

FOUR U.S. DELEGATES HOME FROM SWEDEN

Men Who Attended Inter-Parliamentary Convention Impressed by America's Position.

BELGIAN STUDENTS HERE

19 Are Among 576 Passengers on Kroonland—Navy Officer Brings a Bride From France.

Four of the seven American delegates who went to Stockholm for the nineteenth Inter-Parliamentary Union convention returned yesterday on the Red Star liner Kroonland, much impressed with the commanding position this country had assumed in morals and economics the world over.

Twelve nations were represented at the convention in July by 150 delegates, all of whom were reported as keenly interested in the approaching disarmament conference and eager to know just where the weight of President Harding's influence would fall. Representative Alban W. Barkley of Kentucky, Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, Senator W. B. McKinley of Illinois and Representative E. B. Brooks of Illinois were the delegates who returned.

Among the ship's company of 576 passengers were nineteen Belgian students who will attend American universities with the aid of the Committee for the Relief of Belgium, Educational Foundation. Twenty-four students enjoy that advantage yearly and five of this year's quota already are here. The Belgian students will spend three days sight-seeing in New York. Many wore ribbons indicative of gallant war service. The party includes one woman, Miss Irma De Jans, Ph. D., University of Brussels, who will study American literature at the University of Wisconsin.

Norman Arthur of Princeton, N. J., transferred from the post of Secretary of the American Legation at The Hague to Montevideo, returned with his wife and child for a month's vacation.

La Touraine of the French Line also swelled the quota of foreign students in America, bringing six Spanish girls, three doctors and three nurses, to pursue post graduate work in our colleges under the auspices of the Spanish Government.

The last of the Harvard Glee Club members who toured Europe came back on La Touraine.

Lieutenant Dallas Dupre, who served with the torpedo squadron in French waters during the war, returned to announce that Miss Germaine Grout, daughter of Admiral Grout of the French Navy, who came with him had become his bride at Brest on Aug. 27 last.

Pierre Mathieu, violinist, arrived to join the New York Symphony Orchestra, and Pierre Augiers, pianist, came to accompany Kubelick during this Fall season.

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
