Personal Introduction

Hi, I am Rev. Cn. Ryan Brotherton. I am married to Emily, and we have three daughters: Evelyn, Eleanor, and Elizabeth. I am one of the finalists in the search for the next Bishop of the Diocese of Cascadia. I am excited to be a part of this process and I am continually learning more about myself and our diocese along the way. My hope in this short introduction is to say a few things that I'd like you to know about myself and what I sense to be a calling to serve our diocese as its second Bishop.

It has been a great joy of mine to participate in and serve our diocese for the last nine years as a church planter, priest, rector, and canon. I have a deep love and affection for every parish that I have had the privilege to worship with over the years, as well as the few that I have yet to worship with. My deepest desire is to serve our entire diocese as well as I possibly can. My prayer is that we would walk together in this process, assuming the best of our brothers and sisters as we seek to discern God's desire for us.

Nine years ago, we planted Holy Trinity Edmonds. I say we because I believe that it was a communal work done in response to the prompting of the Holy Spirit and it involved other individuals who were also called to this work of planting a new Anglican community in Edmonds, Washington. I was called a licensed lay vicar when we began the work, but we quickly saw a church start to form and realized that there was a great need for a biblically faithful Anglican church in our city. Under the direction of Bishop Todd Hunter and Bishop Kevin Allen we moved forward and began holding Eucharist services in October of 2014. I would lead the ministry of the word and other priests from our diocese would celebrate at the altar for the first couple of months until I was ordained a priest in January 2015. Since Holy Trinity Edmonds began, we have continually grown year after year and today HTE is a church with close to three hundred individuals who call it home and a weekly attendance of over 150. We have three priests on staff, two deacons serving, and two lay staff members. I am grateful that God called me to lead this effort of planting HTE.

During this time our parish has allowed me to use some of my time to serve the diocese as a member of the council, as the Canon for Church Planting, and to serve in many other ways at the pleasure of our Bishop. As the Canon for Church Planting, I have helped our diocese to plant several churches over the past six years or so. During this time, we have been one of the top church planting dioceses in the entire ACNA (since 2018 only two dioceses have planted more churches than we have). I have also had the privilege of helping several parishes find their next rector or vicar, and I have worked with multiple parishes and vestries in thinking about the future and how they can best move forward in doing the work that God has called them to do. I have also worked with multiple denominations to help train and release church planters in their own contexts.

I care deeply about people and seek to invest time into relationships in intentional ways. This allows me as a leader to hear directly from those who are most affected by my leadership so that I can understand what the needs are and how I might serve those individuals or churches better. I believe that I am particularly gifted in building strong and healthy teams that allow individuals to use their talents and strengths to contribute to the good of the whole. Healthy teams continually grow humility, vulnerability and in telling the kind truth to each other. I always aim build a foundation where we can trust each other to move toward growth in those three areas. I am an activator who solves problems and is not afraid to take risks, I believe I am also quick to admit mistakes, make corrections, and apologize when I'm wrong. I am an intuitive and relational leader who leads more by influence than position. I have successfully built

structures and systems in churches and other organizations that led to healthy growth and good internal communication. I value communication that is honest and clear. I am well versed and understand how to communicate effectively to an external audience through social media, podcasting, web design, and SEO (search engine optimization). I am an effective communicator of the Gospel, and I am comfortable in the pulpit or at the local coffee shop to declare the good news of Jesus and that all who repent and turn to him can experience true freedom and abundant life in the kingdom of God, right now and for all eternity.

I have worked as a manager where I was responsible for departments with multiple employees and have overseen budgets of up to a million dollars annually. I started, ran, and sold a successful business. I have worked on the staff of churches ranging from a handful of people in church planting to a church of two thousand.

I am confident that God has called me into this process, and I believe that he has gifted me in a way that would serve our diocese well as its next Bishop. I am hesitant to user stronger language around this call, not because I doubt myself, my ability, or calling, but because I know that this call requires the Church, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to discern together who God has called to be our next Bishop. If it seems good to the Holy Spirit and to the Church that it be me, I will serve our diocesan family faithfully and I have no doubt that we will continue to be strengthened in the faith, plant many churches, and grow together in this abundant life that Jesus gives.

I have led teams professionally since I was twenty years old and working with the Safeway Corporation. Outside of my vocational role as Rector of Holy Trinity Edmonds I currently lead the Mission Cascadia Board as President and Chair and sit on the board of Discover Church Planting and the board of Shoreline Christian School.

Summarized Spiritual Autobiography

I was born into a family that has served the Lord as Christians for generations. I am grateful to have grown up in the church with parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins that loved Jesus. The Christian tradition that I was raised in did not baptize infants, so I was dedicated as an infant and made my personal confession of faith at ten years old when I was baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I do not remember a time in my life when I did not desire to follow Jesus; I consider this to be the grace of God on my life.

My high school years were filled with spiritual growth as I participated in my church. I attended weekend services, youth group, sang in the youth choir, served as a student leader, went to bible studies with students from my public high school, and had the opportunity to go on mission trips to multiple countries. This is also the time that, looking back, I can recognize the beginning of my call to ordained ministry. As I graduated high school, I knew that I was called to serve the church. This was something made clear to me from impressions I believed were from the Holy Spirit, as well as a result of words spoken over me by trusted Christians in my life. I was blessed with a good job, and I spent my free time serving my local church by helping with the youth and college ministries. Looking back, I can see the ways that I was partially embracing God's call on my life without being willing to commit my whole life to vocational ministry. I loved Jesus and his church, and I knew I was supposed to serve the church, so I came up with a plan that I thought was faithful to what God was calling me to do. I would keep working my job, pursue my passion of investing in real estate, make money and use my time and money to serve the church. I did this for a few years until there was a need for someone to take over the youth ministry at the church I attended. This forced me to start thinking about what I was going to do with my life. I wasn't ready to admit that God might be calling me to ordained ministry, but I did offer to run the ministry until they could find a permanent pastor. This is when one of my pastors asked me, "Ryan, are you telling me that you are called to be a pastor?" I immediately said, "no" but it didn't take long for that question to change the trajectory of my life. I realized I had been afraid. Fear had kept me from giving up the things I thought protected me and gave me control over my life. Things like a job, money, flexibility. I also married Emily during this time, I owned several properties, and we were starting to try to have children. Certainly, God was not calling me to the instability and low pay of being a full-time pastor, right? I was wrong. This is exactly what he was calling me to, and the Holy Spirit and others in the church (including my wife) would make it clear over the next few years. When I first started working part-time for my church, I was still working as a Produce Manager for Safeway. When I started working at the church my desires began to change quickly and dramatically. I went from loving my job to dreading it; just waiting till I got off work so that I could go and minister to the youth kids. It wasn't long before I quit my job to work full-time at the church. This is when the Holy Spirit gave me eyes to see the way God had been calling me ever since I was young. I remembered words of prophecy that were spoken over me, dreams I had where God was showing me my fear that was keeping me from trusting him with the direction of my life. Things

I had ignored or justified were made clear to me and I knew that there was nothing for me to do except surrender and serve Christ and his Church in whatever ways he gave me to do so.

The next chapter of my journey had me feeling called to church planting. It was a familiar story for me: God shifted my desires. I began to have a heart for those who weren't already in an established church and would need a church plant to come into relationship with Jesus and his church. Previously, I didn't think church plants were necessary. In fact, I generally saw them as unhelpful. The Holy Spirit used an article written by Tim Keller to help me see the ways God has used new churches since the time of the New Testament to witness to the kingdom of God on Earth and to bring people into a relationship with Jesus. I started to see needs I hadn't seen before and gifts of mine that I didn't know I had. This led me to North Sound Church where I participated in a church planter's assessment with my wife Emily. In the assessment, others confirmed the call we felt, and we began the process of working toward planting a church. Little did I know at the time, this would draw me into the Anglican Church of North America and ordination as a Priest in Christ's One Holy and Apostolic Church.

My call to be ordained as an Anglican deacon, and then a priest came over the course of a couple of years. I went to school to do an undergraduate degree in pastoral ministries at an Assemblies of God school. This is where I began discovering the ancient roots of the faith, the teachings of the church fathers, and the historical and liturgical form of the church's worship. The more I learned the more I wanted to learn and the more I could see how God was calling me to serve in a way I never expected. I lost all interest in being novel or in innovating ways that worship could be new, different, or exciting. I found rest and peace in a way of worshiping that didn't depend on the charisma of the leader but was shaped by Scripture and was communal and participatory. I was astonished at the ways the Holy Spirit made my call clear to me and to others. I still have a hard time believing how the Holy Spirit orchestrated a Baptist church (whose staff I served on) to help us plant an Anglican Church; and that Bishop Todd Hunter and Bishop Kevin Allen saw something in me and affirmed my call to be ordained as a priest in the ACNA. I finished my undergraduate degree, and I spent a year in the ordination process with the Diocese of C4SO and took my exams. I learned from other priests and from Bishop Kevin and began the work of planting Holy Trinity Edmonds as a licensed Lay Vicar. Maybe the most astonishing thing is that God blessed the work. I didn't have a lot to offer, but I sought to be obedient and to trust that God would provide what was needed. I am grateful to say that he has done just that, time and time again. My family has grown, my wife and I have three beautiful daughters, and we have always had what we needed. The church has grown, and we have always had what we needed. I have had the privilege of raising my girls while planting a church and they have played as big of a part in it as anybody else; and they love the church! My twin fourteen-year-old daughters were confirmed by Bishop Kevin this year and I could not be prouder of them. Recently, my heart has been pulled again and I believe God is shifting my desire toward serving our diocese as Bishop. I love Holy Trinity Edmonds and would be happy and grateful to the be their rector for many years, but I can't help but notice the

- For five years I oversaw a multi denominational city-wide worship service, bringing together ten different churches for a night of worship and prayer.

- As a parish we are currently hosting and helping to plant a new church who worships in Swahili and is drawing refugees from our area.
- For the last several years I have gathered local clergy together in our parish from multiple dioceses to pray for each other and grow in relationship for the sake of friendship as we witness to God's kingdom together.

- We are currently helping to plant St. Stephen's Anglican, and we host their worship services in our building.

This regularly leads to opportunity to pray with people, tell people about Jesus, or simply demonstrate God's care and love for his creation.

- In my preaching I seek to make a clear call for people to repent and turn to Jesus. This is important as we have people who worship at HTE who have yet to enter the waters of baptism and commit their lives to Jesus.
