INTRODUCTION

Henrico County, Virginia was formed in 1634 as one of the eight original shires of the Virginia Colony. A settlement had been made as early as 1611 at the "City of Henrico", named for Henry, Prince of Wales, son of King James I of England. The county originally extended from Charles City County on the east into the Blue Ridge Mountains on the west, and from the Appomattox River on the south to the Chickahominy River on the north. Goochland County was formed from the western part of Henrico in 1728 (and subsequently from Goochland, the counties of Albemarle, Cumberland, Powhatan, Amherst, Surry, Buckingham, Fluvanna, Nelson and Appomattox). Chesterfield County was formed in 1749 from the southeastern part of Henrico south of the James River. In the period covered in this volume, the courthouse was in eastern Henrico, at Varina.

The records of the county have suffered much from time and war, and consequently only a few scattered documents exist prior to 1677. Even after this date, many gaps occur in the records. These missing records are partially filled in by the "Miscellaneous Court Records 1650-1807". This is a group of original wills, deeds, administrations, inventories, etc., covering this period. Many of these are duplicates of those in the record books and were not abstracted here. Several of the earliest miscellaneous wills are those probated in other counties, such as that of John Lear of Nansemond. No general index to the wills of Henrico prior to 1781 is in existence, and many of the wills and administrations are not listed in Torrence's Virginia Wills & Administrations 1612-1800.

The Virginia county in colonial times was divided into parishes of The Church of England, and documents often identify persons as being of a certain parish, thus helping to pinpoint their location in the county, and possibly avoid confusion with another person of the same name. Henrico Parish was formed in 1611 and originally occupied the entire county. Varina Parish was the same as Henrico Parish, and was the name often used in the period 1660-1720, when the principal church was at Varina. In 1642 Bristol Parish was formed on both sides of the Appomattox River occupying land in Charles City County south of the James River (now Prince George County) and the southeastern part of Henrico (now southeastern Chesterfield County). In 1735 that part of Bristol Parish north of the Appomattox River, and that part of Henrico Parish south of the James River, and east of King William Parish, were combined to form Dale Parish. King William Parish was formed in 1705 from the southwestern part of Henrico Parish "in the parts adjacent to Manakin Town". In 1720 St. James Parish was formed from the western part of Henrico Parish, largely in what are now Goochland, Fluvanna, and Albemarle Counties.

There are several other sources available in printed form to those studying early Henrico. These include: Henrico County Orphan's Court Book 1677-1739 compiled by Pauline Warner 1963, The Annals of Henrico Parish by Lewis W. Burton (Williams Publishing Co., Richmond, Va. 1904) which also contains a portion of the Henrico Parish Vestry Book 1730-1733 compiled by R.A. Brock; The Vestry Book and Register of Bristol Parish, Va. 1720-1789 by C.G. Chamberlayne (Richmond 1890); Huguenot Emigration to Virginia by R.A. Brock 1886 (Reprinted by Genealogical Publishing Co Baltimore 1973) which contains a King William Parish register; Henrico County Southside 1736 (Vol. XXI of Virginia Colonial Abstracts) by Beverley Fleet (Reprinted by Genealogical Publishing Co., Baltimore 1961)

In the present volume the abstracts end with the Will & Deed Book for 1725-1737 and with Volume II of the Miscellaneous Records, which also ends in 1737. Completion of this project is planned in a second volume covering the years 1737-1781. In addition to wills, inventories and administrations and accounts of estates, other documents appearing to relate to estates or inheritances are included. In the index the decedent's name and pertinent page numbers are underlined. The 17th and 18th century handwriting is often difficult to decipher with 20th century eyes, so I can only apologize for names read wrong and misspelled. Also the several wills written in French by the Huguenots and translated by me could certainly be in error, despite every care taken for accuracy. As in any historical or genealogical work, the reader is advised to consult the original document if possible.

The compiler is most grateful to Dr. Louis Manarin, State Archivist, for permission to examine the fragile original of the Miscellaneous Court Records, as the microfilm copies are badly scratched and difficult to read. Mr. Robert Y. Clay of the Virginia Archives is also to be thanked for suggesting this project.
