CBS Dances The 'GM Shuffle'

Claus upped to VP/Station Operations; new GMs for Los Angeles, Detroit, Pittsburgh stations

KFWB-AM & KTWV-FM/Los Angeles VP/GM Chris Claus has been elevated to VP/Station Operations for CBS Television & Radio. In this newly created post, Claus will coordinate the news, programming, and marketing among the company's 39 radio and 15 TV stations. Assuming Claus's former post at the all-News/NAC combo is Roger Nadel.

Nadel's previous position - VP/GM at all-News/Oldies WWJ-AM & WYST-FM/Detroit — has been assumed by Shadow Broadcasting Services President/GM Rich Homberg. Concurrently, WBZ/

Two-day conference draws more than 200 Talk professionals; program to be held again in '97

ore than 200 Talk radio upon Washington, DC last week for the first annual R&R Talk Radio Seminar. Programmers, managers, syndicators, and hosts assembled for the two-day program to attend workshops, listen to speakers, and chat in the hallways.

The event was so well-received, that R&R Publisher/CEO Erica Farber took to the podium at Saturday night's closing dinner to announce the seminar will be held again in 1997.

Political Insiders

The conference program was studded with appearances by numerous Talk stars and political insiders. White House Press Secretary Mike McCurry attended the opening night cocktail party as compensation for having to bow out of a scheduled speech to the attendees.

Sr. Presidential Advisor George Stephanopoulos, who filled in for McCurry on Friday

morning, stressed that Talk radio is a powerful medium and urged broadcasters to take responsibility for their shows' content.

"You have become America's town hall. Take responsibility for your words. It is not free speech when somebody incites people to violence," Stephanopoulos said, referring to broadcasts by G. Gordon Liddy.

According to Stephanopoulos, President Bill Clinton will not appear on either Rush Limbaugh's or Liddy's shows because those hosts have been excessively personal in their attacks on the President and First Lady Hillary **Rodham Clinton.**

The same session featured an appearance by Tony Blankley, Press Secretary to House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

Stern Steers Course For New Network

'King Of All Media' pacts with Infinity to create first air talent web

NEW YORK Life is looking good for Infinity Broadcasting's super-talent Howard Stern. The WXRK morning host is now syndicated in 22 markets (with two more affiliates expected to be announced soon); his books

"Private Parts" and

"Miss America" - were both best sellers; he's syndicated on E! Entertainment Television; and preproduction has begun on the film version of Private Parts.

Now Stern has cemented the foundation for the next step in his career - the Howard Stern Radio Network. On February 22, Stern and Infinity announced they have formed a partnership to create the industry's first network of air talent to be guided and approved by the "King Of All Media" himself. Stern, Infinity President/CEO

'Sunny 95'/Dallas Now 'All-News 94.9'

Infinity Broadcasting's KSNN/ Dallas-Ft. Worth flipped from Country "Sunny 95" to "All-News 94.9 FM" on Tuesday (2/27) at 1pm. The first round of appointments includes Peter Gardner as OM, Amanda Barnett as News Director/morning news co-anchor, and Cameron Fairchild as Exec. Editor.

KSNN is the only major-market FM station originating an all-News format. The station will sport a 24person local news staff and use the resources of CNN, Associated Press, Bloomberg Business News, Color Radar Weather, and Metro Traffic Control. KSNN PD Dan Pearman told R&R that the staffing is about 70% complete, and the final 30% should be finished by April 1.

"All-News 94.9 FM" has also entered into an agreement with Belo Corp. crosstown WFAA-TV that allows both stations to share local news resources.

"Up until now, Dallas-Ft, Worth was the only market among the top eight in the nation without an all-

'95 Record Sales Down 0.9%

Sluggish consumer spending, computers blamed

ewly released RIAA figures show 1995 record sales down 0.9% over 1994, the first downturn since 1991. Cassettes suffered the biggest sales drop, plummeting 21.1%. CD sales increased, but only by 9.9% - far below their '93-'94 gain of 33.6%.

According to the RIAA, retailers and manufacturers attribute the slowdown to sluggish consumer spending, retail's general economic health, and competition from computer games and online services.

The RIAA points out that the total value of music shipments increased 2.1% to \$12.3 billion, however. Total dollar values have grown during each

of the past 10 years, regardless of units sold.

Morris Gets 50% Of Interscope ... Again

MCA Music Entertainment Group Chairman/CEO Doug Morris has announced his company's long-awaited 50% acquisition of Interscope Records. This is the second such deal engineered by Morris, who also acquired half of Interscope for the Warner Music Group in 1990.

"I'm pleased to renew my association with [Interscope co-founders] Jimmy Iovine and Ted Field, two brilliant individuals who have redefined the music industry over the last five years," said Morris. "We believe in Interscope's management and their incredible instincts for recognizing the music of tomorrow."

The agreement is unusual because it allows MCA to choose not to release Interscope music it finds objectionable, thus safeguarding against the "gangsta rap" controversy surrounding WMG's ownership of the Westwood, CAbased label. Such titles may be released through third parties, with MCA enjoying no ownership interest.

Financial terms were not disclosed, but MCA reportedly paid about \$200 million with an option to purchase the other half of Interscope in five years. This would net Iovine and Field an \$80 million profit, since WMG sold its

Infinity Buys Dominant Transit Ad Firm

Company strengthens presence with TDI in \$300 million deal

Mel Karmazin is zigging while everybody else is zagging. With the rest of radio's titans racing to take advantage of the relaxed radio ownership rules by gobbling up station groups, Karmazin's Infinity Broadcasting is purchasing the country's dominant transit advertising company, TDI Worldwide, for \$300 million.

"The combination of Infinity's radio stations and TDI's outdoor presence gives us a tremendous opportunity to expand local advertising in the nation's biggest markets," Karmazin said in a prepared statement.

TDI, which had consolidated revenues of about \$262 million last year, licenses exclusive advertising rights from more than 100 transit companies in 26 U.S. cities and London. The transit ad firm operates in Infinity's largest markets, including New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, San Francisco, Philadelphia, Dallas, Atlanta, and Washington, DC and sells advertising on vehicles, in transit stations, and transit shelters.

Great Advertising Similarities

Infinity made the purchase because of the great similarities between transit advertising and radio advertising, said Infinity CFO Farid Suleman.

'The aspects of the radio business we really like are the same for [transit advertising]," said Suleman. "While there is a lot of competition for in-home attention i.e. TV, cable, and now the internet — out of the home, radio is dominant. And like radio, transit is out of the home, it's local, and it requires very little capital expenditure so it generates tremendous cash flow.'

Suleman said Infinity would not sell TDI's London operation or those in cities where the company had no stations. "It is a very attractive business on a stand-alone basis.'

According to Suleman, TDI CEO William Apfelbaum, who along with TDI co-owners will get \$240 million cash and \$60 million in Infinity stock, will continue to run the company independently. "Since both businesses are doing extremely well, we will try to maximize each company, then we will look at cross-promotion opportunities."

And while management was studying how to "maximize" and cross promote, it was unknown how long it would take to determine the best course of action.

hancellor Broadcasting Com-C pany (Nasdaq: CBCA) has released its first earnings report --- without the earnings. That figure and some others are excluded from the report because the company is in a Securities & Exchange Commission "quiet period." which ends on March 9.

In the meantime, the company did reveal net revenue of \$64.3 million for 1995, compared to \$26.3 million for 1994. The company recorded a loss of \$11.5 million in 1995, compared with a \$106,000 loss for 1994.

The company's broadcast cash flow also rose, from \$10 million in 1994 to \$25 million in 1995. For the fourth quarter, broadcast cash flow increased to \$6.5 million, compared to \$5.3 million for the same period the previous year.

The company's stock was just issued February 9 and per-share eamings aren't applicable yet.

FX Broadcasting (Nasdaq: SFXBA) posted a fourth-quarter loss of \$593,000 (nine cents per share), compared to a \$305,000 deficit (four cents) the previous year. Net revenues increased 42.5% to \$21.5

ter receipts up 42% to \$31.5 million and annual grosses rising 66% to For the year, SFX suffered losses of \$4.4 million (68 cents), compared to a \$103 million. \$1.8 million loss (26 cents) in 1994. Broadcast cash flow jumped

108% to \$11 million in the fourth quarter, compared to \$5.3 million the previous year. For the year, broadcast cash flow also soared 108% to \$30 million.

sborn Communications (Nasdaq: OSBN) registered fourth-quarter earnings of \$7.7 million (\$1.41 per share), compared to last year's fourth-quarter \$1 million profit (19 cents). The increase is primarily due to the gain of nearly \$8.1 million on the sale of the company's TV station in Anniston, AL. Net revenues for the quarter dipped 6% to \$10.30 million, from last year's \$10.9 million.

Earnings for the year were \$2.7 million (50 cents), compared to last year's \$1.6 million (29 cents). Net revenues for the year increased 13% from \$34.6 million to \$39.1 million. Osborn operates radio stations,

McCain Persists With Spectrum Auctions Proposal

A though Sen. John McCain's (R-AZ) proposal to make spectrum auc-tions law didn't make it into the Talacommunications Act, he's not done trying. The senator is now suggesting that a spectrum auction proposal be attached to a bill that would raise the federal debt limit. However, opposition to raising the federal debt limit may kill the proposal before it even gets off the ground.

Broadcasting lobbyists have said the McCain proposal was rejected by House and Senate leadership, although Sen. Bob Dole is known to favor auctioning the spectrum. McCain's office says the proposal remains on the table.

While the proposal would apply only to digital TV spectrum, it may set a precedent for other spectrum, FCC Chairman Reed Hundt said in a speech last Wednesday before communications professionals and journalists that he would like to see auctions mandated by Congress, because it would end debate on the topic among the commissioners.

FCC: Shutdown Would Delay Telecom

CC Chairman Reed Hundt warned last week that if there is another government shutdown in March, the FCC will not meet any of its deadlines under the Telecommunications Act. The agency is temporarily funded until March.

Multi-Market Selling More Stock

ulti-Market Radio Inc. will offer 5 million shares of Class A common stock with an anticipated price of \$9.94 per share.

The company currently has 2.99 million outstanding shares of Class A stock, 140,000 shares of Class B (with 10 votes per share), 360,000 shares of Class C non-voting stock, and 700,000 shares of preferred stock. The stock closed at \$10.75 at presstime Tuesday (2/27).

The managing underwriters on the new offering are Prudential Securities Inc., Lehman Brothers Inc., Oppenheimer & Co., and BT Securities Corp.

New York-based Multi-Market is owned by the Sillerman Companies and is chaired by Bruce Morrow, better known to radio listeners as "Cousin Brucie."

FCC Slaps WHFS With \$38,000 In Fines

ven as former WHFS-FM/Washington NSM Patricia Ebbert's endless battle against her past employer plods through the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, allegations she aired before the FCC will cost the station \$38,000.

Ebbert is currently asking the court to force the FCC to hold a hearing on whether former WHFS owner Duchossois Communications was qualified to sell the station to Liberty Communications, which may hold up the closing of the station's sale to SFX Broadcasting.

Ebbert's fight with WHFS began when it dismissed her husband. DJ Damian Einstein, because of a speech impediment. Ebbert was later dismissed, she contends, for defending her husband, who ultimately returned to the station.

- In multiple filings with the FCC, Ebbert called for the revocation of Duchossois's license on the grounds that WHFS management had intentionally broken
- several FCC rules. Now the FCC is penalizing WHFS:
- \$2000 for violating political advertising lowest unit charge rules \$20,000 for using a studio transmission link without FCC clearance
- \$2000 for misidentifying the station location
- \$2000 for airing phone conversations without prior notification
- \$1000 for broadcasting "material obtained from other sources" without permission
- \$6000 for not identifying the sponsors of two shows
- \$5000 for failing to distribute all of the prizes in one promotion and giving employees tickets advertised as prizes for the public.

Jacor Closer To Noble Purchase

acor Communications is a bit closer to completing its \$152 million acquisition of Noble Broadcast Group.

Last week Jacor obtained a warrant allowing it to buy about 79% of Noble's outstanding shares, and it has entered into a stock purchase agreement to acquire the rest. Jacor also purchased the assets of a Noble subsidiary that supplies programming to and sells airtime for XTRA-AM & FM/San Diego, and it entered into time brokerage agreements with Noble's KATZ-AM, KMJM-FM & KNJZ-FM/St. Louis and WSPD-AM, WRVF-FM & WVKS-FM/Toledo.

RTNDA Lashes Back At CIA

n response to the CIA's admission that it does not shy away from having intelligence agents impersonate journalists, the Radio-Television News Directors Association has asked Congress to tighten the rules.

"Spies are spies, and journalists are journalists. Both have jobs to do. But they are very different jobs, and they should always be kept separate," RTNDA President David Bartlett said in a release. "Otherwise, the credibility, and even the lives, of legitimate journalists will be put in danger every day."







Playing Cupid Means Cash And Cume For WUSN/Chicago

US99 nets \$ 300,000 from listeners looking for love

For Chicago singles who like country music, "What's your sign?" has been replaced by WUSN's "Dateline" as the way to meet new people. For the station, it's meant fun, promotional opportunities, and big bucks.

WUSN VP/ **GM Steve Ennen** says demographic trends make Dateline a natural for radio. "Demographers say 40% of the population is currently single, with that percentage growing to 50% by 2005. Interep's



survey of singles says 7% of them use an outside dating service."

But Country's recent surge among young demos, he adds, makes it a real winner for the format. "We realized we have all these 25-34 women --- many of whom are single who came to Country in the last few years. We spend a lot of time on the air talking about family and kids, but weren't doing much to promote and market to these young women. Dateline helps us satisfy a huge need among our listeners.

Ennen feels Dateline works particularly well for Country stations because of the format's broad appeal. "To be successful, Dateline needs a lot of participants so members get a steady flow of 'matches.' We appeal to the younger demos who are single and to the 35-44s, a large percentage of whom are divorced and running out of acceptable options on how to meet people. This works for Country so well because, as a format, it crosses so many demos.

"And we can feel it working listeners are coming up to us at events and thanking us for starting it. The early response was so great, it alleviated any concerns we had about the negatives attached to dating services.'

No Cost, Huge Reward

As if playing Cupid and making listeners happy wasn't enough to give GMs a warm, tingly feeling inside, Ennen points out there's literally no cash outlay for the station -– but there's potential for huge profits. "Our commitment is the same as any other promotional commitment. All WUSN does is run promos. There's no capital expense

- the computers are located at Northwestern University, and everything else is done by the company." WUSN airs

one promo in each daypart and plugs Dateline once an hour during the nighttime "Cryin', Lovin', and Laughin' show

In the 10 months since Dateline started, WUSN has enrolled almost 15,000 members who generate "a couple thousand calls a day," according to Ennen. He adds they're hitting almost the entire database on a weekly basis.


\$1.95-a-minute 900 number (see "How Dateline Works") are truly amazing. Ennen says WUSN's share of those profits --- about 30-35 cents per minute of usage --- has added up to over \$300,000 since last December. Ennen emphasized, "That's money that falls right to the bottom line. That's like a \$900,000 radio account, because it falls right into other profit. Plus the phone company does collections for you."

Ennen says Dateline is also an exlist, since stations keep all the names client has its own database, and each month.

While Dateline users become part of the station's "Loyal Listener Club" and other event marketing strategies, the service itself is used to reach them as well. When members call the 800 number to check their voice mailbox for their daily list of matches, they also hear messages from a station personality. (These are automatically downloaded to every voice mailbox.) WUSN has told Dateline users about a morning show remote from Nashville, upcoming live remotes, and other activities.

WUSN has also used Dateline in conjunction with new artist showcases. Invitations are left in everybody's voice mailbox, and they RSVP to the station to get on the guest list. That, of course, also becomes a value-added membership benefit.

Win-Win Situation Dateline is even a win-win situa-



tion for sales and programming, says Ennen. "PDs like it because with a simple promo, they can dish off to Dateline some of the sales-related promotions they might consider onair clutter.'

For example, WUSN has tied in with area gambling riverboats to help them fill the casinos on off nights. Ennen explains, "We issue invitations on the phone system something PDs don't often like to put on the radio - and leave a number for people to RSVP and be put on a VIP list for free admission. The

programming is happy.'

As you might imagine, the number and types of promotions that can be done are endless. Ennen especially likes us-See See Mage

ing music-related events as Dateline promotions: "We keep it format-friendly by tying the promotions to the music and our product. In fact, this is another area especially beneficial to Country. People tell us they love Dateline because they want to meet somebody who likes country music, country concerts and clubs, and line danc-

How Dateline Works

ere's how the "Dateline" system works and sounds to listeners.

Station Dateline promos include a toll-free 800 phone number that people use to sign up (in Chicago, it's a local number). A station personality walks callers through a sign-up process that takes about 10 minutes.

New members answer 18 personal questions - how tall a date should be, whether they'd be willing to date a smoker, how old a date should be, etc. - to create their profile and a profile of their "perfect companion." Individuals can also record an outgoing message that will be placed in the voice mailboxes of any companion matches.

During the initial call, they're also assigned a personal identification number they use to access messages from potential dates, as well as hear messages from the radio station. Each day after 5pm, members can call the toll-free line to hear how many matches and messages there are in their voice mailbox. (Because it's illegal for profanity to be used on 800 access numbers, every voice message is screened by the company. Also prohibited in messages left on the 800 number are last names, addresses, and phone numbers.)

After hearing those messages, the Dateline user can choose to call a 900 number and, using their PIN number, hear personal messages left specifically for them by their matches. People can use the 900 number to set dates, exchange information, or carry on "conversations" - all at a cost of \$1,95 a minute.

WUSN hooked up with a Lake Michigan cruise company for the "US99 Singles Dateline Cruise," and Ennen says, "We took over the boat on one of their slower nights and sold 200 tickets for dinner and dancing through the phone system. They were amazed. "The cruise company had been

> somewhat skeptical about what a Country station could bring to them. The tremendous success of our cruise night solidified them as a station client.

In another successful Dateline promotion, the station split the membership database into four different geographic areas. A club in

each area was the site of a no-host after-work party on a Friday. By targeting members' voice mailboxes geographically, the station invited them to the party in their area, and each club paid \$2500 for a sponsorship of the Dateline message. Each club was packed, and the station made \$10,000 without airing a single spot.

Now There Are Three

Until recently, WUSN was the only Country outlet in the nation using Dateline. Just over a month ago, WMIL/Milwaukee debuted the service and enrolled 2000 people in its first 30 days. It now averages 50 new members a day. Last week, WYNY/ New York joined the fun.

It should be fascinating to see how YNY does with Dateline. A Big Apple Urban station had 5000 people sign up for Dateline in its first three weeks and is currently getting 900-number phone usage of 7000-9500 minutes per day. By comparison, a Chicago Urban station enrolled 30,000 people in its first 10 months

Carol Schlosser, Marketing Director at DMI - Dateline's marketing and service arm -- works with a number of different stations and formats and compiles an affiliate newsletter in which stations share promotion ideas, liners, and copy. She notes that Country users are dif-

ferent from those of other formats. "They're more serious, more intense," she says. "They also spend more time in the system than other format users. As Steve says, 'Country listeners 924. 45 N. **99** have a sensitive

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
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
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

Adapting To Today's New Technologies

W ay back there at the dawn of modern communications, the head of the British Patent Office observed, "The telephone will be a success in America, but the British have no need for it. We have plenty of messenger boys."

A short time earlier, the man responsible for the American Patent establishment advised Congress to shut down the whole operation because, "Everything useful has been invented."

These kinds of mistakes result from a combination of two things — bad information and insufficient imagination.

Mike Shores is a radio programmer who went to work for Tapscan a couple of years ago. Now he's gone out on his own to provide computer consulting services for businesses. Although he will not focus solely on radio companies, being a former radio guy, he has a lot to say about how our industry is using the new computer and communications technologies. He recently put some of these ideas to me in response to an article I had written (**R&R** 11/ 17/95) about e-mail as an audience communication device.

While no one can deny the impact of new technology on pro-

gramming, production, and even promotion, Shores feels we're lagging behind in employing these tools in the sales and marketing areas. In particular, he finds that many stations are tied down by paper-intensive systems that don't take advantage of the new "telecommuting" possibilities. Too much is put on paper in needless — and time-consuming — repetition of work. Shores is an advocate of the "paperless" office. There are several specific areas:

E-mail

E-mail is, by far, the most common activity on the Internet. Local networks, online services, and other communication channels are swelling with e-mail traffic. This can be especially helpful to salespeople and other folks who are constantly on the go. Communicating with one's primary office via e-mail is quick and convenient. It can be posted whenever you are ready and picked up when the recipient has the time to act upon it. While e-mail lacks the personal contact of the telephone, not everyone is ready to use the telephone at the same time.

By the time this year is out, there'll be at least two FREE email services available. You'll be able to send and receive as much e-mail as you want at no charge. This is because your e-mail will arrive with commercials attached. All you need are a computer and modem. The companies supply the software. This should give the use of e-mail a tremendous boost. Even the U.S. Post Office is planning to get in the e-mail business.

Computer Access

From The Field

There are now many reliable programs that enable someone in the field to use a laptop to access a primary PC back at the office. You can call it up and take it over. You can operate it as though you were in the office itself. Such arrangements can be used to file reports, communicate sales, even post traffic orders — all directly from the field.

"Sneakernet" is a term that Shores uses to describe what happens when I load a file to disk from my computer and run down the hall to hand it to someone else who needs the information. This person, in turn, uploads it to his

or her machine. This is transfer of data via "sneakernet."

With the advent of Windows '95 and other software, it's now easier than ever for computers to "network" and talk directly to each other. It's the old paperless office thing. Eliminate unnecessary steps. Save time. Cut down on mistakes. Reduce wear and tear on shoe leather.

How Real Is This?

I asked some of my most successful clients how they feel about these new techniques as they relate to sales and marketing. Not surprisingly, there's some well-informed skepticism. While no one doubts the irresistible advance of technology, many successful operators feel that good salespeople often don't have the kind of temperament that fits well with new technology. Here are a few relevant comments:

• "It's tough enough to get them to fill out their daily reports. What's going to happen with laptops?"

• "Salespeople are touchy-feely types. They don't do detail."

• "I've got 35 computers already, in programming, bookkeeping, and production traffic. And at least one of them is always broken."


• "Information is only so useful. You've got to have it for show, but a salesperson has to sell people even when the information is bad. That takes heart."


• "Too much thinking is bad."

The people who adapt to technology early are rarely the people who decide its ultimate use. People "with heart" are often slow to use new tools. It took time for a technology such as the telephone to become "transparent" enough for a "people person" to feel he — or she — could press the flesh with it. It wasn't a matter of simple information transference, it was human contact.

However, these new technologies are here today and they aren't going to go away. Managing information is one of the primary jobs of any GM. Managers will have to pick and choose — and time their moves — during these technological times. Sufficient awareness and information will be indispensible.

Oh well. Here come the consultants again!

Radio Really Reaches Working Women

X omen now outnumber men in the U.S. workforce. Twoincome families have become the rule --- not the exception — and traditional roles for women have been redefined. A record 57 million women are now employed, including 70% of women between 25-54 years of age.

Combine all this with the decade-old trend of delaying marriage to focus on career goals, and it becomes obvious that working women are serious consumers and attractive targets for advertisers of all types. Radio stands out as the medium best suited to reach this important consumer target.

More Professionals, **And More Managers**

In the '70s, women fought for acceptance in the working world. In the '80s, women broke into the ranks of the professionals/managers. Today, the role of the working mother is not unusual.

In 1984, working women accounted for 33.6% of managerial and executive employees and nearly half (48.5%) of the professional occupations. By 1994, they held

virtually everyone, but fully 98% of all employed women 18+ listen to the radio - a figure even higher than that for the general population (96%). Radio reaches almost all working females, and influencing these working women is key to any successful advertising campaign.

Reach in itself only tells a small part of the story, however. Listening times show even greater advantages. For the typical week, working women aged 18+ generally listen to the radio for two hours longer than all women, and nearly four hours more than those who are not employed!

Even more impressive: Working women spend more time with radio in each time period. During morning drive, working women listen to the radio for nearly an hour more than those who aren't employed. The working female is listening to the radio in her house while getting ready for work, and then again on her way into the office.

The commute home during afternoon drive shows similar results. Employed women again listen for nearly an hour more than those who don't work. During midday (M-F 10am-3pm), the working female listening level is still higher, outperforming non-working women by almost three hours.

Putting The Numbers Together

The advantage that working women have over non-employed females is even greater within the prime 25-54 demo. Between 6am-7pm Monday-Friday, working females 25-54 listen to the radio an average of two hours longer than non-employed women. Over the total week, working women's radio listening levels are greater than those for non-employed women by nearly six hours!

Y ou've been planning the concert for months ... you've done promotion after promotion ... you've given away tickets on-air for weeks ... you've played the artist's entire oeuvre on a daily basis ... you've primed your listeners to the point of mass hysteria over this show ...

Then — on the morning of the show — the act is forced to cancel! What does a promotion director do? Skip town on the first available bus? Not at WKXC (Kicks 99)/Augusta, GA.

The Country station already had kicked up quite a frenzy over the forthcoming **Brooks & Dunn**, **BlackHawk**, and **David Lee Murphy** concert when they got the news that the artists were stuck in Nashville due to snow. As listeners' angry calls began pouring in, Kicks 99 knew they had to turn the situation around, but quick.

Kicks 99 determined that neither wind nor rain, nor snow, nor lack of performers would keep this show from going on. With a little ingenuity from the production guys, the station staged a "Fantasy Concert" that played the artists' songs and overlaid an applause track, recreating the feel of a live show.

As an added coup, the station got BlackHawk and David Lee Murphy to call in during the broadcast to say how sorry they were to have missed the gig. Meanwhile, Kicks 99 kicked in four complete music libraries of the artists as well as a Brooks & Dunn tour jacket. Listeners ate it up.

And as icing on the cake ... Kicks 99 got a three-minute television plug when the local TV By Scott Slaven

station that co-sponsored the show used the cancellation and subsequent "Fantasy Concert" as its lead story.

The lesson here? Who needs those flighty, unreliable artists when you can stage the whole thing on your own?

Simpson Saga Continues

When we last tuned in to the ongoing **O.J. Simpson** story, **Talk WCKY/Cincinnati** had made the frustrated video vendor an offer to buy \$1647.25 worth of his tapes — if only he would put in a call to its morning show. Simpson — who, in his video,







Is Country Rethinking AC Crossover?

Current batch of product may be first in years worth crossing over

A couple of Mary Chapin Carpenter and Trisha Yearwood songs are making inroads at AC, ending a nearly twoyear period in which very little country product crossed over to other formats.

Carpenter's remake of John Lennon's "Grow Old With Me" from the tribute album "Working Class Hero" — which was not serviced to Country radio — is now climbing into the upper reaches of the AC Top 30 chart. And all without a single or video from Hollywood Records. Concurrently, Yearwood's "On A Bus To St. Cloud," which stalled at Country radio last year, was the No. 1 "New & Active" single last week on the same chart.

Crossover may increasingly come into play in the future partly because of Country radio's hesitancy to play AC-leaning records (since the two formats fight for the female 25-54 demo). And Country programmers are guarding their artists more jealously than in the past. Faced with diminishing exposure for AC-oriented songs in their own backvard, labels and artist managers are looking elsewhere for airplay.

'This Boom Is Different'

Music Row has always taken advantage of opportunities to cross artists over to other formats. (Remember the "Urban Cowboy" era?) A few years ago songs such as Wynonna's "No One Else On Earth," Little Texas's "My Love," and Vince Gill's "I Still Believe In You" were significant hits at AC. In addition, John Michael Montgomery's "I Swear" and Boy Howdy's 'She'd Give Anything" were blockbuster songs at CHR, Hot AC, and AC by All-4-One and Gerald Levert, respectively.

Observes manager Ken Kragen, "In the early '80s when Kenny



rific opportunity to sell more records, which we did. The problem was that the boom rapidly became a bust after the 'Urban Cowboy' fad wore off. After that, country music went back to being more traditional-sounding and everybody said we'd never do that again.

"With the recent boom in the late '80s/early '90s, there was an enormous resistance in Nashville which still exists - to allow an artist to cross. But this boom was much different. In the early '80s the artist crossed to find the audience. In the 90s the audience crossed to find the artist.

"Those people started listening to Country radio because there wasn't much of a Pop alternative. Country radio has kind of become the Pop radio of today. And because AC fights for the same listeners, females 25-54, you are not going to see as much crossover as in the past."

Asylum/Nashville VP/Promotion Denny Mosesman, who did AC promotion for several years out of

Mosesman hold onto acts they started and supported. I also get a sense that AC looks at crossover a little differently now --- like Country is trying to milk this thing to death.'

Station Battles

Another major change is the competitive battle among stations, says Mosesman. "Country wasn't as gigantic back then. In many cases the ACs are now Country's biggest competitors and vice versa. And in other markets, there are two or three Country stations competing against one another. So even with a great song, why is an AC going to be interested in playing Bryan White when his biggest competitors are all over it?

"When I was working Little Texas I heard that a few Country programmers were pissed that we were trying to cross the song over. They didn't want listeners flipping around and hearing their music on another station, even though the record was over for them.'

With White and his No. 1 country single "Someone Else's Star," Mosesman says Asylum "thought about crossover for about a minute and a half. We decided we didn't want to do it and instead concentrated all of our efforts on maximizing Country radio. You have to have the right artist and song."

MCA/Nashville Sr. VP/National Promotion Scott Borchetta agrees.

With Yearwood, MCA believes they have the crossover goods. "According to the information from Country radio, 'On A Bus To St. Cloud' wasn't right for

the format. Yet here's a great piece of music that we thought


had some great AC potential, so we decided to release it. "When the music is right, we'll go for it. But like

Scott Borchetta many labels over the past year and a half, we haven't released anything that we felt was

right to cross over. And if it did, AC would remain the key avenue, says Borchetta. "With the Mavericks, I'd rather go through the trials and tribulations at Country radio. Take a format like Adult Alternative, which would be the next logical step for them. If the band broke there, the next step would be Rock or Alternative and that's not their core. Having a big Adult Alternative hit doesn't mean anything to us, especially since we won't pick up that many more sales.

Country Radio Not Concerned

As far as Country goes, a couple of the format's leading programmers say crossover isn't a big concern. Comments Bob Moody, Group Advisor for Nationwide Communications' Country stations, "I'm as



for country music if they want to. It just draws attention to the quality of the music that we have to people who might not yet be aware of it. "

Interestingly, Moody says the reverse also applies. On a couple of occasions, he has lifted AC songs for his stations, one example being Marc Cohen's "Walking In Memphis," which still gets occasional airplay.

Nevertheless, Moody says he would definitely object if the artist and label begin working closely with other formats when it comes to things like appearances and concerts. But when it comes to record service, he's more flexible. "It's a case-by-case basis. If a wonderful [country] song was shipped to them and not to us, I'd be angry. Yet that's not likely to happen. But [crossover] hasn't been much of a factor since the '70s, when Ronnie Milsap, Kenny Rogers, and Dolly Parton had hits in a couple of other formats.'

KKBQ/Houston PD Dene Hallam takes it one step further, saying he doesn't care if the labels service different formats simultaneously with Country. "Let the market decide. I'm tired of the industry looking at the glass half-empty instead

of half-full. A country artist getting played at another format expands the familiarity of the format to other life groups. "We played [Garth Brooks'] Thunder Rolls'

at KKBO before Dene Hallam

it was country and Garth's label and management were very concerned that a CHR was playing it. Yet the song didn't research well with our life group. Listeners said they wanted to hear country on their Country station.

"With Chapin and Trisha, those two songs are clearly not country and weren't songs we would have considered for airplay anyway."

'Erasing The **Musical Boundaries'**

For their part, some ACs -– especially the softer, older-skewing stations — are giving country records a closer look. "Country is far and away the music that most people aged 25-54 are listening to in this market," states KKCW/ Portland PD Bill Minkler, who had to go through back channels to get a copy of Brooks's "She's Every Woman" because it wasn't serviced early to ACs.

"We are playing a little more country than we have in the past year or so. That's due to a lack of new product within the traditional AC genre and to the quality of music coming out of Nashville. You have to draw the line when it sounds too country, but a lot of the new music coming from Nashville is very compatible with the core artists on our station. You have to erase some of the [musical] boundaries, otherwise you are not going to look at other places for product that will help you meet listener expectations for a mainstream, soft AC.

Other ACs see it differently. Says mainstream WYJB/Albany PD Buzz Brindle, "Do I consciously add country records to compete against [country] WGNA? No. GNA has more in common with our sister CHR station. I'm not too worried if, by adding a few country



songs, we start sounding more country, especially if those are the songs everybody is excited about. But in this format, that's not the case. Not too much crossed over during the past year.'



Like Kragen, Columbia VP/AC Promotion Jerry Lembo - whose company is simultaneously working different Neil Diamond songs to AC and Country — agrees that in the battle for females 25-54, a sampling of country songs will work well for adult ACs. "The two formats tend to be the favorite stations for females in that demo. I've found a strong connection among people who like both Michael Bolton and Alan Jackson.'

The key to crossover, says Lembo, is how you position the efforts. "You can't force it on radio. It has to happen more organically.

'In terms of softer ACs, the op-

portunity [to crossover] exists if the labels so desire. That's not the case with the Hot ACs. Over the 12-24 past months Hot ACs have begun looking more toward pop alternative rather than country. Their listeners



are more interested in hearing the Goo Goo Dolls than Garth Brooks."


No Bold Label Moves

While crossover is beginning to look better in the face of a flat sales vear in Nashville, don't expect the labels to make any bold moves. Comments MCA's Borchetta, "If the whole industry was up and we were the only ones flat, then we would start trying to take advantage of other opportunities. But that's not the case.

Sums up Kragen, "Country radio has become so hip-and hot-driven. It's more about who is the latest sensation, the flavor of the month. It's the old CHR approach. I thought maybe we'd learned our lesson, but I guess we haven't.

'As a result, there's a very real danger for the more established artists. That's another reason why it doesn't bother me to try to broaden Trisha's market because you are only as good as your current record.

'Careers are built by exposure. AC exposure is not going to hurt us as long as we don't alienate the Country base and start embracing AC or some other area of music so strongly that Country doesn't feel you belong there anymore.'

Alternative Radio Treating Sparklehorse 'Good'

Slow and steady has been winning the race for Capitol's Everclear. And now the label and management hope to repeat that success with the similarly named Sparklehorse, a Richmond VA-based alterna-rock five-piece led by singer-songwriter/guitarist Mark Linkhouse.

The band's current single, "Someday I Will Treat You Good," is already gaining airplay at Alternative, with 21

stations playing the record. The label officially went for adds last week. The album, "Vivadixiesubmarinetransmissionplot," went to retail in mid-September.

According to KRRK/Omaha PD Nick Melloy, the single "has a nice, fat pop sound that works perfectly on the air. It's not too grungy, which also contributes to its uniqueness. It's a great guitar record that works well for our station, which leans 18-24."

Capitol and manager Shelby Meade of That Girl have stuck to their guns in maintaining a low-key approach to breaking the band. Early on the label serviced the lead single, "Hammering The Cramps," to college radio and the album to mom-and-pop retail accounts. That effort lasted until nearly the end of last year.

Says Meade, "We wanted to keep it away from commercial radio for a while in order to let them get established. We want to develop the band first rather than just having a hit song."

Not until the buzz started growing did mainstream airplay begin to get discussed. "There were times when things were happening that we wanted to go for it, but we held back. We didn't want to get lost in the shuffle around the holidays because we might have gotten pushed under the carpet. Fortunately, that didn't happen."

Capitol and Meade also worked to get the band exposure in Europe. Labelmates Radiohead heard their music and had the band open for several shows in England and Scotland. That has resulted in coveted airplay at BBC Radio 1



TOP-AM & WASH-FM/DC GM Tom McKinley resigns, effective at the end of March, apparently to take another undisclosed job in radio. No word yet from Evergreen on a replacement for McKinley.

At presstime, ST learned New Age Broadcasting has a letter of intent to sell WRMA & WXDJ/Miami to Paxson Broadcasting for a reported \$115 million - a record for a station sale in Miami.

One of the most visible attendees at last week's R&R Talk Radio Seminar was KYW-AM & WGMP-AM/Philly VP/GM Roy Shapiro. His presence fueled already rampant speculation that CBS Radio is about to drop WGMP's sagging all-Sports in favor of Talk.

Shapiro told ST a decision on WGMP's future will be made sometime in the next 30 to 60 days. Among the options being considered, according to Shapiro: Talk, all-News, or a continuation of the Sports format. Another possibility: brokering out the station's time.

McCarthy - penned a new three-year deal with WWDB on January 31. However, Smith says he's always had "an understanding" he could leave the station if he ever was offered McCarthy's slot.



The First R&R Talk Seminar

□ Everything we dreamed — and more

The inaugural **R&R** Talk Radio Seminar is now history. And, to paraphrase the great **Sally Field:** They liked it! They really, really liked it!

Approximately 240 Talk radio programmers, managers, and syndication executives turned out for the event, which kicked off with a Thursday evening (2/22) cocktail party and culminated with a Saturday night (2/24) banquet and cigar smoking party. In between there were packed workshops, well-received speeches, and a whole lotta' schmoozing among some of the biggest decision-makers in Talk radio.

Here are just a few of the things I'll remember about the debut seminar:

• The hosts' message — During her luncheon address, syndicated Talk phenom Dr. Laura Schlessinger described the frustration she felt over the years with programmers who tried to make her change her show by asking her to "do things that just weren't me."

Schlessinger added that she wishes more PDs understood that air personalities cannot be made into clones of other talents and must be allowed to be themselves. **KABC/Los Angeles** legend **Michael Jackson** echoed that sentiment during the "Deans of Talk" session.

• The Bob and Jerry show — Jackson's fellow deans of talk, WRKO/Boston's Jerry Williams and WABC/New York's Bob Grant, put on such a great show Predictably, the four-tier lobby bar was the place for gossip and guffaws. At any time of day little knots of Talk pros could be seen relaxing, kibitzing, and perhaps scheming.

that one attendee predicted the pair would soon be opening for Robert Goulet in Las Vegas. The two old lions shared insights that were both informative and entertaining. For example, when asked to identify the toughest part of their jobs, Williams immediately responded, "putting up with program directors." Grant added that his admiration for former WABC PD John Mainelli stemmed from Mainelli's courage during the 1994 tempest over Grant's supposed racism. "[Mainelli] didn't fold like a cheap camera," Grant intoned. "And that's unusual... so many of these people in programming are

pusillanimous pip-squeaks!"

The audience was also delighted by Jackson's demonstration of how a talk host can create drama without being confrontational or rude. His very polite question to Grant about whether the WABC host would call President **Clinton** a "scumbag" in person set off a ferocious fight between Grant and Williams.

• Janks yanking chains -Howard Stern pranksters Captain Janks and The King of Cable prompted a spirited debate during the call screening workshop by admitting that they have made crank calls to radio and television stations during which they posed as participants in major disasters. When one attendee said he didn't find such bits very funny, Janks and the King responded that it is the responsibility of the stations and their call screeners to confirm the identities and stories of supposed newsmakers before putting them on-air.

(Janks and the King demonstrated their trademark impishness by ambushing presidential advisor **George Stephanopoulos** after his speech to seminar attendees. The duo managed to get their photos taken with the White House honcho before being shooed away by his escort.)

• Lobby bar antics and intrigue— Predictably, the four-tier lobby bar was the place for gossip and guffaws. • Mike McCurry: regular guy — Talk pros who attended the opening night cocktail party had the opportunity to chat one-on-one with White House Press Secretary Mike McCurry, who spent well over an hour sipping beer and working the crowd. The affable Clinton spokesperson shook hands, solicited advice on using radio, and told some intriguing insider stories — including one about the White House historian's shocking revelation about the number of sexual liaisons that have taken place in the office space now assigned to the president's press secretary.


• Let's do it again — While I enjoyed every minute of the event yes, even the 7am continental breakfast — my favorite moment came at the outset of Saturday's closing dinner when R&R COO Erica Farber announced to the audience that there will indeed be a 1997 R&R Talk Radio Seminar.


To these charter attendees, we say thank you. And to everyone in Talk radio, we say: "See you next year!"

Continued from Page 1 ists the **Foremen** as well as remarks from syndicated host Dr. **Laura Schlessinger,** who shared the story of her rise to prominence.

Schlessinger said the best PDs are those who "let me be me — and not say, 'This is what works, so do this.'" Pressed for the secret of her success, Schlessinger simply said, "I don't think about being a talk show host."

Attendees also met three of radio's most distinguished personalities: WABC/New York's Bob Grant, KABC/Los Angeles's Michael Jackson, and WRKO/ Boston's Jerry Williams. These "Deans Of Talk Radio" discussed how they got where they are, what they encountered along the way, and what they like and dislike about their jobs.

The Deans agreed with Dr. Laura that PDs need to be more attentive to hosts' needs. "Programmers," said Jackson, "have to convince talent that they are our allies, that they are on our side."

Communications attorney Harry Cole appeared on Saturday morning to help broadcasters wade through the legalese of the new Telecommunications Act. Cole, a former writer for Howard Stern, told the attendees that the law gives them new programming freedom by providing significantly more protection from license challenges.

"You basically have to kill the Pope on national television to have your license challenged," Cole said. "The Act now encourages you to go further out on the edge and be more innovative."


Substantive Sessions

Among the most popular of the seminar's 15 workshops was "Where Do We Go From Here?" The crowd spilled into the hallway as **Critical Mass Media's Joel Lind** addressed issues such as the roles of politics and entertainment in present and future Talk formats. "Talk radio that is all sizzle and no steak is garbage," Lind said. "And Talk radio that is all steak and no sizzle is worse than garbage."

• In "How To Speak To Talent" and "Finding And Developing Talent," consultant **Bill McMahon** discussed the 13 common traits of successful Talk radio personalities and suggested new places to look for talent. He also laid out the principles of effective talent coaching. "The most compelling and relatable program content is found by exploring and understanding what the air talent really cares about," noted Mc-Mahon.

• Former WGST/Atlanta PD Nancy Zintak and current 'GST middayer Sean Hannity presented a session that tackled the ongoing tension between producers and hosts. Among Zintak's tips for producers: Always support the talent; remember that your success depends on their success; avoid snap reactions when a host begins to push your buttons or limits.

· Zintak also moderated the ses-

sion "Effective Call-Screening," where "The **Tom Leykis** Show" producer **Eric Braverman** and Howard Stern prankster **Captain Janks** discussed the best ways to get the good callers on the air and keep the rest off. "Some of the best talent in the world comes from callers," said Zintak. "But remember, nobody has a right to be on your show."

• SW Networks VP/Talk Programming David Rimmer led a discussion on how to use syndicated programming. The panelists included KDKA/Pittsburgh PD Diane Cridland, WOR/New York PD David Bernstein, and WTMJ/Milwaukee PD Steve Wexler. Participants agreed that while there are some situations where local programming is clearly preferable, listeners are not inherently turned off by national programming.

• Taz Media consultant Jim Taszarek headed two sessions: "Boosting Your Power Ratio" and "Bridges, Not Walls." In each he urged programmers to become more sales and finance savvy — to become "GM's PDs." He said, "[The business] isn't about radio anymore, it's about Wall Street. The GM's PD is the one who can see the big picture — he must know the language of money."

• In "Building A Research Toolbox," Benchmark Research's Rob Balon and WRKO/Boston PD AI Mayers warned that many research mainstays — such as focus groups and one-on-one interviews — are not as effective or accurate as they're cracked up to be. Stations, they warned, shouldn't base their programming decisions on the one-time responses from listeners in a study.

• During their session on interactive media, **Intervox Communica**tions President **Peggy Miles** and *USA Today* online guru **Frank Barnako** encouraged stations to consider the benefits of a web site as a marketing tool, but also warned of the potential drawbacks.

• In "Consultants: Choose 'Em And Use 'Em," WFLA/Tampa OM Gabe Hobbs joined consultants Bill McMahon and Lorna Gladstone to warn stations against outside experts who offer pat answers and cookie-cutter solutions.

• "Creating Strong Producers": featured consultant Valerie Geller said the talent must perceive the producer as his strongest ally. Co-presenter Diana Silman, producer of Westwood One's "Don & Mike Show," stressed that a producer can never overprepare. She said her team goes on-air each day with more material than they could possibly perform.

• WLS-AM/Chicago OM Drew Hayes and KRLD/Dallas OM Michael Spears joined forces in "Creating The Buzz" to teach attendees how to generate a mountain of publicity without spending a ton of cash. "It's about the drip, drip, drip — constant exposure, not just one big feature," said Spears, who encouraged programmers to get friendly with the local print and televisjon reporters.

• "What's News?" — a session facilitated by **WBAP/Dallas** OM **Tyler Cox** — featured a roleplaying exercise in which representatives of News/Talk and all-Talk stations paired off to learn how each type of station would handle a major news event.

Food For Thought

Even the meals at the seminar were learning opportunities. At Saturday's continental breakfast, **Edison Media Research**'s **Larry Rosin** presented the results of a New Hampshire primary exit poll that explored Talk radio's influence on voters.

At Saturday's lunch, professional facilitator **Gerry Tabio** held a brainstorming session where attendees discussed some of the major issues facing the Talk format and explored new ways to solve old problems. An overarching theme: One good solution doesn't mean that other possible solutions are necessarily bad.

Sabo Media's Walter Sabo and KSTP/Minneapolis PD Steve Konrad led a session in which they assured the audience that the under-35 flock *can* be brought into Talk radio. Konrad, whose station has been successful at targeting a young audience, said that for a station to appeal to young people, it has to sound young — and that often means searching for new talent in new places.

"Pick up the rocks and look at the worms," Konrad said. "One of them is going to be able to do a talk show. And don't be afraid to have fun. After all, it's radio."

ike a passel of pilgrims, more than 4000 diehard (no, not the movie) fans and 300 Country radio programmers from across the nation packed Nashville's orgulous Opry House Tuesday night (2/27) for the fifth incarnation of the **Warner/Giant/Reprise** Superstar CRS show — the annual kickoff to the Country Radio Seminar.

The hare-monious honchos at the Bunny Hutch proved there's more to look forward to in '96 than a considerable carrot crop by tapping some talented newcomers to open the evening's festivities.

First up was a new Warner Bros. band with veteran talent the Sky Kings, featuring John Cowan (New Grass Revival), Bill Lloyd (Foster & Lloyd), and Rusty Young (Poco). The experienced entertainers immediately captivated the congregation with the lighthearted "Doin' What I Shouldn't," before showing their mettle on their first single, "Picture Perfect," which showcases John's ironclad vocals, Bill's golden guitar, and Rusty's trusty steel. The tune will air on Country radio April 1. The boys then exhibited their rich musical heritage and individual vocal powers with a medley of their past hits: Poco's 'Crazy Love," Foster & Lloyd's "Crazy Over You," and New Grass Revival's "Callin' Baton Rouge." Next, Young again shared the vocals that punctuated some of Poco's biggest hits on the exquisite "Lonely Only Goes So Far," and Cowan returned on the melancholy "That Just About Says It All." The band said goodnight with the boisterous bidding of the Delbert McClinton-Bill Lloyd penned "Can't Trust My Heart." The audience responded with fervent applause. It's sure to be an exciting year for this talented trio.

Next, **Paul Brandt** stepped on stage. Though a new artist, he is no stranger to Country radio. After his

recent nationwide radio tour, programmers are already familiar with the man and his music. Without delay, Brandt showed his forte for both singing and songwriting as he launched his set with "Take It From Me," one of six songs he wrote or co-wrote on his debut disc. The crowd became completely absorbed as Brandt soared into the pensive power ballad "I Do" - sure to be a wedding classic. Brandt proceeded to put a new slant on the time-honored "Pass Me By," bringing the assembly to deafening applause. Then the boy with the golden tones turned in an outstanding acoustic performance on the thought-provoking ballad "I Meant to Do That." The talented Canadian closed his set and turned up the energy with his first Reprise single, "My Heart Has A History." The uptempo tune will be heard on stations across America March II.

The Sound Of Music

Faith Hill, who made her debut on the '93 show, proved just how much she has learned while sharing the concert stage with Alan Jackson, George Strait, Brooks & Dunn, and Reba McEntire. She kicked-off with her current chartclimber "Someone Else's Dream" and her second No. 1, "Piece Of My Heart" to heartfelt hurrahs. Hill dedicated "You Can't Lose Me" to her mother and then brought the Opry audience to its feet with her most recent smash and sure-to-be song of the year "It Matters To Me." Hill,

by the way, has been tapped to co-host this year's ACM awards with Brooks & Dunn — quite an honor!

Next, Hill showed her soulful side with the R&B-tinged "Do Right Woman" and a spirited cover of Elvis's "Love Me," before swinging into her career-catapulting hit, the defiant "Wild One."

There was nary a dry eye in the house as the Mississippi native sang the powerful "A Man's Home Is His Castle." Hill then engaged in some high-powered vocal sparring with bandmember and songwriter extraordinaire Karen Staley on the gospel-flavored "Keep Walkin' On," and Hill masterfully handled the Alan Jackson-penned ballad "I Can't Do That Anymore.'

No one was more surprised than Hill when Tim McGraw walked on stage to present her with a platinum award for her most recent album, "It Matters To Me." The assembly roared as Hill accepted the award. Then Hill and McGraw announced they were kicking-off a nationwide tour in two weeks --- again to a rousing ovation. Hill closed her portion of the show with the uptempo "Take Me As I Am" and the recent Top Five "Let's Go To Vegas," then returned to thunderous applause to encore the Carole King classic "Where You Lead." With more performances like this, it looks like '96 will be the biggest year yet for Hill!

Greatest Hits

Barely allowing the gathered faithful to catch their collective breath, Little Texas - Tim Rushlow, Duane Propes, Dwayne O'Brien, Del Gray, Porter Howell, and Jeff Huskins --- took the stage, launching the set with their latest single "Country Crazy." The enviably endowed entertainers' latest album is a celebration of their "Greatest Hits," and they hit them all in their powerful set: the breakneck-paced "Stop On A Dime," the Grammy-nominated "Amy's Back In Austin," their most recent Top Five "Life Goes On," their breakthrough hit "First Time For Everything," and the popular Eagles cover "Peaceful Easy Feelin'." The crowd also got a taste of the future, as the band offered up the powerful ballad "All In The Line Of Love" and the NASCAR-inspired "Gotta Wanna Win.'

Those who got up for some tea and crumpets missed an outstanding performance as the band moved center-stage for a medley of their biggest ballads. Rushlow took the lead on "You And Forever And Me," while O'Brien grabbed the spotlight on "I'd Rather Miss You." The group shared vocals on the No. 1 "My Love," and Howell shined on "Southern Grace." John Cowan, Bill Lloyd, and Rusty Young come from diverse musical styles and backgrounds. It is that diversity, and the wealth of talent that the trio enjoys, that make the Sky Kings so exciting.

Cowan, vocalist and bass player for the band, was a member of the Grammy-nominated, genre-bending group New Grass Revival. Known as musicians' musicians, their influence has been heralded by acts as diverse as Garth Brooks, the Grateful Dead, Hootie & The Blowfish, Emmylou Harris, and Bonnie Raitt.

Lloyd, lead guitarist and background vocalist for the Sky Kings, was half of the ground-breaking duo **Foster & Lloyd.** After they made musical history as the first act to have their debut single go No. 1, Lloyd and partner **Radney Foster** scored a string of Top Ten hits and a Gold record in the late 80's.

Young was a founding member of the group **Poco.** Young's signature pedal steel sound, vocal stylings, and songwriting abilities helped melt musical boundaries that brought the entirely new slant on country music that continues to be prominent today. Young was the lead singer on the group's biggest hits — "Crazy Love" and "Call It Love" — and the sole writer on the former.

When Lloyd suggested to longtime friend Cowan that they form a new band, the result was magical. "When we got together to write and record this album," says Lloyd, "We were truly all thrilled to have the opportunity to work with each other, and it's really cool because all the guys in the band are fans of each other."

Paul Brandt

Born and raised in Calgary, Alberta, and surrounded by cattle ranches and oil refineries, **Paul Brandt** sang in church as a boy, grew up on gospel music, and took up the guitar in the ninth grade.


Late in high school, Brandt began entering talent contests, such as the one held at the world-renowned Calgary Stampede, where he won \$1000 in 1992. This fostered an even greater passion for performing his own material as he developed as a songwriter.

Simultaneously, he was pursuing a career in nursing, a vocation he comes by naturally — his father is a paramedic and his mother a registered nurse. Brandt served as a pediatric nurse for two years, often working with terminally ill children. He says of the experience, "You're thrown into the human experience — you're sharing those emotions with those people. I think a lot of that comes through in my songs."

Fate intervened when Brandt, in a nationwide contest, placed second in performance but won first prize for songwriting with his "Calm Before The Storm." Warner Music Canada contacted Brandt, and a tape of his songs was sent to Nashville. Soon after, Paige Levy (who signed Dwight Yoakam) came to see him play and offered him a deal.

Brandt sees his musical mission as similar to the one he pursued in nursing. "Music is just another way for me to make a difference now, and I look at this whole opportunity as a responsibility. This the gift that I have been given."

Country Radio: 1958-1966

Format veterans recall trials and tribulations of the era

elcome to "The Legends Of Country Radio" — part two in our ongoing tribute to those who helped build this wonderful format.

Our goal throughout this odyssey is to provide an overview of what Country radio was like in the various eras, as seen through the eyes of the those who lived it.

In October 1994, we began the series with a look at the years 1948-1957. That took us from the days when country — if you found any on radio at all — was relegated to a daily or weekly block, usually at night. Often the jocks bought or bartered the time themselves. In many instances, they also doubled as country concert promoters.

In this series installment, we move on to the years 1958-1966, a period of transition and tremendous growth. (Of course, eras and years overlap. We've only attempted to define various periods in the format's evolution for ease of discussion.)

The Country Music Association, founded in 1958, didn't begin tabulating the number of existing Country stations until 1961. According to its polls — conducted sporadically at first — there were 81 all-Country radio outlets in 1961, 97 by 1963, 208 in 1965, and 606 in 1969.

The format evolved during those years as well, shifting from a stronghold of Southern-based Country & Western stations to a format that began to support outlets in previously unthinkable markets.

Exactly which station was the first to program all-Country is unknown. (I hesitate to say "fulltime Country" since many of the all-Country stations were daytimers.) **KDAV/Lubbock, TX,** where **Waylon Jennings** worked as a disc jockey, is thought to have debuted in late '53-early '54 and was operated by Dave "Pappy" Stone and Hi-Pockets Duncan.

On July 1, 1954, WCMS/Norfolk was born, eventually laying claim to the title of "longest continuously programmed Country music station in the world." Its first station vehicle bore the inscription "Western-Country Music Station." WCMS was part of the chain owned by Cy Blumenthal, who

also owned KCKN/ Kansas City, WA BB/Mobile, WHMS/Memphis, and WARL/Arlington-Washington, which was home to legendary Country personality Connie B. Gay.

Moving Into New Decade

Country had a decent run in the midlate '50s as more stations (usually the market's weaker sisters and often daytimers) adopted the format. But toward the end of the decade, many stations that had gone Country switched to a new style of music

that young people were adopting in droves: rock 'n' roll.

Ted Cramer spent 1953-57 at KIMO/Kansas City, which, during the latter part of that span, was one of the few dedicated Country outlets in the nation. Country's high profile of the '90s is a far cry from what stations were dealing with as the '60s arrived. He recalls, "It was mostly a bunch of small-signal, daytime radio stations. It was treated like an ethnic format.

"1957 was a pretty good year for Country. KIMO was a daytimer that did pretty well. And KCKN became the first 24-hour Country station in Kansas City, doing very well in its first year.

"But in 1958, the ratings and sales were not as good. The format then consisted primarily of crossover songs from pop acts such as Elvis **Presley** and the Everly Brothers. So if you look at the chart in 1958, you'll see all these pop acts in coun-



try. The Top 40 stations, particularly **WHB** here, was swamping KCKN at that time."

Current WCMS owner George Crump, who was an executive with Cy Blumenthal's radio chain in the '50s, remembers, "Unintentionally, Elvis was changing country music so much so, in fact, that for a while his style of music seemed destined to obliterate straight country altogeth-

Sanders was in his seventh year at **KFBI/Wichita** in 1958 when he was told the station was switching formats — news that gave him the incentive to begin his own operation. "They told me if I wanted my own Country station to go ahead and build one. They gave me every country record they had. So I went out and built **KSIR**." That was the first in what was to

hat was the first in what was to become a chain of Country stations that included KOOO/Omaha, KFRM-AM & FM/Wichita, and KBIL/Kansas City. Later, he would own KTOW & KGOW/Tulsa, WJRB & WJKZ/Nashville, WNOX-AM & FM/Knoxville, and WVOK/Birmingham.

As you might imagine, things weren't easy then. "Top 40 dominated the markets. I tried not to call [the station] Country. If I called it Country, I had a hard time selling it.

"In 1958, it was tough. **Ray Price**, **Webb Pierce**, and **Carl Smith** were about the only people singing country. But they didn't make enough records. People listened to [KSIR], but they'd get in the closet and wouldn't tell anybody — which didn't do anything for my ratings. I had a hell of a time trying to make that first station go. It was tough sledding for about two years. I didn't really start coming out of it until about 1960."

Gaining Momentum

By the time 1960 rolled around, Country was beginning to gain momentum as well as migrate north.

Explains Cramer, "A drift toward fulltime Country started in the early '60s. The audience was comprised of a lot of poor people literally. A lot of them would show up at remotes in threads. But the music had a great appeal to them. That's certainly a lot different from the demographics you have today, where Country appeals to just about everybody."

To appeal to a more upscale audience, Cramer made what was an especially radical move for Country & Western radio back then. "I

installed what was known at the time as the 'Countrypolitan' format. Basically, it was a much slicker presentation, an outgrowth of Top 40 radio. Up until that time, Country radio had a pretty barefoot sound with very conversational. downhome, corny jocks talking a



lot. We were tight, had good voices, and good production. And we played the hits.

Expanding The Format

The years 1958-66 not only saw the format growing in terms of stations and markets, but the signal quality of stations carrying the format was also improving. The daytimers that did well were being challenged ---and often vanquished --- by big-signal, 24-hour outlets. And the growing pains were accompanied by a more modern approach to the music and air talent presentations.

As such, and with the advent of the "Nashville Sound," Country was fast becoming an alternative for faltering Top 40 stations. Many of those responsible for building early Country stations had never worked a day in the format.

Many of Country's early architects hailed from two distinct genres: country music or rock 'n' roll. And their backgrounds were generally dictated by geography: Those in the South were usually country musicians who got into radio to perform, while those in the North were radio people who got into the format.

Oatman and his peers noticed that few Country radio veterans were invited to move to the big city when stations in major metropolitan areas began making the format switch. He says, "My role models were the older guys who thought that was absolutely blasphemous. We'd say, 'Isn't that terrible what they're doing to the music? They're just screwing it up. There's no steel guitar in that.' It's a lot of the same stuff you hear today."

Moving To The Next Level

One of this era's most important programmers was Chris Lane, who was responsible for creating some of the North's first major Country stations. He launched KAYO/Seattle in 1960, and its success paved the way for stations in major northern markets to take a chance on Country.

Lane's influence on Country radio reverberated through the rest of the decade as the format continued its tremendous growth. He switched WJJD/Chicago to Country in 1965, was PD/personality at WIL/ St. Louis in '68, and later worked at Los Angeles Country outlets KGBS and KLAC.

Lane spent a number of years programming and doing air work at several top rock 'n' roll stations (see page 46). In 1956, he joined KAYO to take on the legendary KJR in the rock 'n' roll arena.

By 1959, KAYO wasn't doing too well, and it was about that time he started thinking about taking Country radio to a higher level. "I always

wanted to take country music to a more modern stance, moving past the 'old clock on the wall' and 'if the good Lord's willin' and the creeks don't

rise' kind of stuff.' Lane, GM John DeMayor, and a

couple of other station execs set out on a fact-finding mission to test the viability of Country. "We traded out a small aircraft and flew from Seattle to Long Beach, CA. I took them to KFOX, which was a successful station monetarily. That's where they had guys like Hugh Cherry and Dick Haynes, who were doing it in the old style that had been financially popular. But we were concerned that major advertisers weren't going to touch that style. However, when we went back, they said, 'Let's do it.'

The first move was to build an airstaff around a well-known local personality. Lane recalls, "I went after a guy named Buck Richey, who had been at KVI for 19 years. KVI was MOR, but I knew he had done Country and had a good name in the market. When I told him I wanted to take KAYO Country, he liked to have died. He said, 'I've always wanted to go back to Country.' But I told him, 'I'm not going to do it the way it's always been done.

KAYO flipped to Country in late 1960. Lane remembers, "On kickoff day we milked a cow on top of the Space Needle ... stuff that was wild to get people's attention.

Expanding Country's Domain

The building of individual, major-market stations was critical to the growth of this format, in that it encouraged other owners to take a chance. In that regard, KAYO's success created quite a stir.

Lane recounts, "That's when hearing Plough — which owned Shearing Plough -WJJD/Chicago, WPLO/Atlanta, and other stations - heard about what we were doing in Seattle. The president of the radio division -Harold Krelstein --- asked me to come to Chicago to talk to them. I did so on three different occasions.

"They wanted to find a way to make money at WJJD. At the time it was MOR. And it wasn't a daytimer on local time; it was a daytimer on Salt Lake City sunrise and sunset, which gave us a little bit of a break.

"I wasn't sure whether or not I should try Chicago. But I finally figured if I didn't give it a try, I'd always wonder if I could do it."

Lane says the term "Country & Western" was never used at WJJD. However, it's interesting to note that in some of the station's newspaper ads back then, they referred to themselves as such.

Ohio Country

Another of Country's legendary stations debuted in 1965 when WMNI/Columbus adopted the for-

mat. At the programming helm was Bill Robinson, who joined "The Mighty 92" in the late '50s. While he was there, the format changed from rock 'n' roll to Big Band/ Beautiful Music. "Singalong With Mitch' was very popular," he laughs.

proaching, it was time to change formats again. "It became pretty evident around 1964 that Country was starting to cook. WHOK/Lancaster, OH was playing Country on their FM and starting to make some noise in the Columbus market. [Station owner] Bill Minnich decided it was time to stick our toe in the water. We found this local guy named Tom George, who

had a very folksy kind of delivery, and gave him a night shift in which he introduced Country to our listeners. The phones went crazy. So we made the decision in October 1965, at the beginning of Country Music Month, to go Country.

There weren't that many players, especially in the North. It was exciting, because we knew we were onto something that was going to do nothing but get hotter. But I didn't have any vision as to where it was going to be 10 years down the road. I had seen a lot of changes.

Final Thoughts

As one who loves Country radio, I can only express to you my disappointment in the dearth of material that exists about this format's early days and the people who nurtured it through its most difficult times. I'm stunned by how little was written or saved. If it wasn't for the clippings and pictures saved by our contributors and their peers, it would be lost forever.

And, of course, there are many

> Robinson left WMNI to change WVIC/Lansing, MI to Country in 1967. "I had a six-month contract to turn the station around. They had 82 stockholders; I became the 83rd. Unfortunately, the other 82 thought they knew more about running a sta-tion than I did."

> But another funny thing happened along the way. "The people at [crosstown] WITL heard I was coming, knew what I had done at WMNI, and changed to Country before WVIC could." It's amazing the way history was changed: WITL has long been one of the format's leading stations.

> At about the same time, WIRE/ Indianapolis GM Don Nelson wanted to hire Robinson for mornings. But when he called WMNI, Robinson had already left. Nelson later hired a headhunter to find a morning personality and, ironically, the perfect person the hunter found was — Robinson. 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IN THE BEGINNING

Rocky Starts Pave Way To Long Radio Careers

ome were guitar pickers. Others were guys looking for a career after serving in the military. Yet despite some rocky beginnings, they all became major figures in the history of Country radio.

Many of today's Country legends got started in radio because they were country singers. In Country radio's early days, many of the programs on the air were performance shows. Stations didn't have formats per se; they featured local artists and their bands.

A Country Life

A live country music show gave Mack Sanders his start in 1942. At the age of 16, he knew he wanted to be a country singer and performer a path he followed well into the '60s.

While growing up in Birmingham, Sanders went down to the local radio station and got some airtime. "I didn't get paid," he says. "I made money from my personal ap-

pearances and used the exposure to plug my shows."

That lasted for a couple of years, until Uncle Sam came calling after his 18th birthday. After the service, he went to work at **KMA/Shenandoah, IA.** "I was an entertainer and announcer. I did double duty because I made more money doing that — \$100 a week."

From there it was on to **KFBI**/ **Wichita** in 1951. "I syndicated a lot of radio material out of there. I was on about 20 stations, singing and announcing. Then TV came in around '55, and I would do radio programs in the morning and a Monday-Friday afternoon television show. This was a show where you wore the guns and a commercial to the Swanky Frankie Drive-In. I did the first live commercial, saying, 'Folks, you be sure to go down to see the guys at the Swanky Thanky Dive-In.' Before the program was over, the restaurant's owner canceled. They fired us."

Sanders's foray into station ownership followed a similar confrontation with management. Rock 'n' roll was taking its toll on those early Country stations as owners sought to jump on the bandwagon. Sand-



ers was still at KFBI in 1958 when station management made the decision to target younger listeners. Rejecting the theory that Country had no place in the marketplace, Sanders contended that the format would eventually find its audience and advertisers. As a response, Sanders immediately made plans to launch **KSIR**, the first in his chain of stations.

From Barracks To Broadcasting

The late '40s and early '50s saw a huge number of men looking for jobs after they exited the military. That coincided with the radio and TV broadcasting boom taking place at that time.

all that good stuff. It was very successful for me. I was known as 'Kansas Mack' in those days."

Pickin' A Career

Mike Oatman also followed the pickin' and grinnin' route to radio. While in high school, he formed a six-piece dance band. He contacted the PD at **KETL/El Paso** about getting his group on the air and was told they could begin later that afternoon. The result was a 15-minute program called 'Teenage Variety Time.''

Unfortunately, it didn't last very long. Oatman recalls, "We did that for about four weeks. Somebody sold **Bill Robinson** always wanted to be a veterinarian, but the military intervened. "I was one of the guys who had signed up to be an Air Force reservist in 1950. I finally got in; 11 days later, the Korean War broke out."

After he served his tour of duty, Robinson was working for an insurance company in Cincinnati. A friend who worked for a local television station told Robinson he "had a really good voice" and encouraged him to get the training necessary to land a job on the small screen. Robinson enrolled in Chicago's Midwest Broadcasting School. "I realized as soon as I walked through the door it

was going to be radio and not TV." After graduation, he took out an ad in *Broadcasting* magazine that soon resulted in a job at **WIZE/Springfield**, **OH** for \$54 a week in 1954.

USMC Preparation

Chris Lane was pondering his future while finishing up his tour of duty with the Marine Corps at Quantico, VA. A friend Lane had worked with on Armed Forces Radio in Cuba was working at a Nashville station. Lane decided to follow suit and thought he had landed a job at a competing Music City outlet. But his assumption led to some scary moments.

Lane, whose wife was pregnant, was told he'd be able to end his tour of duty three months early if he had a job lined up. When he went to the Nashville station to pick up a letter as proof of employment, he was met by the man who had hired him just days before.

Lane recalls, "The PD told me, 'I'm so sorry. The owner was on vacation and heard a guy. He hired him — and you know who's got the job.""

Lane explained his situation to his radio friend, who immediately said, "Let's go over to Eddy Arnold's office. Maybe he knows somebody."

"I'd never met the man before in my life," Lane says. "Eddy, being the sweet person he was, said, 'I know a guy who owns a station in McMinnville, TN.' He called the guy and told him I could drive up there on Sunday morning and audition. Then I had to be back at Quantico at 0700 that Monday morning."

Lane did the audition at **WMMT**; he got the job and the letter he needed. He was a happy man. "You would have thought I was going to work for the network. It was all I could do to keep awake, though. I drove 17 straight hours back to Virginia and made it in the gate 15 minutes before I would have been AWOL."

Ralph Cleans Up

During his teenage years, **Ralph Emery** cleaned soot and ashes from residential furnaces and ushered at a Nashville movie theater. Upon graduating from high school, he enrolled in the Tennessee School Of Broadcasting, where he was taught by legendary WLAC/Nashville disc jockey John R. Richbourg.


In 1951 Emery was paid nearly \$40 a week for his first radio job at WTPR/ Paris, TN. 'I drew \$39.50. While I was going to school, I had been working at a laundry for \$33 a week, so that was a jump in pay. My first goal was to make \$100 a week. I finally achieved that in '56. I had to go to WLCS/Baton Rouge to do that."

Radio Intrigue

"I knew I wanted to be in radio from the time I was four or five years old," **Ted Cramer** says. "I was always intrigued with radio. I listened to a lot of stations."

He got his first gig in 1953, spinning rock 'n' roll records on **KIMO**/ **Kansas City.** "I had studied KIMO's format when I was 13 years old. I knew everything there was to know

about the station and wanted to work there. Finally, after knocking on the door for about a year after my high school graduation, they hired me."

Following a semester at Kansas University, he started at KIMO for \$75 a week. "That was a lot of money, a pretty good **AFTRA** wage for this market. I had tons of money left over. You don't realize how much inflation has changed things. At that time, gasoline was 12 or 13 cents a gallon."

Ill-Fated Sports Career

WCMS/Norfolk lays claim to the mantle of "longest continuously programmed Country music station in the world." With call letters signifying Norfolk's "Western Country Music Station," WCMS has played nothing but country music since its debut on July 1, 1954.

Station owner George Crump had a rather inauspicious beginning as a broadcaster. As a George Washington University medical student in 1950, he served as the announcer during a diving competition at the country club pool where he worked as a lifeguard. Crump recalls, "One of the members owned a radio station and figured if I could swim, I must know a lot about

sports and would make a good sportscaster at his radio station."

It proved to be a false assumption. Crump explains, "I got up to WCRO/ Johnstown, PA and found myself broadcasting a high school basketball game. I

wasn't even sure how many players were on each team.

People called in and said they thought they were listening to a hockey game. I did a football game soon after that. In a rather dramatic fashion — copying what I had seen other sportscasters do — I stood up yelling, `He's at the 30, the 40, the 50, the 60, the 70.' I was relieved of my duties at halftime and became a staff announcer." By 1952 Crump had joined CBS O&OWTOP/Washington as a staff announcer for both the radio and TV outlets. On the weekends, he read the news for WARL/Arlington-Washington. The station was block-programmed, with a variety of music played at different times throughout the day. The guy who came on at noon to spin country records was none other than Country radio legend Connie B. Gay.

Station owner Cy Blumenthal soon convinced Crump he'd be great in sales. He was and soon became WARL's Sales Manager. As Blumenthal's radio empire grew to include outlets in Norfolk, Kansas City, Mobile, Memphis, and other markets, Crump was tapped to oversee the stations' sales departments. It wasn't long before he was named Exec. VP for Blumenthal's group and had input into other areas of operations.

Blumenthal decided to sell his stations; in 1961 Crump convinced him to sell WCMS to Crump and his wife **Marj**. The "total consideration" for the AM station at 1050 on the dial was \$200,000.

It's impossible to relate the history of WCMS without including **Joe Hoppel.** The fact is, along with ev-

eryone else in this special issue, "Hopeless Hoppel" (he later became "Hopalong Hoppel") is a Country radio legend. He joined the WCMS airstaff in 1955 — and remains on the air to this day. Crump says, "Joe's soft patter proved to be just the sort of

thing the harried world wants to wake up with in the morning. It's warm, conversational, and unexcited.

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Smaller Budgets, Bigger Ideas

Creativity was key behind station promotions when staffers had to do more with less

Gaining the listeners' interest — and the advertisers' trust — was a priority for Country stations in the early '60s. At WJJD/Chicago, creativity was the key, while other stations emphasized the tried-and-true route of concert tie-ins.

WJJD's Chris Lane was handling an airshift, serving as PD, and — in his spare time — coming up with promotions to call attention to the station. "That's what we had to do," But when it came time to name the winner, the station declared that the gasoline can came with an unannounced extra — a brand new Chevrolet. Lane reflects, "That did it. The

The CEW years

Lane says when asked to outline a typical job description from that era. "Most guys in those days went into a station that was at the bottom of the barrel. That's the only reason they [stations] would change [to Country]. So you had no place to go but up. They [station owners] would say, 'Come up with ideas and come up

with the promotions, but it can't cost any money.' That was the fun of it."

To celebrate WJJD's first anniversary, listeners submitted entries in three categories: cakes, cartoons, and mobiles. "At the time either **Emerson** or **Motorola** had a big display window at Michigan and Wacker. Our promotion was so successful that they took all of our winning items and put them in the window. The creativity was fantastic. We did things that people wanted to participate in. You don't have that anymore."

'People Had Fun'

WJJD began building additional interest with another promotion that started as a seemingly minor con-

test and mushroomed into a major triumph. The first on-air announcement about the contest explained that the winner would receive a five-gallon gasoline can.

"We got a few postcards — about 75 entries — because some people like to participate in anything," Lane explains.

next week, we gave away a coat hanger padded in a gold cloth. And then the cards started coming in. We gave away a mink coat on that hanger.

"The next item was a rope, and we took out newspaper ads. By then, the press was going crazy, wondering 'what is it?" We gave away the rope — attached to a steer — for a side of beef."

The station also gave away an escalator ride, which came with a \$1000 gift certificate from a local department store. Lane says, "People had fun; that was the main thing. We'd get people to rewrite lyrics to songs to reflect politics or something else.

"People thought they were part of the radio station in some way. They got to know you like they knew the artists. You don't have that these days."

As with their predecessors in the late '40s and early '50s, concerts were a cornerstone in station promotions. **Mike Oatman** recalls, "I used to work very closely with **Hubert Long**, who booked **Ferlin Husky**, **Roy Drusky, Buck Owens**, and many others. He'd put together a four- or five-act show for us. They'd come to town and we'd promote it. That was a major part of our promotions, as it is today for a lot of stations. However, there wasn't another guy in town playing country, so they didn't fight over it."

He remembers booking a concert featuring Skeeter Davis, Kitty Wells, Johnnie Wright, Little Jimmy Dickens, and George Morgan — an all-star cast in the early '60s. "The whole show cost me \$800."

Live Baby Giveaway

In the late '50s, stunts were the order of the day at WCMS/Norfolk it once staged a beard-growing contest among the disc jockeys. But one of its more outrageous pranks occurred in 1959 when the station

aired a non-country record.

Describing "Pakalafaka" as a Turkish hit, WCMS owner George Crump says, "The melodic line was reminiscent of minarets, and the lead singer was evidently a camel." No phone calls came in after the first time the ag- record was played that morning.

"But by lunch time," Crump refilembers, "the record had spun through its groove 18 times or so, and the calls started coming in."

And the Turkish hit just kept on playing. "[Station manager] **Roy Lamere** just happened to be out of the office on a duck shoot in the Carolinas. DJs **Bob Powers, Joe Hoppel, Lee Whitehead,** and **Sam Barbee** took full advantage,

managing to play the record 200 times or so before sign-off."

At sign-on the following morning, "Pakalafaka" was the first song played. The station got more calls —



and more attention — by playing the song 300 times that day.


When Lamere finally returned, the *Virginia-Pilot* newspaper reported, his first act was to chase Powers off the microphone in mid-commercial to ban him from the station. The newspaper also reported that Lamere fired Hoppel, Whitehead, and Barbee. "The media had a field day," Crump says. The incident made headlines. But

that was nothing compared to the attention generated in the early '60s when the station announced that it would be giving away a live baby during a concert starring **Don Gibson.** Crump says, "There were complaints — tons of them."

True to its word, the station did give away a live baby — pig. "Gall pays," Crump contends, "at least some of the time."

From 'Pickers' To Disc Jockeys

W ith the '60s came a major change in Country air talent. While early jocks were often aspiring country musicians who spun records, the talent tide begun shifting to "radio people" who played country music — particularly as Country began wedging its way into major northern markets.

Mack Sanders recalls that in the early '50s, the staff at KMA/ Shenandoah, IA included more than 40 entertainers. In fact, Ike Everly—the Everly Brothers' father — played guitar for him. "The Everly Brothers sang their first song on my show," says Sanders, who met his first wife, Jeannie, at KMA. She, too, was a singer.

"There were a lot of pickers," says **Ted Cramer.** "At **KCKN/ Kansas City** in 1957, I think all but one of the guys was a picker. I was never a picker. I was a radio guy. **Jack Reno** worked for me at KCKN in 1959-60. He left to join the Army, but Jack was a picker. I hired him again at **WUBE/Cincin**-

nati in 1970. So you still had pickers working in Country radio even then, but not as many of them."

Turning Point

WCMS/Norfolk pioneer George Crump saw 1956 as a turning point for radio disc jockeys. "That was the time when a DJ became as big a listener attraction as the type of music he played. DJs had to have personality-plus and a fancy moniker."

But even as radio folks were being hired to staff stations, Sanders preferred to use people who knew the music. "I used a lot of my band members and made disc jockeys out of them. That way, I didn't have to go out and hire people who didn't know how to do it. I didn't go out and hire any Rock jocks at all."

Crump also knew the value of pickers back then, noting that Station Manager "Sheriff" Tex Davis went "straight to the haystack" for talent. He hired a three-piece country band and dubbed them "The Virginians." Not only did they do a live show at noon — "which was very much in vogue" in the mid-'50s but they also helped around the station, Crump says. Additionally, one singer's wife doubled as the bookkeeper and the first traffic reporter.

Chris Lane wasn't looking for pickers when he hired personalities for his newly flipped Country outlets in Seattle and later Chicago. "With the exception of one or two, the people on the air were all former Rock jocks. We wanted the quality of what was a Rock station, but we

didn't want all the phony bullshit. We wanted to do it legit. I didn't want anybody on the staff who couldn't say, 'I'm into this'. They were just quality air personnel, which was what I wanted. That's what we did in St. Louis, too.

"I asked them to be warm and friendly. Just speak to the people. Keep it concise. At that time, anybody who was devoted to country music not only knew the artist's name, they knew who the writer was and who the sidemen were who played on the session. You could use all that stuff. They were very intense and loyal."

'No Pickin' And Grinnin"

Bill Robinson still remembers his first memo to the WMNI/Columbus airstaff as he prepared to flip it from Beautiful Music to Country. Actually, it was more like a handbook. "The memo included mentions of which country artists were deceased, along with details about proper on-air delivery. I told them, 'There's not going to be any pickin' and grinnin'. We are going to treat our audience with the same manner of intelligence as we've treated our audience in our Beautiful Music format.'

"I kept every announcer ... and we made them Country personalities, which was a challenge because I had hired them as Beautiful Music announcers. But I knew them well enough to know that they had personalities and weren't just velvet voices.

"I instructed them to back-an-

nounce every record and pre-announce either the artist or the song before playing it. We had to educate ourselves. I got all the stuff the CMA could give me and every book I could find on the entertainers. We referred to it as the Nashville sound. We may have used the term 'countrypolitan' until we found someone who said they had a copyright on it. There was no Country & Western and we were

hot going to acknowledge the word hillbilly. We treated it as professionally as any format we had ever done. We weren't talking to people with their teeth missing, their feet in the dirt.

and barefoot and pregnant." At that time, Col. Sanders-type ties were popular. Robinson got red ties for everybody and that's what

ties for everybody and that's what they wore in public. "We still had a traffic helicopter and a four-man news team. All we did was change the music. We became warm and friendly. We didn't talk a lot but were keyed on being believable."

Cramer notes that air talent at KCKN had to do a lot more than spin records. "We cut commercials and read newscasts. We had a news director in morning drive. The rest of the time the jocks read newscasts. Split shifts were normal in those years. You'd work 6-9am and then noon-2pm. Or you would work 9am-noon and then 2-4pm. That's just the way it was. Everybody worked eight hours. On the hours you were off, you read the hourly newscast and cut commercials."

'Real Disdain'

During his tenure at KHEY/El Paso, Mike Oatman and his peers noticed that few Country radio veterans were invited to the big city when stations in major metropolitan areas began making the format switch. "The Country guys would say things like 'They've got a bunch of rock'n' roll guys up there. What do they know about country music?' And they really didn't know much about it. We looked down our noses and scorned them. I heard one of them say once, 'That's Slim Whiteman.' That

kind of stuff was ridiculed by the guys who knew the business and knew the artists. You looked at it with disdain.

"There was a real strong branding concept that separated the real Country guys from the new guys. There was also a difference in the intimate knowledge of the music and artists. Most of the guys who were doing Country in those days had a personal interest in the music. They knew it upside down and backwards, and loved to spin the folklore. They marketed the artists by telling little stories about them up front. In my opinion, they did a much better job of building artists by telling those stories."

Oatman may have had some philosophical differences with his northern counterparts, but he credits WJJD/Chicago and other stations with tailoring the programming to fit their particular markets. "They thought, 'We're not going to be one of those "howdy folks, friends and neighbors, send me your cards and letters" stations.' They deliv-

ered it with a totally different approach. In reality, the really good Country stations had good production and an uptown approach, but not as much as what they were doing at WJJD."

At the same time, Oatman says Country radio veterans were still saying, "I hear they're calling it 'countrypolitan' up in Chicago. They're ashamed to admit they're playing country music."

More 'Whirling Disc'

Toward the end of this period, things began to change again. Crump laments, "By about 1966, I sensed that the era of the personality DJ was changing. It seems people were looking for less entertainment from the DJs and more from the whirling disc. Perhaps the populace as a whole was growing too sophisticated for old-time country hype, or perhaps it was tiring of the country prototype because of overexposure on radio and TV. Or perhaps it simply wished for more music and less talk, which TV wasn't offering."

Or perhaps Country managers and programmers were taking notice of the **Bill Drake**-formatted card readers who staffed the dominating Top 40 stations of the era. Whatever the reason, the era of Country disc jockeys was coming to a close.



A TOUGH SELL Overcoming Format Prejudice

nly in the last few years has Country radio been able to sell advertising in a climate relatively free of the negative stigma that's been associated with Country and its listeners for so long.

As unbelievable as it may sound, however, there are still a few advertisers issuing "no Country" decrees. But can you imagine how tough it was during the early days of fulltime

Convincing Advertisers

Country-formatted stations?

Mack Sanders says things were so tough that at one point he had to sell his plane and car to make ends meet. He even went to advertisers and asked them to pay him on the 15th of each month - just so he could pay his employees.

Things weren't quite as bad at KCKN/Kansas City. But Ted Cramer remembers the days when advertisers had to be convinced of Country's power among consumers. "It was a much tougher sell than it is today. And we happened to have pretty good ratings. I think we provided the radio base for Country in Kansas City.

"Kansas City has always been a terrific country market. I believe it's because there's always been a strong station that played country music. It kind of shapes the base for how strong the format is in most markets."

Cramer admits that many major advertisers were not interested in attracting Country listeners. "There were a lot of agency buys that didn't come to Country radio, so there was a lot of direct selling to businesses.

"But Country radio always worked, pulling a lot of business for its advertisers. We also had a lot of car dealers, which was a big catego-

ry for Country. Just about every sponsor that used Country radio got results. As a matter of fact, KCKN used to have a slogan, 'KCKN gives results, not excuses.' And it was really true."

Image-Boosting Concerts Sanders was one of many in Country radio who used concerts to proes in five states because of the signal we'd always take these surveys.

"We found out that 53% of our audience owned their homes; that the top brain surgeon in Chicago was an avid listener; and that the family [responsible for] elongating cars and making them into stretch limos were fans. We even did weekly shows at a nightclub to help turn around the preconceived idea of who the country music audience was.

'We told [advertisers] who the audience was, rather than who they

thought it was. Combining what we did ratings-wise and publicity-wise, other stations jumped on the format. They started experimenting with what they were going

to do - 'Countrypolitan' and 'Town & Country' were schticks. They didn't want to really say they were Country. They wanted to play with it in some way

Healing The Sick

Subliminal messages played no role when WCMS/Norfolk became more aggressive in attracting advertisers. The station's first official radio cruiser captured the interest of advertisers and listeners alike.

"It was a red ambulance, complete with siren and funny lights," remembers George Crump. "The letters WCMS blazed from the door panels. The words 'We Cure Sick Businesses' were printed under the call letters, and the rest of the ambulance was festooned with various pieces of print matter."

The ambulance's "medics" were sales staff members Roy Lamere and

30 Years Of Dog-And-Pony Shows

he Country Music Association was one of the sponsors of the "Power Of Country Radio Tour" that played to ad agencies and buyers across the U.S. two years ago. It was not totally unlike the dog-and-pony show the CMA sponsored back in the mid-'60s.

Chris Lane recalls, "WJJD/Chicago's success broke down the barriers [associated with] buying Country radio. The CMA became parl of it because they realized it as well."

On the CMA's behalf, Tex Ritter one of country music's most charismatic figures - hosted a series of luncheons during the early '60s to win the favor of advertisers. In fact, Lane remembers a highlight of the CMA's Chicago presentation, when Ritter and his entourage gave away a Tennessee walking horse.

They used to take these shows to different cities," Ralph Emery recalls. "They did it in Detroit and Chicago. And I think they did it in New York, Los Angeles, and other places. They'd take the prominent singers of the day, do a show in major strategic markets, and do their pitch about Country radio. They'd leave some printed material to prove their point that Country radio sold their products

"The CMA had a history and a story to tell. They recorded some of those shows and then used the LP that came out of that as a sales tool to sell country music."

Attitude Adjustment

Emery also notes that, in addition to the national attention paid to Jimmy Dean's ABC-TV show, country music benefited from Irving Waugh and Jack Stapp convincing NBC-TV to be the first to broadcast the CMA Awards show in 1968.

"That was a tough sell. People forget that. But when the ratings came in. they had a winner. It occurred again the next year. Other television producers began to look at that. It opened the door for a lot of other country singers to appear on other shows."

Although the negative attitude toward country might have been expected in the North, it wasn't much different among mainstream business leaders in Nashville. Emery says, "I used to really get upset at Nashville. We had this pro-celebrity golf tournament (during which] we always had parties. A lot of the people in Nashville who didn't like country music would come to our parties, drink our whiskey, eat our food - and still badmouth us."

During his WSM/Nashville tenure, Emery was rummaging through a bookshelf at the studio when he found a book which quoted Grand Ole Opry founder Judge George D. Hay. Emery was sur-prised to find that the issues facing Country radio in the '60s had been addressed several decades before.

"One of the things he said was, 'We don't like the word hillbilly because people use it in a derisive manner.' The old judge was a former newspaper man. He'd been around. He knew people.'

The negative attitude toward country began dissipating sometime in the '60s, but Emery neverbothered to notice an exact time when that happened. "I learned to live with it. I just said to hell with it."

George Dail. Crump says, "We announced to the area that Lamere and Dail were business practitioners who knew little about taking blood pressure but were available to patrol local agencies and answer all business distress calls."

The ambulance was just the first of several tricks WCMS used to turn the tide. "What could I do to really shake up our potential advertisers, to make them sit up, take notice, and be entertained?" Crump recalls. "I was in love with the outrageous."

Crump enlisted the services of the Stonemans - a hardcore country act, to be sure --- to invade advertising offices with their lively style of mountain music. Despite the stuffy atmosphere of the offices, Crump suspected "that country hearts beat beneath all those facades."

The entourage was occasionally thrown out of the offices, but the workers were usually entertained by the mini-concerts. Crump says, "We often made sales on the spot, with beaming executives still laughing as they signed on the dotted lines.

More Uphill Battles

Despite the fact that Country was "starting to cook" during the mid-

'60s, the sales staff at WMNI/Columbus still faced an uphill battle. Bill Robinson recalls, "Even by 1965 there was still a very negative image. It was 'hillbilly music' and we were a station playing to the hayfields. We were fighting such campaigns in the newspapers and on television.

"The hardest thing I had to deal with was the morale of the salespeople, who had to go out there every day and get beat up. They faced such strong opposition from their clients and advertising agencies. They had the toughest row to hoe that there was. But our salesmen were all pros. They went out every day in suits. We did not start wearing chaps, cowboy boots, or hats."

Emphasizing to the sales staff that "nobody liked Country but the people," Robinson would add, "We don't care if the advertiser doesn't listen to it. It will bring people into his place of business.

To prove Country's knack for attracting business, Robinson would routinely have photographs taken of WMNI's most successful retail promotions. Those photos would find their way into staff scrapbooks for future ammunition.

mote stations and their clients. "Big advertisers didn't want anything to do with Country. I would bring shows to Wichita and give the tickets away through my advertisers. They'd get into the show for free, but all I was doing was selling advertising."

The situation still hadn't improved very much by 1965. Chris Lane, like Sanders and so many others, used concerts to illustrate the Country demographic to advertisers, "When we went into Chicago, you had the initial belief from agencies and major sponsors that our audience was fourth-grade dropouts, barefoot, and on relief. We had to do a hell of a big turnaround.

"We brought in big shows to the Arie Crown Theater. I started doing surveys with the audiences and asked them to be a help to us, which they were. Every time we did a show or appearance --- and we did appearanc-

efore all-Country formatted stations existed, most stations featured block-programmed country shows. Some were daily, others once a week.

And usually the only people who knew anything about the music on these blocks were the shows' hosts - who more than likely had bartered the time from the station. That meant they were

able to play exactly what they pleased. And if you're on only once a week for five hours a night, there's not exactly a need for computer schedul-

ing software to maintain vertical and horizontal rotations.

But someone had to at least pick the music. And that someone was the PD.

Degrees Of Country

In Chicago, WJJD's Chris Lane was dealing with the sharply defined opinions of his air talent. Lane laughs, "I had one jock who thought Flatt & Scruggs was MOR. Everything would have been 'Don't Give Daddy Any More Whiskey' if he had control of his own show. So I picked the music myself because I knew the direction I wanted to go in.

We still do that today. Maybe it turns somebody off, but we usually showcase an old song and explain the relevance to today's music.'

In the '60s, Oatman says one of the cardinal rules was don't play two female artists back to back. "I never knew why that was the rule," he admits. "I guess it was just our own prejudice during that time. There weren't that many female artists around then.'

Fighting To Play Hits

Ralph Emery started at WSM/ Nashville in 1957 as host of "Opry Star Spotlight" manning the 10:15pm-5am shift. "That's what I inherited, so the emphasis was on people who were on the Grand Ole Opry," Emery says. "I got into more arguments with management because I said, 'I've got to play hit records.' Sometimes the people on the Opry don't have hit records - or not enough of them to sustain an allnight radio program. But if I sandwiched some non-productive Opry star between two hot record-makers, I could get away with it.""

The show would salute one Opry star each night. "They would get a record spin every half-hour each night. And I could play album cuts."


Other than the stipulation that Emery must play Opry stars' records, he had free reign with his overnight show, which continued until 1972. "I developed an open-door policy. I'd take as many phone calls as I could. Frankly, I was pretty off the wall because I was afraid nobody would be listening. I stirred it up as much as I could.

When I walked into the studio, I had a stack of country records. They eren't in any particular order. I had a log that had nothing on it. [Management) gave me a handful of PSAs because they had nothing sold. They said, 'If you read one of these, log it.' They gave me carte blanche to do anything wanted. They just told me to play country -- predominantly Opry stars.

Modern Sound

As Bill Robinson notes, there was a whole new kind of music that was coming out of Nashville in the mid-'60s. The Anita Kerr Singers were backing up a lot of people. They were adding a fullness and a richness that Webb Pierce and Lefty Frizzell never had.

'We played Pierce's and Frizzell's greatest hits, but we had the more modern sound in a faster rotation than we did the more traditional. We didn't

By the late '60s, Country radio included oldies. Cramer says, "In one Pulse book, we had lost some women. When that happened I decided that at

least once a shift we were going to play Jim Reeves oldies – - songs with female appeal That's when we started playing oldies. Up until that time, it had been

a completely current-driven format. We didn't have any research; we played the songs that had been proven hits.'

Luckily, Cramer had the resources to meet the station's needs. His foresight prompted him to begin actively building a collection in 1959. "With every song that came off the chart, I took two brand new dupes and put them in the library. So the library at that station was fabulous. We had two copies of every hit that had ever charted. And we usually had at least one copy — and usually two copies -every album that was released."



form of research that was ever done. "We divided up the heavies, mediums, and lights into the chart positions. We had 50 records, plus maybe three

"We didn't have a music wheel as you do now. I just marked the hot different colored dots on them. We had





two racks of 45s --- currents and oldies - and the jocks would pick what they wanted to play.'

Recalling his duties in Kansas City, Ted Cramer explains, "Basically, the PD decided which music was going to be played, made the phone calls, and did the chart. It was pretty much a Top 40 presentation. I suppose we played 14 songs an hour."

When it came to selecting the music, Cramer employed a system that was very similar to the ones used to-day. "We had the 'Fabulous 50' chart at KCKN/Kansas City; we played all currents. The reason you played all currents in those days was because there were no oldies. When we started the 'Countrypolitan' format, our station was just like a Top 40 except we played country music.

weren't your old hillbilly station --we were a Top 40 Country station. We weren't really, but we used the same techniques the Top 40 stations were using at that time.

"We played whatever we wanted to; we had a chart. We would just grab a handful of records. The first thing I did as a program director was set up a rotation, which we still use today at all of our stations — except for the addi-tion of a fifth category. We did a little research that told us we were missing the boat in a couple of areas. That's the only change we made.'

Here are Oatman's four original categories:

• Chart song: top 25 or top 40 records Classic: old hits

· Comer: new song that hasn't hit

the chart • Choice: at the jock's discretion. The last category may be the most intriguing. "That's where the air personality could play any damn thing he wanted to. There's a lot of education that goes on in that. If he had just played a country-rock song, he wouldn't turn around and play another one. He'd mix it and play bluegrass or an instrumental, or some album cut that nobody had ever heard.

'We encouraged them to experiment and to find something that surprised the audience. Guys listening to us would say, 'My God, you played a Buddy Emmons instrumental during drivetime'or 'You played Webb Pierce between 7 and 8 in the morning. How do you get away with that?'

Technical Turning Points

□ Tracing the technological advances from 45s to audio processing

For the luxury of compact discs and computers. Late '50s Country radio had made the transition to 45s, but stations were still spinning 78s of older recordings.

Before the advent of carts simplified the process of playing commercial spots, DJs were busy cueing fragile acetates or reeling spools of tape while juggling other studio duties. Technology was making its long way slip it on the turntable. We slip-cued everything. If you wanted to change back to 33, you had to stop the turntable and pull the insert out."

Even after the turntables were modified, the metal didn't hold up

Iong under constant use, Cramer says. "The brass got scored and didn't wear very well. The thing would start rattling and making a lot of noise. Then it would

toward the smoother, more professional presentation that shifted Country to a higher plateau by 1967.

Spinning The Music

Ted Cramer can trace these technological advances to his first radio job in the early '50s. "When 1 broke into radio, we were playing all 78s. Then we had transcriptions. They were all played with a 2-1/2 mil stylus. In 1954, the record companies started to ser-


vice 45s along with the 78s. There followed a transition period."

In the late '50s, stations were holding onto equipment that had served them well in the past. "We had Gates 16inch turntables with those big handles on them," Cramer recalls. "Gates supplied a kit to change over your turntables. There were two holes in the top of the platter, and they changed the drive shaft in the motor. So when you turned the handle in one

direction it was 33. When you turned it in the other direction, it was 78.

"In effect, they changed the diameter of the drive shaft with a little thing you slipped over the drive shaft. It made the drive shaft bigger and turned the turntable at 45. So when you turned the handle to 33, it would engage this insert and turn at 45rpm.

"Then we had a slip disc on top. You put the 45 on the slip disc so you could

tapes. ""We played our spots on two Magnacords that were in a rack," Cramer recalls. "You had a peg board with the spots in a reel. It was an A to Z pegboard, and the spots were generally on three-inch and five-inch reels."

Playing the spots required quick reflexes. "If you were triple-spotted, you spooled off the first spot and cued up the next one while the second spot was playing. And you had to be quick. There was no easy way to do it. You had a remote starter on the console for those recorders, but it was a constant up and down, up and down. After you did a four- or five-hour shift, you knew you'd pulled a shift."

Mike Oatman has vivid memories of playing spots on 16-inch acetates during his early days in radio. "They were played on huge turntables that were cued inside out. It had something to do with the way they recorded them. We got really modern in the early '60s when we went to little reels of tape on Magnacorders in the control room. You'd have three or four tape machines and a little rack of these three-inch reels with spots on them separat-

ed by leader tape."

At WMNI/Columbus, Bill Robinson says, "We were still playing our commercials off reel-to-reel. You put a commercial together in those days with a razor blade and splicing tape."

As much as anything, Robinson remembers the sound of the old Spotmaster cart machines. "They had that big, loud, clunking clutch you had to throw. You had to make sure you were talking when you hit

the button. We always put in a onesecond delay before the audio started because of that clunk."

Cramer says, "The Spotmaster used carts like you see today. It had a handle on the top. When you put the cart in, you pulled the handle back and that brought the puck up to the drive shaft."

Although the Spotmaster was the first mass-produced cart machine, Cramer says some stations previously used devices known as McKenzie repeaters. "They had metal carts and were very expensive. They'd get dirty and misfire. You had to clean them all the time. They sounded great when they were working right. But trying to get them to always work right was another story."

Turntable Trials

During his days at **KIMO/Kansas City**, Cramer was using a Collins console and an RCA 77 mike "which was then about the best mike you could get," he remembers. "You had one Gates turntable on the left side and two Gates turntables on the right."

At KCKN, Cramer says the jocks sat between four turntables. "We had two 16-inch Prestos to our left, with viscous-damped arms. They floated down so you couldn't hurt the stylus. On the right side, we had two 12-inch Presto turntables that were set at 45. So we played our 45s on one turntable and the others were set at 33 so we wouldn't make any speed change errors.

"We had all of our commercials in green shucks. They were A to Z. You sat at the console, and there were these bins to the left and right. Depending on what commercials were on the log, you pulled the commercials and set them up that transmitter right across the hall from you.

"We had a 78 turntable because once in a while somebody would request something we only had on 78. For the most part, we played 45s. There was a period of time when they came out with a 33-speed small record. It wasn't an album. It was one record, but it had a little hole in the middle and ran at 33rpm. They tried those for a while, but they never really cut it."

A Mike ... And A Piano

Compared to most, **Ralph Em**ery found himself in opulent surroundings when he started working at WSM/Nashville's downtown

way. We washed the acetates once a week to remove the fingerprints. Oatman says the **KHEY/El Paso** studio consisted of "a couple of turntables, a couple of tape machines, a microphone, and a pretty rustic old console. It wasn't uncommon then, but our station was in the transmitter building — there was a studio. "That radio station was wonderful; a real throwback to the old days. Down at one end of the hall we had a huge auditorium that seated about 300 people. There was a long hallway with various offices. And they had a rather large news department.

"We were on acetates for commercials, so the Spotmasters made life a lot easier on us. The fidelity was much better, and they didn't wear out like the acetates. It was a lot more flexible."



LABOR RELATIONS State Of The Union

C hris Lane's Windy City station experience was quite different from what others experienced at other stations during that era — or any other for that matter. The strong presence of labor unions in Chicago meant it took multiple people to put even a record-driven radio show on the air.

Lane arrived at WJJD in the middle of a work stoppage. "The engineers were on strike for seven or eight weeks because they didn't want us to play our own records. They wanted to play the records, the spots, and everything on their side of the glass. I knew that was going to be a pain in the butt because I wanted album product in there for specific cuts the guys could play. They would have to be able to do this themselves,

LEGENDS OF COUNTRY RADIO

A Kinder, Gentler Promotional Push

Fewer artists, labels meant less time spent marketing aggressively

t's hard to imagine a time when stars would make unscheduled phone calls or station visits. It's even harder to fathom the days when PDs weren't constantly being hammered by label promotion staffs.

For the most part, Country radio legends say, record companies did a competent job promoting their records during the '60s. But radio veterans offer the reminder that there weren't as many labels - or artists - to contend with in those days.

Gentler Times

"It wasn't nearly as aggressive as it is today," Ted Cramer notes. "By and large, we got our records in the mail. There were very, very few personal visits - some occasional phone calls from the record companies

"Remember, there weren't very many artists in those days. You didn't have the volume of artists you have today and the intense compe-

ing country records - even the people being paid to do it. He recalls a conversa-

tion with [publisher] Al Gallico, who called to ask about a specific record. When Lane said he hadn't heard the record, Gallico said an independent promotions man should have already delivered the wax. Lane told him, "I haven't seen this guy in six or seven months." For the most part, in-

tition. You didn't have as many record companies. You had Columbia, Capitol, RCA, Mercury, and

says, "They had all the accounts because they had the Black stations and the Rock stations --- they automatically got the Country stations." Lane told Gallico to contact Paul

Gallis, a Chicago-based promoter. "Paul Gallis is probably one of the hardest-working promotions men

I've ever known,' Lane says. "He didn't know anything about Country, but he got into it and was legitimate in his cause. Paulie would go to every station he was

supposed to; the other guys wouldn't do anything. That's the way it was at first."

Even the country labels were lax when it came to promoting and marketing the music. Lane says, "Columbia was the best at the time. I can't remember anybody who was Country promotion alone at that time. It just wasn't considered a big deal in terms of sales. The guys then just didn't have any feel for what the music was ¹

Working With Nashville

"You had people in Nashville who were so happy to have outlets, they worked with you," Lane explains. "The radio guys worked back with them. It was of mutual interest to make both aspects of your business a success. I don't think that's there anymore. Radio figures, 'If they go bust or that record goes dead, who cares?' That's my feeling. If I'm wrong, I would be more than happy to apologize.

Former KHEY/El Paso PD Mike Oatman hasn't seen a drastic change in the relationship between the labels and Country radio since the '60s. "Somebody would call to promote a record, try to get you play it. You always gave the labels great respect because that was your source of supply for records. Where I was, you were always so glad that anybody from Nashville would call you although artists did that more frequently in those days.'

Unscheduled phone calls from the stars were more frequent, however. 'Guys like Webb Pierce would call you," Oatman says. "You'd hear from George Morgan."

Oatman recalls Johnny Horton and manager Tillman Franks dropping by KHEY to visit air personality Uncle Virgil Bond. They were on their way to Nashville to record Horton's next single. Franks asked his artist to wing the song, and Horton responded with the opening lines of "The Battle Of New Orleans."


"Virgil got the first copy of it that was sent out. Tillman sent an acetate of it. Of course, we played it and made a big deal out of it.'

contact with label promotion staffs. "I had a very good relationship. They were very hard-working people. I got Jeannie C. Riley's 'Harper Valley PTA' three or four hours after it was cut. Shelby Singleton brought up an acetate.'

Once his overnight radio show gained popularity, Emery started getting visits from stars - including non-Opry members. "At one time. I had the only game in the country they could use to promote their product. Because of WSM's reach, they came. There was nowhere else to go to get a fair shake on promotion.

"People today don't realize how isolated the business was. The print media was not nearly as friendly as it is today. You didn't have the great number of radio stations playing country music. You didn't have two television networks promoting country. It was a time when a lot of very talented people were struggling.

"There were nights in that studio when I'd have eight or 10 singers — I'd have to take them in shifts. I developed a rather hard style of interviewing, I guess, to break up the monotony. It's a long time from 10 at night 'til five in the morning. So I got somewhat of a reputation for being a hardass in the interviews.

"A lot of people dropped by because I was user-friendly. Today, the marketing is different. People have larger organizations. Nashville was never a big town on managers. Everybody had an agent to book them, but not many had managers."

Chris Lane explains, "One of the problems was that you couldn't get the record companies to give a damn about whether they had a hit or not. They didn't really hustle to put them in record shops. Finally, I got so pissed in Chicago, I called some record guys and said, 'We're going to play the records. But it puts us in a bind when listeners call and [say] they're angry at us because they can't buy them anywhere."

Lane got their attention when he suggested he might have his DJs provide an on-air announcement: "We know you can't buy these records. So every Friday from 3pm to 4pm, we'll play all the new ones and you tape them."

The labels were concerned, to put it mildly.

"They went nuts. But it got the message across. I was just trying to tell them they were missing a hell of a lot of product sales out there.

Treated Like Bologna

Ralph Emery agrees that fans in some parts of the nation had a hard time buying country records. "It was a big problem, except in isolated areas. Without any distribution, you might as well not be in the record business. Or if you have distribution and you can't get anybody to display your product or merchandise it for you, you're dead in the water."

Emery recalls visiting NYC to tape a syndicated radio show. "I went into a record store up there to ask if they had any country records. This guy treated it like it was bologna. He said, 'I think we've got some Johnny Cash in the back.' I wanted to say, 'Well, wrap me up a pound."



Country Radio: Missing The Entertainment Factor

A s the music changed, so did Country radio. No one would dispute the format's current success.

But several Country radio legends think Country radio has lost something through the years. They

feel an underlying sense that stations aren't as responsive to their listeners and that the talent level of today's air p e r s o n a lities doesn't match that

'Barren Wasteland'

Mike Oatman admits his programming prejudices, but minces no words when asked his opinion about today's Country radio. "I'm probably a radical, wide-eyed redneck in this area. But I think that

about the product or the listeners," Chris Lane says. "You've got places where it's the only station there — and they figure, 'If they're not going to listen to us, the hell with them.'"

These days, few disc jockeys are allowed to display much of their personality, Lane contends. "We had more fun then. You were allowed to have fun. It's so tight now. They don't want anybody to say anything. It's all 'no talk.' If you've got a station that's just playing music, I've got to know you well enough to like or dislike you. If I'm going to like you, I've got to have something that sets you apart from the other stations.

"Did you ever drive along in the early days and hear somebody totally break [up laughing] on the air? You didn't know why, but you broke up as well. How do you explain the Talk radio phenomenon and yet, with music, you can't say anything at all?"

Lane thinks certain aspects of Country radio will eventually come full circle. "One of these days, a PD of a station that's having some problems will probably say, 'Hey, I've got a great idea. Let's get five or six talented air people and put them on the air. Let each one do their own show as long as it falls within the confines of something great-sounding. Maybe his personality is different than the Country radio now — for the most part — is a barren wasteland. It clearly is successful, so it's sort of weird for me to say that. But I believe we quit entertaining people a long time ago.

"Back in those days, Country radio entertained you as well as played the music for you. They informed you and they talked to you. The air personalities had great followings. They were as popular as the artists they played. And they were role models; you'd think, 'I want to be like that guy.' Today, not many people want to be like a liner card.

"We were a hell of a lot more interesting to listen to. There was more variety and more of the things that our perceptual research constantly tells us are still on listeners' minds.

Oatman frequently hears two criticisms about today's Country stations. "People complain that they play too many commercials, no matter how few they actually play. The other one is that they don't play enough variety. We delved further and found out they meant that they heard too many of the same songs over and over again. When you see somebody is playing a song 52 spins a week ... I think that's what they're talking about. Our whole company is structured on the concept that we're not a jukebox.

"We play a lot of music, but we also have news and we let the guys be personalities. They do some selection of the music, although we use a computer program. They have complete editing rights over it. As long as they edit within the classification of the rotation, they're fine. If you call up to request a song, they decide what category it fits in. When that category rolls around again, they play it."

Who Sang The Last Song?

These days, Country listeners may love a certain record yet be unaware of the artist's name. **Ralph Emery** says, "I have to agree with the artists who say, 'If you're gonna play it, say it.' We always identified every record we played. And I've always worked very hard to communicate with the public. I didn't want the public to listen to me and not understand what I was trying to do.

"I would never have played somebody's record and not announced it. I know more artists who complain to me, 'You work hard all your life to make good records. But when you get them on the air, they won't even identify you.'

"The formats are tighter and nobody is allowed to do much on their own. Radio has become somewhat impersonal — even though during ratings sweeps, they have all these contests ... and kiss everybody's butts."

Emery also has few kind words for radio consultants. "I did not see it coming nor would I have predicted it. But I'm very suspect of

The Struggle To Move North

WJJD format switch is litmus test for Country's acceptance in major markets

The significance of **WJJD/Chicago**'s success and its pivotal role in the future growth of Country radio in major markets cannot be minimized.

Chris Lane notes, "The general consensus in both the radio and record industries was that if WJJD didn't make it happen, that would be it for Country in major markets."

Here are excerpts from *Variety* columnist **Les Brown**'s front-page account (3/3/65) about the format change:

How WJJD will fare with its switch to an all-Country & Western music format is being carefully watched by the general music trade, for the **Plough** station now stands to be a barometer of the C&W climate in the northern metropolis.

It's long been the belief of the Nashville music industry that their product has outgrown its regional boundaries, that C&W is no longer esoterically rural, and that it has lost the old 'hillbilly' stigmas in the urban centers, at least with the younger generations. Whether it's true or not will be indicated by the **Pulse** and **Hooper** numbers a few months hence.

And in what can only be termed a left-handed endorsement, Brown went on to say why he thought WJJD could succeed:

As for the southern migrant in Chicago, while he's somewhat of a sociological problem, he's nevertheless without representation in the communications media. Since he has little to identify with in urban culture, WJJD could fill an important void for him. Also, as a consumer he's anything but negligible, especially when it comes to the living essentials. And you think you have trouble selling ads to the BMW dealer.


people programming your radio stations who do not live in your market. Every market has its own identifying stamp. The mores and culture of Mobile, AL have to be different than Louisville, KY. In order to appeal to your particular region, your records have to be programmed by somebody in your market."

Pop, Science Meet

"Country now is like pop used to be," **Mack Sanders** contends. "Years ago, **Garth Brooks** would not have been played on a Country station and neither would **Shania Twain** — and I love that record she's got out. They'd be on Pop stations. We had the **Everly Brothers, Fabian**... all those people made pop records in the '60s. That music now fits Country like a glove."

Programming a radio station has become a science, George Crump notes. "We could do things that were daring and different in those days. We'd do things for the hell of it and hope it turned out well.

"Nobody's very anxious to take a gamble these days. There's so much competition now and the approach to everything is scientific. That takes some of the fun and spark out of radio."

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The Country Music Scene, 1958-1966

By Robert K. Oermann

he music world was on fire in 1958. During the next decade, it would put in place most of the strategies that have characterized its modern history.

The blaze had been ignited two years earlier by **Elvis Presley**, a country boy who learned to wiggle like an R&B star. His rock 'n' roll revolution virtually burned to the ground all of the existing music business institutions. Overnight, an entire generation of supper-club crooners was rendered insignificant. For the first time, music became the province of young people, an emerging market instantly dubbed "teenagers."

A United Industry

Grasping to make sense of the bonfire, the industry began to unite in 1958. The National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences was formed and presented its first Grammy Awards that year. Initially developed to promote "good"

musicians as opposed to the South's rockabilly rebels, this institution eventually evolved into music's most prestigious awardsgiver. The first Grammys went to artists like Henry Mancini, the Kingston Trio, the Chipmunks, Ella Fitzgerald, and the Champs.

Also in 1958, the **Recording Industry Association of America** initiated the formal practice of issuing gold record awards, signaling music's emergence as a major profit center. **Perry Como** earned the first RIAA gold record, followed closely by **Laurie London**, the "Oklahoma!" soundtrack, **Perez Prado**, and Elvis.

Country At Crossroads

One of the genres burned worst by the rock 'n' roll conflagration was country music. Radio was still in the early years of formatting. Country, with its strong association with blue-collar, rural, southern adult listeners, wasn't high on anybody's list as a format as the industry turned toward style-conscious teen marketing. By 1958, only 81 stations were broadcasting country fulltime. That was the year the Country Music Association was founded to promote Nashville's most famous export. In years to come the CMA would

The CEW years

earn a reputation as "the world's most active trade association."

Music Row had initially responded to teen consumers by creating its own youth-oriented records to rival the ones coming from Memphis, Los Angeles, Chicago, New Orleans, and New York. These included such top 10 smashes as Gene Vincent's "Be Bop A Lula" (1956), Sonny James's "Young Love" (1957), Ferlin Husky's "Gone" (1957), Bobby Helms's "Jingle Bell Rock" (1956), Tommy Sands's "Teen-Age Crush" (1957), George Hamilton IV's "A Rose And A Baby Ruth" (1956), Marty Robbins's "A White Sport Coat" (1957), and the early successes of Brenda Lee and the Everly Brothers. Most of these were also significant country hits.

It's also important to remember that Presley's early **Sun Records** singles charted in country, not pop; that his 1956 "Heartbreak Hotel" breakthrough was recorded in Nashville; and that the superstar charted 84 times in country during the next 27 years. Presley was a perennial Country radio presence who achieved a total of 31 top 10 country hits.

The Nashville Sound

Conway Twitty, country's chart champion, recorded his teen an-- "It's Only Make Believe" them -- in Nashville in 1958. Sheb Wooley's novelty "The Purple People Eater" was a hit that year as well; and the Everlys continued their rockabilly string of Music Row hits. Decca Records opened its Nashville office in 1958, joining rivals Mercury (1952) and RCA (1955). Capitol (1960) and Columbia (1962) would soon follow suit. Decca's Owen Bradley, RCA's Chet Atkins, and such figures as Anita Kerr, the Jordanaires, Grady Martin, and Marvin Hughes began to fashion a new "uptown" style of country, a sound that could seem as at home in suburbia as on the farm. The idea was to combat rock 'n' roll by crafting records that could compete with it on the pop charts.

One record that is often cited as the first in this new "Nashville Sound" style is **Don Gibson's** "Oh Lonesome Me," produced by Atkins in 1958. The first Nashville Sound record to hit No.1 on the pop charts was also an Atkins creation for RCA, "The Three Bells" by the **Browns** (1959). Also typical were "He'll Have To Go" by **Jim Reeves**, "Don't Worry" by Marty Robbins, "Last Date" by **Floyd** Cramer, "Walk On

By" by Leroy Van Dyke, "Crazy" and "I Fall To Pieces" by Patsy Cline, "The End Of The World" by Skeeter

Davis, "Hello Walls" by **Faron Young**, and "Still" by **BillAnderson** — all of which crossed from country to the pop charts in 1960-63.

Hardcore country fans resented the Nashville Sound. But it unquestionably broadened country music's appeal, essentially "saving" the industry during its darkest days.

Folk And Pop Trends

This was also the era of the folk music revival, a movement heralded by the Kingston Trio's "Tom Dooley" in 1958, which won its Grammy in the country field. Nashville marketers were quick to note this and capitalize on the trend. RCA album sleeves of the period even bore the logo "Folk-Country."

Nashville songwriters wrote a raft of imitation folk tunes. Dubbed "saga songs," these 1959-64 efforts included Johnny Horton's "Battle Of New Orleans" and "North To Alaska," Stonewall Jackson's "Waterloo," Marty Robbins's "El Paso," Lefty Frizzell's "Long Black Veil," Bobby Bare's "Detroit City" and "500 Miles Away From Home," Eddy Arnold's "Tennessee Stud," Jimmy Dean's "Big Bad John," Claude King's "Wolverton Mountain," and Johnny Cash's "Don't Take Your Guns To Town," "Frankie's Man Johnny," "I Got Stripes," "The Rebel — Johnny Yuma," and "Understand Your Man." Bare, Waylon Jennings, Jody Miller, Don Williams, and others were first introduced as

The Dean Of Country Music

A s Country radio expanded into metropolitan areas, many big-city residents got their first real look at the format's artists through national television shows. And the name of one artist from this era cropped up repeatedly during our conversations with the various Country radio legends — Jimmy Dean.

The daytime "Jimmy Dean Show" aired from 1963-66 on ABC-TV. Dean, who had enjoyed hits with "Big Bad John" and "P.T. 109," also hosted an evening show on the network between 1964-66.

Mack Sanders explains Dean's impact: "The Jimmy Dean TV show was the turning point for country music. Before he got his own show, Jimmy Dean did the 'Tonight Show' and absolutely tore it up. He brought **Roy Clark** on with him; it was unbelievable.

"He then was offered the ABC show, and he had to fight every week to keep it country. They tried to put dancers on it — and all kinds of stuff that didn't fit."

Never Given Credit

"It was easier to sell Country after the 'Jimmy Dean Show.' He's never been given his due for what he did for country music. Most of the people in country music don't even know. Believe me, I was in the trenches at that time."

Recalling when **WJJD/Chicago** switched to Country in early 1965, **Chris Lane** says, "Just prior to going on the air, I went to New York with [station executives] **Harold Krelstein** and **George Dubinetz**. One of the guests at the lunch was Jimmy Dean, who was doing the ABC television show. At the end of the lunch, Jimmy said, 'I'm so into this and I hope it works. The week before you go [on the air], call me."

Lane called Dean and gave him the date for the Monday kickoff. "I think his show was on a Wednesday or a Friday. During the show's opening, he said, 'I want to let everybody in the Midwest know that come Monday, WJJD — at 50,000 watts — is going to go fulltime country music. 'We couldn't have paid for that. And **WLS**, which was the ABC affiliate, like to have died."

"folk" artists. **Burl Ives** crossed over in the other direction, from folk to country.

In the meantime, Nashville's brand of pop continued to make hay. Roy Orbison, Ray Stevens,

Brenda Lee, **Bobby Golds**boro, and Johnny Tillotson enjoyed sustained success in the teen market. **Mark Dinning** ("Teen Angel"), Tommy Roe ("Sheila"), Joe Dowell ("Wooden Heart"), Wanda Jackson ("Let's Have A Party"), Ronnie

& The Daytonas ("G.T.O."), Sue Thompson ("Sad Movies," "Norman"), and the Newbeats ("Bread And Butter") also made waves. Most would later retreat to country careers. During the early '60s a group of R&B stars also brought pop attention to country songwriting when Solomon Burke, Ray Charles, Brook Benton, Clyde McPhatter, and Esther Phillips repopularized classic country tunes.

The **Beatles** invaded the U.S. in 1964. This marked the birth of "stadium concerts," the dawn of an era when the live performance industry became a show-biz phenomenon. Records sold in previously unimagined quantities as band after band landed on American shores from Britain.

Country Moves Mainstream

At the time, country acts were still appearing at county fairs and

municipal auditoriums on "package tours": multiple-artist "shower of stars" events where acts performed their hits, but generally not entire shows. This state of affairs didn't begin to change until after



the landmark 1969 Johnny Cash/ Hank Williams Jr. concert at Cobo Hall in Detroit that grossed \$93,000, setting a new record for the era.

Only a handful were genuine headliners with their own drawing power. A mega-star of the late 1940s and early 1950s, Eddy Arnold embraced the Nashville Sound string sections in the 1960s, donned a tux, and reportedly became the wealthiest act in country history. "What's He Doing In My World" (1965), "Make The World Go Away" (1965), "The Tip Of My Fingers" (1966), "Misty Blue" (1967), "Then You Can Tell Me Goodbye" (1968), and other hits redefined Arnold's stardom. Ray Price took a similarly tuxedoed route. His "Danny Boy" in 1967 outraged purists by employing a full-blown orchestra. The only country artist who met

the British Invasion head to head on the pop charts was the irrepressible Roger Miller. His "Dang Me," "Chug A Lug," "King Of The Road," "Engine Engine #9," and "England Swings" during 1964-65 earned him 11 Grammys, a total unmatched until the rise of Michael Jackson nearly 20 years later.

Glen Campbell sang "Gentle On My Mind["] and "By The Time I Get To Phoenix" in 1967, launching his pop-crossover stardom. Miller and Campbell both made the transition to network television with their own series.

Country On Television

TV was a major force in broadening country's appeal during the 1960s. Jimmy Dean (1957-66), Roy Rogers (1962), and Tennessee Ernie Ford (1956-61) also boasted their own network series. The massively popular "Beverly Hillbillies" (1962-71) featured Flatt & Scruggs as regulars. The

nual awards during this period; all would eventually become national TV specials in the decades to come. California's Academy of Country Music was first, presenting its "Hat" awards to acts such as Buck Owens, Merle Haggard, and Roger Miller in 1965. Music City News began presenting its fanvoted trophies in 1967, honoring Haggard, Loretta Lynn, Tom T. Hall, Tammy Wynette, Tompall & The Glaser Brothers, Bill Anderson, and the Wilburn Brothers at its first ceremony. The Country Music Association's first awards also took place in 1967. Eddy Arnold, Jack Greene, Loretta Lynn, the Stonemans, and Chet Atkins were among the evening's big winners. The following year the CMAs became the first nationally televised music awards in history.

Stars Of The Era

The "keep it country" brigade may have watched in dismay as country marched uptown in its new suits and evening gowns.

But there was plenty on the charts to cheer them. Indeed. this era witnessed the rise of the superstars who were to define country for decades to come; men and women whose names still mean "country music" all over the world today — Johnny Cash, George Jones, Tammy Wynette, Loretta Lynn, Charley Pride. Buck Owens, Merle

Haggard, Mel Tillis, and Dolly Parton.

By 1958 Johnny Cash had already become a force on the pop charts with "I Walk The Line. "Ballad Of A Teenage Queen" and "I Guess Things Happen That Way." During the next 10 years he became a national icon for the folkies and a symbol for the emerging hippie culture of working-class dignity, alienation, social justice, and rebellion.

George Jones already had six top 10 hits when the CMA was established in 1958. In 1959 he created his classic "White Lightning"; in rapid succession thereafter came "The Window Up Above" (1960), "She Thinks I Still Care" (1962), "A Girl I Used To Know" (1962), "The Race Is On" (1964), "Love Bug" (1965), and "If My Heart Had Windows" (1967) - all definitive honky-tonk performances. The so-called "Bakersfield

Sound" was another hard-country phenomenon of the era. Buck Owens emerged in 1959 with the top 10 "Under Your Spell Again," and during the next 10 years his spare, piercing, propulsive sonic attack ruled the Country airwayes. "Above And Beyond" (1960), "Act Naturally" (1963), "My Heart Skips A Beat"/"Together Again" (1963), "I've Got A Tiger By The Tail"/"Crying Time" (1965), and more than 40 additional top 10 smashes made Owens one of the biggest stone-country heroes of all time.

Merle Haggard's career kickoff came in 1963. By 1967 he'd sung such monuments as "Sing Me Back Home," "Swinging Doors," "I'm A Lonesome Fugitive," and "The Bottle Let Me Down." Today Haggard is the most imitated vocal stylist in country music.

Charley Pride was as country as grits, too. The "Jackie Robinson of country music" first hit the charts with "Just Between You And Me" in1966, becoming an instant superstar. Porter Wagoner's immortal "Green Green Grass Of Home" was a 1965 hit, while Mel Tillis was en route to major stardom with 1967's "Life Turned Her That Way.'

The Female Perspective

The biggest star of the Nashville Sound era was unquestionably Patsy Cline. Her "Greatest Hits" remains the all-time biggest-selling female country album to this day. She opened the door for an entire generation of stylists. A year after her 1963 death. Dottie West won the first female country artist Grammy, and Connie Smith rocketed to stardom. Their Grand Ole Opry sisters include Jan Howard, Jeannie Seely, Skeeter Davis, Jeanne Pruett, and Jean Shepard.

Loretta Lynn, Tammy Wynette, and Dolly Parton are the three figures who unquestionably redefined female country music in the 60s. Loretta arrived first, scoring her debut hit in 1960. Her feisty point of view was refined on 1964-67 favorites like "You Ain't Woman Enough," "Happy Birthday," and "Don't Come Home A Drinkin'." Tammy emerged in 1966 with "Apartment #9," following it in 1967 with career records such as "Your Good Girl's Gonna Go Bad" and "I Don't Wanna Play House,"

In January 1967, Monument Records issued "Dumb Blonde" by newcomer Dolly Parton. During the next 25 years Dolly would become the biggest multimedia country star of modern times and a living symbol of how high country would climb in the entertaiment pantheon of the '70s, '80s, and '90s.

instead of running around to the engineer's side.

We had musicians playing the records and broadcast engineers playing the spots. The engineer who did your carts, your commercials, who opened your mike for you, was an IBEW guy. In the studio with me was a musician who had a turntable, who would actually play records. You cued both of these guys when you were doing a show."

(Editor's note: Among those Lane refers to as "musicians" were people who played in studio orchestras during the days when radio shows featured live music. They were in the musicians' union. As the need for live musicians ended, they couldn't be phased out because their union was so strong, especially with the network O&O stations. So they ended up doing other chores around the station. In fact, one of the production engineers at WMAQ/Chicago when I was there in the mid-'70s had been a musician and later a "record turner." These staffers were later absorbed into engineering unions like NABET or IBEW and were employed at the stations until their retirement.)

Lane recalls one of his encounters with a record turner: "I remember there was this old guy who was probably in his 70s. I would cue him and it would take him 10 or 12 seconds to react. I used to kid him, 'If I shot you with a 45-caliber from my side of the glass, it would be 10 seconds before you'd fall on your ass.' I finally told him to play the record when I pointed to him no matter what else I was doing. I got to where I'd point to him 10-12 seconds before I really needed him to start. By the time he got it going, it timed out just right.

"It wasn't easy working that kind of thing. We took a strike and went to the lawyers to be able to play our own records, and we finally got it."

Although WSM/Nashville utilized engineers in a master control room, Ralph Emery laughs when asked if the station was using union personnel. "I was invited to an AFTRA meeting. The chairman of the board of National Life [the insurance company that owned the station] heard about it and threatened to fire anybody who went to the meeting. So that stopped that.

"I wasn't going to the meeting anyway. Hell, I was just glad to be there at WSM. I was young and had no tenure. I was just happy to be hanging on with the people who had been there for years.'

"Down in the corner of one hallway, I was in Studio A. It was a large room, so large it had a piano in it. 1 had the one boom mike that I would interview with so we could talk across the room instead of using individual mics. I had a large table in the shape of a semicircle, and the turntables were on the right.

The board was handmade by WSM's engineers. "We were controlled by the master control room," recalls Emery. "When those guys would go home at night, they'd just set the switches open so I could play my music and talk. In the daytime, they operated for all the announcers: They played your records for you."

Other Tricks Of The Trade

The exclusive use of turntables for playing music made it essential to maintain good quality vinyl pressing. Cramer says, "We played records and hustled dupes. You'd get records with bad wax and cue burn. We replaced our music about once a week. Every week when I did the chart, I put in new wax. That was a big job. It was good for about an hour and a half each week, just replacing the music.³

As the '60s progressed, audio processing became more sophisticated, as Oatman points out. "The Automax and the Volumax were big items in the processing chain to make AM stations sound a lot louder. Everybody bought QRK turntables because there was speed enhancement built into them: 45s played at 46 1/2, 33 albums played at 34. Everybody was looking for ways to enhance the sound of their radio stations, much as we do today to get an edge on the competition.'



"The other stations were out there pounding, 'If you spend money with them, all their listeners are on welfare.' They really played us down. Of course, our comeback was, 'That's because they're scared to death.""

Stigma Still Exists

Although Country currently is enjoying its greatest acceptance ever, Ralph Emery thinks traces of the stigma still exist. "Everybody respects money, but I think you still have some prejudice. Lane responded, "It's a music where a man can stand up and say, 'I love my God, I love my country, I love my woman' - and not necessarily in that order. 

highly rated rube comedies -"The Real McCoys" (1957-62), "The Andy Griffith Show" (1960-68, often featuring the Dillards), "Petticoat Junction" (1963-68), and "Green Acres" (1965-71) also created a fondness for country culture.

In addition, dozens of country acts created syndicated TV shows. The Wilburn Brothers, Bill Anderson, Porter Wagoner, Del Reeves, Billy Walker, Bobby Lord, Flatt & Scruggs, Marty Robbins, Jim & Jesse, Ernest Tubb, Red Foley, the Stonemans, Hugh X. Lewis, Buck Owens, Stu Phillips, and Kitty Wells all tried the medium. These programs generally appeared on weekends in secondary markets in the South and West. But they gave an entire generation of young people their first exposure to country music.

Several organizations in the country industry began giving an-



&R's Country Radio Readers' Poll, now in its 20th year, features the only slate of award winners selected solely by PDs, MDs, and air personalities at our Country reporting stations. They were asked to list their choices in eight categories of excellence.

Shania Twain and George Strait were the year's only multiple-award winners, but Reba McEntire and Brooks & Dunn were the only acts returning as winners in this year's poll. McEntire is enjoying her second consecutive win as Performer of the Year, after edging out Garth Brooks last year. As for Brooks & Dunn, Country radio named them Best Duo for the fifth year in a row.

BEST MALE VOCALIST

BEST SINGLE

George Strait

60 • R&R March 1,1996

• Anyone who questioned the viability of a four-CD box set compilation featuring a single country artist seriously underestimated George Strait's appeal. His "Strait Out Of The Box" on MCA became the fastest-selling box set in history and has been certified platinum (the RIAA certifies a four-CD set as platinum after sales of 250,000).

• Major discount store chains, which sell the bulk of Strait's CDs and cassettes, expressed initial reluctance to stock "Strait Out Of The Box," which carries a list price of \$49.98. However, fans were anxious to buy the 72-track retrospective of Strait's career, which provided the only way to have a copy of Strait's hit single, "Check Yes Or No."

• The complication's commercial success was matched by critical acclaim. USA Today described Strait as "the class

act of country music," while *Entertainment Weekly* pointed out that he is "often referred to as a savior of country traditionalism." As *People* explained, "Fourteen years on the charts, and no one has knocked off his Resistol."

• "Lead On," Strait's last album of all-new material, was certified platinum in 1995. With little hype from his manager, label, or publicist, Strait's concert tours remain one of the hottest tickets in country music.

That followed the platinum certification of their 1994 self-titled debut LP. • Having spent 1995 on the

road with Tim McGraw, Little Texas, and 4Runner, Black-Hawk started the new year on

tour with Brooks & Dunn. Later this month, they'll hit the highways again as the opening act on Wynonna's national tour.

• The group — featuring Henry Paul, Dave Robbins, and Van Stephenson — captured Star Of Tomorrow honors in the Vocal Group category of last year's TNN/Music City News Awards.

- No. 1 single in 1995: "I'm Not Strong Enough To Say No."
- Honorable mention: the Mavericks, Diamond Rio, Sawyer Brown, and Little Texas.

PERFORMER OF THE YEAR

Reba McEntire

• Using elaborate staging and theatrics, Reba McEntire's 1995 tour provided one of the most sophisticated productions ever endeavored by a country artist. Seventeen semi trucks, six buses, and a jet took the 83-member entourage to 120 citles. In return, her fans got an unforgettable experience as McEntire made use of videos, dancers, and stage props for live re-creations of many of her videos as she performed her greatest hits.

• McEntire has developed a completely different production for her 1996 tour, which kicks off March 5 in Louisville. She's expected to perform before at least 1.2 million people in more than 100 cities.



• The '95 tour began McEntire's celebration of two decades as a recording artist. Activities included the release of her 16th MCA album, "Starting Over," and a CBS-TV special taped in October during CMA Week.

• In 1995, McEntire's trophy case was expanded to accommodate the ACM's Entertainer Of The Year and Female Vocalist awards, along with two American Music Awards, a People's Choice Award, and a TNN Viewers' Choice Award.

• In addition to the platinum certification of "Starting Over," 1995 brought McEntire additional metal: "Greatest Hits, Vol. 2" went quadruple platinum; "From My Broken Heart," "Greatest Hits," and "Read My Mind" went triple platinum; "Reba Live" and "The Last One To Know" received platinum plaques; and 1985's "Have I Got A Deal For You" achieved gold.

BEST NEW ARTIST

Shania Twain

• Is there any doubt that 1995 was the year of Shania Twain? The Canadian singer-songwriter had been keeping a low profile until the release of her Mercury album "The Woman In Me." The album's first single — "Who's Bed Have Your Boots Been Under?" — opened the door, which she kicked wide open with "Any Man Of Mine."

• "The Woman In Me," the fastest-selling album by a female artist in country music history, is second in sales only to Patsy Cline's "Greatest Hits," which has sold six million copies.

• Twain was recently named the American Music Award's Favorite New Country Artist. Last year, she won five Canadian Country MusicAwards and three awards from

CMT/Europe. Her "Any Man Of Mine" music video was one of CMT's top 12 videos of 1995. She's also been nominated for four Grammys, three CMA Awards, and four Canadian Juno awards. • Twain has achieved her success without a concert tour to promote the album. She's not

expected to hit the road until next year. • No. 1 single in 1995: "Any Man Of Mine."

BEST DUO

Brooks & Dunn

• When PDs and personalities voted for Best Duo, many added a variety of editorial comments such as "who else?" and "duh!" There's no denying that Brooks & Dunn remain the most popular duo in country music. They've maintained that distinction by delivering a long string of singles containing lyrical messages and musical hooks that grab listeners' immediate interest.

 During 1995, the Arista act amassed multiplatinum certification for "Brand New Man" (five million), "Hard Workin' Man" (four million), and "Waitin' On Sundown" (two million).

• Other trophies and plaques kept rolling in during '95, including the CMA's Vocal Duo, the ACM's Top Vocal Duet, the TNN/Music City News Awards' Vocal Duo, and the Blockbuster Entertainment Awards' Favorite Country Duo Or Group.

Brooks & Dunn just put the final touches on their fourth album, "Borderline," scheduled for release April 16.

18-34 Power Gold

Brooks Leads Young-Adult Poll

G arth Brooks's hits may have lost a bit of Power Gold luster due to burnout at mainstream Country outlets. But he shines at 18-34 Country outlets.

Brooks leads the 18-34 Power Gold pack with six tunes in the Top 50, four of which rank in the Top 20. Ironically, whereas it's Brooks's mega-tempo "Ain't Goin' Down" that's his top 25-54 tune (and all three of his songs on that list are uptempo), it's his ballads — "The Dance" and "Shameless" — that lead the way among the younger-skewing stations.

Brooks & Dunn are runners-up in this derby, placing five songs — No. 2, 15, 38, 40, and 46 — in the Top 50. Four of the five songs the duo placed on the 25-54 PG list are also on this roll call with "Rock My World" missing. "Brand New Man" is the song that appears on the 18-34 but not the 25-54 list.

Three artists place three songs each on this list: **Toby Keith, Tim McGraw,** and **John Michael Montgomery.** Another seven acts — **Alabama, John Berry, Confederate Rail-road, Joe Diffie, Alan Jackson, Sammy Kershaw,** and **Tracy Lawrence** — have two songs apiece.

Gold Separation

The most interesting comparison encompassing the three years we've compiled the 18-34 Power Gold lists is the apparent "drifting apart" of the two. The movement has been slow enough to make it difficult to characterize it as "fragmentation," though it's picked up considerably in the last year. In 1994, the two charts shared 35 songs. Last year it was 32, and this year it's dropped all the way down to 23.

There are 21 acts who appear on both lists; seven artists are on the 18-34 chart but not the 25-54 list: Alabama, John Anderson, John Berry, Tracy Lawrence, BlackHawk, the Tractors, and Travis Tritt.

Other interesting notes:

• Twenty-eight different acts are represented, versus 27 in '94 and 35 last year.

• This list is even more heavily male-dominated than its 25-54 counterpart. There are 24 men/male groups who account for 46 of the songs. Only four women — Mary Chapin Carpenter, Patty Loveless, Reba McEntire, and Wynonna — grace this list.

• Once again using a liberal definition of "down tempo," there are five songs that could roughly qualify as a "ballad" on this list. Isn't it odd there would be more of them on the 18-34 PG chart than on the 25-54 counterpart?

25-54 Power Gold

Jackson, B&D Scoot Along Country's Power Gold

This year's mainstream Country Power Gold Top 50 is led by Alan Jackson in quality and Brooks & Dunn in quantity.

Jackson placed four songs — No. 1, 5, 7, and 28 — in the elite group. B&D, meanwhile, notched five tunes in the Top 50 — No. 10, 30, 33, 37, and 47.

Checking in with three songs each on this year's Top 50 are Vince Gill (2, 9, 39), Garth Brooks (6, 36, 40), and Toby Keith (11, 17, 29). Seven other acts placed a pair of songs in the Top 50. Special mention also should go to Randy Travis's "Forever And Ever, Amen." It's the only song that has made it onto every Power Gold list since I began compiling them in 1990.

Some other interesting notes and comparisons:

• For the second year in a row, 30 different acts contribute to the Top 50. Males continue to dominate the category. In 1996, 23 men/male groups hold 40 slots while seven women claim 10 tunes in the Top 50. Last year, 22 men had 39 songs versus eight women with 11 songs. In 1992, the first year we did a Top 50 instead of a Top 30, 19 males accounted for 39 songs and eight women had 11 songs.

• Marking their fourth consecutive year in the Power Gold Top 50 are **Trisha Year-wood**'s "She's In Love With The Boy," Alan Jackson's "Don't Rock The Jukebox," and **Hal Ketchum**'s "Small Town Saturday Night."

• Thirty songs that were on the list in 1995 show up for this year's roll call, while 14 that made it in 1994 also made it this year. Repeat appearances also include eight tunes from '93, two from '92, two from '91, and one from '90.

• Only 23 of the 25-54 Power Gold songs appear on the 18-34 Power Gold list. Nine artists appear on this list but not the 18-34 list — Tracy Byrd, Mark Chesnutt, Diamond Rio, Faith Hill, Hal Ketchum, Martina McBride, Lee Roy Parnell, Randy Travis, and Trisha Yearwood.

Comebacks

The comeback story of the year belongs to Diamond Rio. The band's "Meet In The Middle" comes in at No. 19 this year. It missed last year after making the list in '94 and '93. Also making a comeback was **Clint Black**'s "A Better Man," which was absent in 1995 after placing in 1991-94.

Three songs returned to the Power Gold limelight after a two-year absence. Sammy Kershaw's "Cadillac Style" and Garth Brooks's "Two Of A Kind, Working On A Full House" and "Rodeo" all made it back after an initial appearance in 1993. One song, **Reba McEntire**'s "Is There Life Out There," is in this year's Top 50 after making it in '94 but missing it in '95.


Most notable among the missing this year is Garth Brooks's "Friends In Low Places." Apparently, the song that placed No.1 on our list in '92, '93, and '94, and third in '95 has finally burned to the point where it's no longer a staple of most stations' Power Gold category.

A Matter Of Time, Tempo

It's also interesting to note the eras that comprise the Top 50 list. Only 16 songs peaked on our weekly chart prior to 1993. The oldest song on the list is Travis's "Forever And Ever, Amen," which peaked in May 1987. Next is Black's "A Better Man," which topped the chart in May 1989. Oddly enough, there are no songs that peaked in 1990. Six are from '91 — No. 18, 19, 25, 28, 36, and 40. And eight are from '92 — No. 10, 20, 22, 37, 41, 46, 48, and 50

Amazingly, only one song on this chart would fit the liberal definition of "down tempo" — Montgomery's "I Swear." And, admittedly, even its inclusion might be stretching things a bit. Last year, 10 songs fit that description. But what a sign that the "Lptempo" mania gripping Country radio in recent years is still growing.

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

Delmarva Broadcasting's WSTW/Wilmington, DE is a great example of a well-programmed, respected, and very profitable medium-market CHR. Dominant in both ratings and revenue, the station provides an excellent case study for sales success.

According to revenue estimates and market analyses compiled by radio financial expert Jim Duncan and published in his Duncan's Radio Market Guide and Update,

How does 'STW manage to pull off such incredible bottom-line numbers? I talked with GSM Cynthia Morgan as she was preparing to depart on an annual managers' retreat. Each year, Morgan and her fellow managers attend special training sessions on such topics as budgeting and resolving conflicts. This kind of thinking has allowed WSTW to stay on top in Wilmington for the past 16 years.

When you're taking in almost 50 cents of every radio dollar spent in the market, you're doing a lot of things right. Morgan explains, "We've been fortunate being No. 1 in 18 of 22 books. That gives you a big advantage. Even though we're a middle-sized market, we're as good a facility as any large-market station.'

Innovative Presentation

While the CHR format may carry some perceptual baggage, the 'STW staff counters with a simple approach: success breeds success. "In weekly sales meetings, the first thing we do is ask for success stories," Morgan reveals. "We put them in a 'sales opportunity book,' which has all of our current packages playlists, program guides, etc. and is updated for each sales rep. This way, when a prospective client says, 'You won't work for my business,' we've got a list at our fingertips. We have banks, car dealers, and supermarkets [advertising with us].

"Our VP/GM, Julian Booker, is very supportive of both the sales and programming ends of the station. He's a forward-thinking person who allows sales to have all the tools to compete in the sales arena. We have a computerized laptop presentation for both stations. Very few stations in the country have that. We can

since we're covered by Philadelphia. [This presentation], along with our sales expertise, gets rid of that small-market image

Morgan, LSM Michael Reath, and 10 salespeople (including a sports marketing specialist) comprise the sales department. WSTW also has a sales liaison who handles sales promotions and vendor opportunities. Although the reps sell both WSTW and WDEL, the stations aren't sold in combo. Says Morgan, "Normally when you have an FM and AM, the AM is a throwaway. With us, they're separate rates and presentations. To help bring in the local business, we have several onair programs that sponsors can tie into, like 'All Request Lunch Hour' and 'Traffic Watch.' Sometimes it's off-air, like the Job Fair, which has created a lot of new revenue for us. For the Job Fair, instead of going to a company's advertising agency or Advertising Director, we get advertising dollars from the human resource department."


Of Wilmington's top-rated stations, only WSTW, WDEL, and AC WJBR are actually based in the city. The others are based in Philadelphia or northeast of Baltimore. Alternative WPLY/Philadelphia - a primary competitor for local ad dollars placed fourth overall in the latest Wilmington book. But after WSTW's sales reps have stated their case, advertisers solely targeting northern Delaware generally avoid buying Philadelphia stations. Local

sales are the station's strength: about 90% of the station's total revenues comes from local accounts; 10% is billed from national clients; and agency business makes up 45% of the money coming into the station.

Secret Weapons

Outside of ratings and a great sales staff, WSTW and WDEL have a secret weapon that has helped put them over the top. Morgan says, "It's not something that's directly related to sales packages. We're out in the community - we're involved with the Rotary Club, Better Business Bureau, United Way, and several non-profit organizations. People get the message that we're here to stay as owners, as opposed to just making money and turning over the station. And that comes back to us in trust '

Unlike many GSMs, Morgan makes it a point to understand her programming counterparts, while trying not to be a back-seat programmer herself. "The best way to cultivate a positive programming/sales relationship is to always remember each person's viewpoint. We want more revenue, but if I do something for short-term revenue that hurts pro-

gramming, then I lose long-term revenue. It would hurt ratings, and I'd get fewer buys next year. If anyone is in the business for more than six months, they should be smart enough to learn how each department affects the other's long-term viability.

"When I go to different conferences, like the NAB or RAB, I tend to go to seminars that don't involve sales. They could be on programming, FCC regulations, or anything. A mistake I made early on was not going to lunch with the programming department to keep in touch.

Sommers, because I'd be telling him things I know nothing about. I think he appreciates that very much. I listen and understand where he's coming from. I tell him where sales is coming from, and he gives me the same courtesy.

"I meet with Sommers, Julian Booker, the office manager, production director, promotions director, and the engineering, programming, and sales staffs every two weeks. Sometimes the meetings run long, but I'd never want to go without them — they keep communication lines open, and you understand what the other departments are going through.

Know No Limits

Morgan recently hired a rep who was within a couple years of retirement to sell WSTW. "If anything, I had to spur him on to sell AM News/ Talk. He was psyched — he prides himself on being hip at his age, so it was more ego-satisfying for him to sell the FM," Morgan says. This kind of attitude has helped Morgan maintain a top-notch sales crew. "To me, sales experience is much more necessary than education. If someone has good sales experience. I could care less if they have a college degree. If they don't have any sales experience and are young, then I look for the college degree as some sort of measure of what they can do. We try to hire what I call a 'motley crew' - different personalities, backgrounds, and ages. You'd be surprised at how many people we interview who are out of the format's normal demo yet listen to WSTW. It can be very helpful to hire them to represent us, because a lot of business owners are out of our demo."

Morgan also looks to bring in people with a certain drive. She explains, 'Self-motivation is the most important quality I've found. You can teach someone radio. It's not hard to learn, and you don't have to live and breathe it to sell it. A well-rounded person can get in to see someone on some other

aspect. then present the station. I appreciate greed whether that means greed for money, approval, being well-known in the marketplace, or whatever it is.'

Morgan can speak from experience. She started at WDEL three days out of college with no experience in sales or ra-

dio. She became LSM of the AM, then the combo, then was promoted to GSM. In May, she'll celebrate her 17th year at the stations: "That's rare, but not as rare here.'

"

Keep 'Em Happy

Controlling turnover has been a major key to WSTW's continued success. "One of the things that's very unusual about us and helps make us successful [is that we beat] the stereotype of huge turnover, which means clients are always getting used to a new person," Morgan says. "The station's been owned by the same company since 1931, and because of that, it's more of a family atmosphere where we say, 'We love you, but expect the world of you at the same time.' We have sales reps who've been here 22, 13, and nine years. Some have only been here a few years, but have been in the market at other stations for several years. We have three who've been here under a year. They work very hard and deserve every cent they make. It ends up being a great place to work for atmosphere and money. The benefits are great, too, since some stations don't pay expenses or have good health plans, leading to turnover. Additionally, you're able to build relationships with clients. If you've got a lot of turnover, you're constantly having to regain confidence with clients."





KRBV/Dallas Makes Powerful Format Debut

□ How this new Urban AC made it happen in its first book

This column is about the Fall '95 Arbitron ratings success of KRBV/Dallas-Ft. Worth, a new Urban AC that found its niche and an enthusiastic audience in a relatively short period of time.

The numbers prove the format change was on the money. In the all-important 25-54 demo they are now tied for No. 2 with Country KSCS-FM. Prior to the Fall '95 book, KRBV was ranked No. 17. In persons 12+ Monday-Sunday, 6am-midnight, KRBV jumped from a 3.7 share last sum- Thomas Bacote mer to a five share, mov-

ing from No. 10 to No. 3. In the 18-34 demo the station leaped from eighth place to third. And it hit No. 1 in the 18-49 demo with a 6.1. I'd say that's some pretty good work for the first book out of the shoot.

Meeting A Demand

'The Fall '95 Arbitron success was a result of the pent-up demand in this market for this product," suggests KRBV PD Thomas Bacote. "They craved it! For a market this size the Urban Adult audience was vastly underserved. I'm not saying that as a knock to any

other station in this market. I just feel that this was the competitive complexion of the market at the time. We've known there was a huge opportunity in this market for an adult-focused station." For a long time, the Dallas-Ft Worth market had

two Urban-oriented mainstream stations. KRBV's first incarnation,

it was **KIMZ** with a mainstream Urban format. Then it flipped to CHR/Dance, failed, and returned again as mainstream Urban. "After the transfer of ownership from Summit Communications to Granum Communications, Granum commissioned a study to immediately determine what would best suit the market." The results indicated there was a need for a station with a 25-54 focus.

"I'm pleased about the Fall '95 numbers, but I'm also pleased because I think we're able to give African-American adults in Dallas-Ft. Worth a radio station they can consistently listen to and claim as their own. And we'll continue to be 25-54-focused. I'm also happy that we're able to co-exist successfully with our sister station KOAI-FM and didn't have a situation like KISS-FM and WQCD in New York City. We knew the challenge would be to create the best product. But also, we had to create a product that would not affect KOAI, which is one of the preeminent NACs in the country.

cause the guys who have remained here have been through a lot over the years, including ownership changes. This ratings success is a good motivator, confidence builder, and we can use what we have been able to accomplish to move forward and deal with future challenges.'

Mixing The Right People

One person who helped make the project a success, says Bacote, was consultant Barry Mayo. "He's a true broadcaster, a true competitor, and the perfect consultant to get involved in this project. We looked at his involvement as a programmer, a GM, and an owner. From a format standpoint, I look at him as one of the 'fathers' of the UAC format.'

As far as putting together the right airstaff, Bacote explains, "I don't have the perfect answer in terms of what style of personality is right for all Adult Urbans. But I can say we looked at what this market wanted and were very fortunate when we kicked off the radio station to have three personalities who were already familiar to the market: Tom Joyner (mornings), Keith Salis (middays), and Russ Parr (afternoons).'

Joyner and Parr have been known to focus their comedic flair toward a younger audience. I asked Thomas if their approaches had changed. "All of these guys have always been customer-focused entertainers. They rise to the occasion to meet the demand of the audience. Tom's morning show is very adult-focused. Parr has done everything he's needed to do by going out and talking to his audi-

Straight-Forward Station


Bacote details the station's music foundation. "We're an oldiesbased radio station. "We play some currents: I would say that it's probably 70/30 oldies to currents and recurrents. It is music-intensive. We don't get into 'so many in a row'; we're pretty much a straight-forward radio station with our presentation. Because our music image is important, we will do things and say things that will promote the continnous nature of the music. Listeners have caught on to that and it's really a matter of doing it. You have to do what you say you're going to do. Smoke and mirrors can be great, but you also have to be in the position to give the music to them. You don't want to lie to your audience.

"As a young programmer who's interested in making an impact in the business, I feel fortunate that I have had an opportunity to work with people who are not only focused on winning, but developing people as they win. It's great being part of this company and part of this radio station as well. [For me] as the PD, it's like being a conductor for a particular part of the orchestra. This really was a team effort.

"[Our goal is to] remain customer-focused and customer-driven," says Bacote. "I know that sounds strange, and it might sound like a car commercial, but in radio we have to stay focused on our listeners. We'll continue to do our homework and of course we want to continue to grow and develop. We want to be a long-term player.





Soft AC Plays Sales Hard Ball

□ KODA/Houston outpaces Country rivals as city's top radio biller in '95

According to Miller, Kaplan, Arase & Company data, KODA/Houston emerged as the city's top radio biller in 1995. It's quite noteworthy that KODA is Soft AC and prevailed over Houston's healthy collection of Country outlets.

"Our competitors try to position Soft AC as a background format,



and that often sticks with the advertising community,² comments VP/GM Dusty Black. "KODÅ is here to play serious radio. and we do all the elements everybody else can do.'

Aggressive Plan

When KODA evolved from B/EZ to Soft AC in 1991, Black developed a strategic plan to aggressively sell the station. "It took us two or three years to assemble the management and sales staff that we needed. GSM Michael Nasser and LSM Frank Carter put together a [nine-member] sales staff that's second to none in Houston. Sales departments like this aren't built overnight. You no longer just give somebody a client list and tell them to go out and get it done.'

Running With The Pack

A 22-year radio veteran, Black felt it was important for KODA to become the market's rate leader. "That's truly a position that most [other Soft ACs] just don't have and is usually [reserved] for

Rock or Country stations. Houston needed somebody to establish a real value for the product.

"

"In terms of rate, it's better to have two or three other stations running with you, rather than being far ahead of the pack. Other stations wanting to run as fast as us should put on their shoes and go after it because it helps the whole market. Radio has historically underpriced itself in the marketplace. It's time for us to step to the plate and get what we're worth as a medium.

High Stakes Repped nationally by Major Market Radio, KODA improved from 1994's third best biller to 1995's pacesetter in Houston's \$180 million sweepstakes. Black, however, wasn't willing to reveal KODA's specific share of that pie.

Unquestionably, the SFX Broadcasting SoftAC's No.1 25-54 and 35-64 numbers played a major role in copping top billing honors. But, as Black points out,

"It's one thing to have [ratings] and quite another to convert them into something significant. By hook or crook, when a client invests money with us, we have to prove that we'll work for them.'

It could have been a different story had KODA ranked outside the top three 25-54 and 35-64. "It would, frankly, be extremely difficult to be the top biller [under those circumstances]. You'd really have to dramatically overachieve your market share. Country and News/Talk stations are good at doing that.

"Our challenge is to repeat as top biller, and we have a good shot at it. It's seasonal: Our biggest quarters are second and fourth."

Cetera Contently Carving Out AC Identity

N ame some artists who've had at least five number one R&R AC hits. Don't worry if you missed Peter Cetera's name — even Chicago's humble former lead singer doesn't believe his name makes the list.

In fact, Cetera has landed at No.1 almost six times, with "Glory Of Love" in 1986; "Next Time I Fall" (with Amy Grant) also in '86; "One Good Woman" in '88; "After All" (with Cher) in '89; and "Restless Heart" in '92. His "Even A Fool Can See" peaked at No.2 in '93.

The owner of one of music's most distinctive voices, Cetera has had 12 AC chart songs - nine of which have cracked AC's Top 10.

'King Of Duets'



Impressive chart history and stats notwithstand-Peter Cetera ing, he's remained nearly invisible. Following the

birth of his daughter, he relocated from Los Angeles to Sun Valley, ID and you don't see him jesting with David Letterman or chatting with Tom Snyder. Only recently has he started making the rounds of morning radio shows, usually wanting to steer the discussion away from the past and certain other pigeonholes.

"I've been a solo act for 10 years, yet it seems people only want to know about my years with Chicago and there's a misconception that I only do ballads. They've become hits because that's what people like. I'd love to have an uptempo hit. 'Restless Heart' was very big for me. It was mid-tempo and I was very happy to do it.

"We're hopefully in the process of closing a deal with Pam Tillis to record a duet. I don't think I've done that many, but I guess I could set a dubious record and become the king of duets. At best, I'm a reluctant performer. You almost have to kick me in the rear to get me on stage." A summer tour, however, is in the works.

Big Fish

Consistent with his low-key approach, Cetera's two most recent chart successes have been on the relatively small Nashville-based River North label. His debut River North release, "Forever Tonight," featured "Wings" co-star **Crystal Bernard** and placed 20th on **R&R**'s AC Top 95 of '95. "Rather than shopping myself on the street. I found t could slide into something that made me the biggest fish in the pond. [River North's] trying to break some Country acts and I'm their only contemporary artist."

He believes there are advantages to being in Nashville, including a positive fan/artist relationship. "Rock and pop artists eat their young and spit them out. They've totally lost respect for their audience."

Admitting that he finds the state of radio confusing, Cetera remarks, "I've listened to more radio in the past four months than I have in years, but no longer know anything about formats. As far as I'm concerned, Top 40 isn't at all the same and it's hard for me to break into it because I'm not a mega-star.

"Sometimes I don't look at [chart numbers] because I'd rather not know that my song isn't doing well. I'll take a look and then get on with my life, but it's lovely having songs that do well on the AC chart. I truly appreciate that AC seems to like what I'm doing."

"

Variety Helps Boost Song-Driven KHMX In Houston

While SFX Soft AC KODA/Houston boasts 25-54 and 35-64 bragging rights, crosstown KHMX (Mix 96) performs quite well among 18-34s and 25-54s. The Nationwide Hot AC is up across the board, posting fall-to-fall 18-34, 25-54, and 35-64 demo gains.

"KODA and KHMX are very good radio stations, and ratings re-

flect that KODA does a great job [filling] the market's soft position," remarks PD Pat Paxton. "Our focus is on being an upbeat station for 25-44 females.'

Pat Paxton contest was such

a hit last spring, Paxton revived it in the fall, backing it up with massive cash payouts. "It's been done at tions]. We call out a letter; if a person has that letter in his name and is the designated caller, he wins a lot of money. Adult females with kids are too busy to play games that aren't incredibly easy. According to our statisticians, the odds are one in three that a letter we announce will appear in someone's name.'

'70s Blend

Unafraid of being a cutting-edge, current-intensive station, Houston's Mix also blends in '70s product by groups such as the Eagles. Comments Paxton, "That's a fairly unique Hot AC approach. For some reason, many stations are dumping '70s music, but we've yet to reach that point."

As part of his research process,

" Stations get into trouble by playing artists we think our audience wants. As it turns out, songs are more important than artists.

Paxton probes to see if Mix listeners still want music from that era. 'We always think we're trying to outsmart the audience - which can be a mistake. After hearing the '70s montages we play, research participants tell us that variety is one of our station's biggest advantages. They define variety mostly by era, rather than style.'

Concerned with how some fellow Hot ACs handle particular artists, Paxton states, "Some are still too reliant on Michael Bolton, Rod Stewart, and Phil Collins. Those are KODA's artists - not ours. A good number of Hot ACs haven't learned yet that they have to graduate from these artists.

"Hot AC is very much a songdriven format. [KHMX will play] a great song from Dog's Eye View before a mediocre song by a mainstream artist every time. It's been proven many times that stations get into trouble by playing artists we think our audience wants. As it turns out, songs are more important than artists."

Hot AC should continue to be successful by keeping up with the format's core audience, Paxton opines. 'Some people think it's a short-term format. But there will always be a demand [among 25-44 females] for an upbeat, fun station. As programmers, it's our job to find out how to create that mix to satisfy their needs. Provided we program them correctly, Hot ACs won't soon go away.'

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





Big Guns Conference Call: To 2001 & Beyond, Part 1

KTVW, WNUA, and KKSF PDs examine how telecom, fragmentation affect the format

Between them, KTWV/Los Angeles PD Chris Brodie, WNUA/Chicago PD Lee Hansen, and KKSF/San Francisco PD Steve Feinstein have logged nearly 70 years experience in commercial radio. Possessed with unique vision, each guides a radio station that stands as a model of NAC innovation and ongoing success.

Brodie, Hansen, and Feinstein are longtime friends as well as trusted colleagues. During a recent conference call, the level of camaraderie between them was as high as the intelligence of their remarks.



This first of three columns will outline their far-reaching observations.

R&R: How will the recently signed Telecommunications Act of 1996 affect NAC radio?

CB: Lee and I have already been affected by it - me with the CBS/ Westinghouse merger, and he with Pyramid/Evergreen.


LH: Make that "Pyragreen/ Evermid."

SF: I'm thinking about what commercial radio is going to face once the telecoms and other music delivery systems are up and running. When they start offering cable service, it's not unlikely they will bundle DMX or Music Choice, just as those services are bundled with DBS these days with Direct TV. That may not affect at-work or in-car listening, but with nights and weekends being such important dayparts for all of us, it could put a crimp in our style.

CB: Remember the adage that the railroads thought they were in the railroad business, but they were actually in the transportation business, [and they got blindsided] when airlines emerged as a force. We have to look at all of these new technologies.

SF: At least once or twice a week, we get an e-mail from someone who has either heard KKSF while visiting the market or has seen our web site [from their homes] in Omaha or Dubuque. Some of them are pretty clever, and they ask, "Are you avail-able on the satellite?"

All of this really points to the fact that we'd better be on the spot musically - as we all are at this point -



but more importantly, we'd better be more than just a radio station. A listener emphasized this point beautifully for us by listing [all the extras]: our quarterly printed newsletter, our e-mail newsletter, the listener parties, the Rising Star concerts, the AIDS samplers, the dream sets, the fact that we pick up the phone.

We have to touch people, get under their skin, and be more than a darned good music service. That's what it's going to take if we're to survive the onslaught of these eventual competitors.

CB: The biggest vote of confidence for me is that radio is the most intimate medium; it's the most one-onone. We can take advantage of that and make sure we provide as many purposes as possible. Most of the new technologies don't have that intimacy, except the web - and then you must have a relationship with a mouse.

SF: Or a gerbil.

LH: When the medium faced an assault from a new technology television - 50 years ago, radio evolved and developed formats, and it certainly has survived and thrived. Our response to these new broadbased delivery systems that are more global will be to be less global and act even more locally.


SF: The one advantage they'll have over us - one we don't even want to think about ---- is that many, if not most, are not going to have commercials. In our format in particular, commercials are just a grievous, cardinal sin. They counteract everything that we work so hard to do with our music mix. Granted, I'm a worrywart. But I'm concerned that what provides our daily bread is going to be our eventual undoing.

I'm still getting as many complaints as ever about commercials, although we've done a better job than ever of keeping bad spots off the air. But our listeners are ultra, ultra-sensitive to the tone and content of commercials.

CB: I wouldn't be surprised if we held a conference call 10 or 20 years from now that all these alternative music services wanted to take a slice of the advertising pie. Advertising grows exponentially, and I believe they'll go after it. But [my consolation] in those fears - in Los Angeles, at least - is automobiles.

LH: I probably get more complaints about the pop crossover songs we play than commercials. We rarely turn advertising away. [Former WNUA GM] John Gehron and I once decided to [decline an ad], but it was political, regard-

ing the abortion issue. No matter our personal views, we felt the spots were simply too inflammatory.

R&R: What do you predict regarding the potential for future fragmentation in NAC?

LH: When I called Chris [Brodie] to congratulate her on a great book, she said, "We want to stay just this side of appearing too attractive to a competitor." So whenever I have a down book, I go to the corporate people and tell them I plotted the wobble.

When I saw some of those numbers in Dallas last summer, [I realized] there aren't too many places where the situation is attractive enough that anyone could successfully split [one of us]. A lot of corporate people wouldn't necessarily want to get involved going against a station with some heritage and top consultants.

There's not that much chance of head-on fragmentation, but I have thought about [the impact of] a Chicago station with low debt service, like WTMX or WPNT, going back to an EZ or Beautiful Music format.

CB: Our company made the decision to do a hybridization of the format in Detroit with V98.7, although there's existing NAC competition from WJZZ. This is a classic example of this subject. We believe V98.7 will be a solid radio station, but that will take [listeners] from other stations. I never considered [former "Quiet Storm" outlet] KUTE or [former NACs] KACD & KBCD my primary competitors. l was looking to get 25-54 numbers from everywhere.

If there were an Urban AC in Los Angeles [not hindered by signal restrictions], it's possible we'd experience some cume erosion because the adult black audience isn't being served here. I think more about [Urban Gold] KACE and Cox than I do [AC] KOST and Cox. Detroit will be interesting, and I think both stations will do well.

Once you deal with being the No. 1 [English-language] music station [25-54], as we just have [in the Fall '95 Arbitron], you have to ask yourself, "What's the next problem?" Well, it's that someone can come right after you. [KTWV

Asst. PD/MD] Ralph Stewart said to me, "What can anyone do? Are they going to out-Wave the Wave?" No, the threat is from some form of hybrid.

That's when Steve's [comment] proves so right — we must be more than a radio station. You've got to have service elements, community involvement, relationships with the artists - everything - and then you'll have every reason in the world to believe that you'll still be on solid ground.

SF: You'd better have captured their hearts as well as their ears.

LH: ... and be carrying on enough of a constant dialogue with your listeners so that you are reinventing yourself and serving the 1996 audience.

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NAC NOTES By Carol Archer

There's a lot of action in the Top Ten of this week's Tracks Chart, with especially strong momentum on Count Basic (6-3*), George Michael (13-6*), and Vibraphonic (14-7*).

Michael's soulful, plaintive "Jesus To A Child" (**DreamWorks/Geffen**) has distinguished itself as an extremely valuable programming tool for attracting adult listeners, particularly those in the precious 35-54 cell.


Rotations on the Vibraphonic edit of "Can't Get Enough" (Hollywood) are expanding exponentially: six to 12 plays at WSJZ/Buffalo and WEBZ/Panama City, four to 12 at **KOAS/Tulsa**, five to 10 at **WZJZ/Columbus**, and six to 10 at **WVMV/Detroit**. It's also getting heavy play at **KTWV/LA**(12 plays) and **WJZF/Atlanta** (15 plays). This cool acid jazz entry is among Most Increased at +54.

George Howard's "Our Love" (GRP) is top Most Increased with +65, including gains at SW Smooth FM (up to 16 plays), KBLX/SF (seven to 10), and WNWV/ Cleveland (11 plays). New adds include KOAI/Dallas and KCJZ/San Antonio.

Tony Rich Project's "Nobody Knows" (Arista/LaFace) swept Most Added honors with 14 reporters — including WLVE/Miami, KOAI, WJJZ/Philadelphia, WVMV, and WNWV/Cleveland — embracing it out of the box.

Craig Chaquico's much-anticipated new CD offering, "A Thousand Pictures" (**Higher Octave**), is showing immediate acceptance several cuts deep. The track "Just Friends" is among Most Increased at +20. And "Sweet Talk" picked up five adds this week, including one at **KKSF/San Francisco**.

Insider Tip: Keep an eye and an ear on 3D's "Georgy Porgy" (TriStar). It was added this week at KTWV and KIFM/San Diego.

later no one will remember that you named yourself. It was that way with the Rolling Stones. They called themselves the "World's Greatest

Rock 'n' Roll Band" and it stuck.


"If Michael Jackson and the **Rolling Stones** could do it, I told Robin, 'I should be the king of something, too: 'I'll be the King Of ... All Media.

Stern I tried it out when I talked to reporters. I asked them to

please be sure to put in my title when referring to me. At the beginning it was, 'The self-proclaimed King Of All Media,' but after a while it was just 'The King Of All Media.' And I thought, 'This is wonderful - now I'm the king of radio, TV, film, and books. I am true royalty.'

His "Miss America" not only generated crowds numbering in the thousands for its multicity book signings, it also received impressive media coverage. Stern was pleased with the exposure: "The reaction was phenomenal. There's nothing worse than writing a book and getting no reaction. And I believe it's that people are reacting to the radio show [as well as] the book - it was one big celebration and our audience really embraced me. It was thrilling beyond my comprehension to have that strong of a reaction."

Which brings to mind this question: How does Stern handle his pop-

one four or five hours every day, and you feel like you do know that person — especially when I'm sitting here telling you everything from my penis size to which nasal hairs I trimmed last night. But I'm thrilled with any fan reaction to the radio program.

24-Hour Job

Stern outlines his work day: "I get up around four in the mornfun on the radio.

ing a book or some other project where I divide up my time. I'm reading newspapers, magazines, watching TV, and generally being aware The day is spent finding material and discovering what's going on in the world.

"It's a 24-hour job to be in touch with what people like to hear and talk about, and there isn't a minute I don't do my research. While I'm having a conversation with my wife, I'm thinking, 'How's this going to sound on the radio? How does this play?' So it's a very weird existence. For the last 20 years I've had no understanding of what it is to have a private life. I just look at everything in terms of the show.

"My wife thinks it's a sickness and will say, 'Are we ever going to have any private moments?' After I discuss something intimate on the air, she'll say, 'I was sure you weren't going to talk about that, I was sure you understood that was private between us.' And I'll say, The fact that you like a certain type of sex is private? Shouldn't we share that with the world?' Occasionally, she gets pissed."

On the air, Stern has said he spends his weekends inside his home. "I don't go anywhere; I have a miserable existence," he confirms. "I live in my basement, which I set up in a very high-tech fashion — it's not a bad place to be - but I do the same thing as I do during the week. I watch a lot of TV, wait for my wife to say something, and generally wait for Monday to come around so I can get back on the air. That's what's great [for stations] about hiring this morning show. You have a guy who has no life and basically sits and prepares material - a radio machine, if you will."

Stern admits that with the filming of his movie, life will become more complicated. But he adds there's a positive side. 'It'll get crazy, but that's good for the radio show. The way I see it, everything

feeds into everything else and becomes material. Someone asked me, 'What's it going to be like doing this movie and the radio show?' My answer is I'll have a lot to talk about on the air. It's going to be fun taking my audience into the world of movies.

"Twenty years ago, most people in our industry would have said a radio performer will never star in a movie, write books, or put on the biggest-grossing, pay-per-view event in history — [they kept] DJs in their little box. When I got into radio, my attitude was, 'Let's think big; let's change the medium; and, yes, we can have a national morning show and do these other things

Lining Up Affiliates

as well.' There are so many people in our industry cloning what I do for a living that now I'm saying to all my fellow broadcasters, 'Let's do business together. I want to come to your town. Let's blow away the clones; the imitator is never as good as the original. If you have the original up against the imitator, the original will win - no doubt about it."

"At our affiliates, the GMs and PDs tell me it's fun to be part of things. The show is so high-profile contact with the PDs; we have people at all the stations feeding us newspaper articles daily and telling us what's going on in local markets. We've got a neat little organization, and now we're trying to make it bigger.'

Innovating The Business

Has Stern ever thought about giving up radio to focus on another medium? Buchwald steps in, answering, "Not only will Howard not


leave radio in the foreseeable future but an agreement has been reached, signed, and delivered between Howard Stern and Infinity to continue in the radio business for an extended period of time.'

Stern adds. "I've had a great " association with

Mel and Infinity; I love this company. What they're doing in broadcasting is exciting and unprecedented. Mel is an innovator and he's changed the way people look at buying radio stations. Mel has been tremendous for my career and has backed me up every step of the way. It's a great association.

"Am I fired up about radio? I still see myself as a radio perform .: I have no desire to leave the business. Radio is an exciting medium; we've proven it can be an up-front and inyour-face medium, and I can do things on radio that guys can't do on TV. Jay Leno and David Letterman could never do the kind of

and off the scale that they become

stars themselves. Also, PDs are freed up timewise because they don't have to worry about their morning program now. The GMs don't have to buy TV time because the show is so visible. They've got a show people listen to for long periods of time that generates large audiences. They can promote their station within our show, promote station contests and personalities through it, and use it as their own advertising medium to recycle the audience.

"And we have good relationships with the people we're doing business with. There's weekly phone

bits I do because they don't have the sheer amount of time. I'm *absolutely* thrilled not only to still be in radio but, in looking at the future, there's tremendous potential for the medium and still many things to accomplish."

Karmazin remarks, "Now that we can talk about Howard staying in radio for an extended period of time, it gives radio the opportunity to take advantage of what Howard is all about. Howard has a credibility no one else has. Howard makes you a ton of money. Every single project he's been involved in has made a ton of money. As we accelerate the program into more markets, stations are going to have to make a decision between having Howard [on their stations] or competing against him, which is a difficult task because he

always wins. He's won in every business he's ever gone into.

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"By winning I mean financially, which is the main report card. Howard is a magnet for advertising revenue, and he gets the demographic advertisers want to reach. And very importantly, the show is formatted so it's all local advertising. So in syndicating the program, stations get to keep all the inventory. They pay a price, but it's a minor investment toward what he'll make for them. Financially, it's a very viable program."

Weighing In

Buchwald mentions, "It makes me very happy to hear Mel talk about a ton of money. Howard is the only client I've ever had where you don't count the money — you weigh it. We started in York, PA [on February 19]. We expect to announce two new affiliates soon and are looking for more markets that might want to weigh their money made from broadcasting the Howard Stern Show."

Karmazin adds, "The program is going to expand dramatically. 1996 is the year Howard will pick up more affiliates than ever. Over the last few years, he's proven this program works in every circumstance: big market or small market. East Coast or West Coast, live or tapedelay, liberal or conservative market. Up to now we've had to prove to skeptical broadcasters that Howard could work in their markets. Now there's no argument any broadcaster could raise as to why not to put Howard in their markets. As a matter of fact, they're going to have to deal with it because, if they don't put him in their markets, their competitors will."

Regarding such objections, Stern believes people are the same from region to region. "I've always believed that - even before we got into the syndication game. When programmers used to say to me, Gee, my market's unique, it's local, etc.,' my response was, 'People like to laugh.' And they're getting something unique with this program - a guy on the national scene, so to speak. Their local morning man is now on "The Tonight Show,' "The Late Show With David Letterman," and making a movie for Paramount Pictures. That's excitement you can't always get from a local morning guy.

"The financial picture is pretty rosy, too, when you put this show on in mornings. It's a tremendously profitable experience. The show is a home run — it does what it's supposed to do: It makes a lot of money for stations and brings a lot of attention to your position on the dial."

"We're excited about it," says Karmazin. "Howard is extraordinary in knowing how to communicate to a very large audience. It was very silly for us to use Howard's knowledge and ability in only one daypart. So now radio stations have the opportunity to get more programming options that will all have this in common: It'll be compelling, get ratings, and make money. And it will happen sooner rather than later."

Radio's New Face

While details are still being finalized for the Howard Stern Radio Network, there are a variety of options Stern is developing. "Stations might be able to pick and choose from the network, and we might provide 24-hour-a-day programming that would include station promotion and input from me in every daypart. That's a real exciting proposition. And in the same way that morning syndication and the type of programming we've been putting on has been changing the face of radio, the network will change the face of radio as well."

Describing the role he'll play in

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the network, Buchwald says, "The network will develop programming much like it's done in the film or television business. We might begin with a simple idea and employ writers and production people to work with Howard to expand it to a for-mat, and then find that unique talent to fit the project. Then the master's genius will give it that special touch. Finally, it gets his stamp of approval and then the show goes into distribution. We hope to be dealing with networks such as Westwood One and others, as well as in some cases. individual stations around the country and maybe around the world.

"We'll be looking at talent in the same manner — finding someone interesting and working with that person and others to develop a show, or perhaps refashioning an existing program. Howard seems to know what makes programming and talent compelling."

Buchwald admits to having chatted with other broadcasting suitors about partnering in the network, but says, "We chose to continue with Infinity because we could not imagine a better partner in the radio business. Mel Karmazin is a courageous broadcaster and his support for Howard over the years has greatly helped to structure the success of the Howard Stern Show. Mel's loyalty and integrity are well known in the radio community. We've tried to acknowledge those characteristics in kind.

"We want to be very direct and declare our intention in expanding the number of Howard Stern markets both large and small. Previously, we were interested only in the larger markets, but now we're looking for the show to be a truly national program."

Cross-promotion between the affiliates and book retailers was heavy for Stern's two books, and

it's expected to be the same when the movie is released. Stern asserts, "We really want to be involved on the local level because it helps the show. E! Entertainment Television is another vehicle that supports the radio program. It's great for the listeners to hear something cool on the radio, then know they can watch it that night on E! — it all feeds into the excitement."

Buchwald interjects, "E! now reaches 37.8 million homes. In the markets with both the radio program and E!, there is a cooperative promotional campaign between the two."

Stern concludes, "Go up and down the dial --- nothing compares. I'm talking about bringing my audience to a film premiere and what it was like making a movie. That's the big difference. There's an excitement on our show people want to hear about, and that's the advantage of bringing the show on board. We've cleared up any questions about the economics, ratings, how to use the program, and how to be involved with it. It's a no-brainer — a winwin situation for every market size and every format."



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Things will get extremely complicated this year for Alternative programmers. We are seeing direct challenges mounted by Active Rock, Top 40, Adult Alternative, and [Hot] AC.

Playing With The Big Boys

Despite Rock background, Jeff Pollack has forged his way into Alternative

Consultant/artist manager Jeff Pollack has an extensive background in the Rock format. Still, the list of panelists for his forthcoming "New Media & Music Conference 1996" reads like an Alternative who's who: KROQ/L.A. PD Kevin Weatherly, WIBF/Philadelphia OM Jim McGuinn, KDGE/Dallas PD Joel Folger, WNNX/Atlanta PD Brian Philips, Epitaph Records head/recording artist Brett Gurewitz, Trauma Records President Rob Kahane, MTV Sr. VP/Programming Andy Schuon, U2/PJ Harvey manager Paul McGuiness, R.E.M. attorney Bertis Downs, and others.

One might assume a "spin" was being put on the event. Is Pollack making an aggressive attempt to reposition himself away from Rock and toward Alternative? Pollack is

quick to relate his commitment to those formats for which he is traditionally known, but he also acknowledges a deepening involvement with Alternative.

Direction Shift

"There's no question the company's direction over the last few years has significantly moved into the Alternative arena," he notes. "Most of the panelists involved with our conference come from stations that are very current-based, be they Active Rock or Alternative. On one hand, this does not represent a sudden, dramatic shift for us. For years, we have been involved with Alternative clients on an international basis. Domestically, we have been predicting the explosion of this format for at least five years." Pollack cites one of the reasons for his focal shift. "The incredible quality of new music has been sustained for the last few years. That has done a lot to regenerate interest and commitment from radio. It draws favorable parallels to the high-water mark of the late '60s and early '70s for rock."

After years of representing a mainstream rock approach, Pollack had to work hard to gain the level of access in Alternative he has today - and feels he no longer has to defend his position. "A lot of us who have been in radio a while got into it for the love of music, period. The love of radio came second. I was fortunate to come out of college radio and into commercial radio at a time when there was a lot of experimentation and dedication to discovering new music. I managed to learn, grow, and develop a stronger sense of business acumen. That doesn't mean I lost sight of what is essential.

"Who wrote the rule that having a love of music and being successful at attracting a large audience must remain mutually exclusive? My primary responsibility is — and has been — to get ratings for broadcast owners. I think that can be done [while] still remaining integrally involved with developing bands' careers."

'Philosophical Interpretation'

Pollack has encountered a sizable quotient of "elitism" that he feels is unwarranted. "If you take a close look at the backgrounds of the most successful programmers and consultants in Alternative radio, with few exceptions, they all came from Top 40, AOR, even Hot AC. Everybody has a

past resume, particularly the PDs in major markets."

With so much sharing of music by various formats today, how does Pollack differentiate between the advice he offers his traditional Active Rock clients and that which he provides to his emerging base of Alternative stations?

"Music sharing has reached saturated levels before. We recognize that there are many more elements to creating an image than just music. How we arrive at them is an ongoing process of philosophical interpretation with the individual client, based on both the market demand and the programmer's strong suits. If you hear what Jim McGuinn is doing at WIBF/Philadelphia, you'll hear distinctive Alternative elements that you won't hear on [crosstown] WPLY or WYSP.

"Ironically, it is our sense of history that enables us to help clients understand how to break from the pack when everyone is playing the same music. We did it in head-to-head battles in AOR. We know how to influence a level playing field."

Risks & Experiments

One area that Pollack is committed to developing is on-air talent in Alternative radio. "A lot of people feel the format grew faster than its programming and on-air talent. I don't agree with that. We just have to look harder and think in less conventional ways as to what constitutes exciting talent today. Rather than going to the same old sources, we will try to uncover talent *anywhere*.

"It's no secret that the format is struggling to establish credible morning shows. We encourage risk-taking, be it unorthodox couplings of parttimers and hiring listeners who have caught the station's attention. We may find a diamond in the rough, or we may fail miserably. Either way, it beats hiring a mediocre talent with practical experience."

Pollack says if stations haven't already embraced experimentation, it may be too late. "Things will get extremely complicated this year for Alternative programmers. They no longer can benefit from surprising the competition. We are seeing direct challenges mounted by Active Rock, Top 40, Adult Alternative, and — now — "Modern" AC.

"Modern" AC? "This [format] is going to be a serious challenge for Alternative radio. Listen to KYSR (Star 98.7)/Los Angeles a station skewed 25-34 female that is appropriating the more pop-leaning artists in the alternative arena. This will cause stations to relinguish ownership, if not involvement, with several of the softer artists that are not compatible with Filter or Seven Mary Three. There may be some industry furor as a result. The fragmentation is surrounding the format on all sides. Your musical focus must be sharper than ever.'

Telecom Benefits

Pollack believes the Telecommunications Act of 1996 will further strengthen ownership's commitment to the Alternative format. "There have been several landmark changes over the last five years that benefit Alternative. In the past, if you were programming a stand-alone station, invariably you not only secured your younger target demo, but many owners would force you to broaden your reach to acquire older 'money' demos. This particularly hurt CHR. It prevented stations from constantly regenerating themselves to include the

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new bands, and was very destructive for both Pop and AOR.

"

"With the recent ownership rules, you'll find strategic duopolies in a market, allowing Alternative programmers to remain pure to their core's interests. Smart owners will combine their 18-34 targeting with another station, be it AC or Rock, handling the upper-demo concerns. The strength of the combo delivers the broad audience. Gone is the obsession with trying to be all things to all people.

"This will be a significant, profound benefit to Alternative PDs. Look at KROQ/L.A. over the last five years: Management has allowed that station to stay focused on remaining pure to its target, which has meant constantly changing to meet the musical demands. The same goes for WHFS/Washington. Has [PD] Robert Benjamin changed the music substantially since he's been there? Of course he has, and it results in listeners feeling the station is always on top of the best new trends. Doomsayers of this format are smoking banana peel if they fail to recognize this strategic strength."

Adult Alternative: 'Less Successful'

On the eve of last year's conference, Pollack lashed out at the Adult Alternative format in a widely circulated interview. Today, his opinions haven't soft-

ened. "Was I wrong? Other than a couple of markets where Adult Alternative stations have organically grown, this format is *less* successful than last year. Is there a format possibility there? Yes. Is it being done properly? Ninety-five percent of the time, no.


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"Adult Alternatives can, with the right music mix, acquire a portion of a Classic Rock station's audience and appeal to more eclectic listeners. So far, I've only seen a couple of stations come close to getting it right."





• Essentials: The early '90s San Diego scene is still producing great acts. Some (such as Rust) took longer to surface than others (such as Stone Temple Pilots), but that gave Rust a chance to work away from the industry glare. As a result of a couple of indie singles and an EP, Rust were more than ready to meet the standards set by producer Dave Jerden — although initially they didn't think they would. "We were a little scared of working with him at first," said vocalist/ guitarist John Brinton. "But he kept saying, 'These are the coolest songs I've heard in a long time,' and he definitely elicited our strongest performances."

Brinton, guitarist Michael Suzick. bassist/vocalist Tim Blankenship, and drummer Pat Hogan have spent the last few years touring extensively with acts such as Stone Temple Pilots



and Tool. They have continued to draw on the support and sensibilities of the San Diego scene.

• Influences: Rust say they draw on everything from Jimi Hendrix to Joy Division and Killing Joke to the Adolescents.

•Artist POV: Commenting on Rust's attitude regarding their hometown, Brinton says, "There really is a strong scene here. There are some great new bands, and other earlier acts, like us, have been developing. Because none of them became the 'next big thing,' a lot of the media attention went away. [With] the whole 'regional rock' thing that started with Seattle, everybody figured it would happen here. Whenever anyone would ask us what we sound like, we just say 'regional rock."



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

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
