Born January 12, 1844, in Guilford, Conn. Died January 16, 1941, in Cornwall, Conn.

Academy 1866-67, attended Yale Divinity School 1867-68, 1869-70 (BD 1870), and Andover Theological Seminary 1868-69; home missionary in the West 1870-71, ordained in Congregational church, Waseca, Minn., March 20, 1871, and minister there 1871-75, minister Wethersfield Avenue Church, Hartford, Conn, 1876-80, Northfield, Conn., 1881-87, and First Congregational Church, Cornwall, 1888 until retirement 1915; superintendent of the Sunday School 1891–1904 and 1921–23; author A Catechetical Introduction to the Pentateuch (1881), A General Introduction to the Holy Scriptures, An Introduction to the Sunday School Lessons (1886), and A History of Cornwall, Connecticut . . . (1926), editor: Parish Papers of the Northfield Congregational Church (1882-87), supplied notes for Diary of Ebenezer Dibble (1903), president Cornwall Water Company 1915-30 and Village Improvement Society, treasurer and member executive committee Cornwall Library 1888–1913; member Cornwall Library Association 1888– 1935 (president 1913-35), trustee Housatonic Valley Institute 1907-30, chairman school board for many years, moderator of town meeting, president Cornwall University Club and Cornwall Law and Order League; vice-president Litchfield County University Club

Married January 12, 1878, in Hartford, Emily Amelia, daughter of Charles Jackson and Martha Delia (Winship) Shew Children Charles

Mr Starr was the last surviving member of his Class. Since February 8, 1940, he had enjoyed the distinction of being the oldest living graduate of Yale.

Married September 24, 1879, in Greenport, NY, Louise Parish, daughter of Samuel Hicks and Maria Louisa (Parish) Townsend Children: Mabel Townsend (died December 13, 1880), Marie Louise Townsend (B.A Vassar 1906), and Gertrude Townsend (Washington Coll of Music 1911–13). Attended Berkeley Divinity School 1869–70 and 1871–72 (graduate 1872), tutor in Latin and Greek Yale University 1870-71, ordained deacon in Episcopal church 1872 and priest 1873, assistant minister St Andrew's Church, Meriden, Conn, 1872-73, minister Christ Church, Rye, NY, 1873-82, Christ Church, Detroit, Mich, 1882-85, Grace Church, Baltimore, Md., 1885–88, and Grace Church, Brooklyn Heights, NY., 1888-97 (president standing committee Diocese of Long Island 1896–97), bishop coadjutor Diocese of Connecticut 1897–99, bishop of Connecticut 1899 until retirement 1928; author The Key of Life (1894), Aspects of Revelation (1901), The Catholic Ideal of the Church (1905), and The Kingdom of God and American Life (1912), D D Trinity College 1897, Yale 1898, and Wesleyan 1903, clerical deputy at general convention of Episcopal church 1883, 1892, and 1895, honorary president Anglo-Catholic Congress 1925, honorary vice-president Connecticut Humane Society 1899–1941, honorary elder Connecticut branch Society of Mayflower Descendants; trustee Berkeley Divinity School 1899–1941 (president of the board 1899–1928) and Trinity College 1899–1931 (member advisory board 1931–41), associate fellow Berkeley College 1933–41; member Monday Evening Club 1898–1941, Society of Colonial Wars, and Society of the Cincinnati.

Attended Yale Divinity School 1871–74 (B D 1874); ordained in Congregational church, Bridgeport, Conn, September 6, 1874, and minister there 1874–81, minister North Manchester, Conn, 1881–86, Palmer, Mass, 1886–92, and Somersworth, N H, 1892–93; secretary International Christian Workers' Association 1893–96, Connecticut Home Missionary Society 1896–99, and Northfield extension movement 1899–1907, superintendent of men Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, 1907–15 and financial secretary 1915–20, retired from active work in 1920 because of failing eyesight and devoted himself to literary work; author What Every Christian Needs to Know (1904), II Timothy 2 15; A Course of Study in Personal Work (1910), Songs from Sightless Land (1927), and many religious leaflets and tracts, in recent years resided in St.

David Schley Schaff, B.A. 1873.

Born October 17, 1852, in Mercersburg, Pa. Died March 2, 1941, at Winter Park, Fla

Father, Rev. Philip Schaff, D.D., LL.D. (attended universities of Tubingen, Halle, and Berlin 1837–40), author and teacher; professor Union Theological Seminary 1870–93, son of Philip and Anna (Schindler) Schaff of Chur Coire, Switzerland Mother, Mary Elizabeth (Schley) Schaff, daughter of David and Anna Mary (Hoke) Schley of Frederick, Md.

Prepared at gymnasium, Kornthal, Germany, and Phillips-Andover; attended New York University 1869–70 Entered Yale College beginning of Sophomore year, in Senior year president of Yale's first football club and coach and member of her first football team, generally regarded as originator of intercollegiate football in America, member Kappa Sigma Epsilon, Delta Beta Xi, Alpha Sigma Phi, and Delta Kappa Epsilon

Attended Union Theological Seminary 1873–76 (diploma 1876), supply minister Lafayette Square Presbyterian Church, Baltimore, 1876; ordained in Presbyterian church 1877, minister Hastings, Nebr, 1877–81, First Presbyterian Church, Kansas City, Mo, 1883–88, and Westminster Church, Jacksonville, Ill, 1890–97, associate editor Schaff-Herzog Encyclopaedia 1881–94; traveled in Europe and the Near East and studied at University of Berlin 1888–89, professor of church history Lane

Theological Seminary 1897-1903; professor of ecclesiastical history and history of doctrine Western Theological Seminary 1903-26; lecturer on church history Union Theological Seminary 1926-27 and on American church history 1927-30, resided in Washington, D.C., 1925-41; author: A Commentary on Acts (1882), The Life of Philip Schaff (1897), History of the Christian Church, Vol V, parts I and II (1907, 1910), John Huss's Treatise on the Church (1914), John Huss . . . (1915), Our Fathers' Faith and Ours (1928), and many articles in religious publications; contributed to: A Select Library of the Nicene and Post-Nicene Fathers of the Christian Church, edited by Philip Schaff; revised his father's edition of Christ in Song. Hymns of Immanuel (1895), D D Illinois College 1891 and universities of Geneva and Prague 1909, moderator Synod of Missouri 1887; represented Presbyterian General Assembly at celebration of 400th anniversary of Calvin's birth (1909), delegate to Tenth Council of Presbyterian Alliance, Aberdeen, 1913, chairman committee appointed by General Assembly to prepare a new catechism 1908–13 and committee to arrange for celebration of 400th anniversary of Protestant Reformation 1917, president American Society of Church History 1916-17, member Covenant-First Presbyterian Church, Washington, D.C.

Teacher at Santa Barbara (Calif.) College 1875-76; broker and real-estate dealer San Francisco and Oakland, 1876-78; in Boston (Mass.) Custom House 1878-79; cattle rancher in Erath County, Texas, 1879-82 and Palo Pinto County 1884-1900; fruit grower in Napa Valley, Calif., 1882-84 and Loma Linda, Calif., 1923 until retirement 1939; member First Presbyterian Church, Redlands.

Married October 3, 1883, in Napa, Martha Elizabeth, daughter of John Dilliard and Sarah Myra (Freeman) Snow Children. Ruth (Drexel Inst. of Technology 1910), the wife of Carl Rossow Steinke (B S. Born July 11, 1854, in Norridgewock, Maine Died January 29, 1941, in San Diego, Calif.

Father, Abiel Abbott, a lawyer in Boston, son of Benjamin and Phebe (Abbot) Abbott of Watertown, Mass. Mother, Sarah Smith (Davis) Abbott; daughter of Nathan Smith and Elizabeth (Cooper) Davis

Traveled abroad 1877–78, studied in his father's office 1878–79; attended Boston University School of Law 1879–82 (LL B 1893), admitted to Massachusetts bar 1882, Michigan bar 1891, and Illinois bar 1892; lawyer in Boston 1882–91, Ann Arbor, Mich., 1891–92, and Chicago 1892–94; Tappan Professor of Law University of Michigan 1891–92, professor of law Northwestern University 1892–94, dean Stanford University Law School 1893–1907; lecturer in law Columbia University 1906–07, professor of law 1907–16, Nash Professor of Law 1916 until retirement 1922; author. A Selection of Authorities on Descent, Wills, and Administration (1894); editor: Brief Making and the Use of Law Books (1906); resided in San Diego 1930–41, interested throughout his life in the study of Greek culture, in recent years he had worked on the manuscript of a book dealing with the genealogy of the Greek gods, member

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FORMS OF BEQUEST

In answer to many inquiries from alumni and friends of the University who plan to remember Yale in their wills, the following forms are suggested:

(GENERAL)

I give and bequeath to Yale University, a corporation existing under and by the virtue of a charter granted by the General Assembly of the Colony and State of Connecticut, and located in the Town of New Haven in said State,

Dollars, to be used (or, the income to be used) for the following purposes.

(Here specify the purposes for which the bequest—or the income therefrom—is to be used)

(It is strongly recommended that a competent lawyer be employed to prepare the will and to supervise its execution in order to comply with all the requirements of the law of the state in which the maker of the will resides. It is also wise to give the University considerable latitude in the use of any fund so that a change of circumstances may not impair the usefulness of the gift. The Treasurer of the University will be glad upon request to review the phrasing of any proposed form of bequest.)
