players are tied, or if three (3) players are tied then:
  - a. If three (3) players each have the same number of wins, a player having played less than all three (3) matches is automatically eliminated and the player advancing to the single elimination competition is the winner of the match-up of the two remaining tied players; or
  - b. Highest percentage of sets won; or
  - c. Highest percentage of games won

If the above tie-breaking methods produce one (1) superior player (1st place) or one inferior player (3rd place), and the two (2) remaining players are tied, the tie between those two (2) players shall be broken by head-to-head record.


#### **MOST FINALS APPEARANCES – ACTIVE PLAYERS**

Gauff is the first teenager to contest the tournament since Bianca Andreescu in 2019 (19 years, 140 days) and the youngest since Maria Sharapova reached the semifinals in 2005 (18 years, 208 days). 



### 2022 - A SNAPSHOT OF THE WTA YEAR

- Thirty-five different players have won a WTA singles title this year
- **Iga Swiatek** leads the way in terms of singles titles won, with eight to her name (Doha, Indian Wells, Miami, Stuttgart, Rome, Roland-Garros, US Open, San Diego), followed by **Caroline Garcia** (Bad Homburg, Warsaw, Cincinnati) and **Liudmila Samsonova** on three (Washington DC, Cleveland, Tokyo), while eight players have two
- The WTA has crowned eight first-time title winners in 2022: **Anastasia Potapova** (Istanbul), **Martina Trevisan** (Rabat), **Beatriz Haddad Maia** (Nottingham), **Bernarda Pera** (Budapest), **Marie Bouzkova** (Prague), **Linda Fruhvirtova** (Chennai), **Mayar Sherif** (Parma) and **Anna Blinkova** (Cluj-Napoca)
- Liudmila Samsonova has produced the most efficient title run, dropping 18 games at Cleveland
- Two players in 2022 have completed a singles-doubles title sweep at the same event **Ashleigh Barty** at Adelaide (partnering Storm Sanders) and **Beatriz Haddad Maia** at Nottingham (partnering Zhang Shuai)
- The youngest title winner this season is **Linda Fruhvirtova** at Chennai (17 years, 141 days) and the oldest is **Tatjana Maria** at Bogotá (34 years, 245 days)
- **Tatjana Maria** is also the lowest-ranked title winner in 2022, having been ranked No.237 when she triumphed in Bogotá
- Five qualifiers have won a WTA title this season, Tatjana Maria (Bogotá), Anastasia Potapova (Istanbul),
   Bernarda Pera (Budapest), Caroline Garcia (Cincinnati) and Anna Blinkova (Cluj-Napoca)
- The top seed has prevailed at nine events in 2022, while 20 unseeded players have captured a title
- In the longest match in terms of time spent on court, **Sara Sorribest Tormo** took 3 hours and 54 minutes to defeat **Camila Osorio** in the first round at Cleveland
- Twenty-one singles championship matches have been decided in three-sets in 2022
- **Katerina Siniakova** claimed the most doubles titles this year with six (Australian Open, Wimbledon and US Open all w/Barbora Krejcikova, Melbourne Summer Set w/Bernarda Pera, Berlin w/Storm Sanders and Monastir w/Kristina Mladenovic)
- **Iga Swiatek** owns the longest unbeaten streak in 2022, winning 37 matches on the spin from February to June. This included title runs at Doha, Indian Wells, Miami, Stuttgart, Rome and Roland-Garros
- Entering the WTA Finals, Iga Swiatek owns the most Top-10 wins with 12
- **Iga Swiatek** also leads the Tour for most match wins this season, with 64 (including two in the Billie Jean King Cup), followed by **Ons Jabeur** on 46 and **Jessica Pegula** on 41
- Five players have made their Top-10 debuts in 2022: **Danielle Collins** (January 31), **Jessica Pegula** (June 6), **Emma Raducanu** (July 11), **Coco Gauff** (September 12) and **Veronika Kudermetova** (October 24)
- Elena Rybakina has hit the most aces this year with 370, followed closely by Caroline Garcia on 369
