

## CASA Cairo Fellows

**Andrew Alger** received an M.A. in Middle Eastern Studies from the University of Chicago in 2012, where he was also the recipient of an Academic Year Foreign Languages and Area Studies Fellowship. He is interested in the historical development of public education in the Arab world. After CASA, he hopes to begin a Ph.D. program or teach English in a foreign university.

**Niko Banac** is a Ph.D. candidate in the Dept. of Near Eastern Languages and Cultures at UCLA. He holds a B.A. from the University of Chicago where he also majored in the same field. He studies classical Arabic literature. His primary interest is in classical Arabic literature and aesthetics, as well as hermeneutics and especially its relationship to experience.

**Will Barnes** graduated from the University of Tennessee in 2010 where he studied history. Thereafter, he enrolled in the Qasid Arabic Institute in Amman, Jordan.
