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Principal's foreword

Introduction

This report contains a range of information in regard to the progress of Benowa State High School towards School Community goals.

A range of significant school goals were consolidated in 2010 including both the Middle Phase student leadership structure and the Peer Mentoring Program in the Senior Phase in partnership with Lifeline and National Australia Bank financial support. The school has continued to sustain strong growth in the Middle Phase and a master site plan was developed in 2010 to facilitate development of school facilities in anticipation of further growth.

School progress towards its goals in 2010

Significant work was done in 2010 to prepare teachers and the school site for the implementation of the 1 to 1 computer strategy with Year 9 students. A key outcome included the establishment of a staff professional development matrix with key teachers leading various in-service opportunities.

Future outlook

The key areas of focus for 2011 were established in consultation with the school community and included:

•implementation of a whole school curriculum and pedagogical framework;

•increasing the use of student achievement data to personalise instruction.

The Inter-year Project (TIP) continues to provide an effective induction for Year 8 whilst the inclusion of International fee paying student program adds to the intercultural blend of the school. Benowa State High School has a firm no tolerance policy regarding bullying.

Involving parents in their child's education.

The School Council along with the Parents and Citizens Association remain as long standing forums for parent involvement in the school.

"Benowa Expos" provide the community with major contact with school staff in the Year 7 to Year 8 transition and the senior subject selection process. More than 3,000 people attend these important school community functions annually.

Reducing the school's environmental footprint

In April 2010 Benowa State High School was selected to participate in the Department's "Solar and Energy Efficiency Program". Installation began of the first twelve solar panels, an inverter and data point that would eventually be expanded to twenty-four solar panels, increasing our capacity to 4kW. The power harnessed from the sun is being fed back into our power grid and is helping reduce costs as well as the school's environmental footprint.

Access to Benowa State High School solar energy generation statistics and energy consumption data is via our dedicated web page on the Department's "solar schools" website. Teachers can utilise the website within the classroom to analyse energy usage, explore renewable energy and energy efficient topics.

Early in 2010 Benowa State High School underwent a complete overhaul of the Fire and Water Reticulation systems throughout the campus. The original galvanised pipes, that were prone to leaking and were difficult to repair, were replaced by a new, modern system of pipes and valves.

This should result in major savings to the school by the way of no more expensive water leak repair bills that invariably caused an inconvenience when they were repaired. Other benefits from the outcome of this work have been the increase to the number of fire hydrant points across the school as well as the installation of a dedicated booster station situated near the fire mains.

Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

Non-attendance is managed in state schools in line with the DET policies, SMS-PR-029: Managing Student Absences and SMS-PR-036: Roll Marking in State Schools, which outline processes for managing and recording student attendance and absenteeism.

The school has implemented electronic marking to address issues of fractional truancy and the accuracy of roll marking. Year Co-ordinators and Phase Directors liaise with parents on issues of compulsory attendance that arise from systemic monitoring of student attendance. The school issues "T" letters in accordance with the DETA policy with very few students reaching recommendation for police intervention. Attendance is recorded in the ID Attend system of student attendance management.
