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# 7 YEARS OF GOVERNOR BADARU'S ADMINISTRATION IN RETROSPECT (1)

**Seven Years of Governor Muhammadu Badaru Abubakar:  
The Journey So Far**

The people of Jigawa State have indeed seen a gigantic development in the last seven years of the present administration. Governor Badaru has all it takes to celebrate the seven years of his stewardship in the areas of water supply, education, good roads, healthcare delivery service, agriculture, commerce and investment, economic empowerment - where thousands of jobs were created among our teeming youths, among others.

Even though when he took over the leadership of the State the financial liabilities and contractual commitments on ongoing and new capital projects at that time was more than the annual budget of the State which was about N110 billion. The inherited liquidity was only N16 million in the state treasury.

To make things worse, the monthly Federal allocation dropped from an average of about N5 billion to N3 billion.

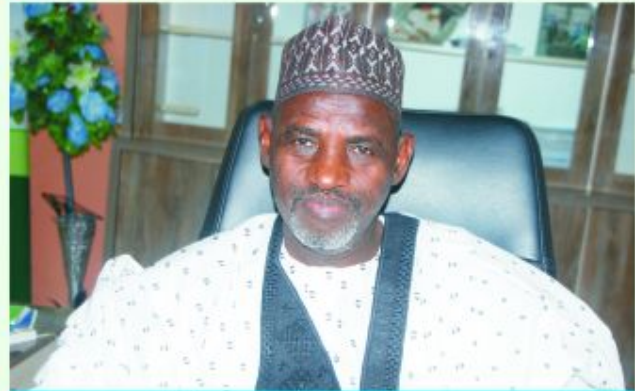
But Governor Badaru did not panic. In his effort to effectively face the challenges despite the economic situation at that time, he adopted several measures in order to meet the yearnings and aspirations of the electorate whose hope was to have the dividends of democracy at their

doorsteps. In this regard, the tenets of good governance, particularly accountability and transparency were adopted with the aim of having the principles of prudence and value for money became the binding ethic under his watch.

These and many more efforts put in place by the Governor have translated into the gigantic developments recorded in the six years of this administration, and accolades received from associations and national and international non-governmental organizations which are numerous - for instance the State has emerged top on budget transparency and accountability index 2020 ranking among the 36 States of the Federation which has earned the State about 16 million Dollars from the World Bank.

Though the journey had not been an easy one, but was fulfilling when viewed from the prism of developments so far witnessed in the state.

As I always say, the present administration is determined to

However, these could only be achieved with the added support and understanding of all citizens through peaceful coexistence and participation in programmes initiated for the common good of all.

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**MDAs PROGRESS REVIEW FROM 2015 - DATE**

**Ministry of Water Resources**

At the inception of this administration in May 2015, there was acute shortage of water supply across the State of which about 40% of all the schemes were fully functional, this is due to frequent breakdown of water facilities and the capital intensive nature of water supply management.

It is in view of this the State Government under the leadership of Governor Muhammadu Badaru Abubakar awarded contracts for the rehabilitation of all dysfunctional water supply schemes (hand pumps, motorized and solar schemes) across the State at a total cost of **Seven Hundred and Thirty Three Million, Five Hundred and Twenty Seven Thousand, Two Hundred and Nineteen Naira Sixty Five Kobo (N733,527,219.65)** Only. As per the breakdown below:-

1. Rehabilitated **108** number Motorized water supply schemes under Jigawa State Water Board.
2. Rehabilitated **240** number Solar and Motorized water supply schemes under STOWA.
3. Rehabilitated **4,571** number hand pump operated Boreholes under RUWASA.

The State Government has also spent the sum of Six Billion, Five Hundred and Forty Two Million, Four Hundred and Thirty Six Thousand, Four Hundred and Ninety Nine Naira, Nine Kobo (N6,542,436,499.09) only on the following:-

- I. Procured AGO Diesel, Lubricants and Water Treatment Chemicals (Recurrent Expenditure based on Monthly standing order).
- ii. Improved water supply in Dutse and its Environs.
- iii. Manually Dredged water channels in Kazaure Jekarade Water Treatment Plant.

**Jigawa State Water Board**

Under the Jigawa State Water Board the State Government spent the sum

of **Two Billion, Three Hundred and Ninety Four Million, Eight Hundred and Ninety One Thousand, Seven Hundred and Thirty Nine Naira, Sixty Three Kobo (N2,394,891,739.63)** only on the following:-

- I. Rehabilitated 20No. Solar and Motorized schemes
- ii. Upgraded/Improved 13No. Urban Towns Water Supply Schemes (including 3<sup>rd</sup> NUWSRP)
- iii. Procured 9No. Generating sets
- iv. Procured 119No. No. Submersible Pumps,
- v. Converted 28No. Motorized water supply schemes to Solar Powered
- vi. Constructed 12No. New Solar powered water schemes
- vii. Overhauled 20No. Generating Sets State counterpart fund for the Construction of pipelines Distribution network at kazaure town 39km And 12.94km in Dutse and its Environs.

**Small Towns Water Supply and Sanitation Agency (STOWA)**

Under this agency the State Government has spent the sum of **Five Billion, Eight Hundred and Three Million, Seventy Three Thousand, Three Hundred and Fifteen Naira, Twenty Four Kobo (N5,803,073,315.24)** only on the following:-

- I. Rehabilitated 523No. Solar and Motorized water supply schemes.
- ii. Constructed 514No. New Solar powered water supply schemes.
- iii. Converted 164No. Motorized water supply schemes to Solar Powered
- iv. Formed 346No. Water Consumer Associations in Small towns @ **N9,072,550.00.**
- v. State /EU-WSSSRP II Projects in Taura and Malam Madori LGAs @ **N516,600,000.00.**

**Rural Water Supply & Sanitation Agency (RUWASA)**

- I. Rehabilitated 3,093No. Hand Pumps Rehabilitated 6No. Solar powered water supply Schemes (UNICEF).
- ii. Constructed 4,077. Hand Pumps in collaboration with UNICEF/DFID and EU-WSSSRP II Programme.
- iii. Converted 45No. Hand pumps to Solar powered.
- iv. Constructed 313No. Water Collection Points (Constituency Projects).
- v. Constructed 2,216No. Blocks of VIP Latrines in collaboration with UNICEF/DFID and EU-WSSSRP II Programme.
- vi. Constructed 36No. Solar Powered schemes in collaboration with UNICEF/DFID and EU-WSSSRP II Programme.

**Ministry of Finance and Economic Planning**

**The Ministry of Finance and Economic Planning and its reporting agencies were able to achieved the following during the period under review.**

(1) Settlement of inherited liabilities of **N 12.799 Billion**, out of 15.21 Billion, leaving a Balance of **N 2.410 Billion**.

(2) Payment of the sum of **N 4.348 Billion** as Students examination fees to NECO, WEAC, NABTEB and NBAIS from **2015 to April, 2021**(this is in addition to N 614.6 Million inherited from the 2013/2014 academic session).

(3) Payment of the sum of **N 6.954 Billion** as Scholarship to both internal and external students as **at May, 2021** and an additional N 950 Million inherited from the 2013/2014 academic session.

(4) Payment of all outstanding and new requests for counterpart funds of SUBEB, FADAMA III and IFAD amounting to **N 8.789 Billion**

(5) Amount contributed by the State Government to the Contributory Pension Scheme for its Employees was **N 8.813 Billion**

(6) Publication of annual account electronically using IFMIS within the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of the subsequent year as required by law. Already, **2020** annual report has been submitted to Auditor General and is posted in the State website.

(7) Successfully participated in the **2018 and 2019** World Bank supported State Fiscal Transparency, Accountability and Sustainability (SFTAS) performance for Results program leading to the receipt of 1.98Billion and **N 8.208 Billion** grant respectively.

(8) Following the approval issued by the Governor for the upward review of Car loans, Refurbishing and Motorcycle Loans to civil servants, the sum of **N 4.605 Billion** has so far being disbursed to **17,358 staff** across the State service within the

last Six (6) years.

(9) Receipt of the sum of \$ 1.0 Million IDB loan for Integrated Agriculture.

**Jigawa State Internal Revenue Service**

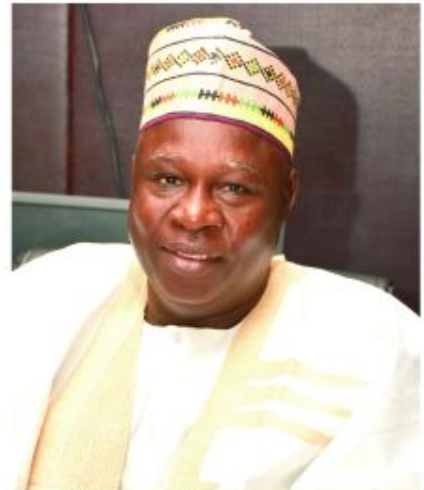
The Jigawa State economy as a known fact mainly depended on agriculture and other informal sector activities. The internally generated revenue main source of collection is pay-as-you-earn (PAYE) deducted from the employee's emolument on monthly basis. The board has 5 zonal and 10 area offices. The board has been mandated to be an efficient and effective revenue generating agency providing continuous flow of IGR to the State in line with international best practices for sustenance of good governance and achieving a culture of continuous improvement of IGR.

Despite low level of economic activities in Jigawa State compared to other States in the country, the Board has made remarkable improvement in collection during the tenure of Governor Muhammad Badaru Abubakar.

The revenue has been on the increase during this period as shown in the table below: -

1. In 2015 the total amount generated was N6,568,869,231.66.
2. In 2016 the total amount generated was N9,425,602,737.11.
3. In 2017 the total amount generated was N9,859,445,279.71.
4. In 2018 the total amount generated was N9,682,227,406.62.
5. In 2019 the total amount generated was N8,536,371,114.59.

The Jigawa State Board of Internal Revenue under the period in view (January, 2015 to December, 2022) accomplished some activities that are of great importance towards Increased Revenue Generation through the use of competent professional work force and tax administration system that's taxpayer considerate in line with

relevant tax law as follows;

i. The Board developed and upgraded State payment platform to include; remita, the nibs and E-bills pay platform (Jigawa IRS) is now accessible at any Commercial Bank branch nationwide which made payment faster and easier. It is worthy to note that 7,500 bank branches and all internet banking accounts can now collect Revenue for the State.

ii. Also, in our effort to automate the system and to block leakages, a POS has been distributed to all revenue generating agencies in which another platform was created where the Board will monitor and see collection made by those MDAs instantly.

iii. The Board in its quest for improved performance during the period under review partner with Development Support Agencies for reform and improved performance such as PERL- ARC, SLOGOR etc.

iv. In our effort to strengthen and boost the Revenue of the State, the Jigawa State Revenue Board with the support from the (SLOGOR) reviewed and harmonized the Revenue Law of the State, both the Local Government and State Revenue Laws were harmonized to

make it one single law in the State. The new law tagged "Revenue Codification and Consolidation" was passed by the State House of Assembly and assented by His Excellency the Executive Governor of Jigawa State on 16<sup>th</sup> July, 2019. The passage of the law (law no 4 of 2019) gives the Board some sort of powers to resolve issues with speed.

v. With the passage of the law PERL- Arc who played a prominent role in the exercise conducted a stakeholders' forum with a view to proffer solutions towards its implementation.

vi. Establishment of an electronic data management service (EDMS) that will transform the tax system from manual to electronic and this will give both the tax officer and payer to transact business via the net. State and Local Governance Reform Project (SLOGOR) support the Board with the establishment of the center and the project has been completed and is awaiting web-connection.

vii. The Board in partnership with Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) open a driving license office at Kazaure while that of Gumel is in progress all in an effort to ease doing business in the State.

viii. Conduct of Joint meeting with Local Government Revenue officers on quarterly basis to iron out issues that are in conflict between the two organizations.

ix. Establishment of Medium term revenue strategic committee.

x. Jigawa State tax policy.

xi. Deployment of Jigawa State Eternal Revenue

### **What the Board Intend to Accomplish in the coming years**

1. Aggressive Tax Education to enlighten the taxpayers to pay as and when due.

2. Opening of driving license office in Gumel.

3. Intensive training - external and in house to staff.

4. Relocation of Dutse Zonal/ Area offices to allocated office building.

5. Renovation of Babura and Birniwa Area office.

6. Training of proposed deployed staff from Ministry of Finance.

### **Internal reforms within the ministry of finance and its agencies:**

(1) SFTAS – Sustained Public Financial Management reforms in Jigawa has led to the State's participation in the World Bank supported State Fiscal Transparency Accountability and Sustainability (SFTAS) performance for result programme. The State accessed N 1.98bn and **N 8.208 Billion for the 2018 and 2019 budget cycle. The 2020 Budget included the sum of N 8.208 Billion being grant received for State participation in the 2019 respectively.**

(2) SIFMIS – With support from EU-SLOGOR, the Ministry is embarking on the implementation of the new SIFMIS Project Via Oracle software involving the supply, Installation, integration, testing, training, and commissioning of a State Integrated Financial Management Information System (SIFMIS) Software, related hardware and software would include among others: Planning, budgeting and project management; bank and cash management; purchasing and order management; accounts payable/ payments processing; accounts receivable; assets management, general ledger; Human Resource Management System (HRMS) and payroll; the project with have six servers and 350 workstations across all MDAs with fiber-optic connectivity. SIFMIS is an upgrade of the DFID-SPARC supported IFMIS plat form which has been in use in State for almost a decade.

It is worthy to note that as specified in the contract agreement, all the installations of the SIFMIS equipment has been completed and the SLOGOR project has winded up in the State. However, prior to the

above a Disaster Recovery Center(DRC) under the Office of His Excellency the Deputy Governor has been established and the Joint Venture Partners would remain in the State for Two (2) years to oversee the projects.

### **Budget and Economic Planning Directorate:**

(1) Successive budget reports have continued to indicate high budget performance with over **90%** recorded in the **2020** full year report. This is not by accident; the BEPD has coordinated annual planning and budget processes involving Medium Term Sector Strategies (MTSS) and Medium Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF) leading to inclusive and realistic budget in line with the priorities of the CDF.

(2) The Directorate is successfully coordinating the development of the State Single Social Register through its State Operation Coordination Unit with the support of the National Social Safety Nets Coordination Office (NASSCO), So far, **442,320** poor and Vulnerable house hold have been captured and enumerated through CBT process in all the phases across 27 Local Governments. This figure **442,320** has been cleaned and uploaded into the National Social Register (NSR) approved by NASSCO, majority of which were approved by the World Bank in the First Phase which spanned across the 27 LGAs. It is worthy of note that Jigawa has one of the highest number of households captures in the NSR as well as the Actual number of National Cash Transfer beneficiaries numbering about **167,790**.

(3) BEPD maintains an open –door policy with regards to budget preparation and documentation citizen's groups and CSOs are being encouraged to participate in the budget process. All budget related documents are made available to the public. This led to the State's emergency as the best in budget transparency in Nigeria **for Three**

### (3) consecutive years, (2018-2020).

(4) Jigawa has joined the N-CARE programme a World Bank programme for Result to respond to COVID-19 impact. The State is eligible to enjoy \$ 20M for interventions in the social transfer, food security and MSMES Support. The Steering Committee has been inaugurated in June, 2021. Also the State Coordinating Unit has been established under the Directorate. The Federal Project Support Unit has already access the State for readiness effectiveness.

(5) Formal inauguration of the State Steering Committee for Open Government Partnership (OGP) by His Executive Governor in February, 2021.

(6) Formal approval by the State Government to the BEPD to

conducta training of Open Government Partnership members, State and non-State actors.

(7) Conducted a sensitization workshop for newly appointed Hon. Commissioners and Permanent Secretaries who are members of the State Steering and Technical Committees of the Open Government Partnership (OGP) with Non-States Actors.

(8) Establishment of the Door Coordination Unit with the aim of aligning Donor Intervention with State priorities, eliminating duplication and obtained commitments of the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO).

(9) The Directorate with the Support of UNICEF has conducted Situation Analysis of Children in the Jigawa

State.

(10) The Directorate has repaired about four of its Utility Vehicles and providing 6No. Solar Power boreholes from the savings which was made under the 2013/2014 SDG Projects.

(11) Covid-19 Response Register for 565 communities in urban centers covering eight L.G.As in the State across 12 Wards in the said LGAs (Dutse, Gwaram, Jahun, Hadejia, Mallam Madori, Birniwa and Babura)

(12) UNDP COVID-19 Response in Dutse L.G.A to cover 5,380 poor and vulnerable households under the UNDP Intervention. Already 3,174 beneficiaries have received credit alert.

**Ministry of Land, Housing, Urban Development  
and Regional Planning**

From the inception of this administration in May 2015 to 2022, the Ministry of Lands, Housing, Urban Development and Regional Planning focused on the provision of geographical data on land for planning, development as well as increasing viable action plans and review on land, housing, urban and regional planning. During this period Ministry has recorded a lot of achievements in these areas.

**Systematic Land Titling  
Registration (SLTR)**

Recognizing the socioeconomic impact of titling, the Jigawa state government signed a memorandum of understanding in partnership with GEM 3 A DFID program to quickly embarked on improving the systematic Titling Registration by deploying Geographic Information System (GIS) technology to capture land title and property document data of land owners using secured efficient and effective database platform. The exercise, which is empowering land owners with a timely access to land titles and certificates is also adding value to land ownership in the state, making it easy for land owners to access credit for their business and also helping government with accurate data for development planning purposes.

The programme started with a piloted scheme at Jigawar-Tsada and Fagoji in Dutse Local Government Area with following appreciable achievement.

- i. Registration of 3,500 parcels of land within a period of 12 months with only two teams registering 100 parcels of land per week, at the initial stage.
- ii. Signing of 2,142 certificates by His Excellency the Governor and collection of 3000.
- iii. Successful conduct of public display of the SLTR data for

Agricultural land at Jigawar-Tsada.

iv. The State Government has re-dedicate itself toward extending the programme to cover other parts of the state with a view to attaining total coverage (Scale up) by extending the program to the first batch of five (5) urban centers of Hadejia, Gumel, Kazaure, Ringim and Birnin Kudu. These are identified to be capable of optimizing the process to generate growth and employment in the state.

v. A total of 26,000 certificates has been produced every year (12 months) and ready for collection at the rate of ₦4,000 each thus having a revenue return of ₦104m.

vi. Training of staff has been conducted while the procurement of furniture and equipment as well as other logistics have been carried out for the acquisition of satellite imageries and events along with public sensitization, committee meetings, periodic meeting with Imams elders, traditional leaders, CBos/NGOS and public display.

vii. Office accommodation in five urban centers of Hadejia, Gumel, Kazaure, Ringim and Birnin Kudu have been renovated, furniture and equipment also been installed.

So far, 50,000 parcels of land have been registered within the state to protect the land owners and their host community, the Ministry of Land in collaboration with Jigawa State Investment Promotion Agency (Invest Jigawa) and GEMS 3 produces the land registration and resettlement framework, the first of its kind in Nigeria.

The framework which is in compliance with the Responsible Agriculture Investment (RAI) principles has been adopted as a regulatory framework for the allocation of land for large scale

agriculture in the state.

It ensures that the livelihood of project affected persons are sustained during the execution of the project while also protecting the community interests in the project and by extension ensuring that the people and the state derive full benefits from the project.

Meanwhile, the Ministry of Land had conducted a three month housing registration at the six urban centers of the state namely, Dutse, Hadejia, Gumel, Kazaure, Ringim and Birnin Kudu.

On another development, the State Ministry has made all necessary arrangements for the take-up of the new Jigawa Geographic Information System located at the Ministry's headquarter.

**Land Acquisition for Large  
Scale Agricultural Activities  
and Solar Power Project:**

Under this programme the Ministry of Land, Housing, Urban Development and Regional Planning has allocated land for several projects after undergoing open and transparent process, as follows:

- (1) 600 Hectares of land granted to GCC at Kachi, Dutse district, Dutse Local Government Area for the construction of tiles and marbles factory.

- (2) 12,000 Hectares of land granted to Dangote Rice Mill for the production of rice in commercial quantity at Kafin Hausa.
- (3) 10,000 Hectares of land granted to Dangote Rice Mill for out grower scheme at Hago and Kisigin Fadama Valley in Kafin Hausa L.G.A.
- (4) 12,000 Hectares of land granted to Great Northern Agribusiness Limited for the production of sugar cane plantation at Gagarawa, Taura, Garki, Sule Tankarkar and 1,000 hectares at Gagarawa factory.
- (5) 36 hectares of land granted to Hadejia Specialist Hospital including the access road

- surrounding the site at Hadejia.
- (6) 110 hectares of land granted to Federal University Dutse Cooperative Society Limited at Hammayayi road Dutse L.G.A for Housing Scheme and resettlement layout.
- (7) 200 hectares of land granted to NOVA SCOTIA for 80MW Solar Power generation at Dutse.
- (8) 100 Hectares of land granted to Pan Africa Solar Generation for 50MW Solar electricity at Dutse and Hadejia respectively.
- (9) 100 hectares of land granted to Oriental Renewable Energy along Warwade road for 50MW solar

- power project at Dutse.

**Ministry of Women Affairs and Social Development**

The Ministry of Women Affairs and Social Development is saddled with the responsibility of providing comprehensive social welfare services and development of women, person with special needs (PSNs), children and all other vulnerable groups as well as lead sector in the coordination of cash transfer and social security allowances for poor and vulnerable households in the state.

Women and Social Development as well as issues involving Persons with Disabilities and other citizens are among the top priority issues in Jigawa state policy thrust, this is because of their numerical strength and the important roles played by women, and other groups in nation building.

Part of the Ministry's policy objective is to facilitate the articulating of a pro-active social development policy that will encourage rigorous approach to poverty eradication through comprehensive women development programmes, including Grand and soft loans such as women fund for economic empowerment and diversifying skills training to reflect the economic needs of our environment.

In the same vein the policy will help for the rehabilitation of person with disabilities and effective social security scheme as well as proper utilization of children potentials to protect them from social menace and abuse, through the improvement of child justice administration, protective and correctional measures such as reformatory school and girl's child skill acquisition centers. Improving and enhancing the recreational and leisure facilities with a view to promoting effective participation of children in to wider society and establishment of stranded children transit camp with vocational training materials is another significant agenda.

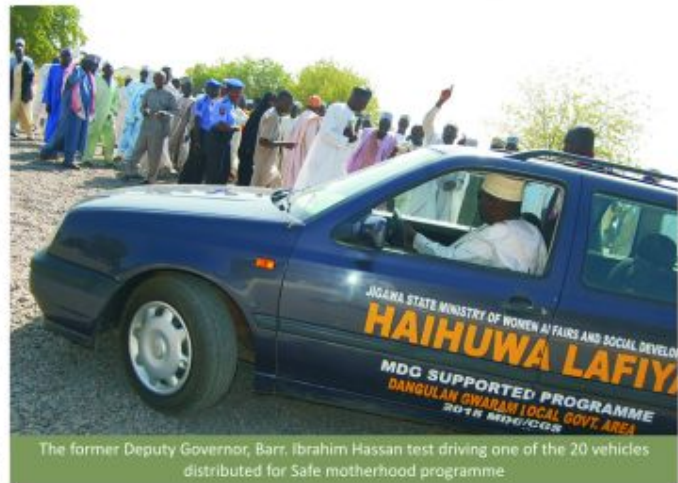

In particular, the core functions of the Ministry for Local Government include the following:

1. Coordinate the implementation of Federal and State Government policies as they affect Local Government Councils.
2. Coordinate planning and formulating Local Government Council's development plans.
3. Coordinates the preparation of Local Government Councils

budgets.

4. Monitoring and Evaluating Local Government Councils projects/programme.
5. Undertake inspection of Local Government Councils operation.
6. Undertaking advisory responsibilities towards Local Government Councils.
7. Managing the financial, human and physical resources of the Ministry.
8. Developing and improving the Ministry for efficiency and optimal performance.

**Vision and Mission:**

i. **Vision:** To be the catalyst for even and sustainable development across the Local Government Areas in the State.

**The Perspective of Local Government Councils in Jigawa State**

As the third tier of Government, Local Government Councils are the closest to the people and play a vital role in the process of socio-economic

development. *Section 7 of Fourth Schedule of the 1999 Constitution* has conferred the state with the constitutional power to Legislature on matter pertaining to functions, structure and finances of Local Government. Their functions as

specified in this section are clear with the most significant ones being construction of local roads, sewage facilities, markets and motor parks. The Jigawa State Local Government Law No. 7 of 2007 has elaborated further on the functions, structure

and finances of Local Government in the state.

As is well-known, Jigawa State comprise of 27 Local Government Councils which are divided into 30 State Constituencies, Senatorial Districts.

### **Specific Ongoing Reforms:**

The present administration which came in 2015 opened a new chapter in the development of the state. This sets yet another stage for the tortuous journey to the socio-economic development and empowerment of the people especially at the grassroots. ## Interview with Engineer Muhammad Sani Musa, Managing Director SIMS Global Resources Nigeria Limited

So, I am from Jigawa State. I did my primary and secondary schools in Kano. I started my University education at Federal University of Technology, Yola and later transferred to Bayero University Kano. I am married and have four children.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** Your Company SIMS Global Resources Nigeria Limited has done a lot in the provision of clean water to the people of Jigawa State as part of its Corporate Social Responsibility. We would like you to share with our readers this giant stride?

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:** Yes, I am the Managing Director and Chief Executive of SIMS Global Resources Nigeria Limited and we have a connection

with A R - R A Y Y A N Nigeria Limited also as a sister company. Secondly, on your question concerning Corporate Social Responsibility, from day one when we started getting contracts from the Jigawa State Government we tried to

contribute our quota towards the development of the state. In other words, complement the State Government's efforts of improving the quality of lives of the Jigawa people through the provision of clean drinking water. At the moment we have drilled boreholes with overhead tanks and solar in each of the five emirates. For instance, we have provided complete solar water system scheme at Babura in Ringim Emirate, Gumel, Dutse, Hadejia and Kazaure. Secondly, we have also renovated some part of Government Girls Secondary School, Sule Tankarkar where we renovated the school's clinic classrooms, build toilets and repaired their water system. We also sand filled Government Secondary School, Gwaram with over 200 trucks of sand, this has made the School road motorable. Another project done was the renovation of a classroom and provision of burglar to a primary school in Gumel, in addition to its computer class. provide them with some items.

In the area of conversation of motorized water schemes to solar, we have converted the Dutse Model International School water scheme and also provided complete water scheme to Unguwar Belbelu in Dutse Local Government Area.

All these and many more projects that I could not recall were done free to the people as part of our company's Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR). So, you can see that we have done a lot and plans are under way to do more for the people of Jigawa. In the area of educational support, we have paid school fees and bought books to many students that could not afford to pay their school fees and buy other instructional materials.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** Are there plans to expand this gesture?

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:** Really we have plan every year to support the State Government in one or two things and students of the less privileged as well.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** Can our readers know how much you have spent on the provision of these projects?

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:**





Well, each borehole we drilled is about N7million and we have drilled about ten. So, we are talking of over N70 million, and for schools we spent over ten million to do the renovation of the schools and many more other things. I am sure we have spent over N100 million in the last six years and this year we have plans to do more.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** The present administration of Governor Muhammadu Badaru Abubakar has converted several motorised water schemes to solar schemes. What is the advantage of this?

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:** Initially what they usually do was to put fuel into generators to pump water into tanks and thereafter release it to the people for about 3 hours. But for the solar it will spend about ten hours, sometimes twelve hours getting water flowing. Another advantage also is that whenever you are using a generator there is wear and tear, which means it will one day spoil and has to be repaired.

In addition to this also there is cost of diesel which is presently about N700 per litre. But for the solar once you have done the initial investment, you don't need to invest a single kobo. Unless may be for the pumps or taps which were initially working for 3 hours

and now have to work for about twelve hours, so most of the taps can give up easily because of the time they are taking in being used. However, on the issue of the taps also State Government is planning to change them.

In fact, there was a time when we went to one of the locations where we installed solar panels and inverter to convert the water station to solar from motorised after finishing the work, the operator came to us and told us that he is very happy, because from today he would not be troubled by the problem of kick-starter. So, you can see that the motorised system is associated with so many problems - from the repairs of generator, batteries, fuelling to so many others.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** It is on record that the present administration of Governor Muhammadu Badaru Abubakar has achieved a lot, especially in the areas of water supply, road construction and many others. What do you think is the secret behind this?

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:** It is true a lot has been achieved. If you look at how the Governor is performing one wonders, how he gets the money to do all these projects when other states are not paying salaries and gratuities. But he pays salary and

gratuities/pension as at when due and also did all these projects that can be seen across the state, at the moment over 1,500 kilometers of roads have been constructed. This is also the thinking of many people. I am sure we are going to

miss a lot from him, because this government is about to finish its second tenure and we don't know who will be the next Governor. Is he the type that continues with this effort? That is another question. So, I think the Governor should share with the next Government his secret so that there will be continuity as you are aware the State relies mostly on Federal Allocation.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** Finally what message do you have to the people of Jigawa State especially the beneficiaries of the various projects across the State?

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:** Now, if you take a look at the state you will see that every part of the state is connected with good roads in addition to the township roads, as well as provision of health care delivery services. I am sure a lot of money has been spent, so also if you look at the water sector you will come to conclusion that huge amount of money has also been spent on the projects.

So, with this development it is imperative upon the people to also contribute their quota by ensuring that the projects are protected from being vandalized or misused, because as stakeholder it is their duty to help the government in protecting them.

**Jigawa State This Moment:** Thank you very much.

**Engr. Muhammad Sani Musa:** Thank you it is a pleasure.

**Ministry of Environment**

The mandate of Jigawa State Ministry of Environment and its agencies is to conserve a clean and healthy Environment for the sustainable socio-economic development and wellbeing of the people of the State which is consistent with the Sector's key policy objectives of the Comprehensive Development Framework (CDF II) and Sustainable Development Goals 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 as follows:

i. To ensure sustainable environmental conservation for the wellbeing of the people of Jigawa State. This is consistent with the key policy objective of the CDF II and SDG goals 11, 13, 14 and 15; which is to ensure that the environmental exploitation for economic development regenerates and protect the environment for present and future generations.

ii. To ensure clean and healthy environment for socio-economic development of the State. This is consistent with the key policy objective of the CDF II and SDG goal 12; which is to ensure qualitative and healthy environment and promote an efficient integrated waste management scheme

iii. To harness and exploit the available Renewable Energy sources for Environmental sustainability. This is consistent with key policy objective of CDF II and SDG goal 13; which is Conserving, Protecting and Enhancing the environment, the ecosystem and ecological processes.

From 2017 to date, the sector was fully engaged in the prevention and mitigation of various Environmental hazards such as desertification, flood, erosion,

aquatic weeds infestation and Environmental Pollution in vulnerable communities across the State which improved livelihoods and minimized the loss of lives, property, and critical infrastructure through the implementation of the following:

1. 12 million tree seedlings were raised and distributed which resulted in the following:

- I. Increase in the area covered by Forest in the State.
- ii. Establishment of 35km of shelterbelts.
- iii. Establishment of 600 hectares of individual woodlots.
- iv. Establishment of 150 hectares of gum Arabic plantation.
- v. Provision of tree seedlings for planting to 350 institutions.
- vi. Provision of tree seedlings for planting to 100 Community nurseries.

2. Construction of 35 kilometres of new drainages, culverts and reclamation of eroded lands has reduced the extent of land affected by gully erosion in the State.

- I. Pumped out storm water at Mailolo in Hadejia and Akama in Jahun.
- ii. Purchased of nine pumping machines at JASCO for pumping out storm water.
- iii. De-watering of river flooding at Babura, Auyo, Hadejia towns, etc.
- iv. River embankment at Girdo, Girta, Matsa, Tashena and Azamu in M/Madori LGAs, Gilakocini, Maragwado, Arawa, Gishinawo, Masama, Jiyan, Damashewa, Tandanu, Munzarau, Sunamu, Kubayo and Matarar Ganji in Kirikasamma LGAs. Guri town in Guri LGA. M/Taura in Taura LGA, Gabarin in Ringim LGA, Tsagaiwa in Miga LGA, Kuryal Kaugama LGA, Tumunjira, Shamakeri down

to Bulangu in K/Hausa LGA.

v. Procured working materials (empty sacks) for rapid response of flood at affected LGAs.

3. Collaborative efforts with various Self Help groups have resulted in the clearance of over 100km blocked by Typha grass and other aquatic weeds along the major River Channels.

4. Similarly, about 1,890km of Drainages were desilted to improve free flow of storm water and domestic effluents and minimize the breeding of mosquitoes and curtail the spread of diseases.

5. Continuous effort in waste collection 59,653 has increased the volume of waste collected and disposed in urban centres of the state.

6. Utilization of Solar Energy for Electricity generation also witnessed an increase in the number of Mega Watts generated from solar electricity for model villages and street lights.

7. Improved economy wood stoves production and distribution has remained very much below set targets due to funding and logistical problems.

**Jigawa State Contributory Health Care Management Agency**

The present administration has achieved a lot in the area of health care delivery services; among the areas is the establishment of the Jigawa State Contributory Health Care Management Agency through the Jigawa State House of Assembly Law No. 07 of 2019, aimed at attaining Universal Health Coverage (UHC). The law enables all residents of Jigawa State to have access to equitable, affordable and qualitative health care service at all levels irrespective of economic and social background.

The primary purpose of JICHMA is to reduce out of pocket expenditure among the Jigawa State residents through adequate and sustainable funding that will be efficiently and equitably used to provide quality health care services.

This giant stride is one of the greatest achievements of the present administration in its effort to provide sustainable social security interventions in the state.

**Vision**

A strong, dynamic and responsive Agency that is committed to achieving Universal Health

Coverage for all residents/indigenes of Jigawa State.

**Mission**

To accelerate the achievement of Universal Health Coverage through effective pooling of resources and strategic purchasing of qualitative and affordable healthcare services to reduce out of pocket expenditure, increase efficiency, equity and effectiveness in health care delivery.

**The health facilities are divided into 3 parts:**

1. Primary health care services
2. Secondary health care services
3. Tertiary health care services

**Primary Health care:**

Approximately 689 facilities sub divided into:

1. Health posts.
2. Health clinics.

**State Universal Basic Education Board (SUBEB)**

From the inception of the present administration in 2015 to date, several efforts have been made with a view to improving the standard of education in the state.

The State Universal Basic Education Board is saddled with the responsibilities of providing basic education at the primary and Junior Secondary Schools level.

Based on this, the following achievements were recorded during the period under review;

(1) Recruited 1,393 NCE teachers majoring in English, Mathematics

and Basic Science to reduce the perennial human resource in basic schools across the state. The recruitment was done in 2 phases of 623 and 770 teachers. The board also established a sound unbiased and professional recruitment process based on merit.

(2) Teachers' houses were built in the hard reach areas in order to alleviate the difficulty in reaching the areas in time and avoid lateness so as to enable teachers discharge their duties effectively.

(3) Basic Education Sector is the part

of the Badaru's social transformation agenda which is to ensure effective teaching and learning outcomes that will contribute to the national growth and development.

Against this back drop, Governor Badaru's administration had constructed new classroom blocks while several others were renovated and all were supplied with appropriate furniture in order to create a good conducting environment for teaching and learning activities.

He said thirty four states have benefited from the project excluding Lagos State Government that has not provided the land for the project and expressed satisfaction with the support received from the Jigawa State Government and its people towards actualizing the project.

Earlier the Minister of Works and Housing, Babatunde Raji Fashola represented by the Minister of State for Works, Alhaji Muazu Sambo Jaji stated that the programme was conducted in thirty four state of the federation which comprised seventy four housing units - consisting of forty eight units of 2-bedroom bungalows, twenty four units of 3-Bedroom Bungalows and four units of one 1- bedroom bungalows and a portal of Federal Ministry of Works and Housing is to be open for those interested to apply for the houses on first come first serve basis and commended the State Government and people of the state for their support to President Muhammadu Buhari's government.

In a good will message the Emir of Dutse, Alhaji Nuhu Muhammadu Sunusi represented by the Wamban Dutse, Alhaji Mustapha Aminu expressed satisfaction with efforts of the Federal and State Governments toward the initiative and requested for more housing estates.

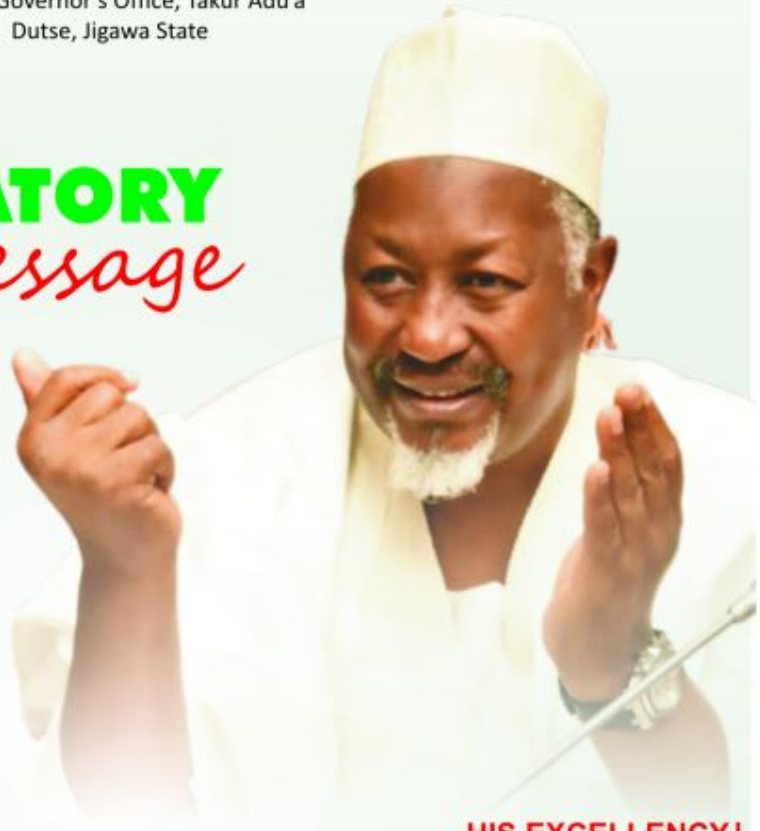
