CBC AM/FM READIES 'MAPLE MUSIC' FOR DOMINION DAY

Canadians from coast to coast were front and centre of a CBC AM & FM radio network extravanganza featuring Canadian music and artists to help celebrate our national birthday - July 1st. This first one hour special, entitled "Maple Music - Ahead of the Record" was broadcast at 1:30 PM EDT on the complete network and repeated on CBC-FM, in stereo, the same day at 6:30 PM. The second Special was set for the first part of "The Entertainers" Friday, July 7th at 8:30 PM EDT and rebroadcast on CBC-FM Saturday, July 8th at 12:30 PM.

Both programs came about through the CBC's mapping of a tremedous project that saw them following and taping 21 artists and groups featured on the recently successful Maple Music Junket, as well as interviewing the principals of Maple Music Inc. and several of the 90 European junketeers flown in for the week-long showcasing of Canada's top recording acts. Using a 16-track sound system for the first time through Enactron, the three concerts were recorded under the supervision of Brian Ahern and Engineer Chris Skene, for the CBC. Producer for both shows was CBC's Paul Mills, who wrote the theme for CBC-TV's "This Land" series. Script was by Bill Howell, poet and freelance writer.

The Dominion Day Special was more of a musical documentary which included dressing

INFINITY FAIR TAGGED WINNER FOR VANCOUVER

Infinity Fair, a Green Grass Production, was billed as "Canada's first comprehensive Youth Culture Exhibition, and showcased several Canadian and U.S. recording groups. The Exhibition was held at the Pacific Coliseum from May 31 through June 4th with attendance figures indicating a successful five days.

Kicking off the musical events were Dan Hicks and his Hot Licks followed by Sunshyne, Good Will Store, Poem Company, Wicked Orange, High Country, Johnny Rivers, Stampeders and the finale by Humphrey and the Dumptrucks. High Country is a blue grass group from Marin County near San Francisco. Kinney's West Coast promo rep, Don Boas, tied the visiting Americans in with a Canadian Kinney group, Brave Belt who were also appearing at the Fair, for a strong promotion package with the local press and radio types.

Other acts appearing during the five days included: Cat Mother, Edward Bear, Mainline, Ballin' Jack, Redbone, Stevie Wonder - and The Rolling Stones' show. Groups scheduled to follow were: Teen Angel & The Rockin' Rebels, Rambling Jack Elliott, Eric Burdon & The Animals and Borne's Farm. It's not known how many groups did appear but Boas was there for the Brave Belt concert which he described as "incredible" which, even other than Kinney folk, would appear to agree with. The Winnipeg group is a strong visual unit that scored well with their album and single releases and have a tightly controlled PR and promotion firm managed by the Bachman family.

The Maple Music Junket people obviously made a tremendous step forward in establishing disc/artist working relations with the UK and European press as evidenced by their comments being read by millions of people who had previously tied Canada in with America, insofar as recorded talent was concerned. Michael Cable, pop columnist for the Daily Mail of London, noted that "things are changing in Canada. The apathy toward home-grown pop in Canada, which used to force artists to go outside their own country to make their names, is disappearing quickly".

CAPRICORN MUSIC ALMOST GUTTED BY FIRE

Capricorn Music Associates, a leading booking agency in Toronto, suffered damages in a recent fire in the building that houses their offices at 774½ Young St. The fire started in a second floor office and quickly spread to the stores below which were completely gutted. Fortunately for CMA their damage was confined to a small area containing stationery supplies.

Sammy-Jo, who heads up the agency, will continue working out of the premises and attempt to get the firm in shape for the fall season.

CLAUDIA VALADE RELEASES ON UNITED ARTISTS

Still basking in the warmth of their first Canadian single, United Artists have followed up their release of "Tell Me Who" by Pinky with a single from pretty Quebecer, Claudia Valade. Miss Valade is no stranger to the business having had much success with her version of "Sukiyaki" back in 1963. Since then she has travelled extensively throughout the world sharing bills with Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and Tom Jones.

The young Laurentian-born Miss Valade represented Canada at the Tokyo Music Festival in May of this year where she sang "Pour Un Homme". Her performance won first prize in the foreign song category. She was also honoured with three prizes, including an Award of Merit and the coveted Singers' prize.

In view of the response given to "Pour Un Homme" penned by Francis Lai with lyrics by Catherine Desage, rhythm tracks were recorded in Japan, using Japanese musicians. Miss Valade added the voice tracks at Andre Perry's studios on her return to Montreal. The single is now regarded as a hit in Japan and is to be released in France in July.

Miss Valade has been scheduled for an engagement at Montreal's Man and His World and is also set for a solo concert at New York's Carnegie Hall. She will be appearing on the Johnny Carson Show in September as well as with Don Rickles at the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas.

ROYAL SCOTS RECEIVE DIMANCHE-MATIN HYPE

Pierre Bellemare, promotion manager RCA Quebec, has been successfully touting the single, "Amazing Grace" and the album, "Farewell To The Greys" by the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards throughout the province. Principal and breakout markets have created a whole new and unique market for the releases by this famous UK band. Both the single and album were certified as Canadian Gold (Gold Leaf Award) last week by RCA's national promotion manager, Ed Preston.

A plus to Bellemare's efforts was the May 28 edition of Dimanche-Matin, the leading French Sunday newspaper with a circulation of almost 270,000 where they featured the album prominently along with a review by Christiane Berthiaume. Bellemare reports increased interest by the local Quebec press which should add significantly to the band's sales picture.

CAPITOL ACQUIRES ISLAND LINE

Dave Evans, director of sales and promotion, Capitol Records Canada, has announced the acquisition of the Island records label for distribution in Canada, effective immediately. Debuting first under the new distribution pact will be product by Traffic, White Noise, the Amazing Blondel, Nick Drake, Bronco and Claire Hamill.

Capitol will undertake an extensive marketing programme to push the new line including direct mail promotion to all dealers and key radio personnel. Future plans include radio campaigns, use of trade and consumer press, in-store merchandising displays and extensive promotion at the radio station level.

DICK DAMRON DOING IT UP THE COLUMBIA WAY

Canadian country music has suffered from many enemies over the past few years. Many of these enemies are the artists themselves along with the shoestring operations releasing their product. We have always been regarded as "distant" not "kissin" cousins of our American counterparts - reason being that we have. for the most part, been poor imitators of the U.S. country scene. Along with the phoney accent went the crap releases, many of them U.S. copyrights. Add to this the poor promotion - and you've got a Canada-wide problem. Country jocks were uninformed - or they were harrassed daily to program Canadian country product, just because it was

We haven't advanced very far over the past few years but we have made some progress. Professionalism is becoming more and more evident and much of this is coming from western Canadian country artists - one being Dick Damron.

Damron has been performing and writing and putting out country discs for several years, and gradually building in a confidence that now sees him emerging as one of the most professional folk/country artists in Canada. He has written over 200 songs of which 140 have been recorded. His most successful offering was "Countryfied" which became a hit

for him and another hit for George Hamilton IV when he released it as a single on the RCA label. Besides being the number one country hit in Canada for five weeks the record was released in eight countries and is now being used as the theme for the new UK George Hamilton IV television series. The young Edmonton talent was also awarded the BMI Song Writers' Award for outstanding contribution to Canadian Music in the years 1969 and 1971. On October 30th of last year he received the Province of Alberta Achievement Award as "an Albertan who had attained national recognition in the entertainment field".

Now releasing on the Columbia label, Damron has what early reports indicate as a hit with his self penning of "The Long Green Line". Country stations as well as middle of the roaders are charting and playlisting the single, a combination of power for a record that far outweighs a top 40 (MOT) hit.

Subtle promotion and just plain keeping country radio personalities informed has been a large sized plus for Damron. Breakout markets as well as those regarded as principal are kept abreast of Damron activities which gives country jocks a hook to hang their Canadian content product on, and that means a great deal in any market, particularly a station serving a large metropolitan area like Toronto. CFGM, for instance, one of the most successful country operations in Canada delivers the second largest quarterhour average audience in the 25-49 category


in Canada after CFRB. They're tied for second in the 18-34 group after CHUM and that's among all English AM and FM stations. That's a hell of a large listening audience

ALLEN BOOKING EASTERN TALENT FOR WEST COAST

Bruce Allen, who heads up his own Talent Promotion firm in Vancouver, has had much success in booking groups from east of the Rockies. He has recently concentrated on groups from Upper Canada and in particular, Kinney's Fludd and Thecycle, a Tamarac recording unit.

Fludd, who saw good chart action with their release of "Get Up, Get Out and Move On" as well as with their initial album release for the label, were one of the groups chosen to play the Maple Music Junket at Massey Hall (June 7). They are managed by William Tenn. Kickoff date for their B.C. tour was in Kimberly (June 14) with one-niters following at Armstrong, Kamloops, and Penticton. They played Vancouver's Pharoah's Retreat from June 19 through the 24th. They completed their tour (25) at The Breakers in Pt. Roberts, Washington.

Fludd were followed into B.C. by Thecycle, with dates at The Breakers (June 23-24) followed by Pharoah's from June 26 through July 8. They return to The Breakers for two more evenings (2 and 9) plus another Vancouver date, as yet not confirmed, before returning to Ontario.

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So, assuming there are no real secondary markets that matter to the major broadcasters in Canada, how can a record break out?

Obviously there are a couple of records a year that receive major airplay (meaningful), but if you check carefully, you will find that Canada's majors are really the great number of MOR stations that will program certain aspects of today's music.

Seriously, I would like you to think of the records that have made international inroads. You will find that they mainly broke through the efforts of good MOR programming where the formula isn't such a bugaboo.

Meanwhile, a dozen stations in Canada really call all the shots on hits. In their hands is the future of the entire recording industry in Canada. So a record released must be judged by a dozen music directors, and if they agree to program it to the top of their charts, it will be a winner. If they turn it down, it is a loser, and they do turn down hundreds of records.

The economics of record production in Canada make the development of an industry extremely difficult. If past history is any indication, only MOR-oriented records stand a good chance of receiving meaningful airplay in the Canadian programming system. Groups and producers should keep this in mind.

Recently, someone suggested that if a Canadian record was good enough, there

was nothing to prevent a producer from leasing the master to a U.S. record company and allowing it to be released here as a Canadian content record. In fact this is being done quite often, but there is no reason to think that this is the answer to solving our Canadian problems in Canada. In fact it is a form of cop-out, a Canadian cop-out. True to form, this idea indicates that Canadians still want it done for them. We run around eternally holding our hand out. "Make us a hit". "Make us a music industry." "Give us a culture." These things are not things you can beg or plead for. National pride is something that has to be earned.

How opportune to say that broadcasters are putting the buck ahead of the spirit of the Canadian music content regulation. Is this the case?

One pictures a pep talk in the dressing room before the game, and Pierre Juneau standing with his foot up on the bench saying, "Let's get in there and pitch fellas and show them we can win."

One might even picture Trudeau sending out a note to each broadcaster that reads, "Canada expects every broadcaster too.." Is the Canadian music content ruling working? Not really as well as it could, and it is unfortunate to have to predict that at the beginning of next year the CRTC will make a few adjustments to the ruling to see that what they want to happen happens. These are the sad facts of life that every broadcaster has to live with, and even sadder is the fact that a dozen broadcasters hold the key to making the ruling work.

You say you don't like it? You say you're not satisfied? You say you won't go along with it. The line for reliquishing your licence to make money forms on the left.

JAREMA REPLACES AMANN CAPITOL PROMOTION

Paul Jarema, who has been associated with Capitol in the province of Quebec for the past three years, has been named to replace Jacques Amann who recently resigned to take on a new endeavour in Los Angeles.

Jarema moves to the important promotion post while the label is into its heaviest Canadian content release in several years.

CKGM's John MacKay gave the Montreal scene a taste of Edward Bear's "Masquerade" which now sees the single "out front" on the national chart race. A left fielder that Bill Bannon must have been working quietly on is Tommy Graham's "After The Gold Rush" which was penned by Neil Young. Bannon has impressive numbers on some of the big outlets and heavy play on CHML, CFRB, CKX-FM and CHUM-FM which indicates the type of single it is.


Christopher Kearney, who showed well on the recent Anne Murray tour is doing likewise with "Loosen Up", culled from his initial album release for the label. Aarons & Ackley picking up numbers on their "N.F.S." deck which was taken from their new album "You & I" doing considerably better than the single.

Pepper Tree are still hanging in there with "Love Is A Railroad". They had many good

things said about them during their recent tour of the Atlantic Provinces and Ontario Place gig. Fergus is showing indications of going the MOR route with "Here With You" which will be included on his next Capitol album.

Crowbar, after nearly setting fire to Massey Hall with their Maple Music Junket finale, have kept a little of this heat on their "Ask Me No Questions" single which, during its tenure on the national chart, brought much attention to their Gold Leaf Award album, "Larger Than Life". They'll be into their cross-Canada tour shortly.



With these words, one of Canada's leading entertainment writers paid tribute to Ritchie Yorke in an article that occupied two-thirds of the front page of the weekend entertainment section of the Toronto Star. Another plus was a photo 8 by 11 of Yorke in a

typical pose (on the telephone). No one in Canada could have expected more in the way of a hype.



The article outlined many of the projects and promotions that Yorke has carried through. The article showed Yorke to be an "operator". In fact, it showed him to be unique in the business in Canada.

After reading the article, one knowledgeable observer noted, "You can't buy promotion like that, Yorke has done it again".

Being of the same ilk as Miss McDonald (an investigative reporter), I did a great deal of research and background on Yorke and Miss McDonald's article. I fell a little short of Miss M's thoroughness. Another tribute to Yorke was the fact that Miss M. phoned dozens and dozens of people to find out what Yorke's magic was. She spoke to Pierre Juneau, Arnold Gosewich. She phoned all over to get all the goods on Yorke. What resulted was another fruitless, gutless expose (?) of Yorke's enterprises. The story might have been tagged "What Makes Ritchie Run?".

Early reports from Europe indicate that Ritchie has had another runaway success with his Maple Music Junket project.

As a fellow writer (of Miss M and Mr. Y) I can appreciate the amount of flair that has to be part of an article about such a controversial figure as Ritchie. I can also appreciate that Mr. Y. competes as a writer with anyone doing entertainment (even Miss M.) He also wouldn't have many allies on the staff of the Star (in fact he might have made a few enemies with fellow music critics).

Every attempt to discredit Yorke turns out to be just another promotion. His book on the Canadian music industry was reviewed by pop writers all across Canada. The typical attitude at the time seemed to be "I should have written this", by his contempories. The point was that Yorke will go down in history as being the first writer to do a book on the industry.

So what was Yorke's angle in going the Maple Music Junket for nothing? The answer might lie in the Star article, and also the attitude of one outsider who thought that Yorke was typical of the music industry, "He's really a go-getter, isn't he?"





NO ETHNIC TOWER ON CITY ISLAND

Toronto is undoubtedly one of the coldest, most heartless cities in the world. In many ways, old hogtown is the cultural centre of English speaking Canada. Yes, all the theatre's here, the music's all here. Most of it, grati-

fyingly enough, seems to have been imported, but for one reason or another, it all ends up in Toronto.

With this in mind, with most of the artsy, craftsy elite squatting on the shores of Lake Ontario, you might think that Toronto would be a pretty dynamic place. Bright, alive, made for people. You'd be wrong. Vancouver, Montreal, Quebec City, Ottawa, even Victoria with its obvious lack of dynamism, leave hogtown trailing in the dust. Toronto is a city not made for people, but for machines and corporations.

The Toronto nabobs, our slimy little municipal policiticians, have repeatedly sold their souls to corporations and developers. The final straw came last week with the announcement that Metro Council has passed, by a twenty to seven vote, a resolution to allow CHIN radio to build three one hundred and fifty foot broadcasting antennas on the Toronto Islands, CHIN is not really big business, some of our best friends and allies are closely involved in the station, but damn it, I for one am sick and tired of having gutless little yes-men in that half-baked clam shell called city hall selling out my city for me. Toronto would be nothing more than a bad memory for me if it weren't for the fact that the typewriter this is being written on is located in the city, but in the meantime, I plan to be as obnoxious as possible whenever our alleged civic leadership chips another piece off the diminishing part of Toronto which belongs to the people.

The decision, it should be understood, is not final at this point. It still has to be approved by City Council, but if it is, and there is every possibility, CHIN will pay the city of Toronto \$12,000 per year for the lease of the ten acre site. Looking at it simply from a dollars and cents point of view there is something screwy going on. With the exception of Vancouver's West End, the chunk of parkland in question is probably the most expensive land, per acre in this country.

In persuading Metro council to approve the application, the proponents of the Island blight concept pointed out that CHIN's bid for the Island site deserved special consideration in view of the high ethnic contents of the station's programming. The lovelies did not elaborate on what this had to do with locating steel eyesores on Toronto Island. Toronto Island already has enough optical pollution.

Both CKFH and CKEY maintain multiple towers on or near the islands, the City of Toronto has been typically benevolent towards concessionaries and the island park is overrun with gaudy boxes purveying overpriced, poor quality junk food and made-in-Asia trinkets.

The Metro Council vote brings up an interesting question. In 1961, the Council refused CKEY permission to locate their towers on the Island. The station was forced to construct them in Lake Ontario itself, near the Western Gap of Toronto Harbour at a cost of almost half a million

dollars. CKEY has written a letter to Metro Council advising that if CHIN is allowed to build its transmitting towers on the Island that CKEY would expect to recover the additional costs incurred in its being forced to build in the Lake and would expect to have the option to construct towers on the Island in the future. Now there's a beautiful thought for the future, CKEY, CKFH and CHIN all with their ugly steel towers dominating the trees and lagoons.

The thing that really slays me is the argument that CHIN should be allowed the privilege in view of its large ethnic audience. Firstly, sad and unfair as it may be, CHIN's audience is all but non-existent. Secondly, what conceivable bearing does the demographics of the audience have on the location

MAINSTREAM MOVES AHEAD WITH JAZZ LINE

Mainstream Records, distributed in Canada by Ampex, have shown early indications of reviving some of the old jazz masters and indeed bringing attention to brand new material. Forty-five albums and tapes have been released to date carrying a suggested list of \$5.98 and \$7.98 respectively. In the middle of their jazz campaign, Mainstream president Bobby Shad, created a new logo for Mainstream which could cause some confusion in that it is a far departure from the original Mainstream logo. It's expected they will release five albums each month.

Releases include: three albums from Carmen McRae including her "Carmen's Gold", new product from Maynard Ferguson and Sarah Vaughan, the latter is backed by Michel Legrand's musical talents in arrangements and conducting of the orchestra; Mike Longo; and a "Get It Together" set featuring Charles McPherson, Dave Hubbard, Dave and Jay Jay's, Charles Kynard, Johnny Coles, and Charles Williams.

Miss Vaughn has been signed to a long term contract with the label as has Maynard Ferguson. Other signings will be announced in the weeks to come.

Maury Apato, director of national promotion for the New York based Mainstream, spent several days in Toronto with John Driscoll, A&R director for Ampex, outlining a national promotion campaign to cover the new releases. Apato is expected to work closely with Ampex Canada, coordinating promotional activities.

Driscoll reports strong initial sales and radio action from across Canada, particularly with the College radio stations. The label's national sales manager, Clay Killackey, has just returned from a cross-Canada trip and reports the market looking exceptionally good for the new jazz line — from a retailer standpoint.

KANATA READIES MATERICK FOR SINGLE RELEASE

Kanata Records has discovered a powerful "street" voice in Ray Materick, a Hamilton resident, and are now preparing a single release. The label's Bill Kearns took a sample taping of Materick's expected releases to several industry observers, radio and press, and came away convinced that Kanata have a large sized winner.

A Materick album is now being readied but it's expected a single will be released first. It could be "Goodbye", "Season of Plenty" or "Dear Christine" - all Materick self-pennings. One observer noted: "If you don't get off on the voice, listen carefully to the lyrics - Materick shines with words".

Backup musicians for this Thunder produced session include some of Canada's top musicians - Terry Clarke, Don Thompson, Guido Basso and Mike Renzi.

Andy Kim's first single for Uni Records, "Who Has The Answers" has made strong chart moves across Canada resulting in a national breakout. The single qualifies as Canadian content. Kim maintains residence in Montreal from where his brother Joe operates the family PR and promotion company.

Bob Johnson of CFCF initially gave the deck the necessary shot in the arm. Barry Paine, national promo for MCA distributors of the line, reports good airplay now from CJAD and CFOX also of Montreal. The single is receiving strong play from CKLG/Vancouver, CKXL/Calgary, CHED/Edmonton, CKY/Winnipeg, CFRB/Toronto, CKFH/Toronto, CKLW/Windsor, and CHYR/Leamington.

FM FREE-FORMERS BOOSTS BLUE THUMB

With the popularity of FM programming on the increase, record companies have found a more receptive market for much of their "heavier" product. FM free-formers have accounted for a good percentage of this increase. Several AM music of today stations have also experimented with the "progressive sound" and they too are programming more album cuts and finding it does not create "tune out".

Quality Records has found the programming of more album cuts much to their advantage, particularly with their recently acquired Blue Thumb label. Topping the list of best sellers from the label are: "Headkeeper" by Dave Mason; Mark-Almond's "Mark-Almond II" and "Crusader I" by the Crusaders.

Resnik, Corelli, Nilsson, Price, Domingo and many others participated, with some of Opera's most distinguished conductors accompanying them. An excellent item for fans and collectors.

Antal Dorati conducting the Philharmonia Hungarica Stereo Treasury STS 15182/5

No Haydn enthusiast can fail to be delighted with this superbly performed and packaged series of the complete Symphonies. They are newly recorded and are appearing for the first time on London Records' Stereo Treasuries budget line.

The enclosed brochure contains a wealth of authoritative information by H.C. Robbins Landon. Mr. Robbins Landon's newly published edition of the symphonies is used throughout the series. The performances are as full of magic as the works themselves.

BACH AND HANDEL ARIAS

Kathleen Ferrier, Contralto London Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Sir Adrian Booul Ace of Diamonds SDD 2184

A fascinating recording of one of this century's best loved and remembered artists. This was Kathleen Ferrier's last recording — originally released in mono then transferred into stereo by superimposing a new accompaniment on the original monophonic version. London Records are re-issuing their library of Ferrier recordings on their Ace of Diamonds budget line — surely making this Bach-Handel album the bargain of the year. If you love great singing, don't miss it.

Perhaps London Records will try to acquire permission to release a recently discovered BBC tape of a London Promenade Concert at which Ferrier sang the Brahms Four Serious Songs in the orchestral arrangement by Sir Malcolm Sargent.

VIVALDI

The complete Concertos for Lute (Guitar) and Mandolin

Narciso Yepes, Guitar Takashi & Silvia Ochi, Mandolins Orchestre de chambre Paul Kuentz Deutsche Grammophon 2530 211

Did Vivaldi compose four hundred and forty-five concertos? Or did he compose the same concerto four hundred and forty-five times? His two Lute Concertos (here played on the guitar) and three for Mandolins fit comfortably on this beautifully performed and well recorded disc. This should be a winner for relaxed summer listening.

CHOPIN 10 Mazurkas Prelude, Op. 45 Ballade, Op. 23 Scherzo, Op. 31

Arturo Benedetti Michelangeli, Pianist Deutsche Grammophon 2530 236

This is the third in a series of DGG recordings of the great Italian pianist. The first disc released last fall was a Debussy recital (DGG 2530 196) followed by Beethoven's Sonata No. 4 in Eb major, Op. 7. (DGG 2530 197).

An uncompromising artist of spartan integrity, Michelangeli's performances, at once poetic and brilliant, have been flawlessly reproduced on these discs. They are among the most important piano releases in many years.

CHUM-FM PRESENTS NEW MUSIC SERIES

CHUM-FM, one of the leading Toronto stations in giving exposure to Canadian artists, commenced their new program series, "Sunday Night At 11", June 25. The series will present interviews with name recording acts as well as a good sampling of their music.

Kicking off the series were the English group, The Strawbs, who recently released their new A&M album, "Grave New World".

It's expected that Canadian groups attaining hit status will also be featured on this Sunday evening program.

MORE MOVES AT CKGM???

The Montreal Star recently reported that Geoff Stirling, owner of CKGM, recently shook up the station's FM outlet, CHOM, by sacking half the staff including Dave Marsden, now with CHUM-FM. As reported earlier in RPM the FM station has moved up the street on Greene Ave., closer to Sherbooke. Also reported gone is Dave Deloye who shared the news goings on with Cliff Fletcher.

The paper also persists in the rumour that GM's program director is being wooed by a national radio-television corporation. The latter has been kicking around for some time but strong denials are still coming from PD John Mackey.

Jim Montague, newswriter for CKGM, has left on his own hook for CKCW Moncton. Chuck Holliday is apparently doing the midmorning show at GM.

BOB ANCEL JOINS CKCW MONCTON

Part of Jack Schoone's expansion policy for CKCW Moncton was to hire veteran broadcaster, Bob Ancel, to assist Schoone in concentrating on the station's new programming and general policy.

Extensive renovations and additions have just been completed to their Mobile Studio which will be used by all stations of Eastern Broadcasting Co. Ltd. They are also ready to begin round-the-clock broadcasting by mid-July. CKCW has recently made application for a powerful FM stereo, dual polarization outlet, for which they are now awaiting approval from the CRTC.

The station's policy toward community invovement has accomplished much throughout their listening area as well as for station morale. Brian MacKenzie, promotion manager, reports exceptional interest by the locals in the station's involvement in Moncton's annual "City Paint In" campaign. On-air personalities took on the job of painting a mural on the city's "fabulous passionate-pink subway". Also planned is a 20-odd mile "Miles for Millions" march.

The Programmers MAPLE LEAF SYSTEM

There are insufficient submissions to constitute a Maple Leaf System Agenda for Tuesday July 4. The next possible date for an MLS Agenda will be Tuesday July 11.

I must take issue with an editorial comment on Page 17 of the July 1st RPM. Referring to CKGM's departure from the Maple Leaf System, the article said:

"In their notice of withdrawal CKGM noted that they wished to 'contribute to the development of a truly healthy, productive music industry', Apparently the MLS was not fulfiling this function as far as CKGM was concerned."

I think it is grossly unfair to John Mackey, CKGM and the Maple Leaf System to lift a small section of a quote and then tag on an editorial comment which reads an attitude into that statement that was never there.

Nowhere in their notice of withdrawal did CKGM say the Maple Leaf System was failing to fulfill any function relating to the Canadian Music Industry. The complete section you are quoting explains CKGM's objectives in presenting Canadian Talent: "The first and uppermost is to contribute to the development of a truly healthy, productive Canadian Music Industry so that our current problems of lack of quality product will be solved in a positive way."

FIRST CLASS IS FAST

CANADIAN RADIO/TV PROFITS ON INCREASE

Latest report from Statistics Canada shows private radio and television stations with a combined profit of \$30.1 million in the 12 months ended August 31, 1971. This was based on total revenues of \$241.5 million. There are 341 privately-owned radio stations in Canada and the report indicates these had a pre-tax profit of \$16.6 million on revenues totalling \$125.7 million. The 64 television stations showed a profit of \$13.4 million on revenues totalling \$15.8 million.

Although profits in the private radio field rose \$3.4 million in 1971 from 1970 profits it has been reported that total expenses in private television rose more rapidly than revenues resulting in pre-tax profits being down 2.5 per cent for the year. This affected the industry as a whole.

CKGM does give their reason for leaving the Maple Leaf System. The station is heavily involved in promoting local Canadian acts, and is exposing product by leading French-Canadian artists.

Thus, close to 50% of CKGM's Canadian Playlist is composed of local material. "We now find ourselves in a position of not being able to accommodate a Maple Leaf System winner, because our list is filled with local Hit Material". CKGM realizes that to remain in the System they would have to air the MLS winners on a weekly basis.


John Mackey singled out the pleasure of CKGM's association with Maple Leaf System members and CKGM's willingness to remain involved and co-operate in any special projects the System may assume in the future.

In short, Walt, nowhere does CKGM come down upon the ideals or aims of the Maple Leaf System . . . or its record of performance to date. I do not know who wrote the passage on CKGM's withdrawal from the MLS for RPM. I prefer to think it was not you personally, because this kind of distorted journalism is something I am sure you abhor as much as I. In any case, I trust RPM will print this letter in order that any misconceptions caused by the RPM article can be cleared away.

(Ed: We're sticking by our guns. John Mackey did say that the station wanted "first and uppermost... to contribute to the development of a truly healthy, productive Canadian Music Industry." Admittedly it's an assumption to say that CKGM felt that "the MLS was not fulfilling this function", but if, in CKGM's opinion the MLS was fulfilling that function then why would CKGM feel it necessary to leave the system in order to fulfill it themselves?)
