CRISIS

ORNETTE COLEMAN—Impulse AS-9187 This album originates from a 1969 New York concert with Ornette's quartet and guest artist Don Cherry. The disc features four Coleman tunes as well as Charlie Haden's "Song For Che." Some beautiful playing from some of the master innovators of this era.

MOTIONS AND EMOTIONS

OSCAR PETERSON—BASF 20713

With the arrangements of Claus Ogerman we are presented with a lighter side of this great pianist here as he explores ten pop songs from the last five years. Not the best or most involved Peterson recording but possibly the most commercial.

MESSAGE FROM NEWPORT/NEWPORT SUITE MAYNARD FERGUSON—Roulette RE-116

Two of Maynard Ferguson's most exciting albums from the early sixties are combined here with their original titles. With his new popularity, it would be nice to see new fans turn on to really choice Ferguson from his best era.

FATHA AND HIS FLOCK ON TOUR EARL HINES—BASE 20749

With his regular quartet and vocalist Marva Josie, Hines offers a fine collection of originals and standards at the 1970 Berlin Jazz Festival. There is a lot of good solid playing here despite the brevity of the cuts. The pianist turns in a definitive version of Cole Porter's "Easy To Love."

SIKU YA BIBI (DAY OF THE LADY) CHARLES McPHERSON— Mainstream MRL 365

With a four piece rhythm section, and on half the album strings, alto saxophonist Charles McPherson presents a beautiful tribute to Billie Holiday with a selection of eight tunes identified with her. McPherson and pianist Barry Harris are reatured and play exquisitely. A fine, well planned record.

ANITA O'DAY

Anita O'Day Records

With a variety of rhythm sections, recorded live at many times and locations, classic jazz singer turns out a strong program of standards and current pop tunes. Ms. O'Day is sounding very good these days. This disc can be obtained from her at Box 442, Hesperia, California 92345.

MISSISSIPPI GAMBLER

HERBIE MANN—Atlantic SD 1610
With the presence of the powerful
Texas saxophonist David Newman and
a tight Memphis rhythm section,
Herbie Mann has come up with his
best album in a good many years. The
absolute knockout among the six tracks
is a laid back version of the Otis
Redding-Jerry Butler classic "I've Been
