The Children's Bureau develops technical bulletins (TBs) to supplement official guidance and assist states and tribes in implementing child welfare policies and practices. Below are the current technical bulletins to supplement AFCARS 2020 reporting, based on the AFCARS Final Rule published May 12, 2020 (85 FR 28410) and resources for AFCARS 1993 which ends September 30. 2022.

- This TB provides agencies with information required to create the AFCARS data files. It provides technical specifications on the structural layout of the XML data and shares the XML schema for the files. It also covers information on encryption of the file records.

- Publication Date: June 22, 2021
- This TB addresses how to extract data for the Out-of-Home Care and Adoption and Guardianship Assistance Files defined in AFCARS Technical Bulletin #21. Additionally, this
 document includes guidance on extracting corrected files (previously referred to as subsequent files) after the required AFCARS reporting periods.

Pilot Metrics

 Great participation and feedback provided by pilot users during timeframe between January 2023 to March 2023!



- Several key metrics to share with you all based on the pilot usage:
 - 236 new accounts were created for users
 - We had 144 unique logins from users
 - A total of 52 STTs participated
 - File upload and submission metrics:

Upcoming NCWDMS Enhancements


 Based on assessment of pilot feedback, below are key priorities that are being worked on and will be deployed in upcoming releases:



- Increase maximum size for file upload to beyond 2GB
- Improvements to handle display of large number of error counts on Compliance and Data Quality Reports
- Ability to export CSV file for Compliance and Data Quality report results
- Implementing the remaining batch of data quality checks
- Ability to generate STT Frequency and Compliance Summary reports

There is no list of the data quality advisory checks in the technical bulletins. How can I get a list of the checks?

Answer:

The data quality advisory checks are not set in stone. As our CB Data Team gets a better look at the data coming in, we have the ability to revise, add, and delete the data quality advisory checks to help identify potential errors in the extraction of the data and assure the highest quality of data.

To see a list of the current data quality advisory checks (also called data quality rules):

- view an uploaded file in NCWDMS,
- click on the data quality report, and
- then click on "View all rules for this program type."



I uploaded a file and NCWDMS shows some errors in the Data Quality Report. Some of those are marked as errors, but the data we entered are correct. What should we do to address these errors?

Answer:

The data quality advisory checks are designed to identify other potential issues in the quality of data submitted. They assess a wider range of issues than those covered by the compliance rules. These include issues related to continuity between files, CFSR data quality checks, and additional frequency checks.

The checks cannot be specific and sensitive enough to show only significant issues for every state and tribe. We will endeavor to get more precise as time goes on. For now, take a look at any errors indicated on the Data Quality Report. Sometimes, especially where there are fewer child records in the file, the data you reported might be correct and there is no need to resubmit. Other times, the error might indicate an overall issue with the extract of your file and you would want to resubmit.



Will CB be releasing new program/syntax files for states to use when calculating the new CFSR administrative data indicators now that changes have been made to some metrics, and the move to AFCARS 2020 is changing the format of the files used to calculate those metrics?

Answer:

The new syntax for Round 4 code is available and posted to the CB website. A guide for its use is available through the CBC for States. Both are reachable through this link: CFSR Round 4 Syntax. We will update that syntax as appropriate to reflect any changes necessary as a result of the transition to AFCARS 2020.



Is a living arrangement that is less than 24 hours considered a part-time placement? And should we report those?

Answer:

- Technical Bulletin #20 states that "the agency should report a date for each living arrangement. If there is more than one living arrangement, the submitted file should include an entry for the date of each living arrangement. Agencies will be guided by their own policies and data system constraints on the number of events, such as short runaways, part-time placements, and short-term medical stays, that would be counted as living arrangements for the child's record."
- We do not believe that living arrangements that are less than 24 hours should be counted as a part-time placement. Thus, they should not be reported.



Proposed Information Collection Activity: Federal Register Notice

- CB published this notice on March 17.
- It is a part of the requirements of the Paperwork Reduction Act administered through OMB every three years.
- This extension request is unrelated to any potential new regulatory activity that may occur subsequently. This request is for public comment on the burden calculations. It does not seek comment on the data elements that have been through the rulemaking process culminating with the AFCARS 2020 Final Rule.

Technical Assistance Brief: Mapping Common Elements Across Data Collection Systems

- This document highlights the similarities and differences between the below elements across AFCARS 2020 and NYTD
 - Race
 - Ethnicity
 - Education
 - Special education
 - Federally recognized tribes
- It provides crosswalk tables on how each data system collects and reports these elements.



The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Children's Bureau (C8) is responsible for the implementation and management of the Adoption and Foster Care Analysis and Reporting System (AFCARS) and the National Youth in Transition Database (NYTD) which are regulated data collections. There are a number of common data elements that are reported across these two data collections. This document highlights the similarities and differences between race, ethnicity, education, special education, and federally recognized three scross NYTD and AFCARS 2020 and provides crosswalk tables on how each data system collects and reports these elements. Additional information on these data elements can be located in programs-specific documents¹².

This technical assistance brief provides information on mapping similarities and difference between NYTD and AFCARS 2020 from the NYTD perspective. The brief uses the term "young people" when referring to youth or young adults who are part of the NYTD served population and/or NYTD survey. Both the NYTD and AFCARS 2020 regulation make reference to leaving data elements blank. For this technical bulletin and the purpose of data reporting, blank is synonymous with null or no data reported.

Race

NYTD elements 6 – 12 and AFCARS 2020 elements 13 – 20 indicate a young person's race. The reporting of race is similarly defined in NYTD and AFCARS 2020. The definitions of race from the regulations are located in *Table 6*. Data mapping comparisons are located in *Table 1*.

Similarities in Reporting Race for NYTD and AFCARS 2021

- In general, a young person's race is determined by how they define themselves. Specifically, for NYTD, the state
 may not determine the young person's race without consulting them.
- . The state collecting race information must select all possible racial combinations, as applicable.
- The state may select "unknown" when a young person does not know their race or cannot communicate their race or ethnicity. Unknown may also be used if the young person is multiracial, and one or more race is unknown.
- If a young person or their parent or legal guardian does not want to provide their race, the state should select 'declined." The state should not assume a young person's race if a young person declines. If race information is declined, the other racial categories should be reported as "no" (NTVD elements 6 to 11).
- A state must indicate "yes" or "no" for NYTD elements 6 11. If "yes" is reported for NYTD elements 6 11 then NYTD element 12, race-declined, cannot be yes.

Additional Transmission Option

- If an agency is unable to submit an XML file, then CB will not have any data for that state or tribe, which will negatively impact federal reporting, including the development of the CFSR measures.
- Agencies may elect to use the same method and data collection elements that were used for AFCARS 1993 to submit their 23A file due May 15, 2023.
- There will be a penalty with this method.

Dear Child Welfare Leaders

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Children's Bureau (CB) is responsible for the implementation and management of the Adoption and Foster Care Analysis and Reporting System (AFCARS). State and tribal title IV-E agencies are required to report AFCARS ease-level information on all children in foster care and children who have been adopted with title IV-E agency involvement per §479 of the Social Security Act. The regulations were updated via the final rule published in May 2020 (85 FR 28410) which expanded the data to be reported. The new data collection is referred to as AFCARS 2020 and the older AFCARS collection is referred to as AFCARS 1993.

Title IV-E agencies were required to begin collecting AFCARS 2020 data per 45 CFR 1355.41-45 on October 1, 2022. The last submission of an AFCARS 1993 data file was November 14, 2022, and the first submission of the AFCARS 2020 data file is due May 15, 2023.

Currently, agencies submit the AFCARS 1993 files using a secure direct electronic connection between the title IV-E agency and a federal server. Because the structure of the AFCARS 2020 submission differs considerably from AFCARS 1993, CB designed an entirely different file format and developed a new submission and data storage process. Agencies will submit their AFCARS 2020 data formatted as an XML file through the National Child Welfare Data Management System (NCWDMS).

NCWDMS opened up for pilot testing from January 1, 2023 through March 1, 2023. During that time many title IV-E agencies advised CB that they would need more than the three full federal fiscal years allotted by the final rule in order to successfully develop an XML file for their first AFCARS 2020 submission. If an agency is unable to submit AFCARS 2020, then CB will not have any data for that state or tribe, which will negatively impact federal reporting, including the development of the Child Family Safety Review (CFSR) measures. To address this, CB is offering an additional option to the agencies who cannot submit an XML file for the first reporting period of 2023. Agencies may elect to use the same method and data collection elements that were used for AFCARS 1993 to submit their 23A file due May 15, 2023. Although this method will enable states to report AFCARS 1993 data and will facilitate on-going federal reporting, it does not report out all the new data elements in AFCARS 2020. An agency that chooses this option would fail to meet the standards set forth in 45 CFR 1355.46, thus would still incur a financial penalty.






