Big New Freight House for the Erie

The opening of the new 28th Street Freight House of the Erie Railroad on September 1, 1904, marks an event of much importance to the shipping interests of New York.

The freight yard occupies the entire block bounded by 10th and 11th Avenues, 28th and 29th Streets, and has a capacity of 100 cars. The new freight house just completed is 400 feet long and 40 feet wide, and has a capacity for unloading 20 cars at a time.

Two additional stories will be added shortly. Through cars are made up in this freight house for forwarding by the Erie Railroad to Buffalo, Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis and all points west.
